In Memoriam



The Right Honourable C. D. Howe

P.C., B.Sc., LL.D., D.Eng., D.Sc., D.C.L. January 15, 1885 to December 31, 1960

The year nineteen hundred and sixty-one will remain in the memory of all Dalhousians and even all Canadians as the year which marked the loss of the Right Honourable Clarence Decatur Howe.

A graduate engineer from Massachusetts, twenty-three years old, Mr. Howe came to our university on the shores of the Atlantic to accept a Dalhousie professorship. While a teacher here, he also stood on the threshold of a political destiny that was to leave an indelible mark on Canada and her history. Fifty-three years later after distinguishing Dalhousie by serving as her Chancellor for three years, still an integral part of the University and by this time a much beloved master who was still instructing our citizens in the arts, sciences, and trades of building a nation, Mr. Howe passed away.

The eulogies and tributes extended Mr. Howe following his death were many. They found their origin in the hearts of his closest friends, his political allies, and those who had spent much of their own lives opposing him. But from Halifax comes a tribute by another native son which among many stands before us as a fitting memorial to the late Chancellor.

"Only we who worked with Mr. Howe day in and day out could appreciate the character of his ability, his courage, his strength, his decisiveness and above all his devotion to duty and to public interest.

He was truly a statesman of towering stature."





Palhousie Past Present Future

Past

In August, 1814, a small expeditionary force sailed from Halifax and captured Castine, a fortified naval base in what was then the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, whence American privateers sailed to prey upon the British mercantile marine. It was held by a British force until the end of the war, and administered as a British town. In the seven months of occupation the customs duties collected amounted to over £11,500. This sum was brought back to Halifax when the troops returned and was known as the Castine Fund.

In the year of 1816 Lord Dalhousie, the ninth of that name, became Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia. Lord Dalhousie is given the credit of thinking that a seminary for the education of youth in the higher branches of Literature and Science, on the model of Edinburgh University, as being the most worthy of the many objects to which the Castine Fund might be devoted. Legislation was duly

passed and the greater part of the fund was appropriated to this purpose.

In 1820, Lord Dalhousie became Governor-General of Canada. His first public act in Nova Scotia was laying the corner-stone of the first Dalhousie College, with much military pomp and elaborate Masonic ceremony on May 22, 1820. It stood on the northern end of the Grand Parade opposite historic St. Paul's. It was of grey cut stone in the "Colonial" style of the Province Building and Government House. The central member was two stories high, flanked by an east and west wing of one storey. At the entrance was a dignified Georgian portico, and above it, were three tables of stone bearing a Latin description telling when the building was begun and finished. These inscribed slabs were later embedded in the wall of the new building in 1887.

Under the energetic administration of the third president, Dr. John Forrest, Dalhousie became firmly established. The number and quality of students increased, the financial position was assured, the curriculum was made more liberal, a faculty of Law was added, and important men were called to the professorships. His brother-in-law, George Munro, a native of Pictou County, N.S. became interested in the institution and founded no less than five chairs, besides supporting tutors in classics

and mathematics and supplying bursaries and exhibitions for properly qualified students.


In the year 1887, Dalhousie moved from her historic site on the Grand Parade to what was then the western outskirts. This second Dalhousie was built of red brick and is now known as the Forrest Building.

Progress was steadily made in this period of Dalhousie's history. In 1881, women were first admitted

to classes with no opposition or struggle.

In 1912, Dalhousie, again grown too large for its accommodations, was forced to face expansion. It was at this time that the Studley area consisting of more than forty acres was acquired and became duly known as Studley Campus. On August 15, 1912, the corner-stone of the Science Building was laid, the first building on Studley. This was followed in 1914 by the MacDonald Memorial Library.



Faculty, graduates, and students of Dalhousie College for the year 1869-1870.




The second Dalhousie as it appeared in 1887. Minus the turret, it is still familiar to most students, and houses the departments of Botany, Zoology and Medicine.





The Sir James Dunn Science Building, completed fall 1960, housing the departments of Physics, Engineering, and Geology.






Future

Plans for a Student Union Building began in 1911 when a full-time secretary was hired to cope with business details in connection with students' demand for a YW-YMCA building. The idea was subsequently shelved with the appropriation of the property now comprising Studley Campus. In 1914 students and Maritimers raised \$31,000 for the purpose of erecting a Students' Building however in 1924 the money collected to that date was used for the construction of an open air rink. Once again in 1940 pleas were raised but were overshadowed by the prospect of a Mens' Residence, as they were in 1945 by the cry for a War Memorial Rink.

