Students?—Somebody forgot to tell them. A few came, and at picture time (11:30 p.m.) they may have been in the W. C.







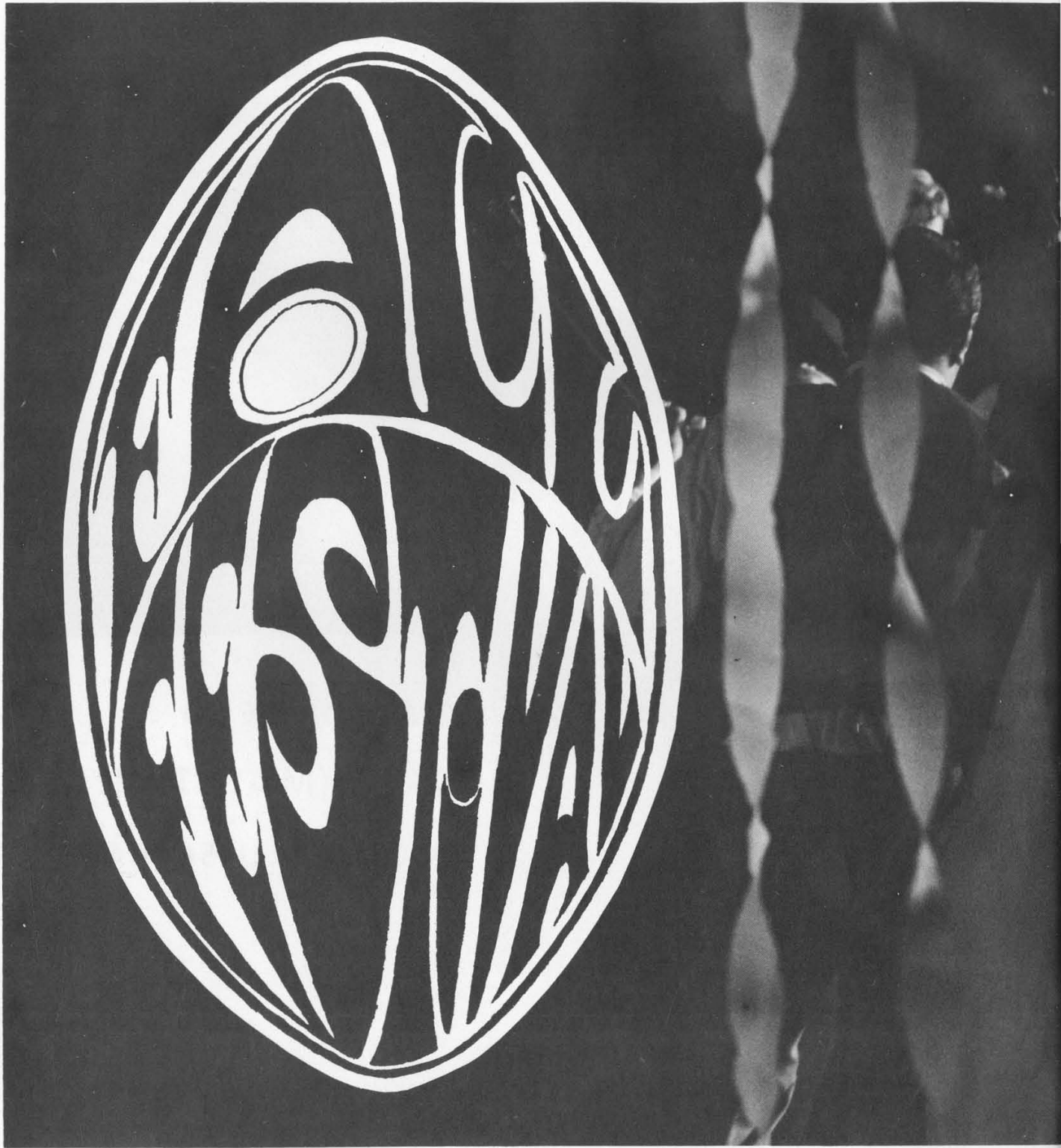

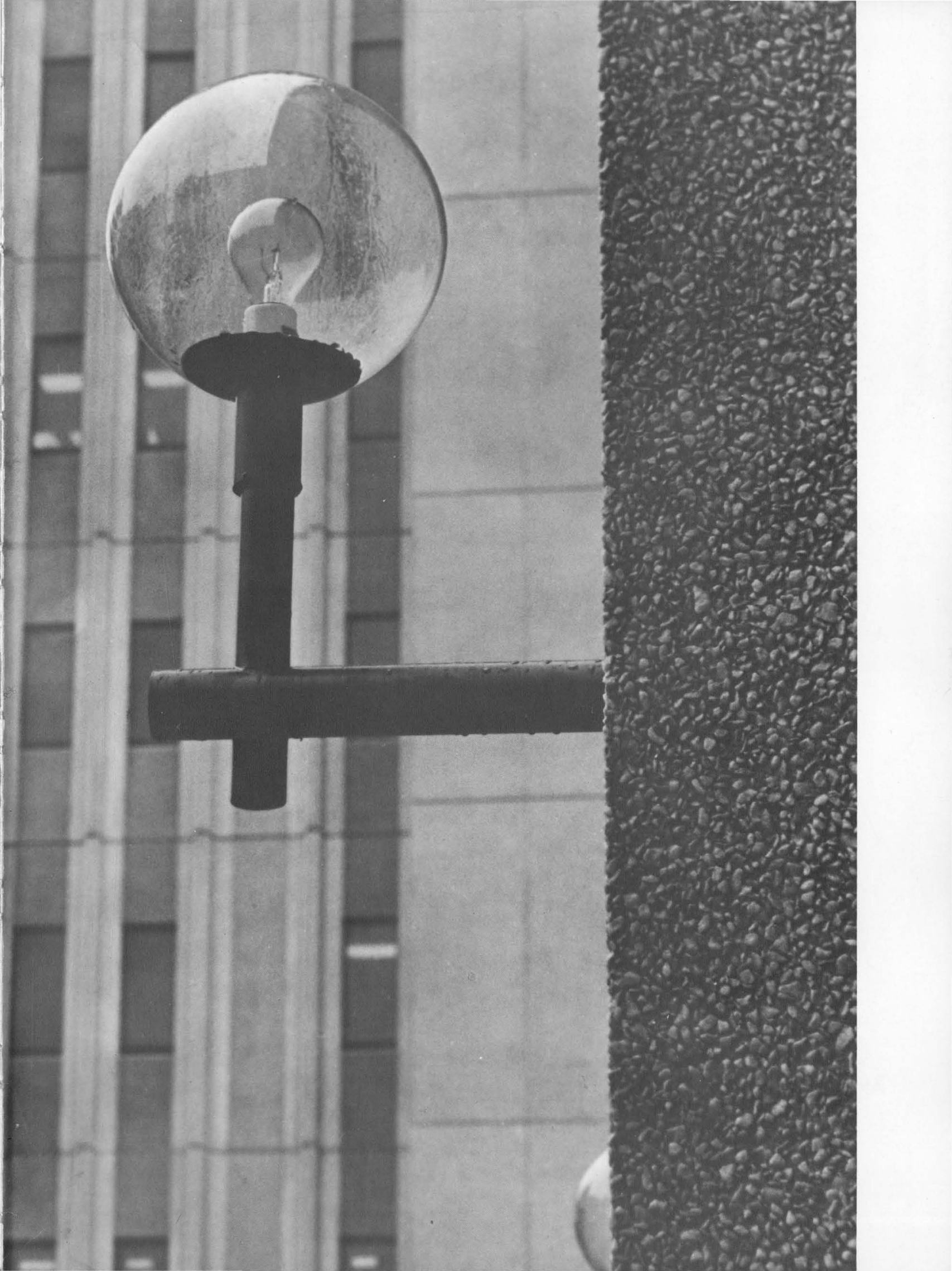


MEDICAL CONFERENCE AT NEW TUPPER BUILDING

The first Dalhousie Weekend on Medical Education in the new Sir Charles Tupper Building was held on October 13. On Friday evening, the speakers were Drs. Langley, Anderson, and Waugh. The topic was education, and how it can be made to work to the best advantage of both staff and students.

On Saturday there were a series of more informal talks, held at the Junior Outport of the Royal Nova Scotia Yacht Squadron. The result was that the staff and students realized that they had the same aims, and that the only hope of success was a close liaison between the two.

The beautiful building for which we have been waiting so long was apparently ready. After arrival, it was found that there were no chairs in the theatre, and that canvas chairs had to be brought in. Even while the students and staff, both more than pleased to be in their new luxury, were trying to build a new rapport, this little chair incident may have served to remind all that with every growth, details are forgotten, and there are growing pains.

More than half of the marchers in the Halifax-International Day of Protest demonstration were Dalhousie students, members of the Student Association to End the War in Vietnam. Dalhousie was also fortunate to be represented by the most loud and obscene of the pro-war anti-marchers.

The march from the Grand Parade to the podium in Victoria Park was only one of the many on October 21, which saw hundreds of thousands all across the world protesting different aspects of the American aggression.

This march in Halifax specifically protested Canadian complicity in the war.



It was suggested that the Canadian government should concentrate not on filling American orders for weapons, but on the rebuilding of the Vietnamese nation.

The speakers at this protest addressed the six hundred present (of whom about twenty were pro-war) on several related topics.

This protest was the major effort of the only Society on campus which is dedicated to ending the need for its existence. We hope that next year there will be no further need of their services.



Two Hoop Stars, Honor Students Die In Crash

Four Dalhousie University students, two of them Maritime college basketball stars, died early Tuesday when their convertible smashed through a highway guard rail post into a gully on the Purcell's Cove Road near the western outskirts of Halifax.

Dead are Margaret Louise MacKean and Kevin Gerard White, both 19 and from Charlottetown; Helen Jane Murray, 19, of Saint John, N.B. and Thomas Frank Beattie, 21, of Bridgetown.

The accident, which is believed to have occurred about 1.40 a.m., was not discovered until 7.45 a.m. However, medical evidence indicated the victims probably died instantly, RCMP said.

The students were apparently thrown 100 feet or more from the vehicle as it careened off the road into a growth of trees some 80 feet away. Halifax RCMP said it appeared that the bodies were thrown through the car's canvas roof.

The girls were both scholarship students. Miss MacKean was in her fourth-year arts and Miss Murray was a second-year pre-medical student. Beattie was in his fourth year in arts and White, an English honors student, in his third year.

Captain of last year's Dalhousie Tigers in the

