Dedication

Dr. George Earle Wilson came to Dalhousie in the fall of 1919, so that this is his forty-first year of continuous teaching at the University. He has been "George Munro Professor of History" and Head of the Department for the whole period, and for many years was Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Science. This record of service is one of the longest and most renowned in the history of the University.

Dr. Wilson belongs to that small group of distinguished teachers who are known throughout the whole country and are not merely within their own University. It is safe to predict that the memory of his teaching will persist for many generations. Sons and daughters will hear from parents of the inspiration and wisdom he imparted.

With rare skill the young student was made to feel that the University was a friendly place designed to serve his needs. Dr. Wilson's door was always open and the extra chair nearly always occupied by a student or a fellow teacher in search of knowledge or encouragement. No one ever went away without help. The ones who were really interested in History—or any other intellectual activity for that matter—were invited to a home cooked meal or a walk around the Park.

May he always live near Dalhousie and continue to talk to students and walk with them around the Park!

I appreciate the invitation to write a prefatory paragraph or two for this 1960 issue of Pharos, and in particular the opportunity to thank the officers and members of the student organizations for the part they have played in the life of the University during the year under review. It is now recognized everywhere that participation in the activities of the campus is important both for the University and for the individuals concerned.

I wish also to congratulate the members of the graduating class on the successful completion of their courses of study. I am fully convinced that the young people who graduate in these days have all the splendid qualities of their predecessors who helped to make the name of Dalhousie illustrious among the institutions of higher learning in Canada.

This brief message is being written as the calendar year 1959 draws to a close. The session has, therefore, not yet reached the halfway mark, but it is already clear that when the record is complete it will show a number of very worthy achievements. The progress that has been made on the construction of the Sir James Dunn Science Building and the Men's Residence in the past twelve months has radically changed the appearance of Studley Campus as seen from Coburg Road. The establishment of the Institute of Oceanography should enable the University, located as it is within sight and sound of the Atlantic, to fulfill a special function in the study of the sea. The decision to offer new courses leading to the degree of Doctor of Philosophy indicates that the University is accepting the responsibilities for advanced education and research that devolve naturally upon it. All of our professional schools have registered significant advances.

May I, in extending my very best wishes to the students who are about to join the ranks of alumni of the University, express the hope that they will keep alive their interest in the development of their alma mater, for we can confidently say of Dalhousie that the best is yet to be.

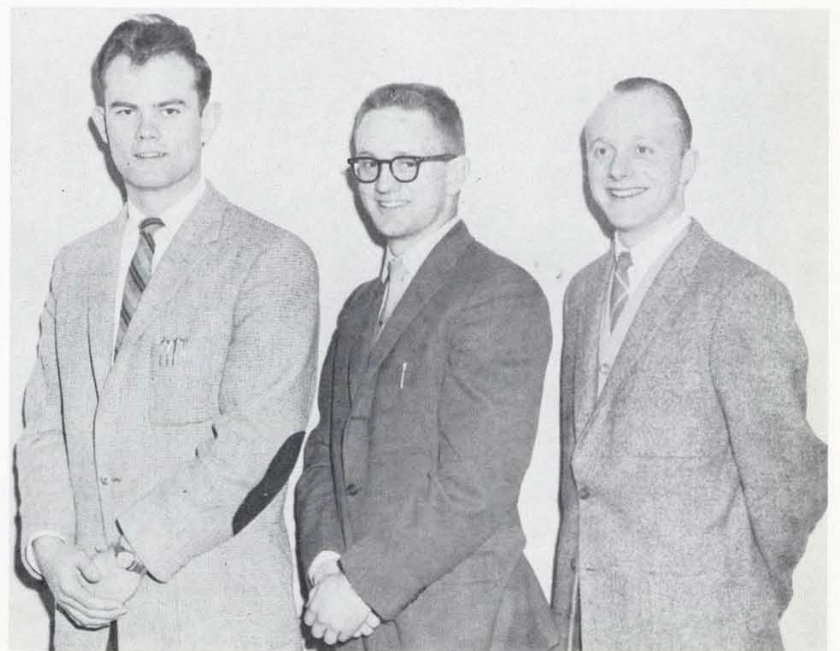
Dalhousie Advertising Bureau

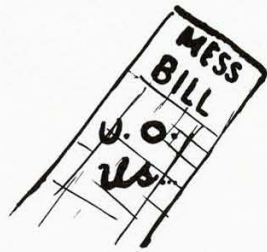

U.R.T.P.

