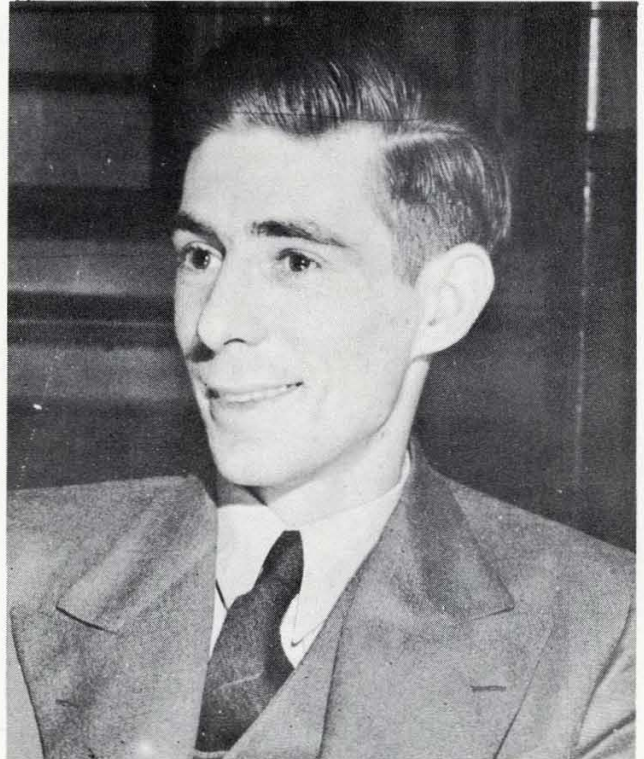
tainment scheduled for that week. This meant that the Delta Gamma plans for Co-ed week previously scheduled for that week were indefinitely delayed or cancelled.

Students Forums for the year will be remembered as being rather quiet affairs in contrast to those of former years, although the same recurrent problems were discussed—namely the question of the allocation of Student Ice Time in the Dalhousie Memorial Rink, and constitutional amendments, which this year took the basis of a complete consolidation and revision of the Constitution.

