

My Dear Sir

The sight of your Note to know
hand was a great deal more astonishing
than all the Medicines in my shop, as I actually
supposed you had forgot Me Which I am happy
to see is not the case, Your two letters come
very opportunely as Mr. R. was just recovering
from a very tedious and dangerous labour which
she has lately undergone and by which she has
increas'd my family by the addition of a little
daughter born on the 19th January 1744, but which
very near cost her, her life, she is however

they got for in your shop was sold at auction on acct of
Lathrop shortly after his flight, you sent about
the sum to my father I was ^{not} with delay,

I find it withal: Which will be some time before
I shall have, as our present Government is very
permissive, and will not allow of a pin being made over
and above the salary, nay, every body is obliged to swear
monthly that they are honest. Government has reduced
the funds property of this Country to nearly a par
with England, having called in all their Paper of 8
11 Pence and issued other Treasury, 6 Pence only. Trade
is very dull and the Glaziers of Agency can get no cash
for Money on account of it — My new situation
affords me 200 a Month out of this I must find a
House for every thing, I have been obliged to build
one which in so doing and furnishing it out of
little decency it has cost me upwards of 6000
Rupers, this has consumed all my Ready entirely, but
thank God I don't owe a pice to nobody. Next
Year I must do something with go home My
Debt, he must be either sent to Calcutta or
Europe I leave you to judge then how far I
am able to afford what you require. I will
nevertheless do every thing in my power and
should my father as I told you before be in
distress from sickness or inability let him have
half a Guinea a week and I will readily remit
it either to Glazier or any other person you approve
of, it is not my intention either to confine him to this
or to establish it, as whenever my circumstances will
allow of it I will do my utmost in the mean time
I must consider that I have 3 small Children to
will for, the oldest not 6 years old, and should I
tomorrow they have none of them a friend to look up
except their Mother who is in want of every assistance
herself, Another thing I cannot think it incumbent on
me to maintain a Wretched Woman, viz My father's wife,
who has been means of reducing him to want of distress

and was the cause of my being turned out of doors
at 10 years of age, was my father alone. I would not
hesitate in making a sacrifice even to provide for
him, but I am determined I never will injure my
own family to benefit or provide for one who has
so irreparably injured me, she has friends & relations
in affluence, her own Mother even, but her worthless
character has estranged her from all these, & with
them be the persons who I cannot, I hope you should
show to Mr. Brown this part of my letter as I would not
wish to give him a pang by a retrospection of the
past, he has been very weak in his conduct with
this woman at his first connecting himself with
her, a preliminary article of which was that the whole
of his then small family 2 boys & a girl, should be got rid
of a few months was sufficient to carry all this in to
effect. I was turned out of doors, the little girl my
sister was taken by this woman to a child infected
with the small pox and made miserable, which decided
her father, my brother by her ill treatment was
obliged to run away from her and after a thousand
hard trials at last enlisted for a drummer, to her
blame and ill treatment must be ascribed his death
as he died of Hydrocephalus and left 2 poor babes
to want, What I do towards my father, is from
an imperious sense of duty, not affection, as
cannot say I feel any, nor could I ever expect it my
self had I treated my children in the same manner
or if I should ever, supply their pan. I wish Brown
see him want, if I have it, but it goes considerably
against my wish & feelings that she should partake even