Over the past year a considerable amount of time and energy has been expended by the Regular and Reserve members of the University Squadron of the R. C. A. F. Although the machines of war are essentially non-productive, military training, particularly when it is combined with academic training, is a most productive exercise.

During the year the cadets have received lectures on subjects ranging from the highly technical Guidance of Missiles, through the less technical but nevertheless complex problems of economics and finally to the social problems of the Beat Generation.

All the cadets have benefited from this and other training.



C.O.T.C.

The Dalhousie University Contingent C.O.T.C. was formed in 1914, its primary purpose being to supply qualified officers for the Canadian Army.

The present day Contingent has an intake quota of six per year. Today, a student is enrolled in the rank of Officer cadet and serves for a period of three years, the training cycle is based on three summers practical training at corps schools or field units, and lasts from the middle of May to the latter two weeks of August. The training program during the academic year consists of one evening's training per week commencing in October and finishing in March.

The great technical advances of the past two decades makes it almost mandatory for officers coming into the army to be university trained. Canada looks to the universities to supply not only her future professional men, but also to make up the officer complement of her Armed Forces.

U.N.T.D. and R.O.T.P.

The Regular Officer Training Plan is the principal avenue of entry to commissioned rank in Her Majesty's Royal Canadian Navy. It provides an opportunity for University students enrolled in suitable courses to complete their University studies as officer cadets.

R. C. N. cadets receive \$63.00 per month pay and \$65.00 per month living allowance. All tuition and other essential fees are paid, together with an allowance of \$75.00 per annum in respect to the costs of books and instruments. Uniforms, and Medical and Dental care are provided by the service. Annual leave of 30 days, plus travelling time, is granted with full pay and allowance.

The University Naval Training Division cadet undertakes training similar to the R.C.N. cadet for three winters and two summers. Upon completion of the required training and having maintained a good academic standing, the cadet is granted a commission in the Reserve component of the R.C.N. The pay during the 14-17 weeks of summer training is \$210.00 per month in addition to uniforms, medical care, and board.

A U.N.T.D. cadet may transfer to R.O.T.P. at any time provided he meets the medical and academic requirements.





Progressive Conservative Association

The Progressive Conservative Association of Dalhousie passed one of its most successful years in its history. The enthusiasm of students for the club itself touched heights never before reached in the thirteen years of its existence.

Meetings were broadened to include audience-participation panel discussions on many problems affecting the Parliament of Canada. Leading members of Parliament and several Halifax industrialists, lawyers and other professional men were kind enough to give their time and thought in such discussions by their participation on the panels.

Even though the club did not form the government of Model Parliament, it was successful in a far more important sphere, by securing a fundamental change in the private member's bill presently before the House of Commons to secure the abolition of capital punishment. The recommendations of the club in this respect were graciously accepted by Mr. Frank McGee, M.P., its sponsor.

