INTRODUCTION.

THE year just passed has been a marked one in the History of King's College. The changes made necessary by the resignation of Dr. McCawley, and by the lamented death of Dr. Hensley, were of course very important; it will be gratifying to the friends of the College to learn that the new appointments have proved most satisfactory.

Last September the Archbishop of Canterbury notified the Board that he nominated the Rev. John Dart, M. A. (Oxon), for appointment to the Presidentship. Mr. Dart had previously filled high educational appointments in England and the Colonies. He entered upon the duties of his new office, at the beginning of last Michaelmas Term, and has since then zealously devoted himself to his work. He has already shown himself a sound instructor and a firm, though kind, disciplinarian. The Governors look forward with confidence and hope to the future of the College under the direction of himself and his colleagues,

The following Resolution passed at a meeting of the Governors, 8th March, 1876, is now published, that they may thus put on record their sense of the useful work done by Dr. Hensley in his laborious and unselfish life:—

Resolved, That Whereas the College has been deprived by death of the valuable services of the Rev. John Manuel Hensley D. D. Canon of the Cathedral, Professor of Divinity, Vice President and Bursar of King's College; the Governors avail themselves of the earliest opportunity to place on record their testimony to his merits as an officer of the Institution committed to their care, and his assiduous labour for its welfare.

Dr. Hensley was one of its most distinguished Alumni, his under graduate career having been, in every respect, highly satisfactory; and, having been invited to accept a professorship about 22 years ago, he served the College with zeal and fidelity to the date of his death, notwithstanding much bodily suffering during the latter years of his life.

The objects in which he latterly manifested special interest and for which he had been for some time labouring with characterictic perserverence, were the erection of a College Chapel and the restoration of the Collegiate School; and they trust that those plans will still be accomplished, notwithstanding the loss of his able advocacy. They would gladly present to his widow and fatherless children a more substantial recognition of his services if it were in their power to do so; but, not having any unappropriated funds at their disposal, they are unable to offer more than this assurance of their hearty appreciation of the merits of the deceased and their sympathy with them in their deep affliction.

When by his death the Chair of Pastoral Theology became vacant, the President undertook the work of that department, and the Rev. W. E. Wilson, who was highly recommended and had had much experience in education, was appointed acting Professor of Classics.

The Board has this year been deprived of the services of J. C. Haliburton, Esq., who for nearly 50 years, was their Treasurer. During all that time Mr. Haliburton gave his services gratuitously to the College and was constant in the duties of his office; B. G Gray, Esq., has been appointed Treasurer in his place.

The Governors have very great satisfaction in stating that Edward Binney, Esq., of Halifax, already a munificent benefactor of the College, has offered to build at his own expense the Hensley Memorial Chapel. They trust that this noble example will have the effect of arousing others so to exert themselves that next year they may announce that the whole amount required for the Collegiate School has been we subscribed.

The prospect for the future of the College is bright and encouraging; the number of students has considerably increased and a still larger number is expected next year. In the advantages offered, King's College is second to none in the Maritime Provinces; these advantages are becoming more and more appreciated; and there is every reason to hope that a still wider sphere of usefulness is opening to the College.

There are three classes of Students admissible to the College :---

1 .- Matriculated Students in Arts :--

2.—Matriculated Students in Civil Engineering: for requirements see School of C. E. further on.

3.—Elective Students: who desire to attend during an Academical Year or Term, one, two, or more courses of Lectures.

MATRICULATION IN ARTS:

Every Student presenting himself for Matriculation shall be required to pass an examination in the following subjects:—

I.—CLASSICS.

THE GREEK AND LATIN LANGUAGES.

One Greek and two Latin Books, to be selected and published by the College Board one year in advance. Latin Prose Composition.

NOTE.-By a "book" shall be meant one division of an author's work. For example, one book of Homer's Odyssey shall mean any one book out of the twenty four into which the poem is divided.

II.—MATHEMATICS.

ARITHMETIC.

The ordinary Rules of Aritmetic; Vulgar and Decimal Fractions.

ALGEBRA.

Addition, Substraction, Multiplication, and Division of Algebraical quantities.

GEOMETRY.

The First Two Books of Euclid.

III.-THE ENGLISH LANGUAGE.

Orthography; Writing from Dictation: The Grammatical Structure of the Language.

IV .-- THE FRENCH OR THE GERMAN LANGUAGE.

(At the option of the Candidate.)

One passage from some author for translation into English. The College Board to select the work and publish the name one year in advance.

Candidates shall not be approved by the Examiners unless they pass in *Two* of the above subjects, of which Classics shall be one.

It shall also be neccessary to pass in Arithmetic. Subjects for 1877-78.

Homer: Iliad. I. or Xenophon, Anab. I.

Cicero pro Archia, and Horace. Odes I.

Latin Composition: Arnold's Introduction to Latin Prose, to the end of the Passive Voice, and translation back again into Latin of a plain English version from the Latin of some easy author.

French: Charles XII, Voltaire, Book I.

German: Adler's Reader, Part I.

Matriculation in Engineering the same as in the School of Arts with the omission of the *Classical Subjects*:

Matriculated Students are required to attend the Lectures and Examinations in all the Departments of their course, and to procure from each Professor a certificate of attendance, without which they will not be allowed to proceed to the Examination held at the end of ever, term.

ATTENDANCE AT LECTURES.

Attendance at all Lectures, except those which shall be announced as optional, shall be compulsory upon all Undergraduates. Professors will note upon the Lectures Attendance List the presence or absence of students immediately before beginning the exercises of the class: any Student entering thereafter will be registered as absent, unless a satisfactory explanation be given to the Professor.

No student shall be allowed to absent himself from any Lecture except by special permission, obtained from the Professor.

COURSE OF STUDY.

The object aimed at is to secure a good general education for all Matriculated Students, while every facility is afforded for the prosecution of special studies. Accordingly, every Matriculated Student, except under peculiar circumstances to be approved of by the College Board, is required to attend the Lectures of all the Professors until he has passed his Responsions, which is generally done in the sixth Term of residence. After this he is at liberty to select two or more of the subjects lectured on to form the subjects of his B. A. Examination. If the student is desirous of taking Honours at his B. A. Examination he can do so in any one of the subjects lectured on after passing the ordinary Examinations. The precise Regulaions will be found under the head of Examinations.

Students who do not intend to take the degree of B. A. are permitted to attend the lectures of any of the Professors subject to all the usual Regulations.

The schemes of Responsions and B. A. Examination will afford a general idea of the usual Curriculum, which, within certain limits, is varied as circumstances require.

THE DIVINITY SCHOLARSHIPS.

Paid by the society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign parts a open to Students for Holy Orders, actually requiring assistance, and subject to the control of the Bishop of the Diocese.

Ten in number-£30 sterling, per annum.

TTE BINNEY EXHIBITION.

£16 sterling per annum. Open to students in indigent circumstances, and of exemplary conduct.

In the year 1858, Miss Binney, sister of the present Visitor, and daughter of the late Rev. Dr. Hibbert Binney, in the name and on the behalf of her father's executors, handed over to the Governors certain stock, amounting to \$1,000, to found an Exhibition at King's College, to be called the "Dr. Binney Exhibition," in memory of her said father. The design of this, Scholarship to assist poor Students who may require assistance, and who shall have commended themselves by their

exemplary conduct, although their abilities and acquirements may not qualify them to be successful Competitors for an open scholarship.

TERMS.—On or before the last day of May, in every year, the College Board shall nominate two Students, in their third term, at the least, whom they may deem best qualified, having regard to their poverty and the excellence of their characters: and the President shall forthwith transmit their names, together with a brief statement of their claims, to the Visitor, who shall select one of them to be the Exhibitioner, and to receive the interest accruing for the following year, commencing July 1st. Or at his discretion, if he considers the claims of the two nominees to be equal, or nearly so, the Visitor may adjudge that the amount be divided between them.