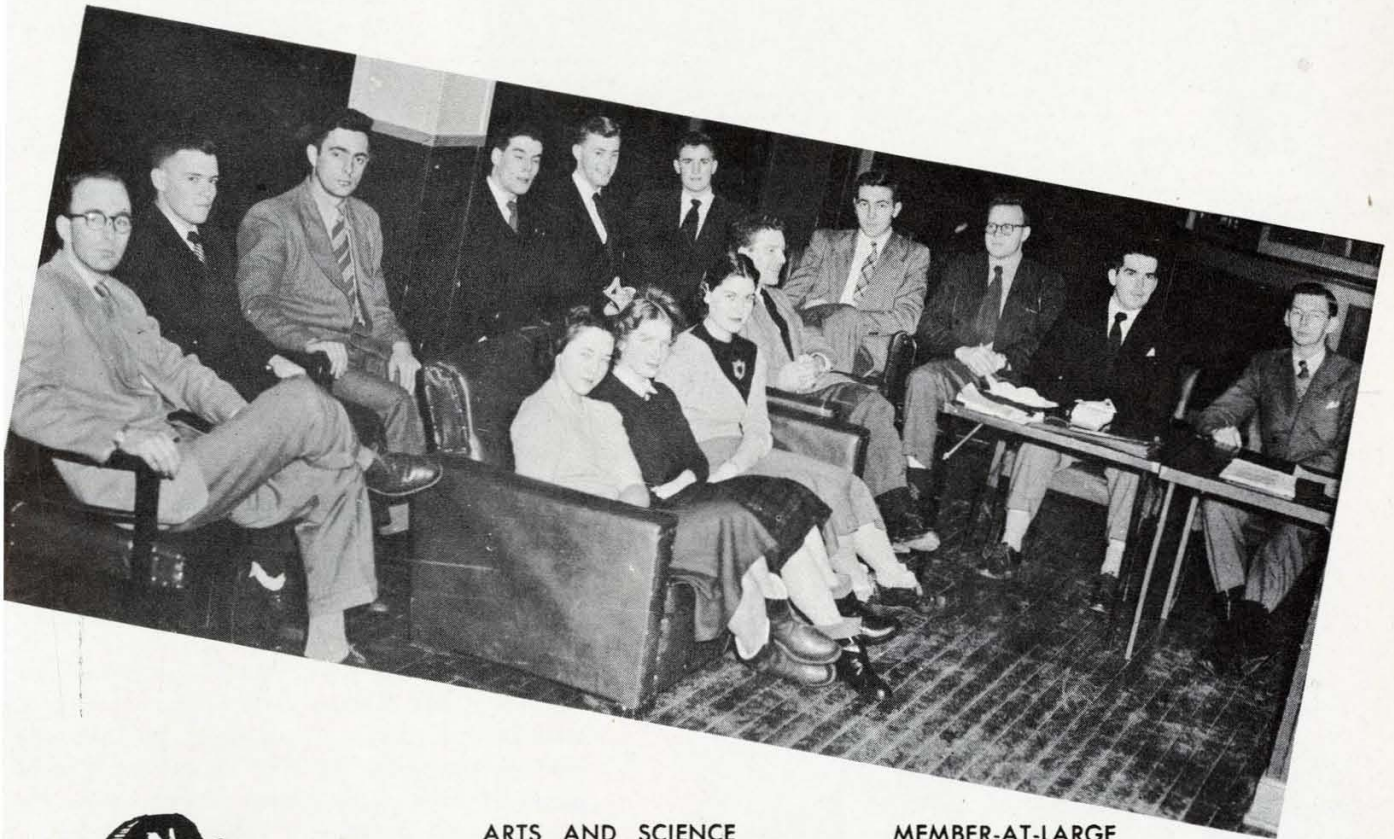

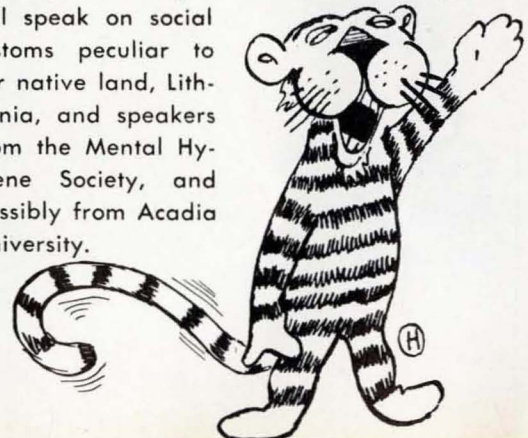


Sociology Club

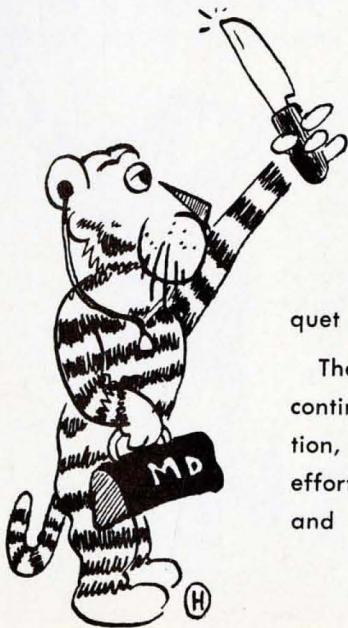

As the Rink Rats complete their third year as an organization to raise ten thousand dollars—the campus contribution to the Memorial Rink—they are busily planning for the oncoming year.