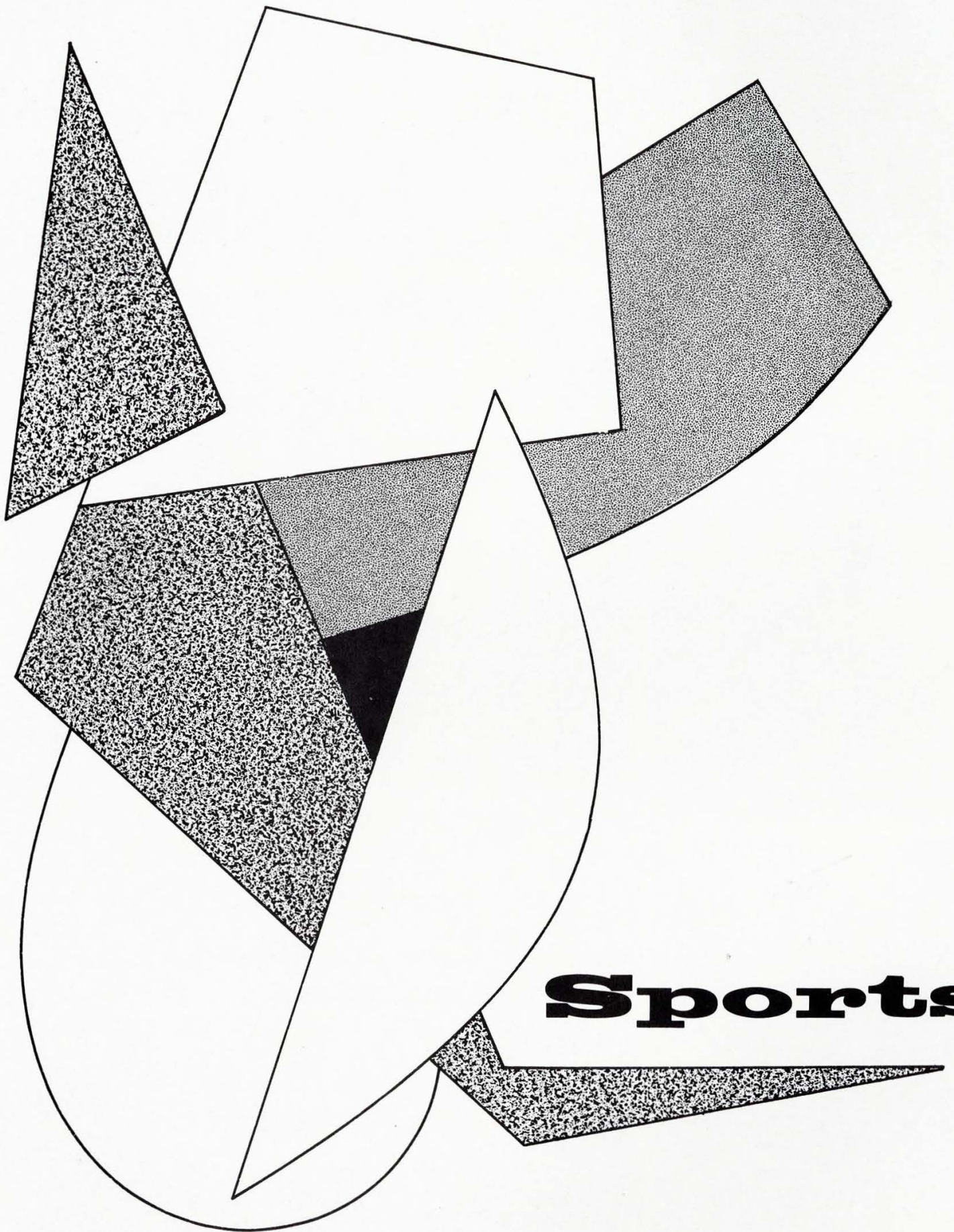


Dalhousie Pepcats

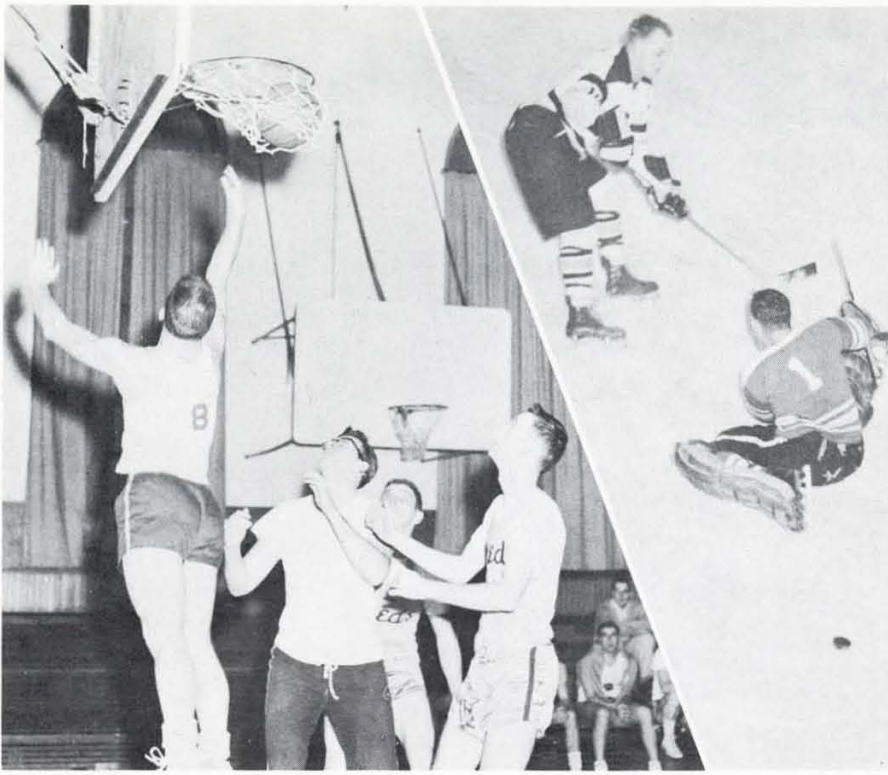

In viewing all aspects of athletics, it must be considered that 1959-60 was a good year at Dalhousie.

On the intercollegiate level, our teams have done well and special tribute should be paid to our curling and tennis teams, both of which won Maritime Intercollegiate Championships this year. In football we had one of our better teams for some years and reached the Purdy Cup finals before being eliminated. Our Junior Varsity team deserves special mention as they were undefeated in their exhibition games this year. In hockey our team