

Professor Berman served as an Instructor with the Navy during the war after which he studied Commerce at McGill. He joined the Dalhousie Commerce Department in 1949, where in addition to a heavy teaching schedule he found time to undertake work in Adult Education, to serve on a Royal Commission, and to attend a course at Harvard University.

The Principle—"He who serves most, is loved most", was perfectly demonstrated in the life of Professor Berman. All students became convinced of his real interest in them as persons. The spontaneous expressions of regret on the occasion of his death, heard on all sides from present and former students, form the best possible tribute to his memory. The significance of a life lies in its quality, not its duration, and friends and family of Professor Berman find solace in recalling the kind of man he was.




The President's Message

I am happy to acknowledge the debt of the University to the editors of Pharos for the time and effort they have expended on this pictorial review of student activities in the year 1957-58. It will serve as a permanent reminder to all of us, and particularly to the students directly concerned, of some of the outstanding campus events of the year. It may also furnish prospective students who are still in high school with a true reflection of the lighter side of University life. Anyone who wishes to know how Dalhousie students employ their time must consult Pharos as well as the University Calendar.

The past year will be outstanding in the annals of the University for three things. The first was the creation of the office of Chancellor and the choice of a great Canadian statesman and former Dalhousie professor, the Right Honourable C. D. Howe, as the first incumbent. The second was the announcement by the Sir James Dunn Foundation of a gift to Dalhousie, by far the largest benefaction that the University has ever received, to finance the construction of the Sir James Dunn Science Building: Lady Dunn herself graciously came to Halifax and turned the first sod on the site in a simple but impressive ceremony. The third was the completion of the fine new Dental Building which stands on the corner of Robie Street and University Avenue, realizing a cherished dream. These developments show that Dalhousie is moving steadily forward, and are an earnest of other improvements yet to come.

The year will be remembered in history as the one in which man succeeded in launching the first Earth-satellite. There is no doubt in the minds of scholars that this is a momentous achievement in the progress of science. It has certainly disposed all thoughtful people to-day to believe that the possibilities of understanding and controlling the forces of nature and harnessing them for human ends are very far from exhausted. You, the graduates of 1958, will see many new things in your lifetime, things of which most of us have no pre-vision whatsoever. It is our earnest hope that you will both see and in due measure contribute to the progress of your generation along many lines especially its progress towards nobler living and international peace. Amid the splendid conquests of science may you yourselves be "more than conquerors" in the profound sense in which that phrase is used in the Holy Scriptures. God bless you all!





The past year has been an interesting and active one in the field of Student Government at Dalhousie.

I believe that the relationship between the students and the University improved greatly in 1957-1958. The students have been enjoying the use of the various libraries on Sunday afternoons for the first time this year, and the University is to be commended for its. enlightened policy in this respect.

Of major importance was the paying off of the balance of the pledge, made by the students in 1950, toward the construction of the rink. I would like to thank the members of the Council for the time and effort they have spent. In particular I feel that our new Secretary-Treasurer, Miss Bernice Robb, and the Vice-President, David Matheson, were in no small way responsible for what I believe was a successful year.

Personally, I would like to thank you for giving me the opportunity of serving in this capacity. It has been a wonderful experience which I have appreciated very much.

National Federation of Canadian University Students

The local NFCUS Committee began the year by distributing the Student Council cards at registration. First year students were in this way brought into early, direct contact with the committee. The contact aroused and maintained interest with the result that this year meetings have been attended by many new workers from the freshman class.

The 21st National Congress was held in Quebec City. We were represented by a large active delegation. The finished draft of the revised NFCUS constitution was submitted and approved by the Congress. We had undertaken this project on a mandate from the previous Congress. Pat Fownes, Dal Law '57, was elected President of the Atlantic region. Ed Harris, outstanding member of this year's graduating Law class was elected National Vice-President in charge of National Affairs.

Most outstanding among projects undertaken on the national level was a campaign to seek aid from the Federal Government for financial assistance for all students qualifying for admission to university. Great effort has been made to bring this proposal to the attention of government executives, members of parliament and the people of Canada.

The Canada Council has provided NFCUS with funds to organize a National Seminar of students in cooperation with the Canada Council. It will be held in September 1958 at the University of Western Ontario. Approximately forty-five students from all parts of Canada will be brought together to discuss the theme, "The Role of the University in National Development". Such action on the part of Canada Council is indeed heartening. It indicates that the voice of the Canadian student is being heard and heeded through NFCUS.


1957 was a year of growth. The number of students increased to about 51,000 with the joining of some 6,000 students from the University of Manitoba. The Federation now speaks the opinion of 85% of the Canadian University population.

Locally, we added to the list of merchants in the Halifax area permitting students discounts. Money for the NFCUS Atlantic Regional Scholarship Fund was raised through sale of tickets of the family of tigers. The "Daddy" of the family was raffled off on Munro Day. Publicizing the NFCUS Plan offered by the Canadian Premier Life Insurance Company was also a program to which a good deal of time was devoted. It is regretted that a student exchange weekend could not have been arranged with other Maritime Universities and some of the New England colleges, but it is a project well worth consideration for the following years.

THE ADMIRABLE



The popular Hall Formal, which had a Chinese theme this year, was the best ever and the Christmas Party will hold many fond memories for us all.






