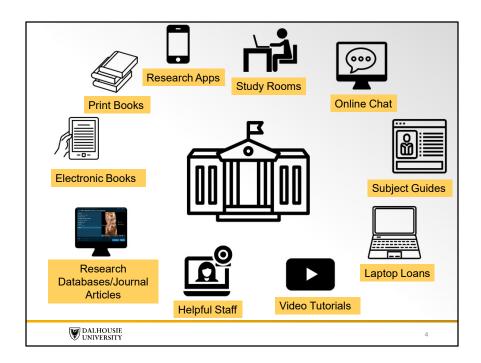


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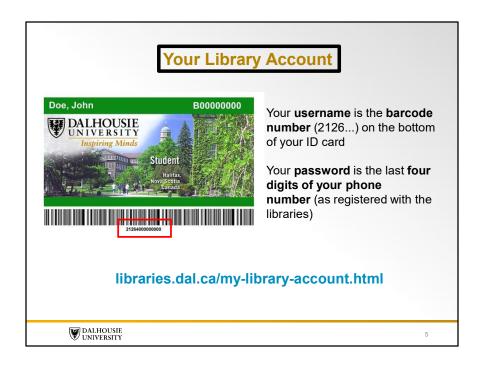
- Our objectives for today – highlights of what you'll need to know to make the most of the library



Let's discuss what's available to you through Dalhousie Libraries



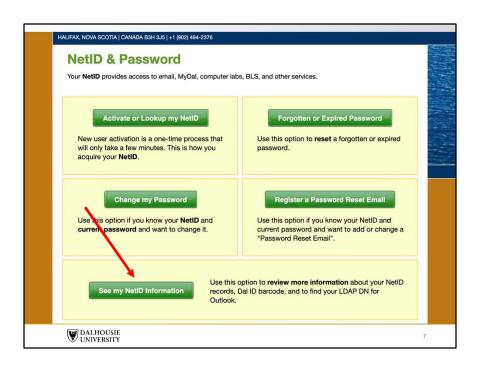
- We have both print and electronic books available
- Apps to help you with your research
- Bookable study rooms. Currently, there are COVID-19 restrictions in place for this. Check individual library websites for the latest info.
- Online chat service for research help
- Subject Guides one for every subject studied at Dal. These were created by librarians to help you find information on a variety of subjects.
- Laptop loans. Check with individual libraries for their policies
- Video tutorials to help you brush up on your research skills
- Helpful staff
- Research databases and journal articles, which you'll use for writing papers and assignments



- To access the library in person or use document delivery, you'll need to utilize your library account. Online access will require your NetID (more on that shortly)
- If you have a Dal card, your username is the barcode number on the bottom of your ID card and your password is the last four digits of your phone number



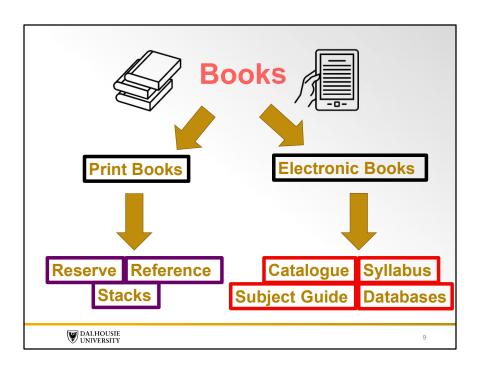
If you don't have a dal card, you can find your barcode number by going to password.dal.ca



Click "See my NetID Information" to see your Dal barcode. This is your username for your library account.



- Let's talk about finding books and articles.



- Library has some print books, some electronic books



Reserve:

❖Books that are set aside at the library, usually close to the circulation desk. Only available for 2-hour loans.

Reference:

❖Books in a designated section at the library that are NOT available to borrow. Can be read in the library.

Stacks:

❖Books that are found in the library's general collection. Available for checkout.



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Find print books...