did well and were eliminated in the playoffs only after a very close series with St. Mary's. In basketball, Dal had only periodic success in league play but made an excellent showing in the playoffs before losing to the Maritime Champions, St. F.X. In other sports, like soccer, golf, and volleyball, we did well if not outstandingly. It is worthwhile to note that a particularly large number of new players were added to varsity teams this year and the outlook for the future is extremely bright.

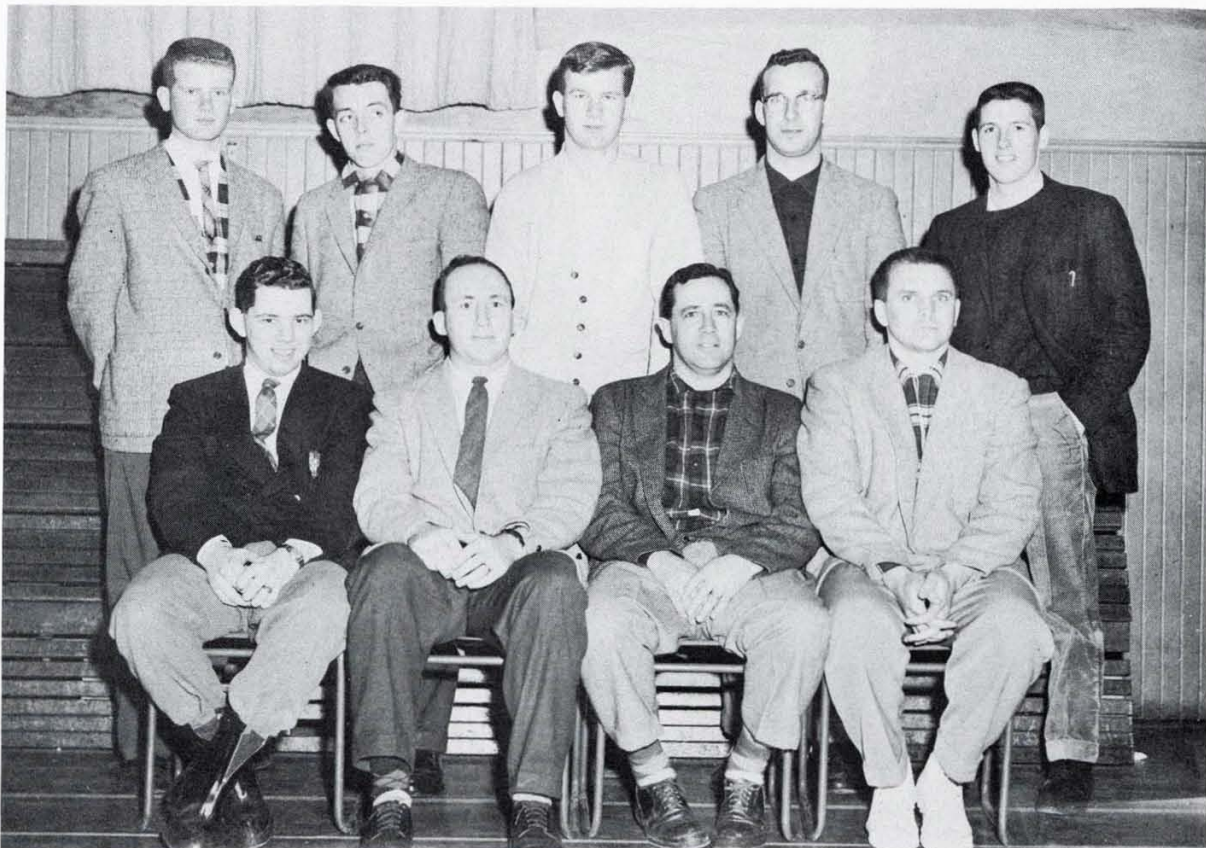
At the interfaculty level we had an excellent year with all leagues being very closely contested and