Maritime basketball conference, Beattie had decided against playing this year to give more time to his studies.

The six-foot-six-inch centre was one of the team's top scorers for three seasons.

REBOUND MAN

White, also six feet six inches tall, was preparing for his third season with the Tigers. He was the team's top rebound man and a key factor in the Tigers' undefeated march through the first eight games of last season's schedule.

An injury put him on the sidelines for the last four games of the schedule and the Tigers dropped all four games.

crashed is divided by a long driveway leading to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Shaw.

The Shaw's housekeeper, Mrs. Donald Paul, said 15-year-old June Pellow, who lives on the back road at Purcell's Cove, was the first person to spot the bodies which were strewn along either side of the driveway.

Mrs. Paul said the girl alerted the family and they, in turn, called the RCMP.

Halifax detachment, who are continuing investigation into the incident, said no cause for the accident has been determined.

Beattie was the younger son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas A. Beattie, Bridgetown.

Surviving, besides his parents, are a brother, Allan, Calgary, and grandmother, Mrs. Frank Beattie, Bridgetown.

Funeral service will be held Thursday at 2:30 p.m. in Bridgetown Baptist Church, Rev. Gerard Steeves officiating. Interment will be in Riverside Cemetery.

The body is at the Bridgetown Funeral Home.

Miss MacKean was the only child of Mr. and Mrs. Douglas B. MacKean, 35 Sidmount Ave., Charlottetown.

Miss Murray was the daughter of George R. Murray, 202 Douglas Avenue, Saint John, N.B.

White was the son of Mrs. Matthew White, 26 Prince Street, Charlottetown.

Liberal Revolts On Tax Vote

OTTAWA (CP) — A Conservative non-confidence motion that drew support even from a Liberal back-bencher was defeated 111 to 95 in a Commons vote Monday night.

The motion criticizing recent federal tax increases won New Democrat, Creditiste and Social Credit sup-

port, as well as the vote of John Addison (L—York North).

However, the absence of 20 of the 95 Conservative MPs ensured the defeat of the motion which would have brought down the government if carried.

There were 75 Tories in the House but only 73 voted, two

others abstaining because of agreements with absent Liberals.

Also supporting the budget debate motion were 18 New Democrats, two Social Credit MPs, one Creditiste and Mr. Addison.

Voting against it were 110 Liberals and J. A. Mongrain (Ind —Trois-Rivieres).

Standing in the 265-seat Commons is Liberals 132, PCs 95, NDP 22, Creditiste 8, Social Credit 4, Independent 3, vacant 1.

4 Students Killed In Crash Of Car

Early Morning Tragedy On Purcell's Cove Road; Victims Unidentified

Four persons died violently along the Purcell's Cove Road this morning when their sports convertible left the highway and crashed through a guard rail post into a gully.

RCMP at press time were still at the scene recovering the bodies of two young men and two young women apparently thrown 100 feet or more from the automobile as it careened off the road into the trees. RCMP officers said it appeared that the bodies were thrown through the car's canvas roof.

Names were not immediately disclosed, but all four were believed in their early 20's. They were believed to be students.

The death scene is a gully off a sloping curve leading

into Purcell's Cove from Herring Cove.

Time of the accident was not yet determined.