On Reserve:

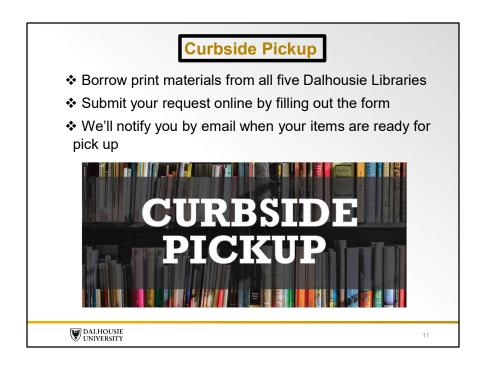
❖ Books that are set aside at the library (by request of your course instructor), usually close to the circulation desk. Only available for 2-hour loans.

In the Reference collection:

❖ Books in a designated section at the library that are NOT available to borrow. Can be read in the library.

In the Stacks:

❖Books that are found in the library's general collection. Available for checkout.



For print books, we now have a curbside pickup service at all five our libraries.

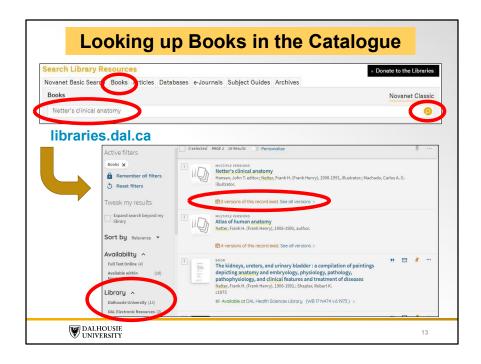

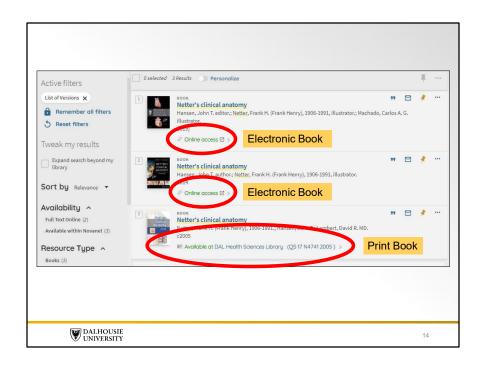


To find books in the catalogue, head to libraries.dal.ca

In the main search bar, click the "Books" tab and search for a title, author, or a topic of interest

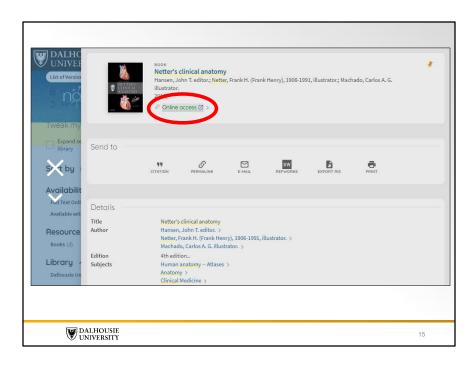
When your search results appear, you can filter by library on the left-hand side

In this list of results, we see the book we searched for is at the top of the list. The record for this book says 3 versions exist.

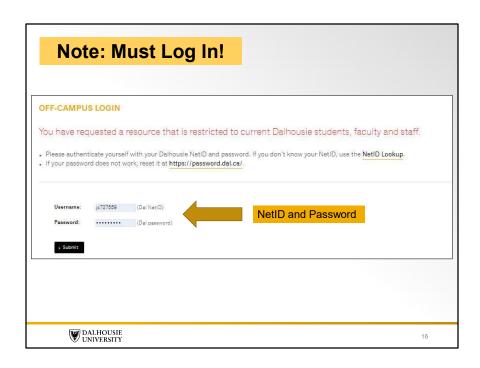


When we click, we see two versions are electronic books because it says: "Online access".

The third version is a print book. The record tells us it's available at the Dal Health Sciences Library and provides us with a call number for finding this book in the stacks at the library.



If you'd like to open an ebook, click "online access"



Note: you will be asked to login with your Dal NetID and password before you're able to access the book.

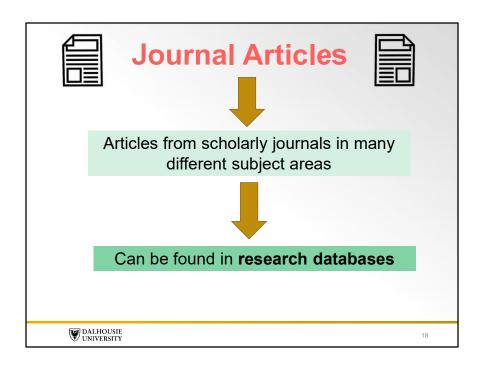


Once logged in, we are taken to the ebook.