After two years of reports, surveys, and investigations mid-fall, 1958, saw Dalhousie's Student Union Building Committee consolidate itself for a final drive towards the long-awaited referendum. This referendum, whereby the whole student body was to be asked final approval for a fund-raising drive, was tentatively set for the middle of the spring term. To obtain campus-wide consideration of the plans, long-term Co-chairmen Murray Fraser and

Dave Matheson invited representatives from every student organization to join the committee.

Every building needs land to be erected on. This was one of the earliest problems which the committee had to face up to. To this end early October saw a delegation from the committee go before the Board of Governors with a request for assistance. While not promising financial assistance with the building itself, the Board nevertheless cheered the hearts of all by guaranteeing students a grant of land on University Avenue as soon as they, the students, had demonstrated their ability and willingness to finance the building itself.

Turning to the actual financial campaign, the Committee soon determined that the most satisfactory and feasible way to get things begun would be a student-approved yearly fee. A survey of student fees paid by members of comparably-sized Canadian universities soon revealed that Dalhousie's, a mere sixteen dollars at present, were

in the very lowest echelon, probably among the second or third lowest in the country.

Dalhousie students took the step forward toward making the proposed Student Union Building a reality as

they voted overwhelmingly in favour of a ten dollar increase in student fees to help finance the project.

The results of the referendum showed that 1,124 of a possible 1,500 student voters were in favour of this change, while only 124 were opposed to it. Translated into percentages, this means that the students who said "yes" represented 75.1% of the entire student body and 90.2% of the total number of voters. In all 83.2% of the 1,500 elibible voters exercised their franchise.

The next concern was with the building itself. It was obvious that something concrete would have to be shown to the students before they could be asked to vote in a referendum.

The contemporary architectual style of the proposed S.U.B. was designed to promote an atmosphere for student relaxation, with ample facilities for student social and cultural activities and occasional formal affairs.


The flexible design includes three basic centres of student activity: the coffee shop, the auditorium, and the office wing. These are grouped around the lounge and are only a few steps from the main entrance. Upon entering the S.U.B. the student will receive a view much unlike that of most other Student Union Buildings. The strattegically placed lounge, with its warm colors and sunken fireplace, should provide a completely relaxing atmosphere conducive to rest and conversation.

The auditorium, enclosing four hundred square feet, can be converted into two large multi-purpose rooms by means of a folding door. This will undoubtedly provide a sophisticated atmosphere for formals, movies, and de-

bates, and can be used as a lounge, reading room and music room at other times.

Below the spacious coffee shop there will be recreation rooms, coat rooms and washrooms. Below the large Pharos and Gazette offices there will be a barbershop, a student operated bookstore, a publicity office and a photography room. The upper level of the office wing will contain offices for campus organizations, and a committee meeting room.




Just as the past decade has seen Dalhousie grow tremendously, so the next ten years should be a period of unprecedented expansion.

Student Christian


Movement

University Naval Training Divisions

The University Naval Training Division (Halifax Universities and Colleges) is one of 24 such divisions across Canada. It involves Dalhousie, King's, Saint Mary's Universities, and the Nova Scotia Technical College. The commanding officer of the UNTD locally is Lt. R. L. Vatcher, RCN (Reserve), an engineering professor at Dal.

A total of 43 cadets are in the local UNTD, of whom 11 are enrolled in the RCN under the Regular Officer Training Plan. Training during the academic year is carried out in all facilities of HMCS Scotian, Halifax naval division, each Wednesday evening from 7:30 to 10. The programme covers training in leadership, navigation, seamanship, engineering, supply and accounting, and communications.

The UNTD year begins within a fortnight of registration at the various universities and continues until a month before the final examinations. In addition, a minimum of 14 weeks' annual summer training must be carried out. A third of this period is spent at sea.

Service in the UNTD is the principal avenue to commission-

ed rank in the RCN (Reserve). A student must be in good standing, a Canadian citizen or British subject (NATO nationals must receive the approval of Naval Headquarters), be aged 25 or under by the day of graduation and of good physique. Preference is given to students having mathematics and physics to the calculus level due to the highly technical aspects of the modern navy.

