

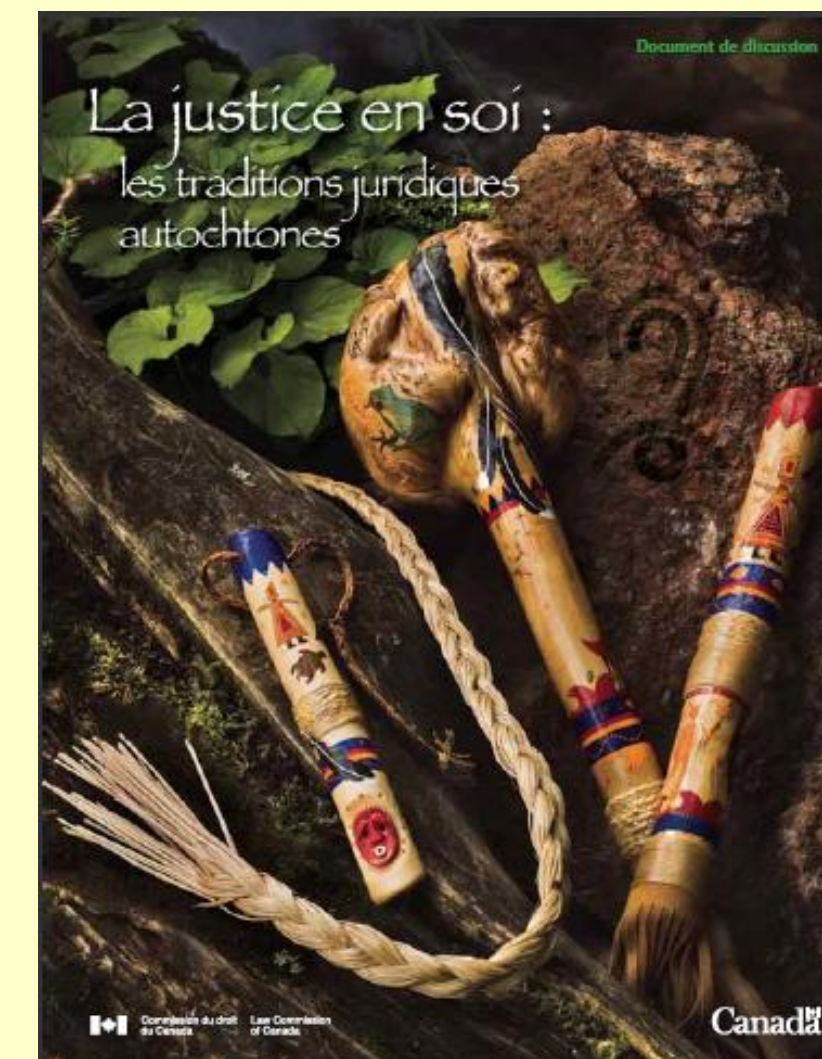
Michelle Paon, Dalhousie University Libraries, Halifax, N.S.