Different publisher platforms have different functionalities – sometimes, you can download books and sometimes you must read them online, directly in the browser.

In this case, both options are available.

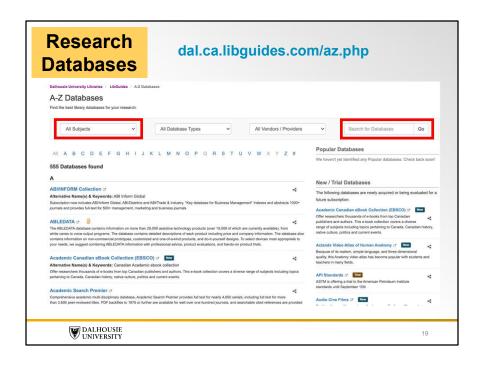
Also useful: you can often download individual chapters. This is helpful if you don't want to download the whole book.



Next, let's talk about journal articles.

At the library, you can access articles from scholarly journals in different subject areas. These are also sometimes referred to as "peer-reviewed articles." They are a common source used in university papers and research.

Articles can be found in research databases



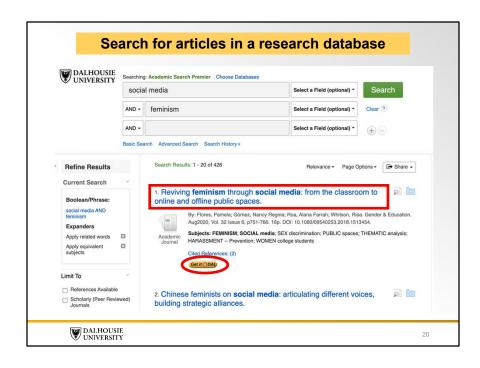
On the library website, we have an A-Z list of research databases available at dal.ca.libguides.com/az.php

Databases are either multidisciplinary, meaning they contain journal articles on a variety of subjects, or subject specific, meaning they're focused on a specific subject area.

In the A-Z databases list, you can search for databases by subject.

Or, if you already know the name of the database you'd like to access, you can also search by title.

Below, each database listed is a short description of the database.

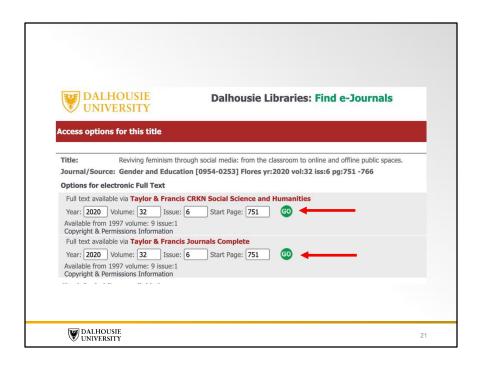


Once you've chosen a database, you can search for articles on a topic of interest.

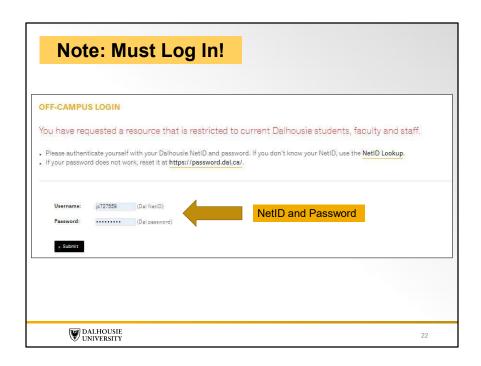
In Academic Search Premier, which is a multidisciplinary database, we searched for "social media" and "feminism" and retrieved 426 results.

The article title of the first result appears in the red box.

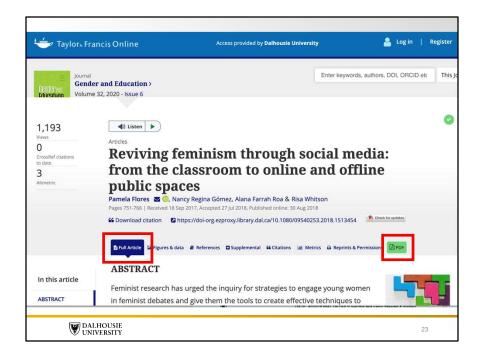
Sometimes, you'll be able to download PDFs of articles directly from the database. If no PDF appears, click the yellow "Get it @ Dal" button to find another way to access the article.