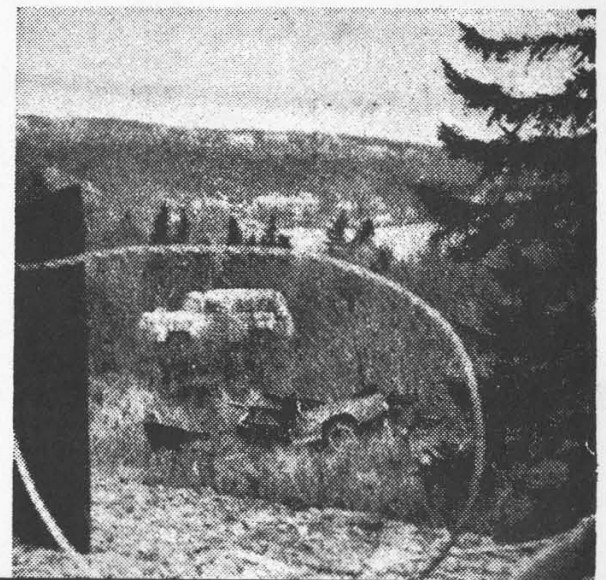
But Mrs. Irene Liggins of Purcell's Cove — whose home is opposite the St. Philip's Anglican Church — told The Mail-Star that she was alerted at exactly 1:40 a.m. by a loud crash and a thump. She heard nothing more and fell asleep.

Local residents at the scene said they thought the sound of the crash must have been cushioned by marsh grass. She found later that in its

death plunge the sports car careened through the first guard rail beyond her driveway. She said guard rail cables at that point had been down since a previous accident 10 months before.

The gully into which it crashed is divided by a long driveway leading to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Shaw.

The Shaw's housekeeper, Mrs. Donald Paul, told The Mail-Star that 15-year-old June Pellow, who lives on the back road at Purcell's Cove, was the first person to spot the bodies which were strewn along either side of the driveway.

FACULTY DRAMA SUCCESSFUL

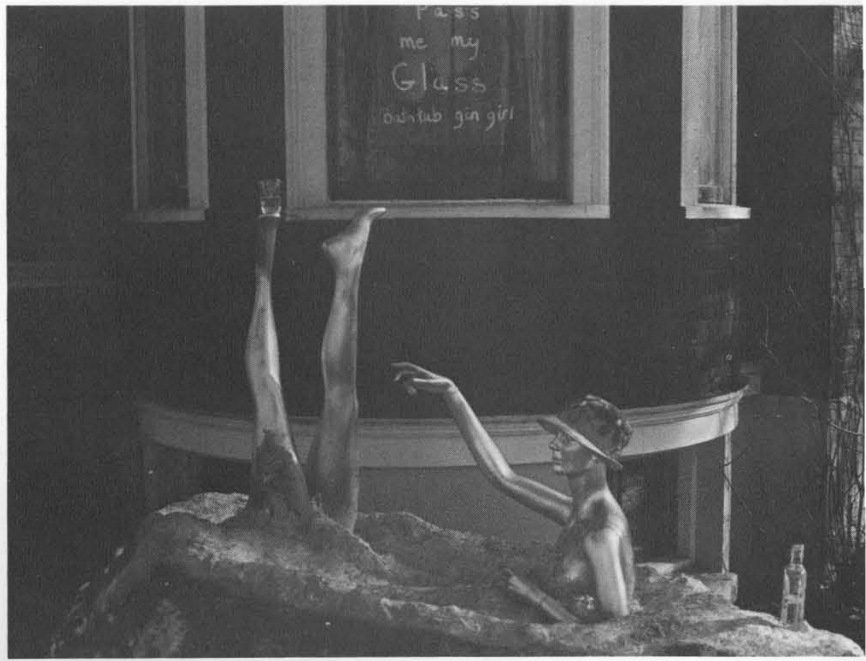

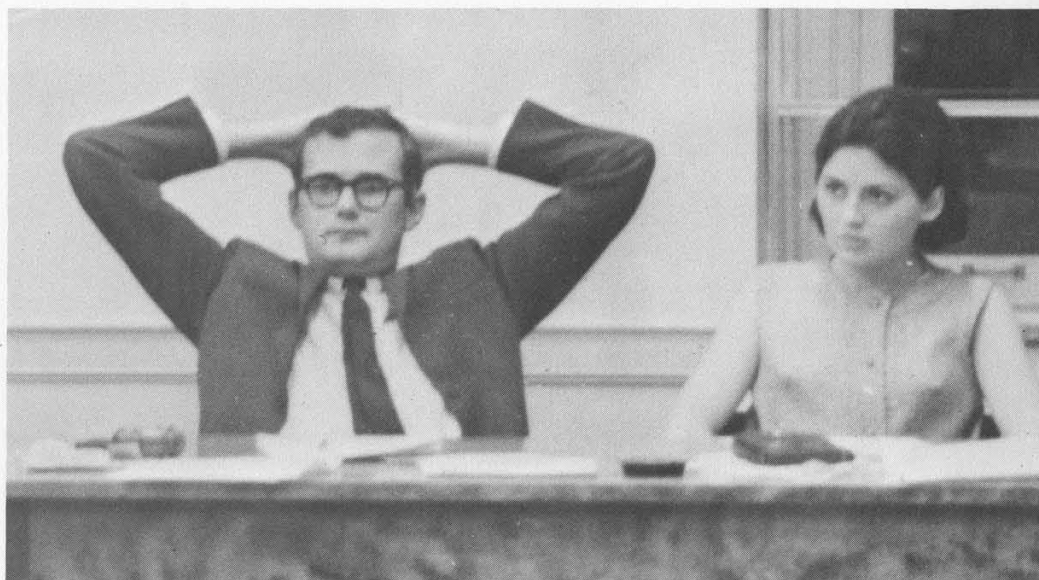


izing in the back rooms the policies that will affect many.