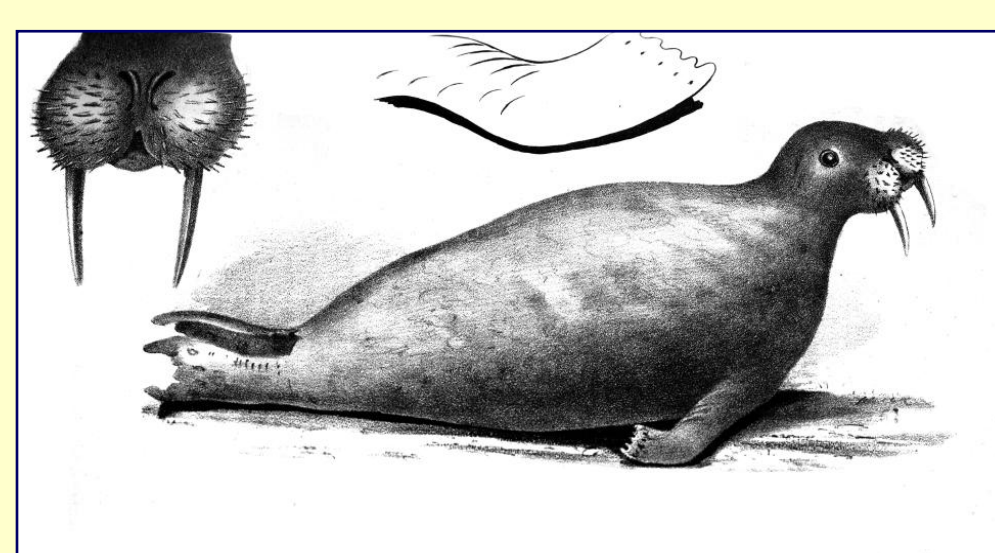

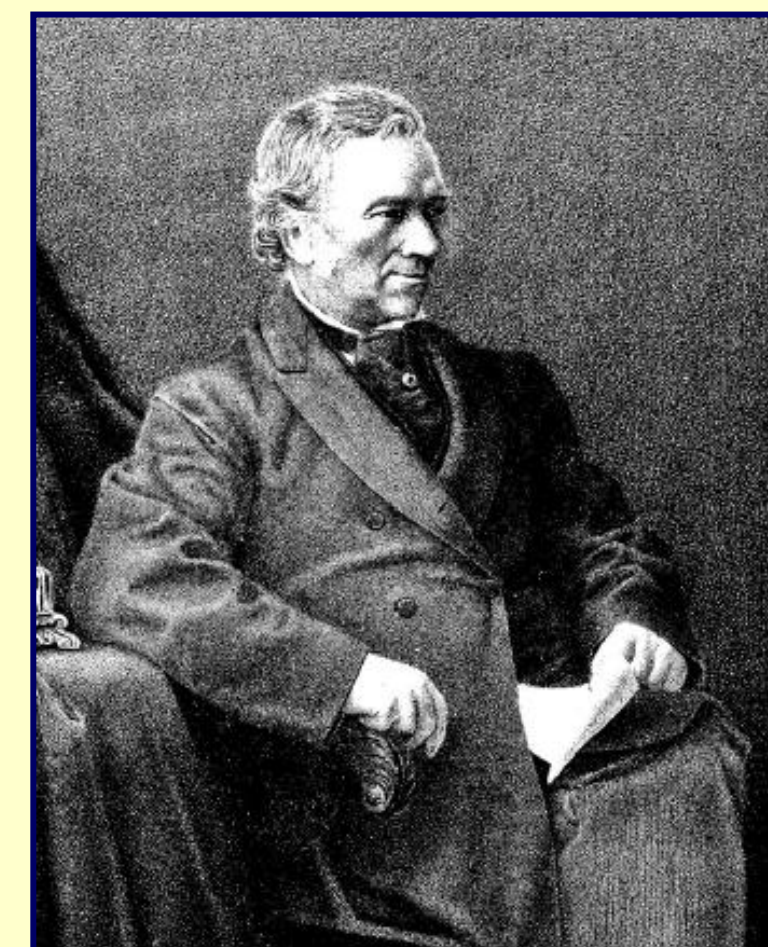

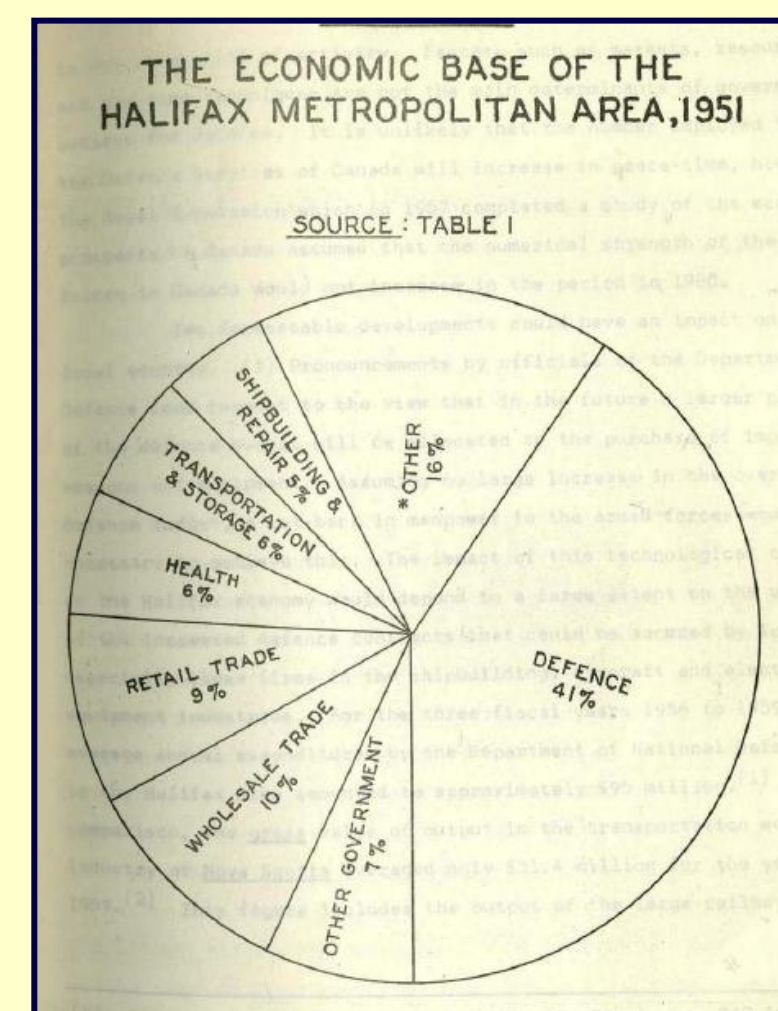
ART. X. "THE WALRUS." By J. BERNARD GELPIN, A. B., M. D., M. R. C. S.