After clicking "Get it @ Dal," we're taken to this page, where we see that we have two options for accessing this article. We can click "Go" for either to open up the article.



Just as with ebooks, you'll be prompted to login.

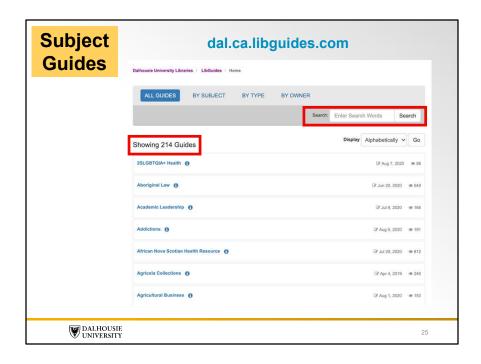


And here's the article!

We can read the full article directly in the browser, or we can download a PDF of the article to save and read now or later.



Now, let's talk about research tools available for you at any hour, from anywhere.

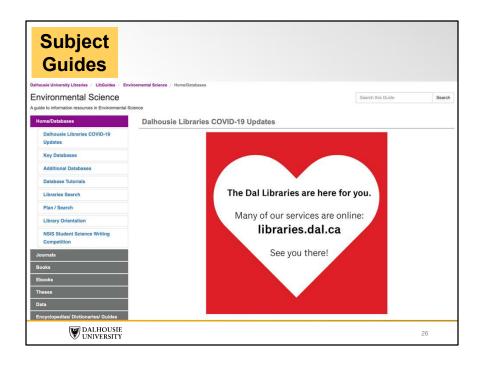


Subject guides are helpful tools for conducting research and finding library resources on a specific subject.

You can access our Subject guides at dal.ca.libguides.com

As you see here, we currently have 214 different guides available.

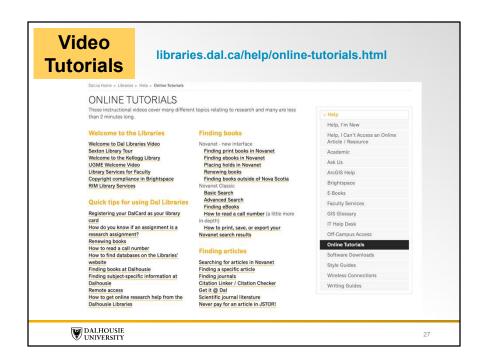
You can search for a guide related to your interests in the search bar in the top right-hand corner.



Here's what a subject guide looks like.

This is the subject guide for Environmental Science. On the left-hand side, there is information and links accessing databases, journals, books, data, and more – all related to Environmental Science.

I encourage every student to bookmark the subject guides that are relevant to their courses. That way, when you needed to get started on a new paper, you have a direct path to finding good books and articles.



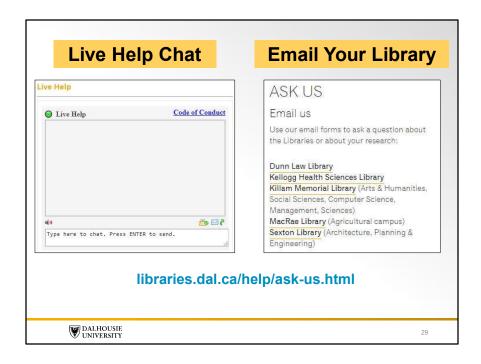
Another research tool many students find helpful are our video tutorials.

These short tutorials cover a wide variety of topics from using the library, to finding books and articles, citation styles, and more.

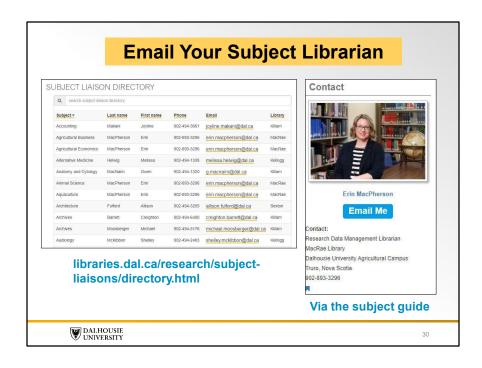


If ever you have a question about the library or about how to do research, we're here to help in a variety of ways.