THE AIKINS HISTORICAL PRIZE.

T. B. AIKINS, ESQ., D. C. L., Barrister-at-Law, and Commissioner of Public Records, has vested in the Governors, as Trustees, a sum of money sufficient to found a Prize of Thirty Dollars, annually, for the best Paper or Essay on the County History of Nova Scotia, embracing matter derived from local records, and traditions relating to the early and progressive history of each County. The Essays must be given in to the Secretary of the Governors on or before the 1st June, 1877. The decision on the merits of the Essays to rest with the Governors, or such persons as they may appoint, and to be announced at the Encœnia in June.

Each Essay to be distinguished by a motto, and to be accompanied by a *sealed* paper, bearing the same motto on the outside, and containing the name of the writer. The subject for 1877 is the County of Guysboro'.

THE GENERAL WILLIAMS PRIZES.

Three of \$60 each, annually, during His Excellency's life, for the best scholar in—

- 1.—Mining and the Science of Mineralogy as it bears practically on these operations.
- 2.—Mechanics and Civil Engineering as they bear on all matters relating to railroads, motive power for them, and all other modern aids to the human hand.
- 3.—Languages of Modern Europe—German, but more especially French, as the almost universal medium of communication in Europe.

His Excellency has decreed that should no candidate be found duly qualified, the amount in that case, in any year, shall be applied to the purchase of books in the department for the College Library. 5. In arriving at a decision on the merits of the candidates, the following shall be assigned as full marks in the various subjects named; but no subject shall count in which less than 25 per cent. shall have been obtained; and subjects limited to those making up 800 marks.

McCAWLEY SCHOLARSHIP.

1. The competition shall be confined to matriculated undergraduates who have completed their first year of residence.

2. The examination shall be conducted by the Reverend the President, assisted by such other person as he shall appoint for the time being, either within or without the University, as assessor.

3. The examination shall be confined principally to such classical works as the President shall have appointed at the beginning of the Michælmas Term preceding, and shall include the translation, grammatical construction and relation to the context of the passages selected, together with such critical and taste papers in prose or verse as may be set at the examination.

4. The examination shall be subject, in respect of the number of marks required, to the general regulations of the University with reference to prizes and scholarships.

5. In the event of there being no competitors, or on failure in the examination, the year's interest shall be expended in the purchase of

classical books for the library from a list selected by the President, having in view in the first instance the completion of a collection of the works of all the classical authors, and of the best editions of the respective works, whether English or foreign, and also of books illustrative of the same, at the discretion of the President.

In order to insure the receipt of the interest forming the prize prior to the time of the competition, and a due preparation for the examination, the first competition shall take place early in Easter Term, 1877, and the amount of one year's interest shall be given to the successful candidate at the Encomia of the same year.

Only two meals are furnished, at 8 A.M. and 6 P.M. Those who require lunch can obtain it from the Steward at 5 cents per lunch.

The rooms are unfurnished, so that a small outlay is required at entrance, to be made by each Student, so as to suit his own means and tastes.

When two Students live together, which is the usual arrangement, the expenses for fuel and furniture is greatly diminished, and the cost of Board, &c., in College may be set down at about \$4.00 per week.

Students are also permitted, on proper application, to board out of College in any place approved by the College authorities.

NOMINATIONS.

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The following is the form of Nomination for a Student to pass through the University, free of fees, and must be addressed to the Secretary of the Board of Governors :

I do hereby nominate (A. B.) to pass through the University, free of fees, (except Library Fee)*, by virtue of certificate No....., held by me. (Date.) (C. D.)

In case of a joint certificate, the above form must be complied with, and the same must be signed by all holders.

Each nominee is exempt from the payment of yearly fees, amounting to \$180 tor the three years' course, besides the fee for a B. A. Degree. There being some eighty certificates conferring this privilege, it is easy for students to obtain it. If a scholarship is held besides, nearly the whole cost of the education will be covered.

For holders of Nominations see former Calendars.

At the request of the Associated Alumni, nominated Students are required to pay the annual Library Fee of \$5, unless specially exempted on nomination.

Some confusion having been caused, in cases of death, by the non-observance of the conditions of the certificate—

1. That on death or transfer the certificate is to be delivered up, and a new certificate obtained.

2. That the right of nomination belongs to the executors, administrators, or assigns, of the original holder; and not to the heirs.

No nomination will be accepted which is not signed by the person or persons in whose name or names the certificate is registered.

EXAMINATIONS.

TERMINAL EXAMINATION.

Every student will be required to undergo an Examination at the end of each Term in all the subjects in which he has attended lectures.

Every Undergraduate, previous to presenting himself for any Terminal Examination, will have to obtain from each Professor whose lectures he has attended during the Term, a certificate of attendance and good conduct.

No Professor will grant such certificate if more than two absences without leave, during the course of the Term, are recorded against the applicant, or if his conduct shall have been in any way reprehensible.

Such certificate will then be handed in by the Undergraduate to the Vice President previous to the beginning of the Examination, and no Undergraduate shall be allowed to present himself at any Terminal Examination unless he shall have complied with these regulations.

The list of candidates who shall have passed the Terminal Examination shall be published in the hall, after the close of the examination. The names shall be arranged in order of merit. Any Student whose name does not appear in this list shall forfeit the Term.

RESPONSIONS. .

Every Matriculated Student is required to pass a public Examination called Responsions, for which he cannot offer himself until he has completed his fourth Term, and no Term after the sixth can be reckoned until it has been passed.

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^{*} The words "except Library Fee" may be omitted.

This Examination is held at the beginning of the Easter Term. The subjects are ordinarily as follows :----

- 1. Classics-Two Greek and two Latin Books, and Latin Prose Composition.
- 2. Divinity-One Gospel or the Acts of the Apostles.
- 3. Mathematics-Algebra to end of Quadratic Equations; Euclid, two Books.
- 4. Chemical Physics and Chemistry, Inorganic or Organic.
- 5. Modern Languages-any one :
 - French-The two first books of Charles XII or an equivalent.
 - The Etymology of the language according to Otto's Grammar.
 - German-The first part of Adler's Reader or an equivalent.
 - The Etymology of the language according to Otto's Grammar,

and an office of the local tradition

B. A. EXAMINATION.

Undergraduates presenting themselves for examination for a Degree, shall be required to produce satisfactory certificates of attendance and conduct during the whole of the three years' course. The certificates must be signed by the various Professors whose courses of lectures they have attended, and no Undergraduate shall be allowed to present himself at any Degree Examination, unless he shall have complied with the above regulations. Or, if Undergraduates shall not have attended the whole time at King's College, they shall be required to produce similiar certificates from the University they have attended.

The Examination shall be carried on mainly by written questions and answers, but the Examiners shall at all times have the power of examining viva voca.

A Public Examination for Degrees shall be held towards the end of Michælmas and Easter terms. Students shall not be permitted to offer themselves for this before their ninth Term, except those who intend to offer themselves for Honours, who may be examined in the Ordinary Degree subjects in their seventh term, between the Responsions and this Examination. In such case, the Student must pass an Examination in the Honour-subjects chosen by him before being admitted to a Degree.

Every candidate for a Degree must be examined on two days in at least two of the subjects on which lectures are delivered by the Professors. The following (or their equivalents) are the subjects for an Ordinary Degree :---

I. CLASSICS :

- Greek-Three Plays and one Book of Herodotus ; Latin-Horace, Epistles: Cicerode Oratore Prose Composition.
- ENGLISH LITERATURE; as by arrangement. Π.
- III. DIVINITY: Four Gospels-Bible History and Liturgy.
- IV. MATHEMATICS:
 - Algebra to Quadratic Equations; Euclid Six Books; Plane Trigonometry.
- V. CHEMISTRY:

Chemical Physics ; Inorganic and Organic Chemistry.