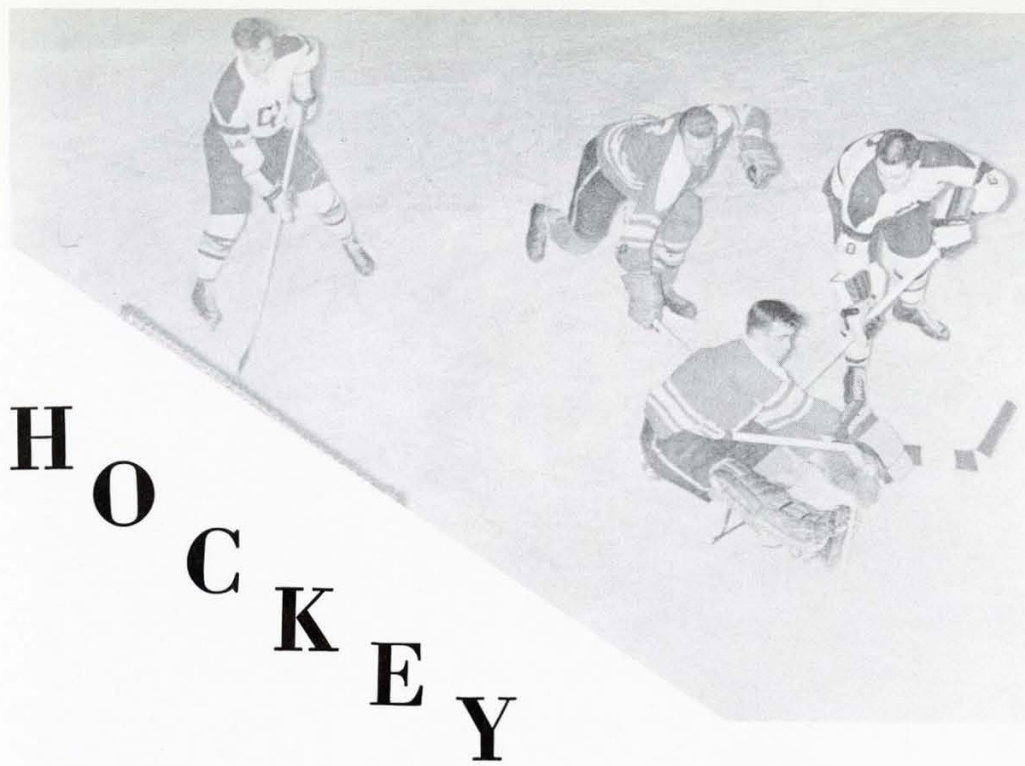


VARSITY

THE STORY OF MUNRO DAY

On July 9, 1881, the Governors of Dalhousie University dealt with a petition from the students, asking that each year there be a holiday named "The George Munro Memorial Day" in celebration of the great benefactions of George Munro. The petition was granted, and the third Wednesday of January of each year was set aside as "The George Munro Day." In the course of years the name has been shortened to "Munro Day". In the year 1928, "Munro Day" was celebrated on March 9, and President A. Stanley Mackenzie reviewed the

history of Dalhousie's benefactors. The special guest on that occasion was the Right Honourable R. B. Bennett, (later Viscount Bennett), who was referred to as one of our great benefactors himself, and the cause of other notable benefactions. Since that time, the names of all our benefactors have been associated with "Munro Day." In 1938 the Senate decided that in the future "Munro Day" should be celebrated on the second Tuesday in March.