GOLF

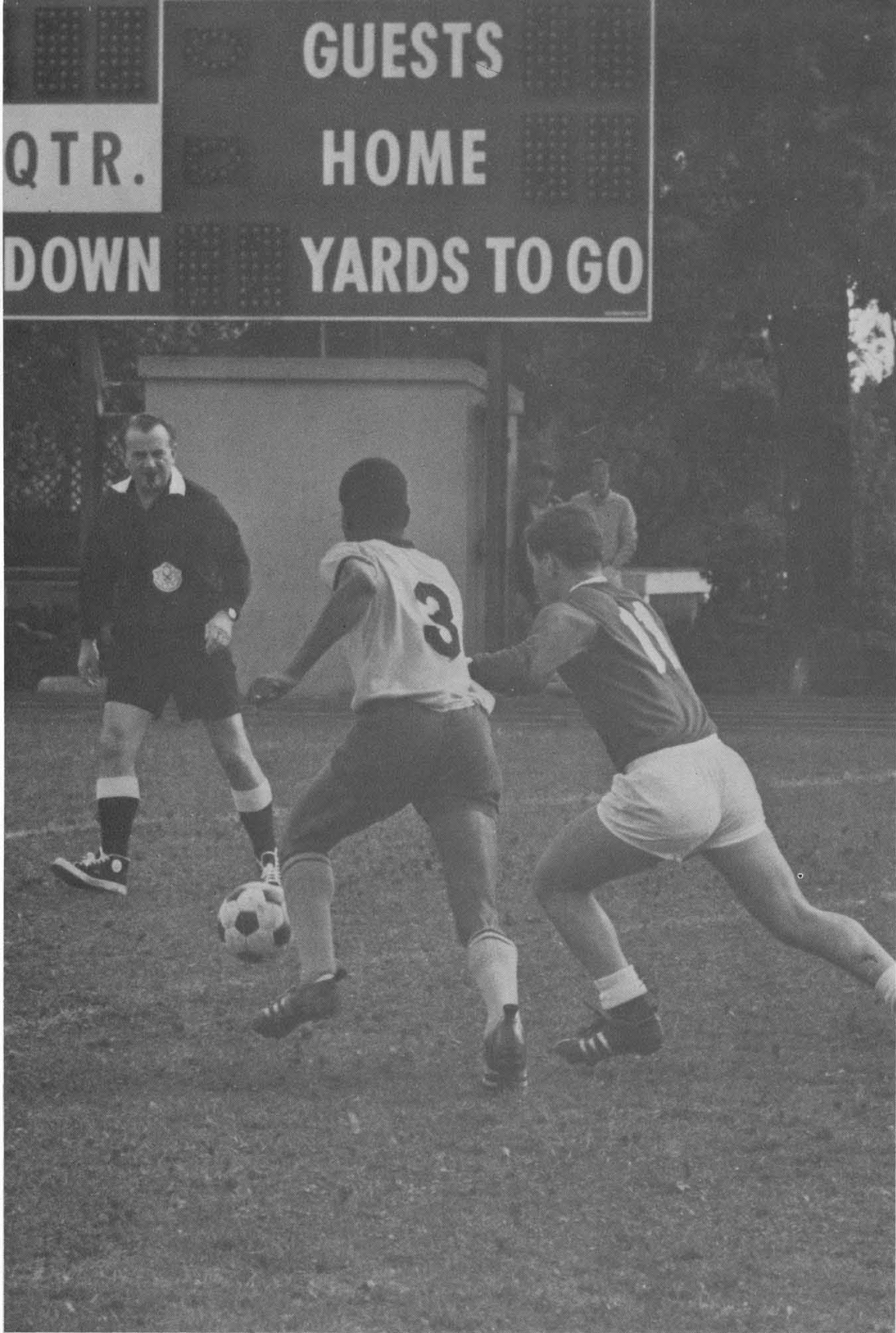

The front nine was played in the pouring rain. Then the temperature dropped and the back nine became a freezing nightmare.