Trichechus, rosomarus, (Gmel.)
I beg to lay before the Institute, a description of a Walrus, that was brought to Halifax in April of the present year. It was shot in March at the Straits of Belleisle, Labrador—drugged on the ice for five miles, and then taken by ship to St. John's, Newfoundland, and from thence fetched to Halifax.



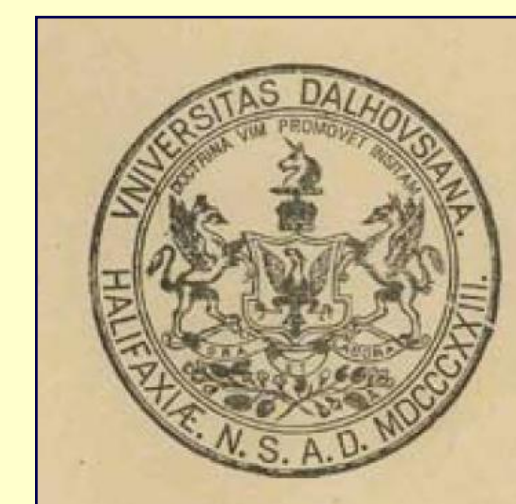

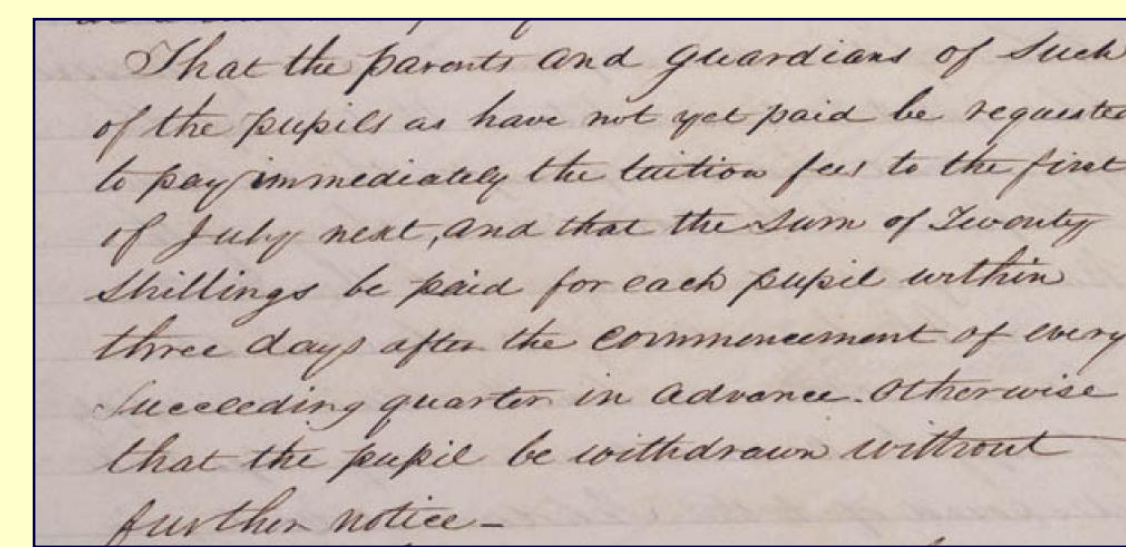
Established at Dalhousie University in 1936, the Institute produced public policy documents on a broad range of socio-economic issues and published the quarterly entitled *Public Affairs*.

