




Dedication


The students of Dalhousine respectfully dedicate their year book, "Pharos", to Dr. Howard Lambert Scammell, M.D., C.M.

President's Message...

I have heard of a teacher who told each successive graduating class that they were undoubtedly the finest students he had ever had! He might have done so with complete ingenuousness, because even Shakespeare observed that each one of a series of things which are as much alike as halfpennies may seem exceptional till his fellow comes along. Fortunately it is not necessary for me to indulge in comparisons between one class and another: it is enough to assure you, the young men and women with whom it has been my esteemed privilege to associate during the past few years, that in my judgment you are eminently worthy to stand in the Dalhousie tradition, and that is very high praise indeed.

In your time at the University you have seen several important advances accomplished. The most recent of these was the transfer of the Façulty of Law from the Carleton Street division of the campus to the fine building, completely remodelled, which had been designed for its use more than two decades ago. I have every confidence that when you fix your eyes on the greatness of the Dalhousie which was foreseen by our fathers and which is gradually emerging in response to the needs of our expanding society, you will be filled with the love of her, as the Athenian was filled with the love of his native city when he contemplated her glory, and you will be proud to follow and encourage her development with your loyal support.

The Dalhousie Year Book derives its name from the famous lighthouse which the ancients regarded as one of the seven wonders of the world. It is a sincere tribute to this University that her students should refer to her under this complimentary figure, and it is not inappropriate in view of the essential service which she is endeavouring to render. 


Elsie Merle Clarke




Dorothy Laverick Yates

Students Council

The Council of the Students is the principal administrative and legislative organizaton of the student body. It is the only recognized medium between the student body and University authorities, and also between the student body and other groups. As President of the Council, I have been asked by the Editors of Pharos to review briefly the past year and the record of our student administration.

Upon taking office, every administrative head has two or three definite ideas on how to improve various organizations responsible to that particular administration, how to stimulate interest in those groups and in what manner policies and activities should be carried out. In many cases, those ideas are considered and even acted upon; in some cases they are rejected. One objective of this year's Council was to reduce the cost of attending University functions and to give a maximum benefit to students for their council fee. We were quite successful in this regard. A local cleaning establishment, a clothing merchant and a Florist all agreed to give substantial reductions to students. There were more Football games played on our campus and students were dmitted at halfprice. Basketball games were attended without charge ,and the cost of Hockey games reduced.


Probably the most interesting and controversial event of the fall term was the result of the National Federation of Canadian University Students annual conference held this year at Quebec. At this conference the Soviet Student Exchange Plan was discussed and after much debate was turned down. As Dalhousie's delegates were mandated to support this plan, the decision had repercussions here. However a referendum was held and the students reaffirmed their faith in NFCUS.

The major event of the spring term was Dalhousie's participation in an Intercollegiate Blood Drive competition. A clinic was set up on the campus and the campaign was also conducted in an Inter-faculty and Inter-fraternity competitive basis. Under the chairmanship of Vice-President Roger Cyr, the drive was successful and our effort was a credit to the University.

In the realm of financing, the Council is responsible for all receipts collected at athletic functions, as well as receipts collected by other Student organizations under the jurisdiction of the Council. This year the Gate Receipts Committee, with David Bryson as Chairman, has enjoyed a very successful year and this has been due mainly to Dave's constant interest and hard work. Skating receipts especially were an all time high.

Among the changes hoped to be implemented before the end of the year is a proposal to change the Gazette from a four page bi-weekly to a six page edition once a week. We hope this will improve the student newspaper. The Council is also endeavouring to get more ice time for students at our University Rink. It has been difficult this year to include all skating and hockey activities into the time allocated to us.

In closing, I wish to thank all those who have helped me in my efforts to discharge the duties of Council President. Especially our Secretary-Treasurer, Bernal Sawyer, whose help has been invaluable. We have had a successful year and no one person can be responsible for all the achievements rcorded by a student administration. Next year there will be a new President and Council. Give them your suport as their responsibilities are numerous. Good fortune and Good health to all.

Several controversial questions were the subject of a series of news stories and a barrage of letters to the editor of the Dalhousie Gazette during the past term, and no matter what else can be said of the GAZETTE, it generally experienced an increase in student interest and comment.

Among the top news stories of the year were the NFCUS rejecton of the proposed Russian-Canadian student exchange and the stand Dal's delegate took at the national conference and his subsequent justification for his vote.

The special law convocation and formal opening of the Law Building on Studley campus, in the presence of jurists of international eminence, was another major news story.

Perhaps among the unusual stories of the year were the Mock trial of the Editor on a charge of libel, conducted by law school students, and a satire which drew a barrage of letters to the editor, both for and against the publication of such material.

At the time of writing, the latest prominent news story was Dalhousie's lead in the Inter-University Blood Donor competition with a total of 58% volunteers.

A high spirited staff and complete co-operation between writers and desk men made this year's GAZETTE a success.


Psychology Club


As is usual, the Law Ball, Poor Man's Law Ball and Law Banquet were the social triumphs of the year.


The Club members in turn review books, fictional or non-fictional, current or classic, written in any literary form.

Over a welcome cup of coffee, the reviewer gives a brief biographical sketch of the author's life, outlines the main sections of the book and leads the lively discussion that follows.


On occasion a book of particular interest to the group is reviewed by a guest speaker, usually a professor on the campus.


Cheerleaders

The team under coach King was young and inexperienced but for the most part the boys will be back next year and should be strong contenders to regain the trophy.