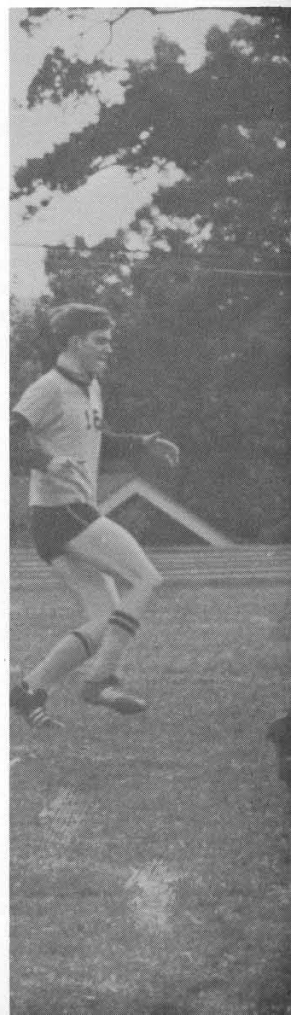
SAILING

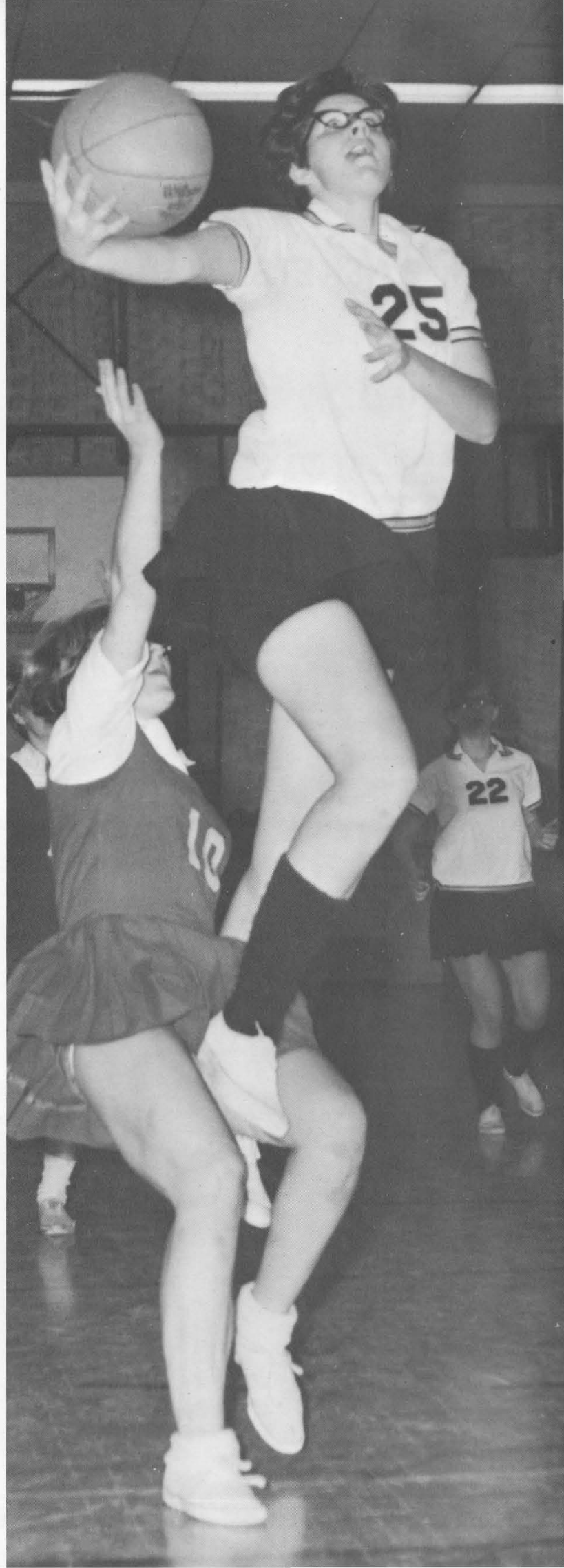




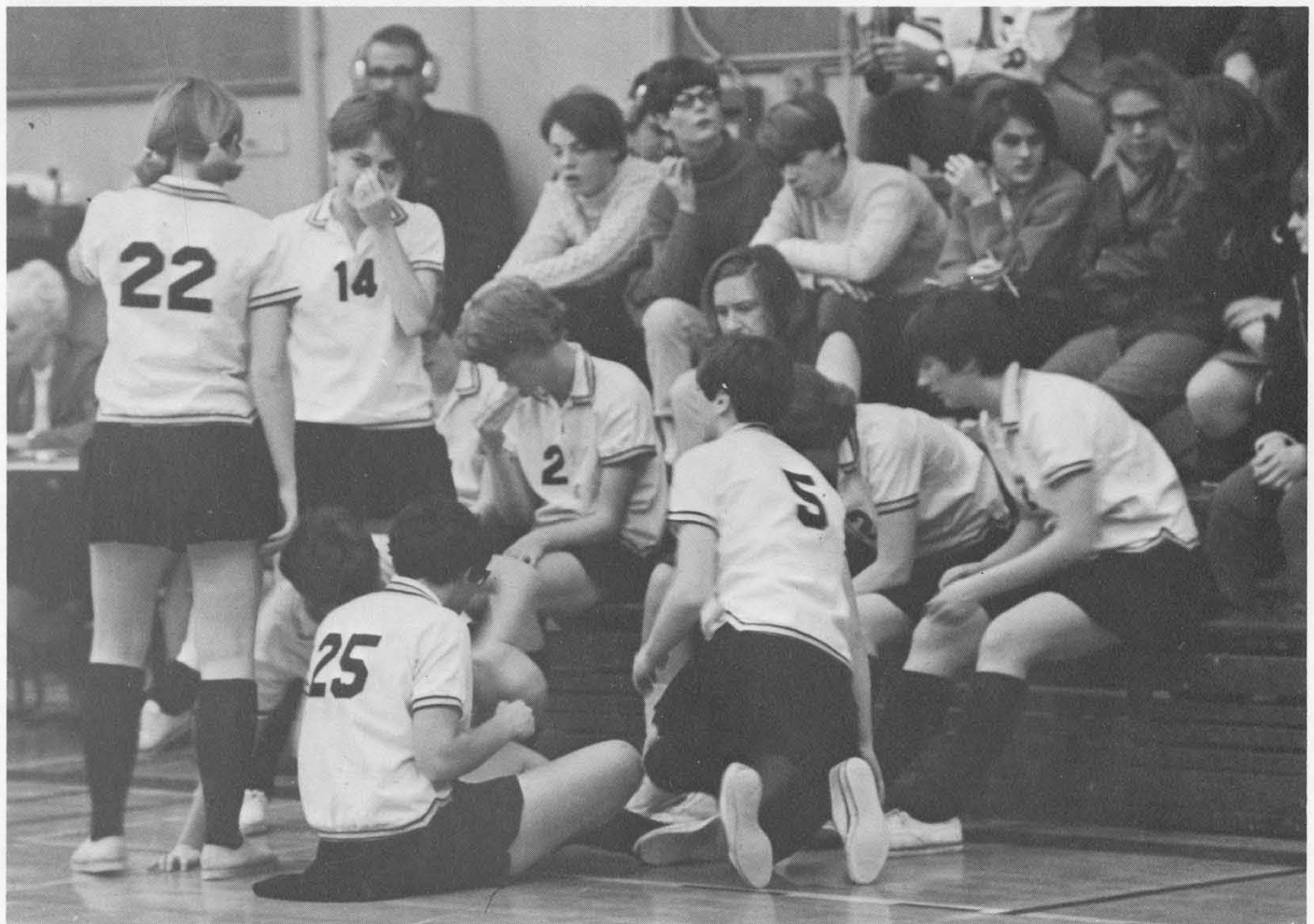
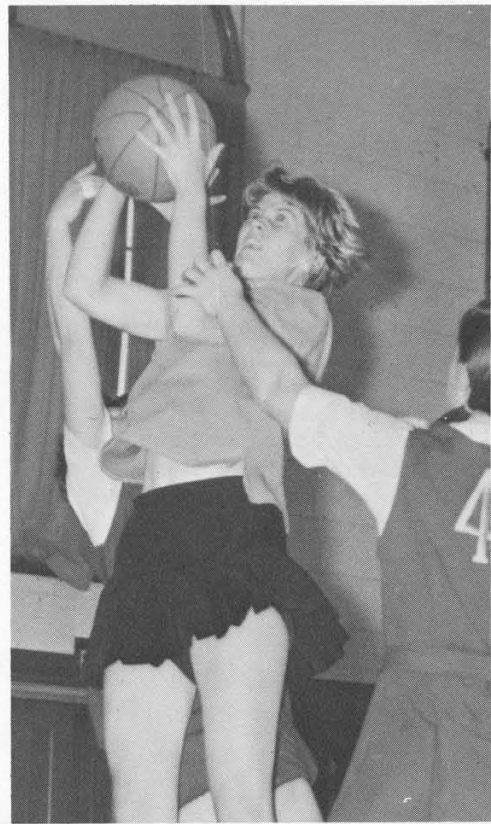
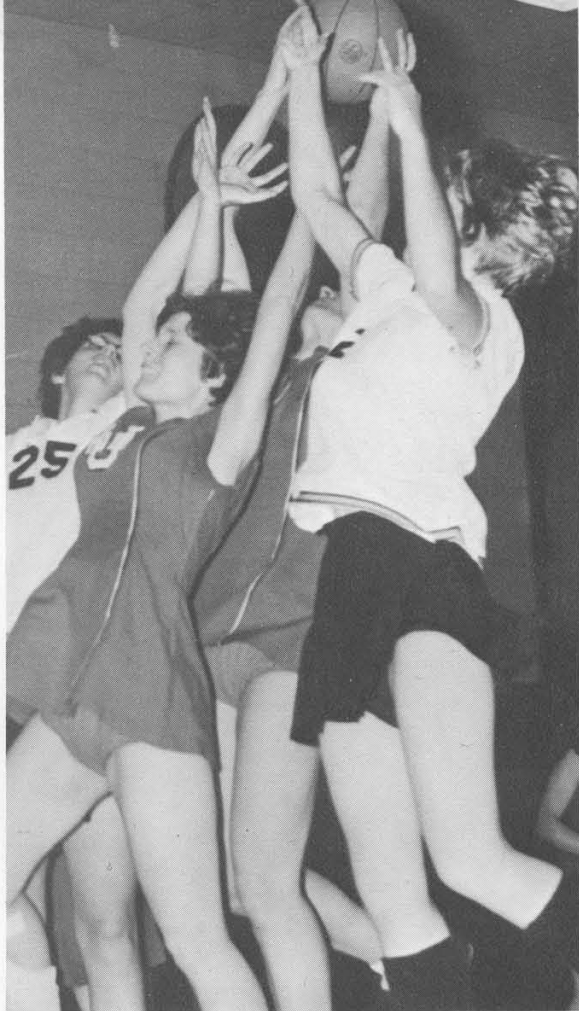
BASKETBALL