VI. MODERN LANGUAGES: Any one.

FEENCH-

The forms and Syntax of the language according to Otto's Grammar. One half (either the 1st or 2nd) of the " Causeries Parisiennes" by Peschier or an equivalent, to be correctly and fluently read and translated. Candidates must be able to translate ordinary English prose into French without serious errors, and show some readiness in conversation.

GERMAN-

The forms and Syntax according to Otto's Grammar, Adler's Readers and some of Schiller's Poems. Easy prose to be translated into German, and some readiness in speaking to be shown.

All candidates for Honours in any branch must first pass the Ordinary Degree Examimation.

Every candidate for a Degree in Honours shall be examined in one or more of the following subjects at his own choice:—

I. CLASSICS :

Greek—Sophocles, 3 Plays, Thucydides, 2 books, Aristotle's Ethics, Latin Terence's Andria—Tacitus, 6 books, Cicero de Officiis, Prose and Verse Composition.

II. DIVINITY:

Hebrew and Greek Scriptures, Evidences, Ecclesiastical History, Systematic Divinity, Church Polity and Liturgies.

III. MATHEMATICS-

Algebra, Euclid, Trigonometry, Diff. and Int. Calculus, Conic Sections, Mechanics, Optics, Acoustics, Heat, Electricity, Astronomy or Engineering.

IV. CHEMISTRY AND NATURAL HISTORY:

Chemical Physics, Inorganic and Organic Chemistry; Practical Chemistry, Qual. Analysis of Compounds and Preparations; and Mineralogy, Geology, or Botanyany one.

V. MODERN LANGUAGES: Any two.

Candidates must show a good knowledge of the forms and Syntax of both French and German. In French they must be able to read and translate the whole of the "Causeries Parisiennes," and another standard Prose work, at the option of the Candidate, correctly and fluently, and to read and translate any French Prose whatever, without much hesitation. Any ordinary English prose is to be correctly translated into French, and facility must be shown in conversation. In German, the whole of Adler or an equivalent, most of Schiller's Poems, and one of his Dramas must have been read. The rest like French.

Modifications in the subjects to be made with the approval of the College Board.

Undergraduates who shall have passed the Degree Examination shall be divided into four classes.

None shall be admitted into the First two Classes but those who shall have taken Honours in any subject.

The Third Class shall comprise those who shall have shown great proficiency in *all* the subjects of the Pass Examination, but who shall not have taken Honours.

The Fourth Class shall comprise all such as have obtained the required number of marks, but have not sufficiently distinguished themselves to qualify for a place in the first three Classes.

An Examination Fee of One Dollar (\$1) shall be paid by each candidate to meet the expenses of stationery,—for the examinations through the year,—which shall be provided by the University.

Elective Students may also obtain Pass Certificates, Honour Certificates, and Diplomas in lieu of Degrees, which shall entitle them to the designation of Associate of Arts.

SCHOOL OF CIVIL ENGINEERING.

 Candidates for the Degree of B. E. shall be required to have been admitted Matriculated Students of King's College.
 2. To have subsequently studied in the above College the course herein prescribed.

3. To have passed two University Examinations.

The Examination for Matriculation shall be the same as in the School of Arts, with the omission of the Classical subjects.

The course for the Degree in Civil Engineering shall usually extend over three years, and shall comprise attendance on the following Curriculum :

FIRST YEAR.

Mathematics (1st course). Chemistry. Experimental Physics. A modern Continental Language. Geometrical Drawing, Office Work.

SECOND YEAR.

Mathematics (2nd course). Mathematical Physics. Mineralogy or Geology. Civil Engineering. Office Work. Field Work.

THIRD YEAR.

Natural Philosophy (applied.) Civil Engineering. Office Work. Field Work. Geology or Mineralogy. Practical Chemistry. Engineering Excursions.

Attendance on these Lectures, shall, in all cases, include passing such Examinations as may be appointed by the College Board.

Candidates shall, on the recommendation of the College Board be admitted to the the Degree after two years' residence, instead of three, if their previous acquaintance with a sufficient group of the subjects set down for study in the 1st and 2nd years be deemed satisfactory by the Board; and Candidates shall, for special reasons, to be approved by the Board, be admitted to the Degree after one year's residence, instead of three.

In such cases the Certificate of the Board will be accepted in lieu of attendance upon these causes, but will not exempt Candidates from the University Examinations in them.

Students who have completed their 2nd year must attempt the first University Examinations before rising to the third year, unless prevented by illness, in which case the Board may admit them to Supplementary Examination.

Candidates who have attempted but failed to pass the first University Examination will be admitted to a Supplementary Examination.

The course for the first University Examination shall include Mathematics (1st and 2nd courses), Experimental Physics, Mensuration, Levelling, Mapping, and a Modern Continental Language.

The 1st course in Mathematics shall include :—1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 6th Books of Euclid and Definitions of Book 5. Arithmetic, Algebra, including the usual rules to the end of Quadratics. Proportion, "Binomial Theroem," for positive integral exponents, "Geometrical and Arithmetical Progressions." and nature and use of Logarithms Plane Trigonometry to the end of solution of triangles. The second course shall include ;—Algebra with the "Theory of Equations," Plane and Spherical Trigonometry, Analytical Geometry as far as the "Equation of ihe Second Degree," Conic Sections, "Differential and Integral Calculus."

Experimental Physics shall be represented by the Professor's Lectures to the Arts' Students and part of Ganot's Physics.

The Examination for the Degree in Civil Engineering shall embrace the following subjects :---

Engineering. Mensuration. Levelling and Mapping. Mathematical Physics. | Natural Philosophy (applied). | Chemistry. | Geology. | Mineralogy.

Each Candidate will be required to produce at this Examination the Field Notes and Drawings of a Survey made by him.

The course in Mathematical Science will be represented by such books as Newth's Mechanics, Todhunter's Mechanics for beginners, Galbraith & Haughton's Hydrostatics, Optics and Astronomy. The course in Natural Philosophy applied will include :--Twisden's Practical Mechanics, Elements of Thermo-Dynamics and parts of Ganot's Physics. Galbraith & Haughton's Steam Engine.

The course of Chemistry will include Chemical Physics, (Fownes), Inorganic Chemistry (Fownes), Practical Chemistry, Qualitative Analysis (Fresenius).

Mineralogy (Dana's Manual).

Geology (Dana's Text Book).

Each candidate must forward to the Registrar on or before the 1st June, notice of his intention to offer himself as a candidate, and before entering on either of the two University Examinations, must produce official proofs of having complied with the above named regulations.

Successful candidates will be arranged in three classes.

The fee for the Degree in Civil Engineering will be \$12.00: It must be lodged with the Bursar before the Examination begins.

OF EXAMINERS.

1. The Examiners to conduct the Degree Examination, and the Prize Examinations in each year may be appointed by the Governors.

2. These Examiners shall sign the Declaration, No. 4, in the Appendix to the present code of Statutes.

3. The Examinations shall be conducted by means of printed or written papers, and shall take place at such time as shall permit of the results being made known at the Encœnia of that year.

Greek Testament, for all students.

For Divinity Students,—Blunt's Key to the Prayer Book, Burton's Church History, Kip's Double Witness, Browne on the Articles, Pearson on the Creed.

MATHEMATICS.

Todhunter's Euclid, Algebra, Plane and Spherical Trigonometry, Differential and Integral Calculus, Galbraith and Haughton's Mechanics, Optics, Hydrostatrics and Astronomy, Hymer's Conic Sections. Engineering Students,—Rankine's Engineering, Twisden's Practical

Mechanics, together with Drawing Board, T-square, set-square 60° and 30°, compass with Pen and Pencil Legs.

CHEMISTRY.

Fownes's Elementary Chemistry. Fresenius's Qualitative Analysis.

NATURAL HISTORY.

Dana's Text-Book of Geology. "Manuel of Mineralogy. Asa Gray's How Plants Grow.

Schiller's Poems.