Service as a cadet continues for three years, at which time there is promotion to the rank of acting sub-lieutenant. Confirmation of this rank is obtained when a degree is achieved, or at a level three years beyond senior matriculation. First and second year cadets are trained during the summer months in East Coast ships and establishments. The third year cadets go to the West Coast. It is common for cadets to serve well in excess of their minimum 14-week summer period. During the academic year cadets receive half a day's pay for each drill night attended and the full-time pay each summer is \$225 a month, including uniforms, medical and dental treatment, and other benefits.

University Reserve Training Plan

The University Reserve Squadron of the R.C.A.F. has operated successfully during the past year through the co-operation of the Regular and Reserve members of the Squadron. Military training, especially when combined with academic training, is an exercise which is very productive and beneficial to those who take part.

This year there are fifty-five cadets in the Squadron who have received training in many of the most important phases of Canada's defense although the machines of war are essentially non-productive. As in past years, the lectures have dealt with diverse subjects ranging from the highly technical field of the Guidance of Missiles to the less technical but nevertheless complex field of economics. These lectures are

given as preparation for the cadets' intensive summer training which is comprised of all phases of operation which they will be expected to be able to perform when they receive their commissions in the Air Force Reserve.

This summer training program consists of operations in various Air Force bases across Canada such as Clinton and Aylmer in Ontario and College Militaire Royale in St. Jean, Quebec. This training is naturally diversified and comprises many phases of officers' operations due to the fact that the main purpose of the training is to prepare the cadets for the roles they will play when they receive their commissions in Canada's Air Force Reserve.

Canadian Officers Training Corps

The academic year 1960-61 marks the 45th anniversary of the Dalhousie-Kings Contingent of the Canadian Officers Training Corps as the future officers carry out military training one night a week with new weapons and developments in warfare on their syllabus.

Commanding Officer this year is Capt. Frank Sigsworth, a Dalhousie law graduate of 1960. Formerly a member of St. Dunstan's C.O.T.C., he has served in both the Regular and Militia forces before entering Dalhousie. Two other contingent officers are Lt. Robert Marvin and Lt. Jack Hawkins, both Dal students and former members of the Royal Canadian Artillery.

Seventeen Dal-Kings students are taking either C.O.T.C. or Regular Officer Training Plan training with the contingent this year. For them it is their pathway to the Queen's Commission while they receive leadership training, useful technical knowledge, good pay, and summer employment. Theoretical work is taken during the college year with the practical phase in the summer.

Corporal J. F. MacDonald was appointed to the Contingent as Clerk Administration on the first of September 1959. He has been with the Canadian Army (Regular) since August 1950, and saw service in Germany with the Canadian Brigade there.





Dalhousie University's football Tigers made a fair debut in the new Atlantic Football Conference. The 1960 edition of the Bengals ended the regular season play, sporting a three win, four loss record, and tied for third place in the seven team loop.

The Tigers, under freshman mentor, Harry Wilson, looked as though they were the only team capable of touching the powerful league champions, St. Francis Xavier University. In the first game, Dal posted an electrifying, come-from-behind, 41-19 victory over Mount Allison University. The black and gold crew felt the sting of defeat for the first time on Oct. 8, when the X-Men whipped them 34-7 in Antigonish. The bright spot in this game, as far as Dal supporters were concerned, was the fact that the Dal crew held the Xavierans to a single, last-minute touchdown in the second half.


Following this defeat, the Tigers roared back with victories over Shearwater Flyers and the Un-

The calibre of play in the league is steadily improving and Dalhousie, with its de-emphasis on sports, soon may not be able to compete with other teams in the AFC, noteably St. F.X. and SMU, who are wooing players from different parts of Canada and the United States.


Varsity Basketball

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
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The 24th National NFCUS Congress was held at Dalhousie in the fall of 1960 with delegates from 36 Canadian Universities. It was Dalhousie's first NFCUS Congress.

The delegates stayed at Shirreff Hall for the duration of the Congress and the meetings were held in the Arts and Administration Building.

The Congress, the annual policy meeting, arrived at a number of important decisions, including an intensive campaign advocating a National Bursary Plan of 10,000 bursaries of \$600. each for four years, until the goal of 40,000 is reached. The international affairs policy was broadened to concern human rights, academic freedom and national well-being as defined in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

Dalhousie secured the mandate for the photography contest; Brian Flemming and Peter Green were elected to the National Executive as Vice-President and Atlantic Regional President respectively. The large group of students who organized the Congress gained an invaluable insight into national student affairs.