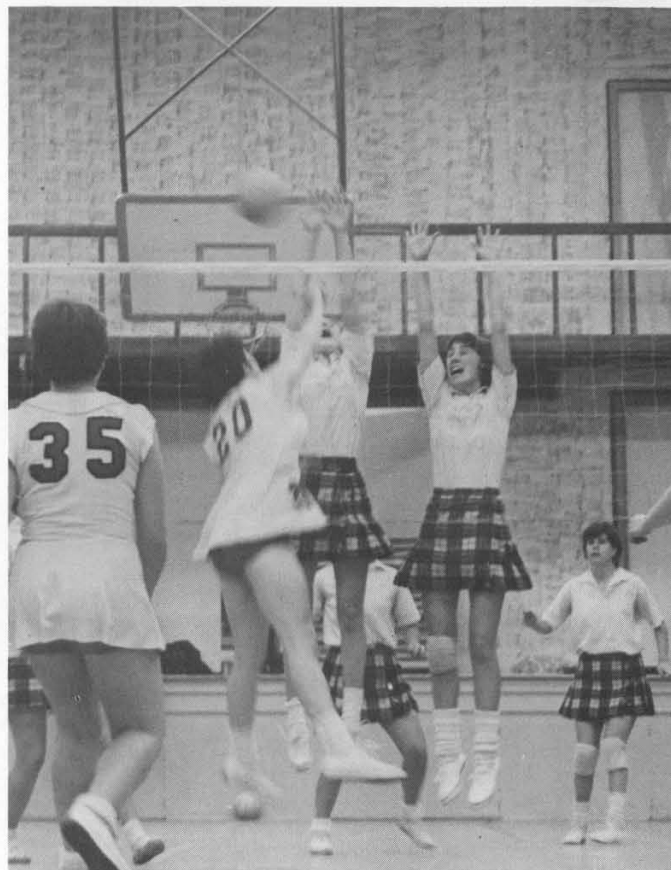


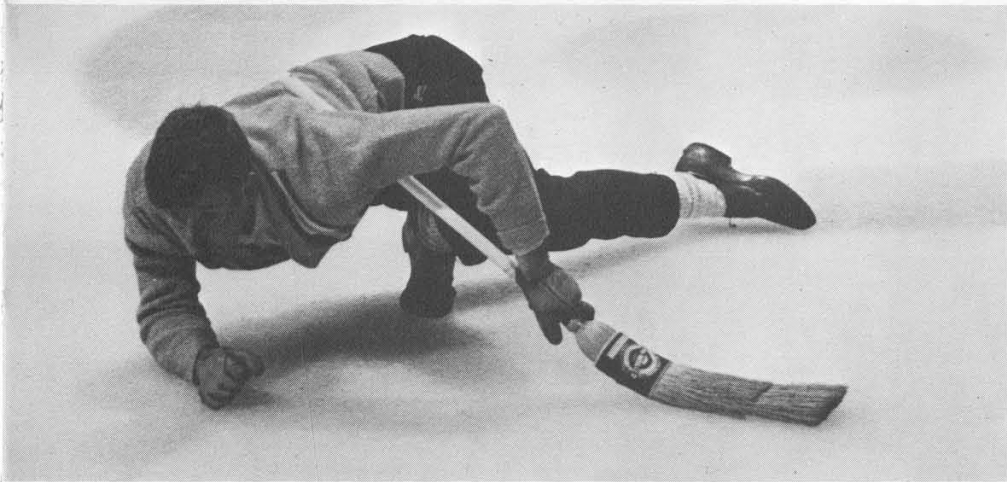
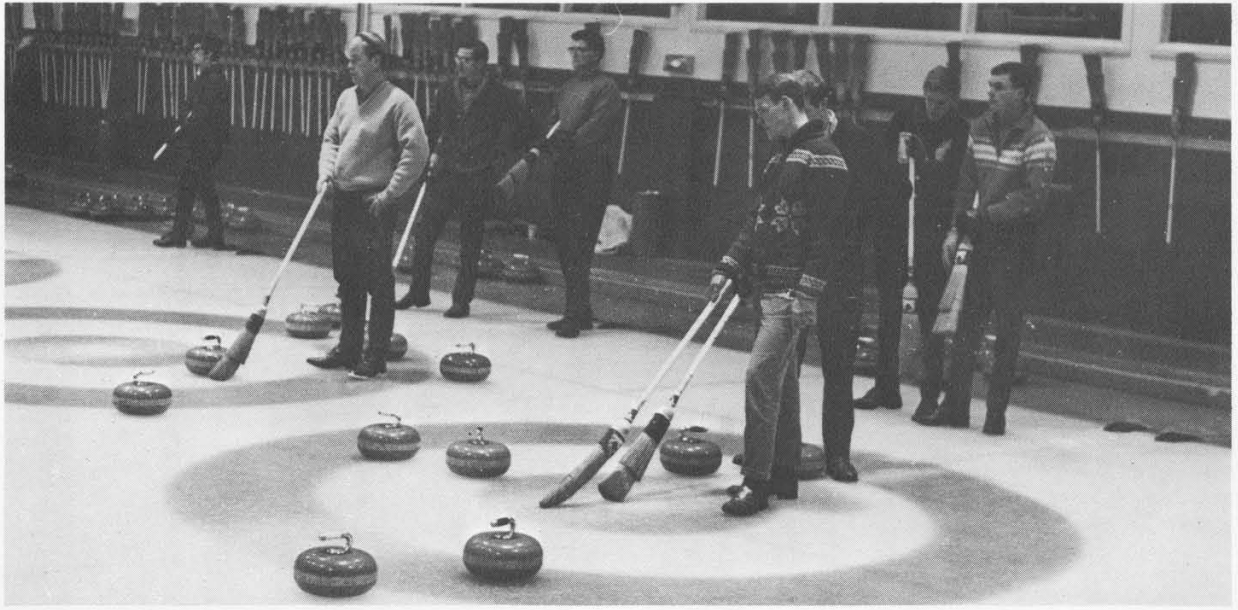
The bright spot on the team this year was freshette Jean Fahie. The league's second highest scorer, Jean missed first place because of a one game absence.