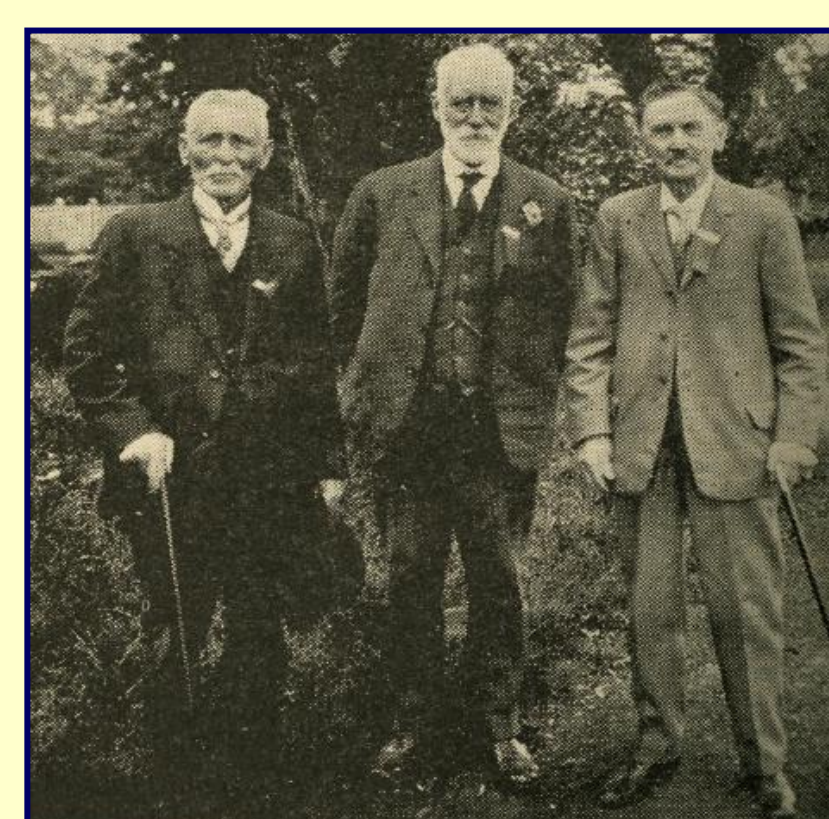

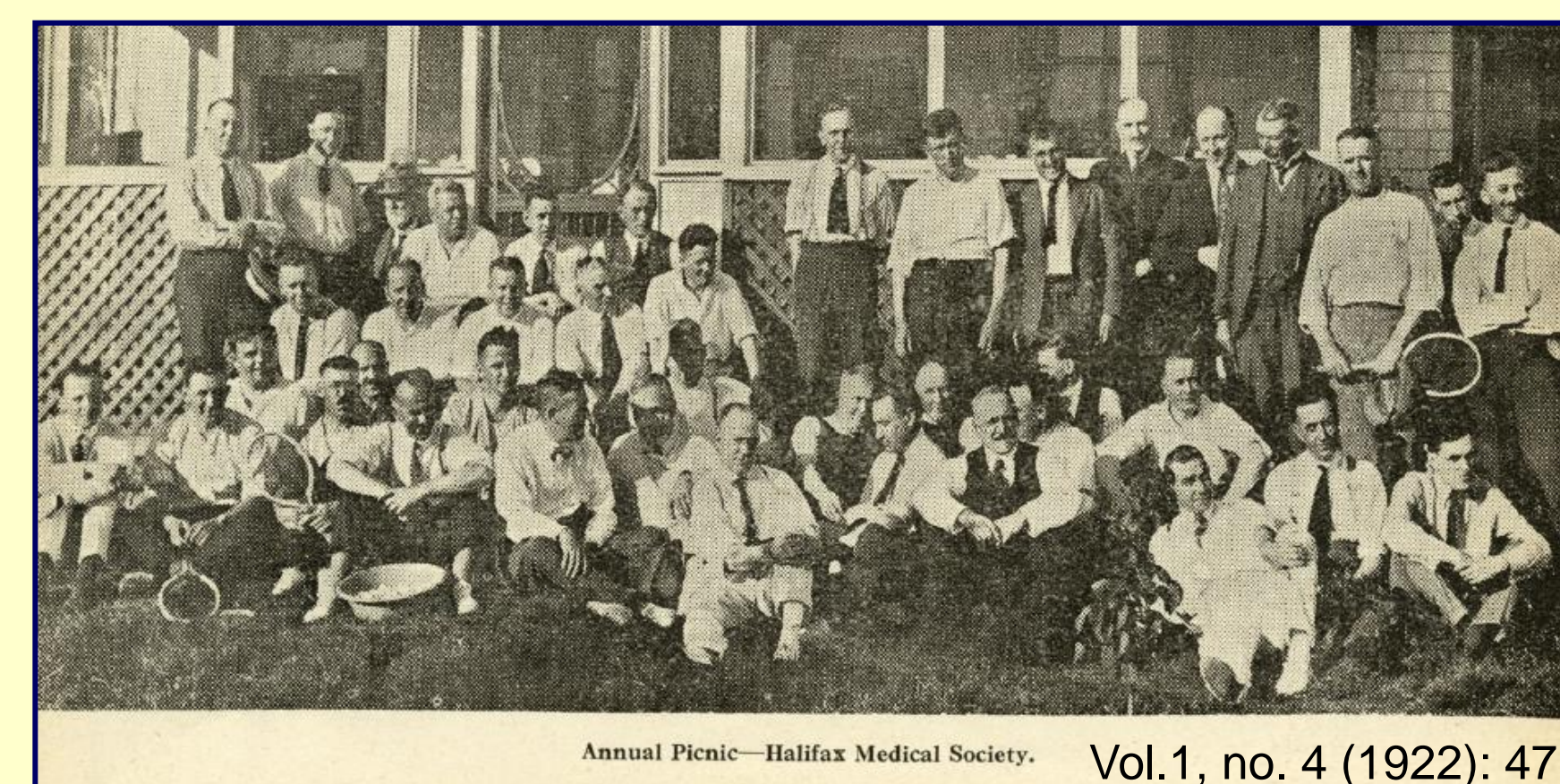
Nova Scotia Medical Bulletin

Founded "to bring together the doctors of the Province into closer cooperation and to inform them of current medical affairs".

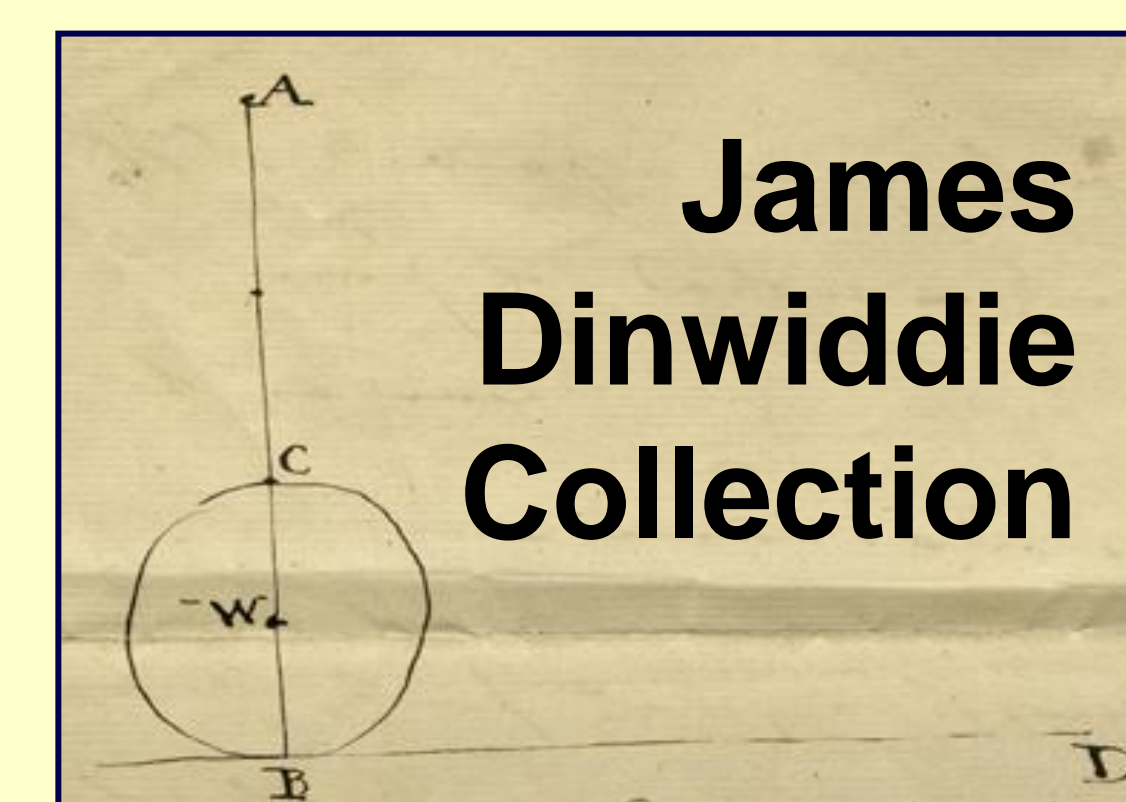

James Dinwiddie Collection

The digitized collection includes 437 items, including:

- journals
- notebooks
- manuscripts
- correspondence

Dinwiddie (1746-1815) was a Scottish scientist who wrote on a wide variety of scientific topics, including agriculture, optics and fireworks. He experimented with hot-air balloons and with electricity. During his life, Dinwiddie travelled to China, and later lectured at a college in India.