For occasional text-books and books of reference, the Library is available.

OF TERMS AND RESIDENCE.

The Academical year shall begin in October, and shall contain three terms, in which all scholastic exercises shall be performed, and all degrees conferred. Michælmas Term shall extend from the first Saturday of October to December 22nd; Lent Term from the Second Saturday of January to the Saturday before Palm Sunday; Easter Term from the Monday after Easter Monday to the last Thursday in June.

The following days shall be observed as Holidays in the University: All Saints Day, Ash-Wednesday, Ascension Day, Whit-Monday, and the Birth-day of the reigning Sovereign.

In order to encourage School-teachers and others, whose engagements prevent them from attending the full course, and who desire to obtain the Degree of B. A., the following special arrangements will be made.

Any such Student, on making proper application, will be permitted to come into residence during the first week of November in each year, and to remain until the end of the succeeding Lent Term, passing the regular examinations. This will be allowed to count as two Terms. After thus keeping eight Terms, he will be permitted to present himself for the B. A. Examination on any subsequent occasion.

DISCIPLINE.

The resident Students are under the immediate charge of the President and Vice-President.

A Register shall be kept of the attendance of all Students at Lecture and Chapel.

No Student shall be out of College after 9.30 p. m., unless by permission.

No visitor shall be allowed to remain in College after 9.30 p. m., unless by permission.

The President and Vice-President are authorized to impose fines or written exercises for infraction of regulations, insubordination, or disorderly conduct; matters of a more serious nature shall be referred to the Board of Discipline, which shall meet once a week, or oftener, if required.

Each Professor shall keep a record of the attendance at his Lectures, to be handed in at the weekly meeting of the Board and duly registered.

The Board of Discipline may deprive any Student of his Term, for negligence of due preparation for Lectures.

In case of sickness a medical certificate must be produced, if required by the Board.

EXTRACTS FROM THE STATUTES.

No undergraduate shall resort to any inn, tavern or publichouse, except for some special cause, to be approved by the President, or shall spend his time in the streets of the town. All bills of the Undergraduates are to be sent by the tradesmen with whom the debts are incurred, to the Bursar at the end of every term; and parents are particularly requested to refuse payment of any bills not thus sent in.

The introduction of spirituous liquors into the College is absolutely prohibited.

THE UNIVERSITY LIBRARY.

THE foundation of the Library is due to the efforts of the first Bishop of Nova Scotia, and may be placed in the year 1789. Several contributions in money had previously been received, but it was not till that year that active efforts were made to obtain books.

The original fund at the disposal of the Governors was not more than £250 sterling, and was intrusted to Mr. John Inglis, son of the Bishop, and a graduate of the University, who repaired to England in 1800, for the purpose of purchasing books. The names of Dr. Moore, Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr. Porteous, Bishop of London, Dr. Horsley, Bishop of Rochester, William Wilberforce, Sir S. Bernard Morland, John Eardly Wilmot, M. P., and others thus became connected with the early history of the library.

Munificent gifts from the University of Oxford continued to increase the value of the collection, which was further enriched by gifts from various English gentlemen, and from others settled in Nova Scotia.

The room in the College building set apart for many years for a Library Hall, was completed in 1810 at the expense of Sir Thomas Strange, and the Archbishop of Canterbury. Subsequently valuable works were presented by Drs. Bayard and McCulloch, and by the Society for promoting Christian Knowledge.

Among later benefactors must be mentioned Dr. Greswell of Worcester College, Oxford; the Smithsonian Institute; The British and Foreign Bible Society; The Dean and Chapter of Westminster; T. B. Akins, D.C.L.; the Society of Incorporated Alumni of King's College; E. Binney, Esq.; C. Cogswell, M.D.; The Smithsonian Institute; The Dominion Government; The Secretary of the Interior, United States; The Institution of Civil Engineers; The Society of Engineers; The Royal Society; The Rev. G. McCawley, D.D.; Rev. Canon Hensley, D.D.; General Sir W. F. Williams, K.C.B.; the present Bishop of Nova Scotia; and Her Majesty the Queen.

This large collection of books, now numbering over 6000 volumes, contained till the year 1870 in a single room in the College building, was then removed to the new Hall specially built for the purpose and presented to the University by the Incorporated Alumni. It contains a large number of standard works of reference in Theology, which is by far the richest department in the Library, and a fair selection of the great Greek and Latin classics.

In Modern History and Belles-Lettres it is very poorly supplied.

In Science some recent Standard books have from time to time been added, and, next to Theology and Classics, this is the largest department. The languages of modern Europe are not so well represented.

In spite of the many blanks, the Library is one of the largest in the Province, and contains all the elements requisite for making it a thoroughly well appointed and efficient Reference Library.

There is no special Library fund, and the collection can only be increased by grants of money from the Governors, the occasional lapsing of the General Williams Prize moneys, and the benefactions of friends of the University.

NATURAL HISTORY.

GEOLOGY AND MINERALOGY.

THE Geological specimens, many of which are very fine, illustrate the most prominent features of general geology, but the majority have been collected in Nova Scotia and are especially adapted to shew the characters of the Fossil Flora and Fauna of the Province. There are several collections, which may be discriminated as follows :—

1. The Almon collection, presented about twenty years ago by Dr. W. J. Almon, of Halifax, contains, with many minerals and a few shells, a considerable number of rock specimens and a few fossils, chiefly from Scotland.

2. The Governors' Collection consists of coal fossils obtained in 1860, at the expense of the Governors of the College; these were collected by Prof. How with the valuable assistance of a party headed by Richard Brown, Sr., Esq., then Agent at the Sydney Mines, who from long study was familiar with the district. Many of the specimens are exceedingly fine, and some are of large size.

3. The Alumni Collection consists of Silurian and Devonian Fossils, chiefly from Arisaig, N. S., collected, named and arranged stratigraphically by Dr. Honeyman; purchased and presented in 1861, by the Alumni of King's College.

4. The Australian Collection consists of specimens obtained through Col. Nelson in 1863 from Sir William Denison, then Governor of New South Wales, in exchange for Nova Scotian specimens from the College Cabinet, sent by Prof. How. It contains some beautiful fossils, and is arranged stratigraphically; its value is increased by an accompanying large detailed colored section made by the Government Examiner of Coal Fields under instructions from Sir W. Denison. 5. A collection of British Fossils, chiefly Silurian and Devonian, obtained through the President in exchange for Nova Scotian specimens sent by Professor How from the College Cabinet, in 1860, to Captain, now Sir James Anderson.

6. A collection from Europe, illustrating chiefly the nature of crystalline and sedimentary rocks, purchased by the Governors.

7. Several Collections, some of which are unnamed, and single specimens, given and obtained by exchange at various times; of these it will suffice to name: Reptilian Tracks of great geological interest, presented by the widow of their discoverer, the late Dr. Harding; valuable fossils, chiefly carboniferous, presented by H. Poole, Esq.; Silurian Fossils from Arisaig, presented by H. Hill, Esq., Sheriff of Antigonish; Coal Plants from Cumberland Co., presented by Rev. Mr. Townshend, Rector of Amherst; Cretaceous Fossils from England, presented by C. B. Bowman, Esq., and Dr. Honeyman; Silurian and Carboniferous Fossils of Nova Scotia from Professor How.

The Mineralogical specimens represent the most important species of minerals—some of them are of great beauty. They consist of those in the Almon collection, of Zeolites collected at the expense of the Governors, and of various others obtained by gifts and exchange, as mentioned with regard to the geological department. Sir Rupert George, Rev. Dr. Robertson, Rector of Wilmot, H. Brown, Esq., Director of the Geological Survey of Victoria, formerly a distinguished student in science at this College, Rev. Mr. Ambrose, Rev. J. C. Cochran, C. B. Bowman, Esq., J. Bowman Esq., Rev. D. W. Pickett, Hon. W. Odell, and Prof. How, have presented interesting specimens.

