

INTERNATIONAL DENTAL STANDARDS ORGANIZATION MEETING IN VIENNA

Meeting of ISO/TC 106 Dentistry. The International Standards Organization concerned with the preparation of standards for dental materials, devices and equipment held very successful meetings in Vienna during the week of October 18th-22nd, 1982. The meetings were hosted by the Austrian National Standards Organization. Some 90 delegates from 15 different countries took part in the meetings of the various committees.

The Canadian delegation consisted of Dr. D.W. Jones of Dalhousie University who is Chairman of the Canadian Advisory Committee on ISO/TC 106, Head of the Canadian delegation, member of the

Secretariat and of Working Group #1; Dr. D.C. Smith of the University of Toronto who is Chairman of Working Group #1; Dr. P. Desautels of the University of Montreal; Dr. R. Barolet of the University of Laval; Dr. P. Williams of the Univeristy of Manitoba; Dr. L. Johnson of the University of Western Ontario and Mr. W. Latchem, Beavers Dental Instruments. ISO/TC 106 is concerned with the development and updating of international standards based upon the physical and chemical properties of dental materials, and the design and physical arrangement of dental equipment.

INTERNATIONAL DENTAL STANDARDS ORGANIZATION MEETING IN VIENNA

(Continued)

The 6 working groups and 35 Task group meetings were held during the week. Working Group #1 on Dental Filling Materials had 4 different task groups meeting. Dr. Derek Jones of Canada holds the position of secretary of this group. This working group had discussions on draft standards for (i) zinc oxide eugenol type restorative materials, (ii) glass ionomer cements, (iii) silico phosphate cement and, (iv) amalgam alloys and mercury. Work is also continuing in the task groups on endodontic materials, pit and fissure sealants, resin based filling materials and the harmonization of cement standards.

Working Group #2 on Prosthetic Materials had 13 task groups meeting at this time. The task groups of Working Group #2 were involved with the development of standards for synthetic resin teeth, porcelain bonded to metal, investment materials, resilient and soft lining materials for dentures, gold solders, gypsum products, colour stability, elastomeric and alginate impression materials, gold casting alloys, denture base resin and corrosion tests. Working Group #3 on Terminology held meetings to develop standard terminology. Working Group #4 Dental Instruments held meetings dealing with standardiza-

tion of bur dimensions, neck strength and bur performance, a number coding system for rotary instruments, hand pieces and root canal hand instruments. Working Group #6 dealing with the workplace of the dentist and equipment held meetings dealing with the patient chair, dental units, dental lighting as well as dental amalgamators, dispensers and capsules. Working Group #7 on Toothbrushes were finalizing the draft document for this important dental product.

Currently Canadian National Standards are being developed by implementation and/or modification of existing ISO standards. Canada through the CAC Committee is actively participating in the development of ISO standards. All of the working groups of ISO Technical Committee TC 106 on Dentistry have Canadian representation and Canada holds the Secretariat of one of the most important of these working groups (WG 1) dealing with filling materials. The working groups and their task groups conducted their meetings Monday through Thursday and the entire group of ISO/TC 106 met in Plenary Session on Friday the 22nd October to consider the recommendations brought forward from the Working Groups.




