
DR. H. L. STEWART, M.A.(Oxon.), Ph.D.

R. HERBERT LESLIE STEWART was George Munro Professor of Philosophy for nearly thirtyfive years, a period which extended from before the beginning of the First World War until after the close of the Second. His great knowledge of men and affairs, his intimate familiarity with ancient and modern literature, his command of language, his strong opinions vigorously expressed, and his inexhaustible fund of humorous stories fascinated and endeared him to successive generations of students. His class in Philosophic Ideas in Literature in particular enjoyed great popularity. Through his books, his many contributions to the newspapers and magazines, his long editorship of the DALHOUSIE REVIEW, his public lectures and his regular broadcasts on current affairs, his name and that of Dalhousie were carried far beyond the boundaries of the University. The memory of his strong individuality, his ready flow of talk and his joking utterance, half bantering, half caustic, will long be cherished.

THE REV. CANON A. STANLEY WALKER was for nearly thirty years Professor of History and for the last sixteen President and Vice-Chancellor of King's College. Dr. Walker was a brilliant, humorous and most entertaining lecturer. In his class History 20 large numbers of pre-professional students annually discovered, sometimes to their astonishment, how fascinating was the study of the past as they learned something of the modern world's debt to the civilization and thought of antiquity. He was always more interested in inspiring others to think for themselves than in any process of indoctrination. His extreme versatility, his mastery of the brilliant generalization and the apt but unexpected analogy were effectively employed to stimulate and arouse the minds of his hearers. The same wise detachment was apparent in his presidency of King's. He held firmly to his belief in the educative value of self-government and in the capacity of the young to rise to the challenge of responsibility. In the personal counselling of students he was never one to be extreme to mark what was done amiss. Rather he sought positively to develop the good that his own cheerful toleration of differences so readily permitted him to discern in others.

# IN MEMORIAM

The news of the sudden and untimely death of Neil McKinnon came as a great blow to both the faculty and the student body of Dalhousie.

In spite of the fact that Neil's career at Dalhousie was destined to be so short his contribution to the University was, to say the least, considerable.

For two years, Neil or "Dusty" as he was known to many, held down the position of end on the football team. During the winter he was one of the highest scorers on the Junior Varsity Hockey Team.

However, Neil's contribution to his college was not confined to athletics. At the end of his freshman year he was elected Treasurer of the Arts and Science Society, and had he returned this year he would have been its President. Dusty was also a member of the Rink Rats Committee, as well as taking an active role in his fraternity, where he held various positions of responsibility.

I am most grateful to the editors of PHAROS for this opportunity to tender my thanks to the student body as a whole for their co-operation in the past year, to offer congratulations, on my own behalf and that of all my colleagues, to the members of it who have successfully completed the requirements for diplomas or degrees, and to say that it has been a genuine pleasure to know them. I mention in particular my appreciation of the assistance provided by the Council of Students, which is responsible for the direct oversight of so many of the extra-curricular activities of the campus.

One record of the life and work of the University in the academic year 1953-'54 will be included in the official reports of the various Faculties and the audited financial statements submitted to the Board of Governors. Another and more graphic record will be preserved in PHAROS, with its interesting pictures and personal references. I have no doubt that when the formal documents of the first category are buried deep in the University archives, PHAROS will still be referred to by all who wish to refresh their memories regarding individual students and to recall outstanding events of the session. I concur most heartily in that complimentary judgment of the young people who come here to continue their studies, and I trust that they on their part feel that Dalhousie is endeavouring, to the limit of its resources, to give them an education of which they will never have reason to feel ashamed.

I shall always follow the careers of this year's graduates with cordial interest.


#### MORRIS AULDEN BARSS, Jr. Armdale, N. S.


#### JOYCE KERR LATIMER Halifax, N. S.


#### SUZANNE MEREDITH PALMER Charlottetown, P. E. I.