You can also email your library directly. Head to libraries.dal.ca/help/ask-us.html for the contact information for your individual library.

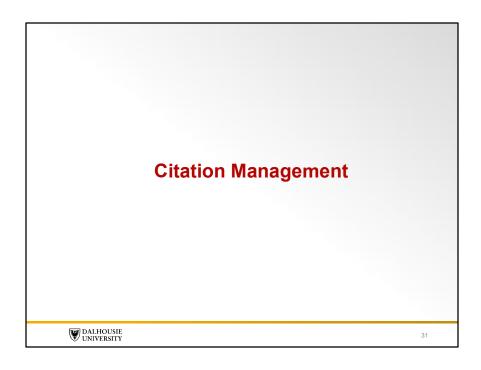


You can also email your subject librarian to ask for help.

What is Citation Management?

Keeping the references you include in your papers, projects, etc. organized. Can be done using software that will:

- ❖Keep your references all in one place
- ❖Create a bibliography for you in the format you need
- ❖Help you create in-text citations while you write

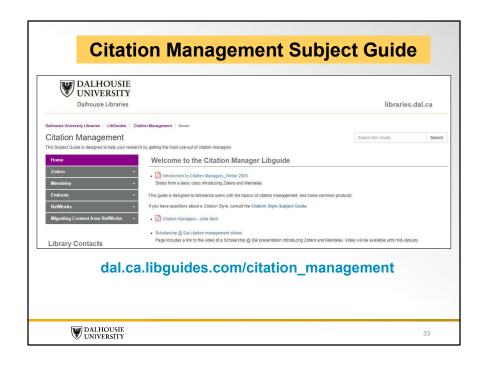


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Citation Management is a strategy for keeping the references you include in your papers, projects, etc. organized.

This is done by using a citation manager, a software program designed to:

- ❖ Keep your references all in one place
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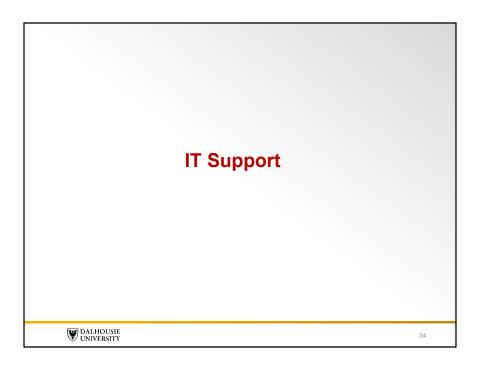

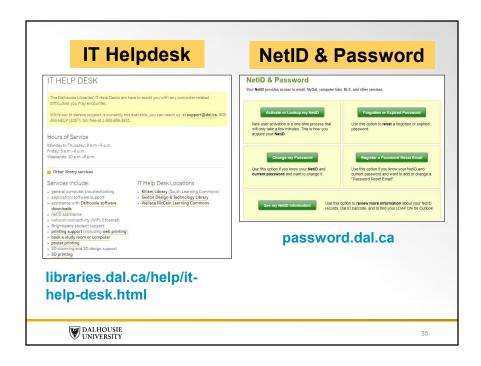
Here, you can learn more about popular citation managers such as Zotero and Mendeley.

If you have more specific questions about how to get started, you can contact your subject librarian using the methods we've shown you.

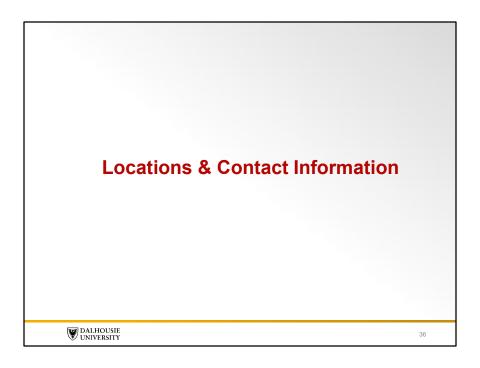




If you need tech support, including general computer troubleshooting, netID assistance, Dal software downloads, and more, the Dal IT helpdesk is here for you.