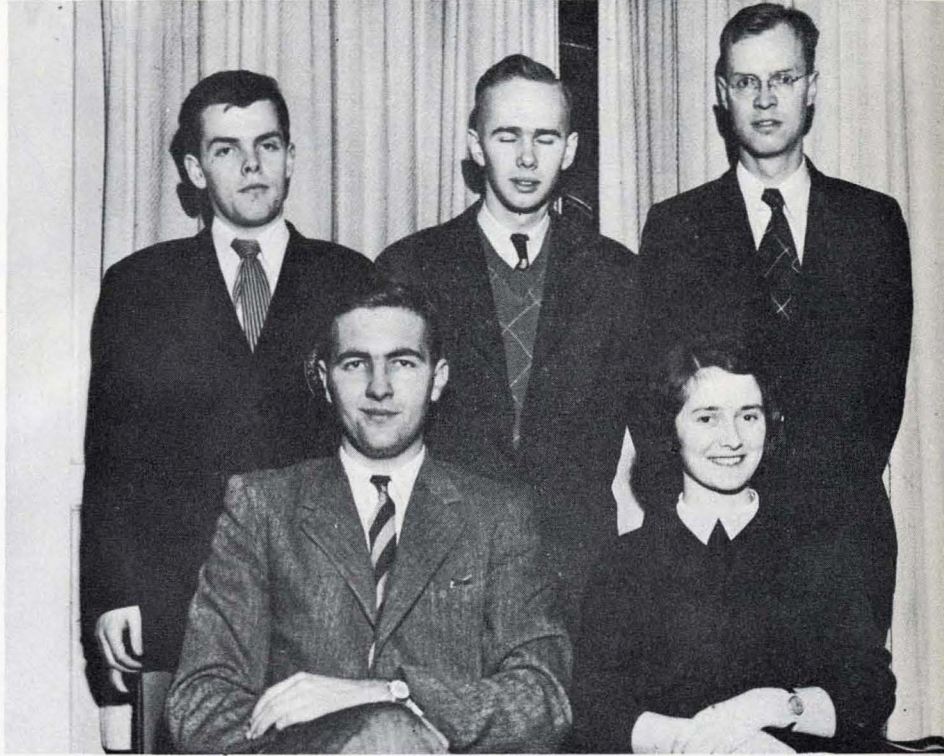

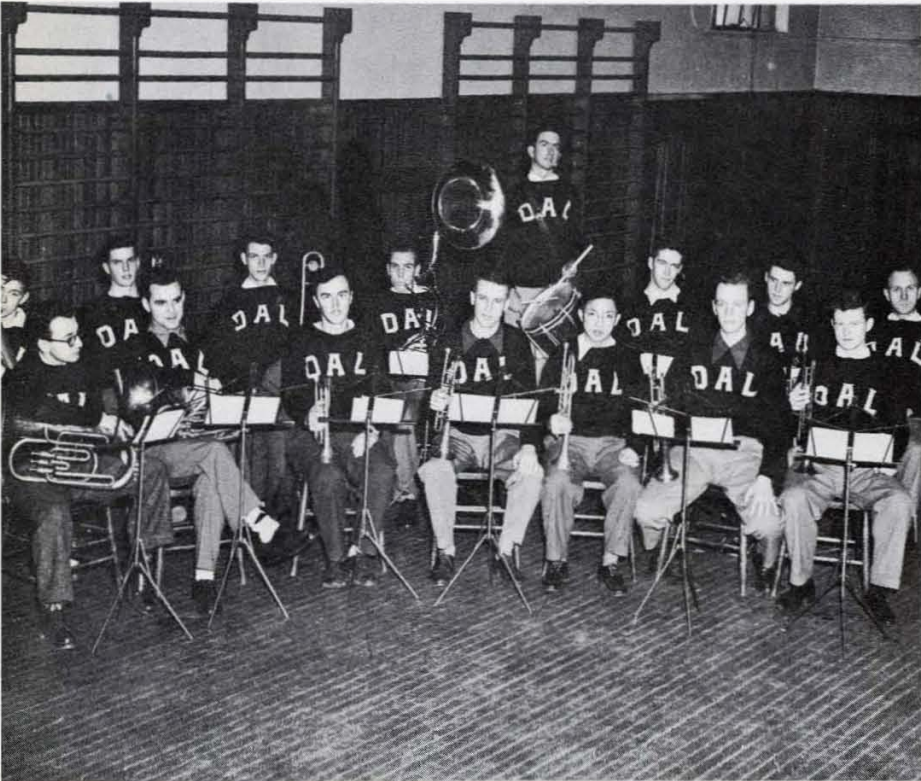