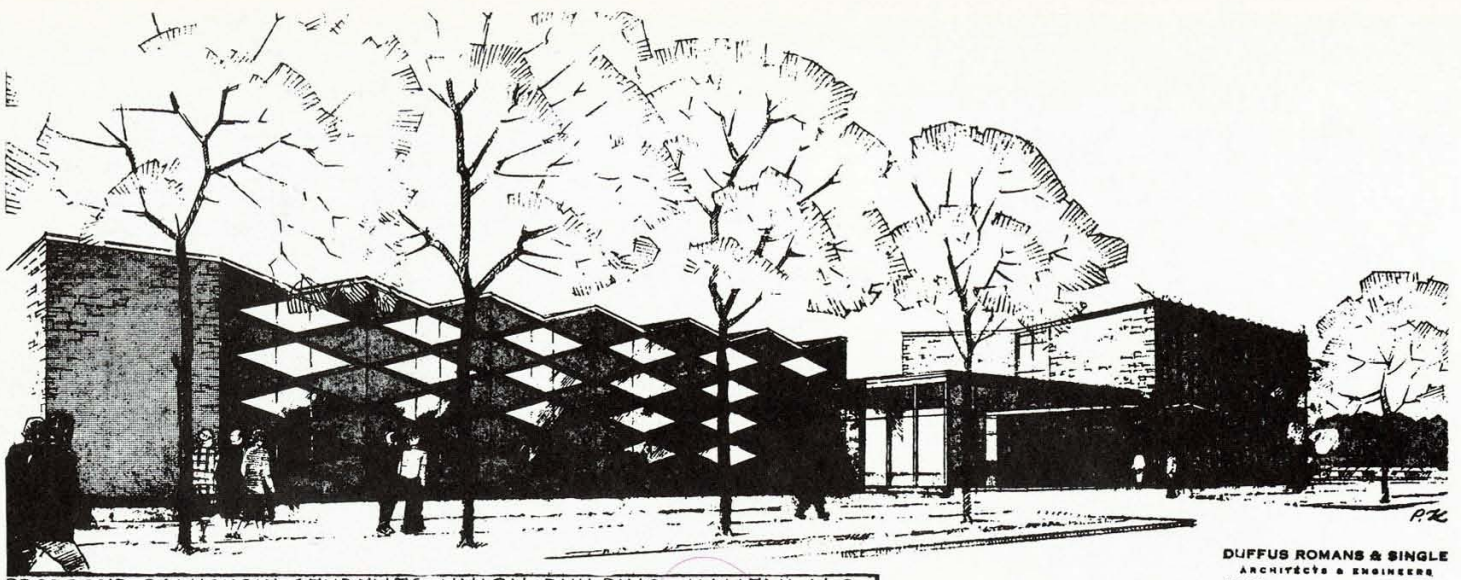

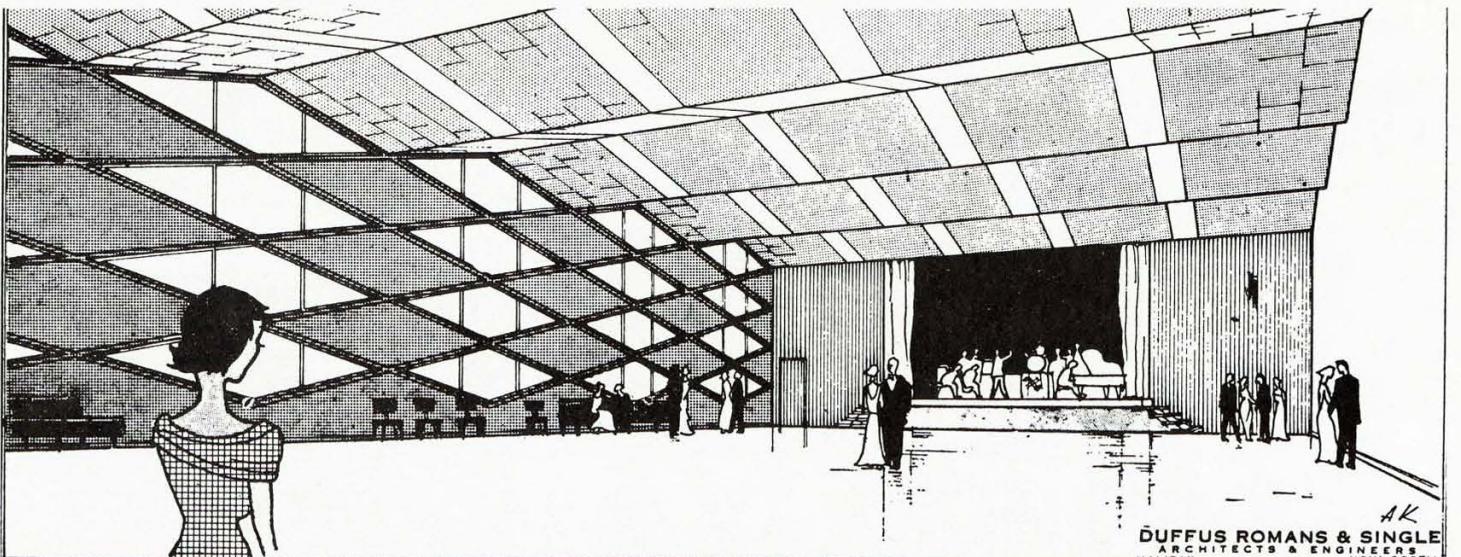