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ZOOLOGY.

The Willis Collection consists of specimens fully illustrating Nova Scotia Mollusca, named, arranged, and presented by J. R. Willis, Esq.

The department is further illustrated by a collection of foreign shells, some interesting skulls and skins, and a limited number of preserved animals.

BOTANY.

The Cogswell Herbarium, bound in five Imperial folio volumes, contains a fine systematically arranged collection of Phænogamous and Cryptogamous Plants of Great Britain, presented by Dr. C. Cogswell.

The Gossip Herbarium consists of a small number of Scottish Plants, presented by Dr. Gossip.

The Willis Herbarium consist of Nova Scotia Algæ and Terrestrial Plants, presented by J. R. Willis, Esq.

The Strange Herbarium consists of a considerable number of East Indian Plants, presented, in 1805, by Sir T. Strange.

There are also a few woods, barks, leaves, and fruits—from various sources—presented by C. B. Bowman, Esq., W. J. Almon, Esq., M.D., and other benefactors.

THE GENERAL COLLECTION.

The General Collection consists of various curiosities from different parts of the world, and a small but choice cabinet of coins.

The most interesting curiosities are the beautiful Indian Pipe from Queen Charlotte's Island, the models of the Leaning Tower and the Baptistry at Pisa, and the memorials of Gen. Williams and Gen. Inglis, which include the sword worn by the former throughout the seige of Kars and that used by the latter during the defence of Lucknow. There is also a model of the Cawnpore Memorial Cross, formed of wood from the house, in the court-yard of which the women and children were massacred.

The College possesses also a number of autographs of royal and distinguished personages; one of Thomas Moore, the poet, inscribed in a copy of Lucian, presented by him on the occasion of his visit.

The Coins illustrate the Numismatics of Rome and most of the countries of the modern world.

The different departments of the Museum are arranged in twenty-four flat cases, supported by the balustrade surrounding the gallery, and five large table cases, all glazed and provided with lock and key. The large specimens which could not be conveniently placed in cases are arranged on shelves or distributed in different parts of the Hall.

The friends of Science in Nova Scotia and elsewhere are respectfully requested to contribute specimens to the Museum of King's College. The steps which have been lately taken by the Governors to provide suitable cases for the arrangement and display of the contents of the Museum in the fine Hall erected at the expense of the Alumni, offer a guarantee that the liberality of donors will be carefully recognized and faithfully recorded.

It is particularly requested that donors will send their contributions of Books, Coins and Curiosities addressed to the LIBRARIAN, and of Natural History specimens to the NATURAL HISTORY CURATOR, King's College Museum, Windsor, N. S., in order that the receipt may be duly acknowledged, and the donation recorded in the yearly calendars as heretofore.

REPORT.

THE Executive Committee of the Associated Alumni of King's College, Windsor, have much pleasure, in presenting this their 29th Annual Report— to be able to congratulate their associates on the improvement which has marked the affairs of the University during the past year ;—the number of Students having largely increased, and a beneficial change made in the Curriculum and the internal management of the College.

The first is, to a great extent, due to the action of your body at the annual meeting in 1874,—supplemented by the Synod of the Diocese, at their last Session,—when the following Report from the Committee appointed "to report on the best course to be adopted with reference to our Collegiate Institutions," was adopted :—

(COPY.)

Report of Committee appointed to report to this Synod on the best course to be adopted with reference to our Collegiate Institutions.

Your Committee having given to the important subject referred to them as much attention as the limited time at their disposal would allow, have the honour to report to the Synod the following recommendations, as calculated practically to benefit the College :---

I. In order that the Synod may be brought into connection with the Educational Institutions of the Church, we recommend that a Standing Committee of the Synod be appointed to further the interests of King's College.

II. Having in view the very great importance of establishing the Collegiate School, we suggest that the Standing Committee be instructed to confer with the Board of Governors of King's College, at their next meeting, on the subject of re-opening the school.

III. With reference to the College, we feel that an effort should be made to secure the attendance of a larger number of Students. We believe that if our people were generally informed of the advantages offered by the College, the number attending would soon be increased. For the purpose of securing the giving such information, we would make the following suggestions:

(a). That the Clergy and Lay Delegates be respectfully requested, immediately upon their return to their Parishes, to set before their people the advantages of the College, and its claims upon their support.

(b). That the Bishop be requested to appoint four or five clergymen in different parts of the Diocese to visit, during the summer, the Parishes in their neighbourhood, and (with the consent of the Rectors of the Parishes) to address meetings on the subject of the College and its claims. A collection at each of such meetings would probably be sufficient to pay the expenses of these proposed delegations.

In consequence, several of the Clergy were appointed by the Bishop to hold public meetings throughout the Diocese, and a resolution was adopted, on motion of the Rev. J. J. Ritchie,—"That a Standing Educational Committee be appointed, as a part of the organization of the Synod, with reference to our Educational Institutions, especially to King's College, who shall place themselves in communication with the Board of Governors and with the Alumni, and report to each Session of the Synod."

We are unable to state how many Students have been brought in, but there can be no doubt that the active canvass carried on during the last two years has had a good result, which should encourage the Alumni, as well as the governing body of the University, to make still greater efforts and give encouragement to all young men who desire a thorough Collegiate training.

Some correspondence has also been carried on between Canon Scovil on behalf of the Committee of the Alumni appointed to confer with a Committee of the Synod of the Diocese of Fredericton, "on the subject of Education at King's College, Windsor," more immediately concerning the status to be given to the Bishop of the Diocese in the government of the College—but on which nothing definite was determined. If this matter should be satisfactorily settled, our numbers will from time to time be greatly increased by the attendance of Students in Divinity heretofore educated under the immediate supervision of the Bishop of Fredericton. 68

The new Bill to provide for a Central University at the last Session of the Legislature, of which the Faculty and the Board of Governors have formally signified their approval in the following resolutions :

RESOLUTION OF THE FACULTY.

"The Faculty of King's College desire to express their readiness to co-operate with the proposed Central University of Halifax which will, it is hoped, bind together the scattered Educational forces of the Province by supplying a general Board of qualified and experienced examiners, and also their willingness to advise the Students under their charge to present themselves for examination before such a Board."

RESOLUTION OF THE GOVERNORS.

"That this Board convey to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council their concurrence with the expression of the approval made at their request by the Board of Discipline and Faculty of King's College, respecting the founding of the University of Halifax as an examining body, and their sincere hope that the system about to be inaugurated may be conducted to a successful issue."

Must prove to all governing and governed that the interests of the oldest College in the Maritime Provinces require greater assiduity and attention to their duties than has been the usual characteristic of College life for some time.

Emulation is the greatest incentive to work with all who possess an honourable ambition. The College requires men, and men who will work so that some of the stigma of the past may be blotted out.

Last year we had to announce the retirement of the Venerable President who had in his day seen much service. This year we have to record the arrival of his successor, the Revd. John Dart, M.A., Oxon, in honours, under whose management the College owes much of her present prosperity. Mr. Dart was nominated by the Archbishop of Canterbury, Patron of the University, on the recommendation of Bishop Claughton, and the Deans of Manchester and Peterborough. He was sometime Warden of St. Thomas' College, Ceylon, (affiliated to the University of Calcutta), and Vice Principal of St. Peter's College, Peterborough, and Lecturer in Science for the Government Department, in Science and Art South Kensington.

Under a President professed of such high recommendations the College has reason to look forward to her future, and feel that her darkest hours are past.

