






FORREST BUILDING
Built 1887


# MEDICAL SCIENCE BUILDING Built 1920






SCIENCE BUILDING—Built 1911



# The Council of



The Council of the Students, to give it its formal name, is the principal administrative and legislative organization of the student body. It is the only recognized medium between the student body and University authorities, and also between the student body and any other groups. It administers the funds of the student body, financing with them the approved forms of extra-curricular activity. All campus clubs and societies must obtain the recognition of the Council before they can operate on the Campus. Under its constitution the Council is responsible to the University authorities for the good order and discipline of the student body.








# English Rugby . . .



Dalhousie was represented in both the Halifax City League and the Nova Scotia Intercollegiate series by strong Junior, Intermediate, and Varsity teams, and under the coaching of Yonkers' own Gabriel Vitalone the Tigers experienced one of their most successful seasons.

In the Halifax League the Intermediate squad ended the season with the City Championship for the 2nd year, after winning every game against Stadacona, Shearwater, and Dal Grads. Under a heavy schedule, the Tigers met and defeated both the Acadia Axemen and the Yarmouth Intermediates, but were unable to go on to the finals due to the nearness of exams.

Dal Varsity came up with the upset of the year when they edged the St. F. X. Xaverians, Dominion Intermediate Champions, by a score of 32-31. In a never to be forgotten game, Gordie McCoy scored with 5 seconds to go, thus putting the Tigers out ahead in the Nova Scotia Intercollegiate loop. Acadia bowed to Dal by a total score of 88-62, and St. F. X. copped the title by defeating Dal in a sudden death game 53-36.

The Dal squad staged numerous exhibition tilts during the year, including one with Saint John Atlantics, Dominion Senior Champions, who defeated the locals 64-42, and one with Mt. Allison Varsity, who lost to Dal 49-32.




Anxious eyes watch as the ball goes in the basket in a Dal-Grads Intermediate Game.

# Hockey . . .







The Dalhousie Boxing squad, an underdog in pugilistic circles since the war, came up with its best season for many years, winning all but three bouts during the whole 1950 term. Coaches Jack McKenna and Percy Paris, aided by Managers Don Kerr and Gino DiGiacinto, started the training sessions early in the fall term, and several series of exhibition bouts with local amateur and professional fighters helped to get the boys in fine shape.

The Tigers made their best showing in the Maritime Intercollegiate Meet, held by the University of New Brunswick during March. With entries in seven events, the Bengals took four of the championships and two runner-up spots. In the middleweight finals Gordy MacDonald of Dal lost a split decision to U.N.B. but earned the plaudits of the crowd through his sportsmanship and gameness, and was voted the award of "Most Sportsmanlike Boxer." In the bantam division Dave Rammassar lost a decision to former champion Lloyd MacDonald of Tech. Joel Christianson put up a game scrap, before losing a decision in the featherweight finals. Murray Dubchansky walked away with the lightweight title, winning two bouts by decisions. Andy Berna scored a K.O. and a decision to take the Junior welter crown and Joel Matheson scored an upset over former Canadian Army champ Harry Collier to win the senior welter title.

The Bengals were nosed out of the team trophy by U.N.B. which was awarded two titles, and took the meet by a single point.

# VALEDICTORY

# Delivered by BERNARD BRUCE LOCKWOOD, B. Com.

May 13, 1950

On Tuesday, the largest class in Dalhousie's history, will have become graduates. Among them will be students from the Arts and Science Faculty and the professional schools, students who entered from high school and veterans, unmarried students and those with wives and families.

On the whole, this class represents a wider section of the population than any previous group leaving Dalhousie, not only because of its size, but also because of the diversity in type.

Our class should go far in maintaining the standard set by the whole succession of Dalhousie graduates. We know and we are often reminded of Dalhousie's relative preeminence in her contribution to Canada's progress. No other university on the North American continent can claim to have produced so many leaders in all fields of life from so few prospects.