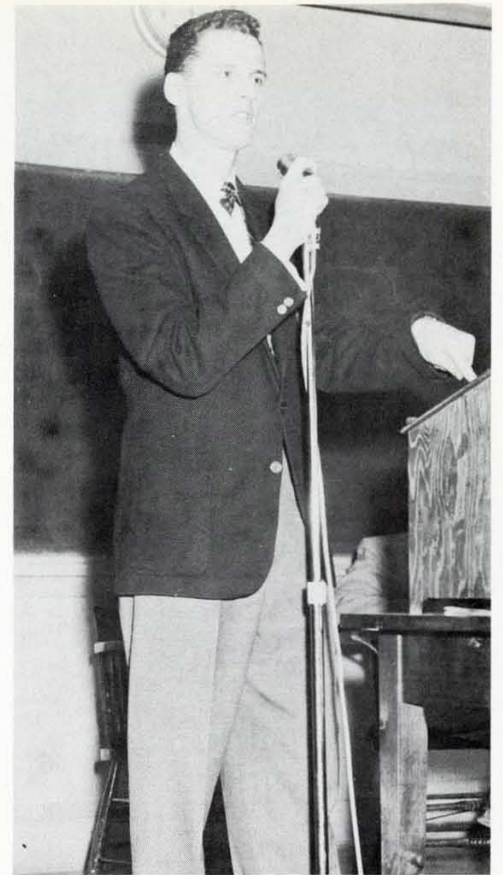
PROPOSED DALHOUSIE STUDENT UNION BUILDING