While we rejoice in this, we have to mourn the loss of three of the names on the College Roll-Beamish Murdoch, Esq., Q. C., D. C. L.; the Revd. Canon Hensley, D. D., Professor of Divinity and Pastoral Theology ; and the Revd. Ferdinand Pryor, M. A. Mr. Murdoch was made an honorary D. C. L. in 1867. In 1865 and 1867 he published his history of Nova Scotia, having commenced its compilation in 1860 from the materials collected by the Record Commission in which he was ably assisted by Dr. Akins and others. The work is most interesting, giving as it does, an insight into the habits of the early settlers of Acadia, though the author does not claim for it anything more than " a scaffolding for the erection of more diversified and elegant structures." Mr. Murdoch died at Lunenburg on 9th February, and was followed in three days by one whose name for nearly thirty years has been associated with everything that is good in connection with the College. It is only necessary to mention the name of John Manuel Hensely, to stir up many heart-felt remembrances in the minds of all connected with the College during that period. From the time of his matriculation in 1849 to the day of his death, he took a deep interest in his Alma Mater, and work for her good seemed his prevailing wish, even in his last years, when bodily infirmities might well have hindered him.

His energy was unfailing and deserving of imitation. He leaves a record of which his friends may well be proud, and his College point to as worthy of emulation, a bright example to her future sons. At his Examination for the degree of B. A. in 1853, he took the highest place, and in the same year was called to fill the chair of Mathematics and Natural Philosophy. In 1856 he was ordained Priest, and on the retirement of the Revd. Geo. W. Hill, was appointed Professor of Pastoral Theology.

He was made M. A. in 1856, B. D, in 1863 and D.D. in 1867.

By his kindly acts and words he endeared himself to his students as well as his associates. While all persons who had the pleasure of listening to his eloquent words on the several occasions when he was chosen to preach the annual sermon at the Encoenia, will remember his earnest manner in setting forth the claims of his Alma Mater, and his words of wisdom.

Next to the master's death we have to place that of one of his pupils who during his College Course gained the affection of his fellows and in a worthy manner followed the example of his Senior. The Rev. Ferdinand Pryor, M. A., died at Antigua on 23rd of last month. He matriculated in 1858 and took his degrees of B. A. and M. A. in 1862, and 1870. Shortly after his ordination in 1864 he was appointed to the living at Pictou, whence he removed to Dartmouth, but the winters being too severe he was obliged to remove to a warmer climate, where he did good service for the Church and gained the esteem of his people, by whom as well as by his College associates his memory will be ever revered.

On the 27th November last your Committee received a letter from Henry Y. Hind Esq., Honorary Chairman of the Collegiate School Building Committee to which they returned by way of reply the following resolution.

"That the Executive Committee in acknowledging the receipt of Mr. Hind's letter embodying the resolution adopted by the Collegiate School Building Committee of King's College Windser, express their sympathy with the objects of the Building Committee, and their willingness in every way in their power to co-operate with them in their laudable undertaking."

On the 30th May, the Board of Governors were notified, through their Rt. Rev. President, of the Resolutions passed at the annual meetings of the Alumni in June 1869, and 1874, with reference to their Treasurer's account and their Minutes which will no doubt be handed in in due course.

The Treasurer's account here submitted shows a balance in favour of the Association of \$590. 22, which is subject to the sum of \$250, the proportion voted towards the salary of the Professor of Modern Languages at the last Annual Meeting.

This balance includes the sum of \$400, which your Committee have deposited at 5 per cent interest, and call on notice of thirty days, in order to, as much as possible, augment the funds at their disposal, so as to be enabled in the future to carry out the original designs of the Association.

With this end in view they caused the following resolutions passed at their March Meeting to be conveyed to the Librarian.

"That whereas the Funds of this Association are limited, and are pledged to the aiding of the Funds of the University of King's College and the Collegiate School at Windsor, in the payment of the salaries of one or more Professors or Lecturers, and one or more Scholarships at the University, or one or more teachers or exhibitions in the Collegiate School, as would appear on reference to Bye-Law No. 6, passed June 27th, 1848. Therefore be it resolved, That the sum of Forty Dollars, voted at the last annual meeting for the Librarian, be paid to Dr. How. But the Committee recommend, that, for the future, the grant be discontinued."

Your Committee have had to notify several persons, whose names appear on the list of annual subscribers, that sums varying from eight to twenty dollars were due by them to the association on account of arrearages, and to this fact the Committee desire to call your attention.

The other business placed before the meeting is the election of two Governors, in the place of the Hon. Mr. Justice Smith and the Rev. Canon Scovil, M. A., Ph. D., who retire by rotation; the election of a Vice-President, in the place of the Rev. Henry Pryor Almon, D. C. L.; and three members of the Executive Committee, in the stead of the Rev. J. C. Cochran, D. D., the Hon. S. L. Shannon, D. C. L., and the Rev. Richmond Shreve, M. A., who, in the order of their election, go out of office.

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AN ACT TO INCORPORATE THE ALUMNI OF KING'S COLLEGE, WINDSOR.

mania and the soundst they, in order to enable

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(Passed the 30th day of March, 1848.)

WHEREAS, a number of persons have associated themselves under the name of the Alumni of King's College. Windsor, for the promotion of education, and have raised by private contribution sums of money which they are desirous to expend in aid of the funds of the said College, and the Collegiate School, at Windsor, connected therewith, in or towards the maintenance and support of the teachers therein, or in such other way as may best conduce to the end which they have in view, and they are desirous of obtaining assistance from the Legislature, by the passing of an Act of Incorporation for enabling them to hold property, and to manage their affiairs with greater ease and convenience.

I. Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor, Council, and Assembly : that John T. Twining, James B. Uniacke, Henry Pryor, Hugh Hartshorne, and all and every such other person and persons as now are members of, or in the said society, and their successors, shall be and are hereby appointed a body, politic and corporate, in deed and in name, by the name of "The Alumni of King's College, Windsor," and by that name have succession and a common Seal, and by that name shall sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded, at law and in equity, and in all courts and places, and be able and capable in law to have, hold, purchase, get, receive, take, possess, and enjoy, lands tenements, hereditaments, and rents, in fee simple or otherwise, and also goods and chattels, and all other things real, personal and mixed, and also to give, grant, sell, let, assign or convey the same or any part thereof, and to do and execute all other things in and about the same, as shall or may be thought necessary or proper ; and also shall have from time to time and at all times full power, authority, and license to constitute, make and establish such Bye-Laws, Rules, and Ordinances, as may be thought necessary for the rule and good management of said society, the establishing of officers proper for the management of its affairs, and declaring the extent, duration, and authority of the offices and officers of the society, and their mode of appointment, and generally for promoting the objects of the society, provided such Bye-Laws, Rules and Ordinances be not contrary and repugnant to the Laws and Statutes of this Province, or those in force within the same, or to the Laws and Statutes of King's College, Windsor, respectively, at the time such Bye-Laws, Rules and Ordinances may be constituted and established, or to the provisions of this Act; and provided, also, that the said society shall not hold at any time, lands tenements, hereditaments, goods, chattels, property or effects, of greater value than ten thousand pounds.

II. And be it enacted, that all persons paying an annual subscription of twenty shillings or upwards, or making at one time a donation of twenty pounds or upwards, shall be entitled to be members of the said society, having been duly admitted, pursuant to the Bye-Laws thereof, provided that such annual subscription or donation be actually paid into the funds of the society, and provided that no person now a member of the said society, or who, hereafter, may become a member of the same, shall, at any time hereafter, continue a member of the same, unless he shall have heretofore paid, or shall hereafter pay at one time into the funds of the said society a donation of at least twenty pounds, or shall hereafter annually, and from year to year, pay into the said funds the sum of twenty shillings or upwards ; and if such annual subscription, or payment of any such annual member, shall not be paid on the first day of May in each year, such member shall thereupon cease to be a member of the said society, until such annual subscription or payment shall be actually paid, or until such person shall otherwise become a member of the said society, under some Bye-Law or Rule thereof.

III. And be it enacted that the said society shall be governed, and its affiairs managed, by a committee of nine, comprising a President, Vice-President, and seven other members, a Secretary and Treasurer; the said committee to be henceforth called the Executive Committee, and such other officers as the said Society, from time to time may think proper.