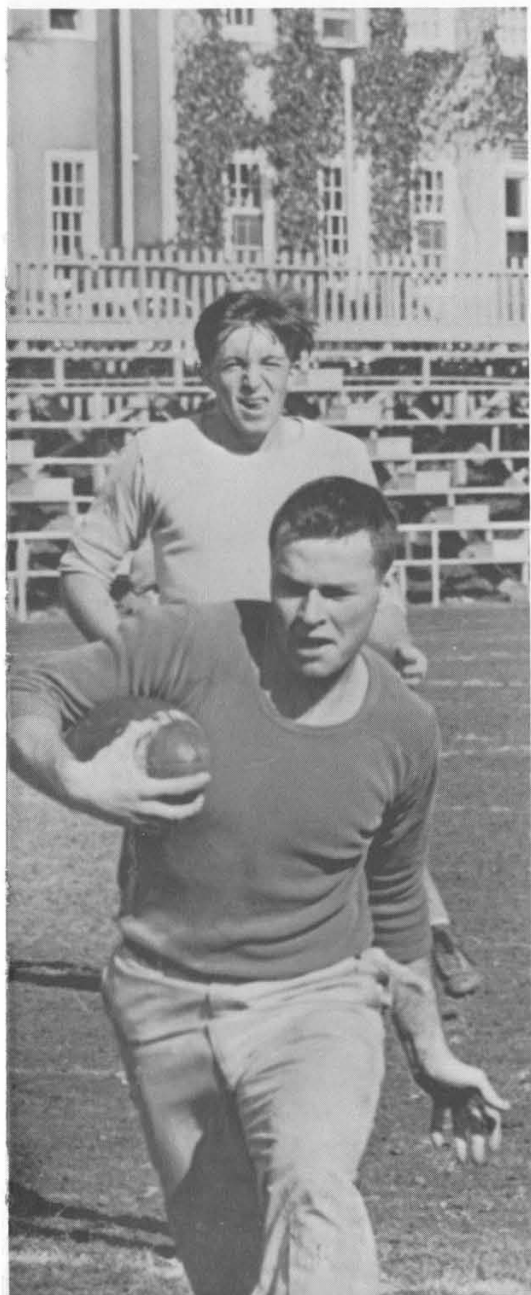


INTERFACULTY SPORTS

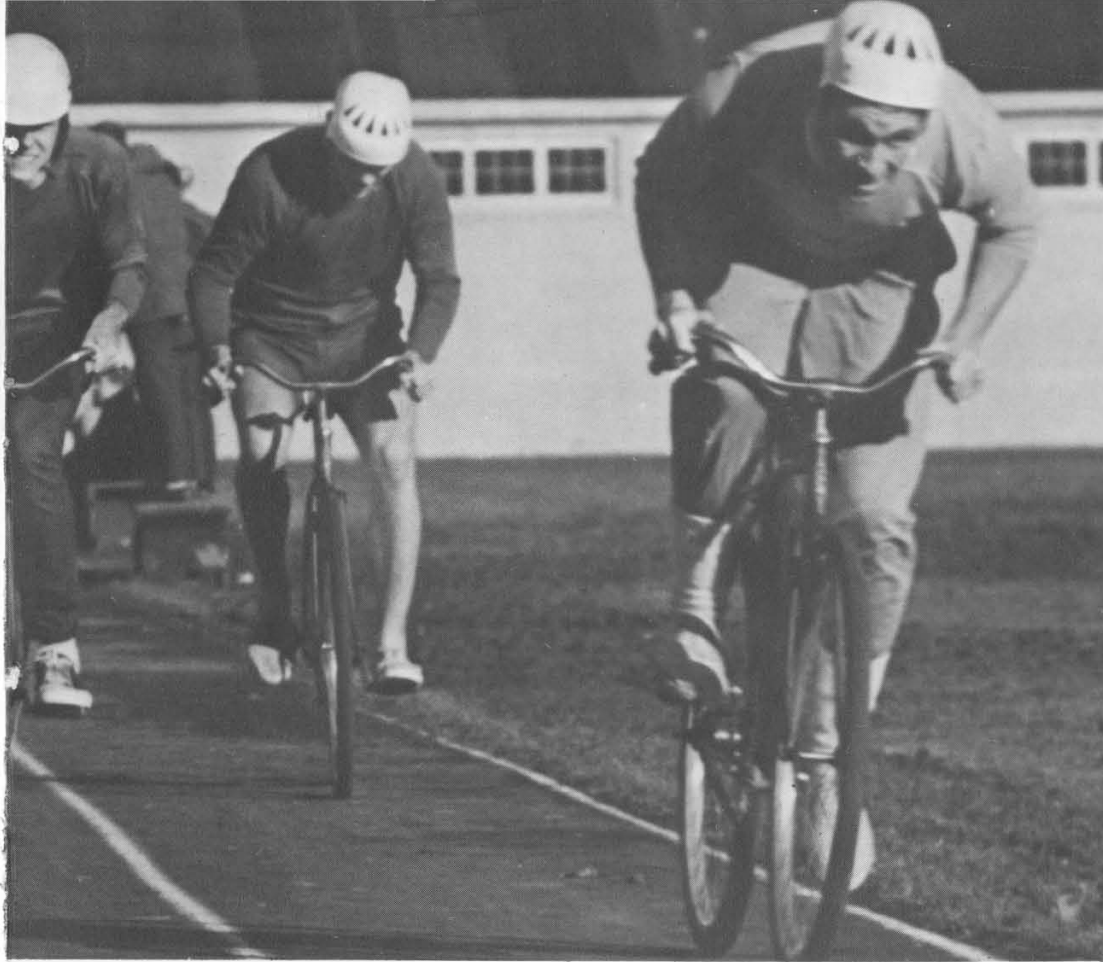

The only new additions to the Intramural Program were soccer and the punishing game of floor-hockey.