And although Dalhousians have waxed so famous and spread so far, none have lost their affection for the college. The success of the first alumni homecoming serves to show how great is the present interest from past experience here. The class of '50 will certainly continue that interest . . . may we also increase it.

Dalhousie as we know it has not been a rah-rah college. We have not seen monster pep rallies, monster snake dances, and monster initiations. There have been periods in the past when such activities were carried on to a moderate degree, but Dalhousie's very size and perhaps a dash of Maritime conservatism has kept the tendency to a minimum. In student days, understanding has replaced glittering attraction . . . later, lasting affection has replaced wavering passion. Dalhousie has been a friend, not a mistress.

If we in the graduating class continue that tradition, Dalhousie's future is assured. A wonderful start has been made for us. In the few years of our presence on the campus, we have seen many advances . . . new buildings, new professors, new faculties But there remains aims in which we must help if the dreams of Dalhousie's founders are to be realized. And there remain conflicts which must be settled.

Not the least of these is centered around state support of universities. We are faced with the certainty that the days of large individual contributions are disappearing, and we must now depend on small personal contributions and government grants. The trouble lies in reconciliation. Many seem to believe that the two cannot co-exist . . . that one will eventually stifle the other. We must find a workable compromise, or concede the truth of that belief, thereby giving over our seats of learning entirely to the state.

But this is only part of larger problems the class must meet. We have seen the effects of great social-istic pressures throughout the world, with many variations in degree and utility. Ways must now be found to retain the gains made, but hold in check those who would carry a good thing too far. Those systems which we have in Canada are good; no doubt they can be improved upon if uncontrolled expansion does not take place. No one, however, should be encouraged to expect anything for nothing, although some seem to see that as a government's prime function.

Most of us will eventually enter the higher income groups. As members of those groups we will complain mightily about sustaining those who will not work for themselves, or those less competent than ourselves. But, as Prime Minister St. Laurent pointed out last week . . . to complain about taxes is to complain about the twentieth century itself. We have built our conception of the twentieth century on the free enterprise system, and we who practice the survival of the fittest in business must attend to the survival of the weakest in life itself.

This year has also seen what we can only hope is the height of communism. Predictions have been made that Stalin's death will see the collapse of Russia as a threat to world peace, and promises have said that communistic expansion will go no further. Ours will be the burden should these be incorrect, and the antipathy which most of us feel toward war, we will have to suppress. Although many of us have not actually suffered

the horrors of war, we have associated with those who have. We have developed a firm desire for peace, strengthened by the certain knowledge that the next war, if there if one, will see the end of our Western civilization.

It may be that we take upon ourselves too great a burden. It has been said many times that Canadians worry too much . . . we do a disproportionate amount of thinking about the state of the world. That may be true, but on a basis of population the same applied to ancient Athens, and comparative progress is no excuse for cessation of effort.

On a more personal level, we must avoid other dangers. We are facing two more . . . one we can alleviate, the other is largely beyond our control.

Because we have a college education, we must not think ourselves ready to meet any challenge. True education teaches humility. Many educators have pointed out that a student should leave college knowing that he could know far more than he does know. And many business men have rejected a college student, knowing that the student could not know half as much as he thinks he does. We should realize our limits as well as our lengths.

On the other hand, we must never reach the point of thinking our education here valueless. We may soon find ourselves in the midst of a business recession as far reaching as our present boom. Should we suffer, as many of us will, we must not devalue our training. In a material world, judgments are most often formed on material standards, but the greatest good done by our years here will be accomplished on levels not so concrete.

We are members of the so-called "cynical" generation. Our thoughts are painted as materialistic; our attitudes skeptical; our ideals almost non-existent. On the one hand, that picture is unjustly harsh; on the other it is to some extent true and even to be expected. Most of our fathers fought one war; some of us fought a second; all of us have seen life against a background of stark reality. If we can make no other claim, we can say that very few of us are dreamers.

That may be our loss, or it may mean that in future years the fact that we are Dalhousie graduates and realists will place us among an even more distinguished company of men and women. Our years here will have introduced us to that company.

## DAVID IRWIN MORGAN