IV. And provided and be it enacted, that John T. Twining, D.D. now the President of the said Society, shall after the passing of this said Act, be the President of the said society; that the Hon. Henry Hezekiah Cogswell, now the Vice-President of the said society, be the Vice-President of the said society, after the passing of this Act; that Samuel L. Shannon, Esquire, now the Secretary and Treasurer of the said society, be the Secretary and Treasurer thereof, after the passing of this Act; and Samuel P. Fairbanks, Henry Pryor, James B. Uniacke, William J. Almon, Robert Fitzgerald Uniacke, Mather B. Almon, and Charles Twining, now the managing committee of the said society, shall after the passing of this Act, be the executive committee of the said incorporated society, until an Executive committee be elected under this Act.

V. And be it enacted that all persons, without regard to religious denomination or difference of religious sentiment may be and at any time hereafter become members of the said incorporated society, being in all other respects entitled to be and become members of the said society, and now, and at any time hereafter, may hold any of the said appointments, or any other offices and appointments in the said incorporated society, being duly elected and appointed thereto, pursuant to the Bye-Laws thereof, anything contained herein, or in any Rules, Regulations, or Bye-Laws of the said society to the contrary notwithstanding.

VI. And be it enacted that the said society, incorporated as aforesaid, shall have power from time to time hereafter, to appoint the President, Vice-President, and executive committee, at some general meeting of the said society by a majority of the members of the society present, the whole number present being not less than twenty members, according to such regulations concerning such appointments as may hereafter be made by any Bye-Laws of the said society, to be made by virtue hereof.

VII. And be it enacted that the secretary and treasurer of the said society, and such other officers as may hereafter be required for the managemement of its affiairs, shall be appointed in such manner as shall be declared by the Bye-Laws and Rules of said society, to be passed by virtue hereof.

VIII. And be it enacted that all donations to the said incorporated society, to constitute life members or otherwise, if not less than twenty pounds, shall be invested under the direction of the executive committee as a permanent fund for the benefit of the said society, and that the funds of the said incorporated society shall from time to time, be laid out and applied by the executive committee in such way and for such purpose only as any general meeting of the said society may direct or appoint, and that the executive committee shall be bound and are hereby required annually to account to the society for all their acts, receipts, expenditure, and doings whatsover, in the said office, and to make a report annually to the said society, at its general meeting, of the progress and state of the said society, and of its affiairs generally.

IX. And be it enacted that a general meeting of the said society shall be held once, that is to say, some time within the last ten days of the month of June, in each year, and as much oftener as may be directed by any Rule or Bye-Laws of the said society.

X. And be it enacted, that the executive committee of the said Society shall meet and assemble as often as there may be occasion, and any three members shall form a quorum. An Act to Incorporate the Governors of King's College, Windsor, and to repeal the Act for Founding, Establishing, and Maintaining a College in this Province.

(Passed the 4th day of April, A. D. 1853.)

Be it enacted by the governor, council, and assembly as follows :

1. The act passed in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of his late majesty king George the third, entitled, an act for founding, establishing and maintaining a college in this province, is hereby repealed.

2. The Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia, the honorable Brenton Halliburton, reverend George McCawley, D.D., the honorable James B. Uniacke, and Lewis Morris Wilkins, esquire, together with eight persons, being members of the church of England, to be elected at a general or special meeting of the "alumni of King's college, Windsor, shall be governors of the college hereby incorporated.

3. The Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia, for the time being, shall be always ex-officio a governor, president of the board and visitor, the said Brenton Halliburton, George McCawley, James B. Uniacke, and Lewis Morris Wilkins, shall be governors for the term of their respective lives; and of the eight persons to be elected by the alumni of King's College, Windsor, two shall, in each and every year, successively, in the order of their election, go out of office, but such two governors may be re-elected.

4. All vacancies hereafter occurring, whether by death, resignation, removal from office, or otherwise, amongst the governors, from time to time, shall be filled up by the alumni of King's College, Windsor, in manner hereinbefore appointed, but the governors shall always be elected from among members of the church of England, and every person hereafter elected on any such vacancy, shall, as to his tenure of office, be subject to the regulation hereinbefore prescribed touching the eight persons to be elected by the alumni of King's College Windsor.

5. For the better management of the college, and for more completely executing the purposes of this act, the governors appointed, and to be appointed from time to time by virtue hereof, shall be a body politic and corporate in deed and in name, and have a common seal and

succession for ever, by the name of governors of King's college, Windsor, and by that name shall make bye-laws and ordinances for the regulation and management of the college, and shall also have, hold and enjoy, for the use and benefit of the college, and the purpose of this act, all the goods and chattels, and all the lands which are now had, held occupied or enjoyed by "the governors of King's college, of Nova Scotia," or by "the governors, president, and fellows of King's College, at Windsor, in the province of Nova Scotia," or by any person in trust for them, or in their behalf, in the same manner as if the same had been duly conveyed and transferred to the governors hereby incorporated, by virtue of a statute of this province, authorizing the conveyance and transfer thereof, and also shall have power to purchase, receive, take, hold, and enjoy, for the use and benefit of the said college, and the purposes of this act, and other goods, chattels, or lands, so as the said last mentioned lands shall not exceed in value ten thousand pounds, and also at all times hereafter shall have power to sell, lease, mortgage, or otherwise dispose of the lands belonging to the college, or any part thereof, for the benefit of the said college, as to the governors, hereby incorporated, shall seem proper, any law to the contrary notwithstanding.

6. The governors hereby incorporated, at any general meeting assembled, shall, from time to time, and as they shall think fit, make and establish such statutes and ordinances for the instruction, care, and government of the students, the management of the property of the college, the appointment of the president, professors, fellows, and scholars, (the president always to be a member of the church of England); and also touching any matter or thing respecting the college, which to them shall seem meet.

7. The college, hereby incorporated, shall be taken to be an university, with all usual privileges of such an institution, whether relating to the conferring of degrees and honors, or otherwise.

8. From the time of this act coming into operation until the appointment of a full board of governors, by virtue hereof, the present governors, shall, notwithstanding this act, continue to exercise all the powers which are now vested in them, by the act hereby repealed, and the royal charter which they now hold.

9. All academical honors and degrees, and all rights, powers, privileges, and authorities, now had, held, or exercised by any person, by virtue of the act hereby repealed, or of the charter hereinbefore referred to, except so far as they may be necessarily taken away, altered, abridged, or affected, by, or in consequence of this act, shall be had, held, and exercised; in relation to the college hereby incorporated, as fully as they are now had, held, or exercised. 10. The royal charter, incorporating "the governors, president, and fellows of King's college, at Windsor, in the province of Nova-Scotia," shall not be in any manner effected by this act, except so far as may be necessary to give effect to this act.

11. This act shall not come into operation until her majesty's assent be signified thereto.

The Alumnt of Minn's College, Eliniteser

An Act to amend the Act to Incorporate the Governors of King's College, Windsor, and to repeal the Act for Founding, Establishing, and Maintaining a College in this Province.

(Passed the 7th day of May, A. D. 1866.)

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council, and Assembly, as follows :

1. Sections 2 and 3 of the above named Act are hereby amended by adding to the third Section the following words :---

"But no person shall be re-elected to the office of Governor of said College until after the period of at least eleven months from the time he shall have last served as such Governor."

7. 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BYE-LAWS

OF

Ehe Alumni of Hing's College, Gindsor.

Passed at a General Meeting held at the Halifax Hotel, June 27, 1848.

I. Besides the Annual General Meeting of the Incorporated Society, it shall be competent for the committee at any time, either of their own accord, or upon a requisition signed by at least ten of the members of the association, upon giving seven days' notice in the public papers, to call a special general meeting of the association, specifying the purposes for which it is called, and in which meeting it shall be competent for the association to transact any such business as may be required. Ten members shall be deemed a quorum for the transaction of business.