HALIFAX N.S. AUDITORIUM - BALLROOM



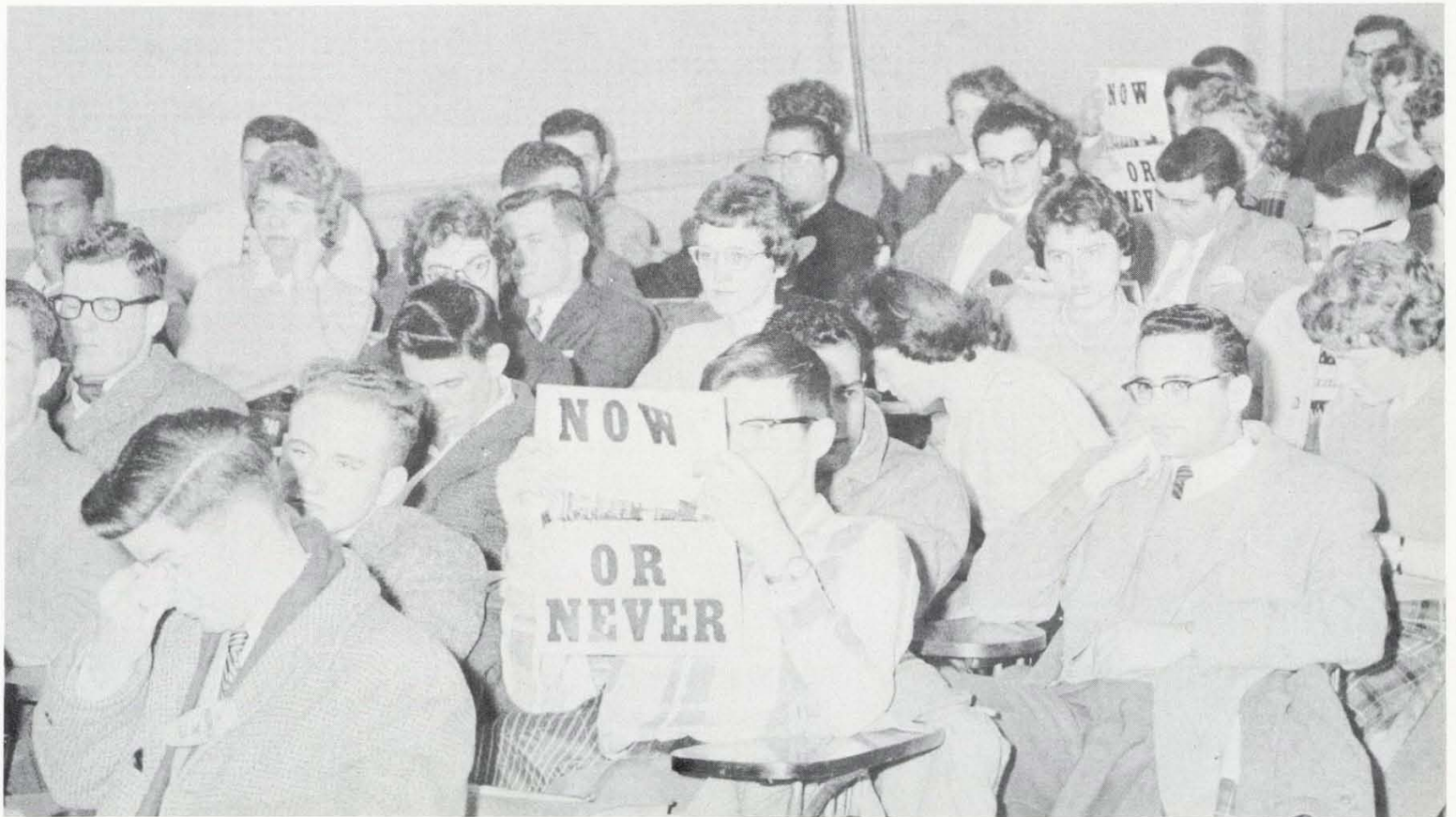
