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## Dalhousie Refresher Course is Great Success

The 28th Annual Refresher Course was presented by the Faculty of Medicine of Dalhousie University from October 25th - 29th, 1954. Approximately 150 medical men attended the course, representing all parts of the Atlantic Provinces.

The John Stewart Memorial Lecture was given by Dr. Waltman Walters, Professor of Surgery at the Mayo Clinic. Dr. Walters also presented several surgical clinics during the Course. His prowess in Biliary and Gastric Surgery was well demon-

strated and Dalhousie University feels honoured to have had Dr. Walters as one of the Guest Speakers.

Other Guest Speakers were Dr. J. C. Moir, Professor of Obstetrics and Gynaecology at Oxford University; Dr. N. M. Wrong, Associate Professor of Medicine in charge of Dermatology at the University of Toronto; Dr. F. J. Ingelfinger, Associate Professor of Medicine at Boston University; and Dr. H. E. MacMahon, Professor of Medicine of Pathology at Tufts College Medical School. Many members of the Dalhousie Medical Faculty also took part in the course.

Some of the highlights of the course were the Symposium on Gynaecology, moderated by Dr. H. B. Atlee; Round Table Discussion—"The Problem of Lung Carcinoma", moderated by Dr. R. L. Aikens; Round Table Discussion—"Hypertension—Medical and Surgical Aspects", moderated by Dr. L. C. Steeves; and the Round Table Discussion—"Jaundice", moderated by Dr. A. L. Murphy.

Special mention must be made of the Clinical Pathological Conference in which Dr. MacMahon and Dr. Ingelfinger were very impressive in their presentation and their discussion was stimulating to all, especially to the medical students.

The interest which all of these distinguished men take in teaching was clearly evident in the manner in which they presented their material.

The Refresher Course Committee, under the chairmanship of Dr. R. M. MacDonald, is to be congratulated on the organization of the course and also on the material selected for presentation. At the conclusion of the course Dr. MacDonald asked that any suggestions, which the medical men of the Atlantic Provinces may have to offer regarding the type of material presented at the Refresher Course, should be sent to the Executive Officer, Post-Graduate Committee, Dalhousie University Medical School.