II. That the books, accounts, and papers of the association shall be open at all times for the inspection of the members, and the Secretary shall furnish an account of the affairs of the association whenever required by the committee.

III. That the Treasurer and Secretary, and such officers as shall be requisite for the incorporated Society, shall be annually appointed by the Executive Committee.

IV. That at the annual meeting of the association, the President and Vice-President shall alternately go out of office, accompanied by the first three of the committee, and that all or any of them having a majority of votes shall be eligible to be re-elected.

V. That at any meeting, members not present may vote by proxy in writing, to be held by any other member; provided that no member shall be entitled to vote either personally or by proxy, whose dues are not all paid up for the preceding year.

VI. That the funds of the association will be appropriated for the payment of one or more professors or lecturers, and one or more scholarships at the University of King's College, or one or more teachers or exhibitions in the Collegiate School at Windsor, to be denominated the Alumni professorships and scholarships, respectively.

VII. That the association will serupulously apply such donations as may be made to them, to such specific objects in aid of King's College, as may be directed by the donors respectively.

VIII. That all meetings of the incorporated society shall be opened with prayer.

IX. (Passed at general meeting of June 21st, 1849.) That the elections of members of the incorporation shall be by ballot.

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RULES AND RESOLUTIONS

PASSED AT DIFFERENT TIMES.

THAT no resolution or proceeding inconsistent with or modifying any resolution or proceeding adopted by a general meeting be entertained by the executive committee in Halifax, except upon a month's notice to the committee being given by the person proposing the same, and that no such resolution or proceeding be carried into effect until the same shall have been confirmed by a general meeting to be summoned for the consideration thereof, if necessary to be arranged before the annual general meeting.

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That a corresponding committee of three residents in Windsor or its neighborhood, the chairman whereof shall be, if possible, a member of the executive committee, be appointed to meet on the second Wednesday in every month, and at such other times as may be expedient, upon summons of the chairman, to confer with the officers of the College or Collegiate School upon any subject, to be submitted to them either by such officers, or by the executive committee in Halifax, in reference to the College or School, and to report thereon to the executive committee.

A month's notice shall be given of all resolutions affecting the rights of members, or creating new offices or salaries.

No individual shall be entitled to vote under a parochial certificate unless he be authorized by a parish meeting.

All annual general meetings of this association shall be holden at Windsor.

That the treasurer make up his annual account to the 30th of April in each and every year.

All undergraduates, resident at College, shall be competent to compete for the prize or certificate for modern languages.

At the annual meeting held at Windsor, June 29, 1856, Dr. King moved the resolution, notice of which was given at the last annual meeting by the Rev. Dr. Twining, in reference to the mode of election of Governors, viz: that the present mode of voting for, each individual separately and in alphabetical order be discontinued, and that the usual mode of putting all the names proposed on the same ballot, out of whom those having the highest number shall be declared elected, should be adopted; which motion was seconded by Dr. Almon. After considerable discussion Mr. A. M. Cochran moved in amendment that the following proviso be added :— "Provided that no person shall be declared elected as Governor unless he have a majority of votes cast." The amendment was seconded by Nepean Clarke, Esq., and carried. The original resolution of Rev. Dr. Twining as amended by Mr. Cochran's proviso, then passed.

At the annual meeting, June 25th, 1873: -

"That in the election of Governors the order of the names be such as to place the name of the Candidate obtaining the smallest number of votes at the head of the list, and so in succession."

At the general meeting, October 17th, 1856: -

"That the right of voting by proxy be in no way interfered with."

At the general meeting, June 24th, 1857 :--

"That the ballot be not sent round for any officer of this association, or of the Board of Governors, whose name has not been previously proposed and seconded by some member of the association; and that the ballot be not taken until all the names of all persons intended to be proposed for any office be given.

At the annual meeting, June 27th, 1860, the following resolutions passed.

"That the Executive Committee of the Associate Alumni be empowered at their monthly meetings, during the interval between one annual general meeting and the next, to elect members of the Incorporation, provided that no black beans be cast against them."

Whereas, the funds of this association are pledged, and consequently, no funds are left for providing the Alumni scholarship and the usual prizes. On motion of Rev. George W. Hodgson, M. A., seconded by Frederick Allison, Esq., M. A.:

Resolved, That whereas the College has sustained a great loss since the last annual meeting, in the death of the lamented Professor Hensley, Vice-President of the College, the Alumni desire to express their deep sense of their great loss, and their sympathy with the bereaved family. Moreover they would express their entire approval of the proposal to erect the College Chapel as a memorial to Dr. Hensley, who took the warmest interest in the scheme almost up to the day of his death, and further, that the Secretary be directed to forward a copy of this resolution to Mrs. Hensley.

On motion of Rev. George W. Hodgson, M. A., seconded by Rev. George W. Hill:

Resolved, That while the Alumni of King's College are firmly determined to maintain intact the rights and privileges of the College, they yet are quite ready to co-operate with the University of Halifax.

KING'S COLLEGE SCHOOL, WINDSOR, N. S.

HEAD MASTER: The REV. C. E. WILLETS, M. A.,

Graduate and formerly Scholar of Corpus Christi College, Cambridge, late Sub-Rector Bishop's College School, Lennoxville, Quebec.

This School is in direct connection with King's College, and is subject to the supervision of the President and Vice-President of the College, under instructions from the Board of Governors.

The object of the School is to provide a sound religious, classical, mathematical and general education, in conformity with the principles of the Church of England; but it is open to all denominations without restriction.

Pupils belonging to the Church of England will attend the services in the College Chapel, but those of other denominations may, if required by their parents, attend the Sunday services of the denomination to which they belong. In the latter case certificates of proper attendance and good conduct will be required from the Minister.

While ample provision is made to prepare boys for the University and higher Civil Examinations, the utmost attention is devoted to imparting such a training as may fit them for all pursuits and professions, and enable them to take that position in society which is conceded only to men of liberal education and refined habits.

COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

The course of instruction includes all the usual branches of a sound education in Classics, Mathematics, German, French, English, etc.

TERMS.

The School year is divided into three Terms :

Michaelmas Term.—First Saturday in September to December 21st. Lent Term.—Third Saturday in January to 1st Saturday in April. Trinity Term.—First Saturday in April to last Thursday in June.

FEES.

The Fees are distributed over the year as follows :---

Modern Languages—Boarders and Day Scholars—Michaelmas Term \$5. Lent and Trinity Terms \$3.50 each.

A half Term's notice must be given in writing previous to the removal of a pupil.

There are two exhibitions connected with the School, one of \$32 and the other of \$16.

Apply in Halifax to Rev. J. W. Abbott, Rector St. Luke's Cathedral; in Windsor to Mr. C. W. Knowles, Stationer, etc., who will forward applications until August 21st, after which date the Head Master will be in residence at Windsor.

ALL the friends of King's College will hail with pleasure the re-opening of the Collegiate School, an Institution which has been so intimately connected in past years with the success of the University. It needs but a brief inspection of the names of the Pupils to convince any one of the important influence that the School has exercised over the youth of the Lower Provinces. Among the Head Masters we find the names of Archibald Payne Inglis, Rev. W. Cochran, Rev. B. G. Gray, Rev. W. Twining, Rev. W. C. King, Rev. C. Milner, Rev. F. Salt, Rev, J. H. Clinch, Rev. W. B. King, Rev. J. G. Mulholland, Rev. D. W. Pickett, Rev. Dr. Blackman and Rev. G. B. Dodwell. As is well known the stone building erected in 1822 was burnt down in 1871, but it is hoped that it will shortly be replaced by a well arranged school-house, for which a large portion of the funds is already promised. In the meantime, by permission of the Governors of the College, very comfortable arrangements have been made, both for school-rooms and boarding accommodations. There are two Exhibitions connected with the School, one of \$32 and the other of \$16, to be competed for in June.

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