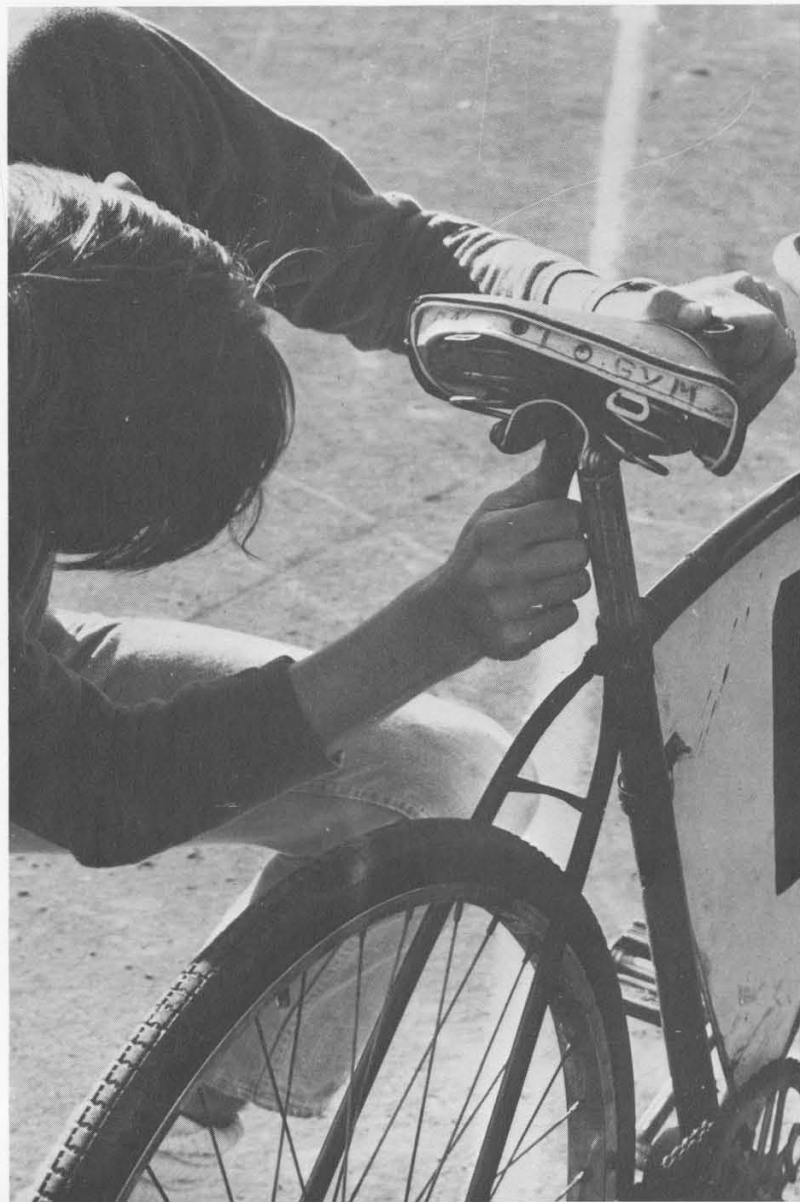


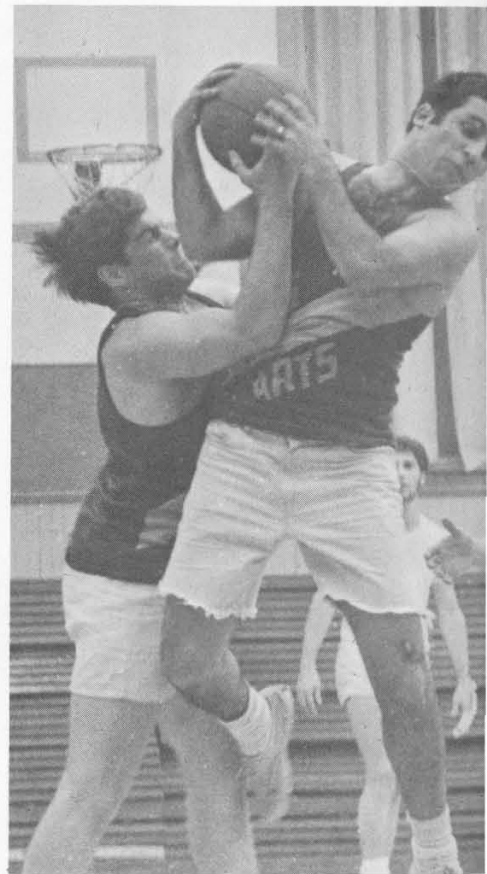
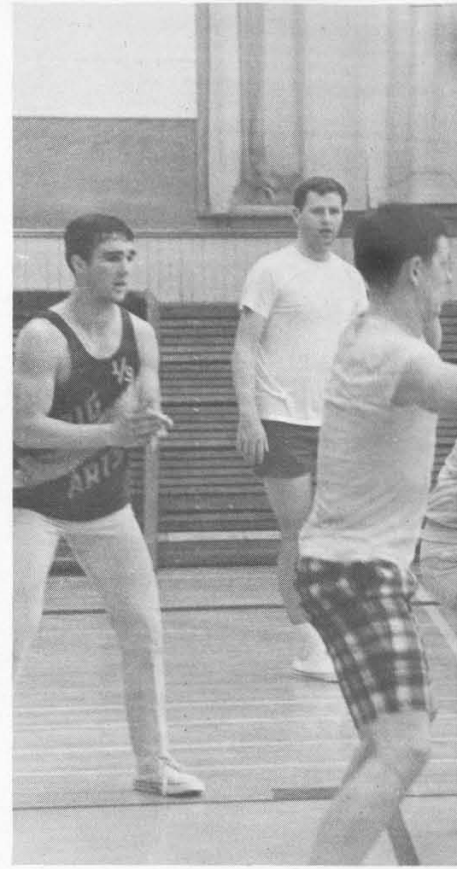
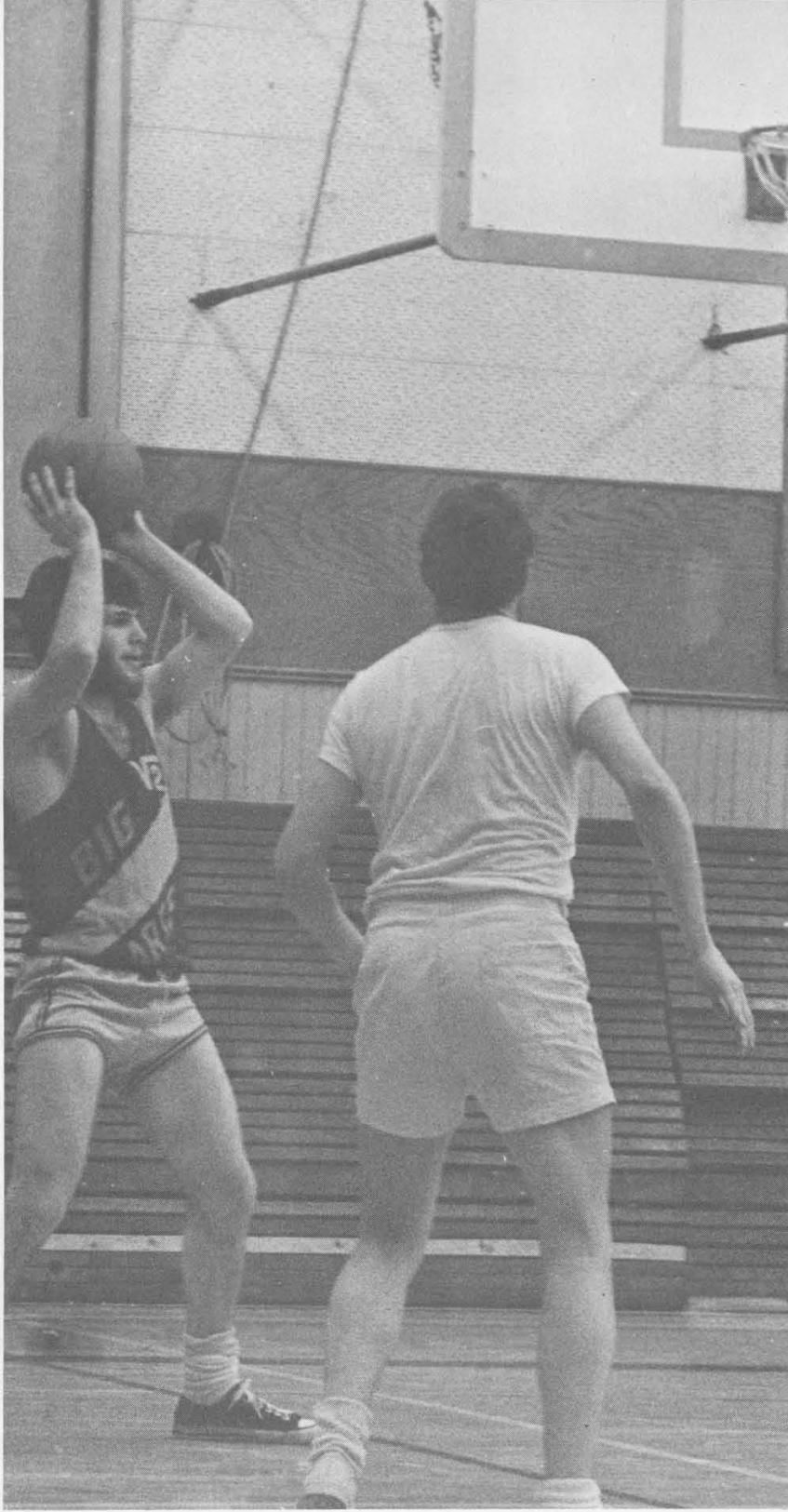

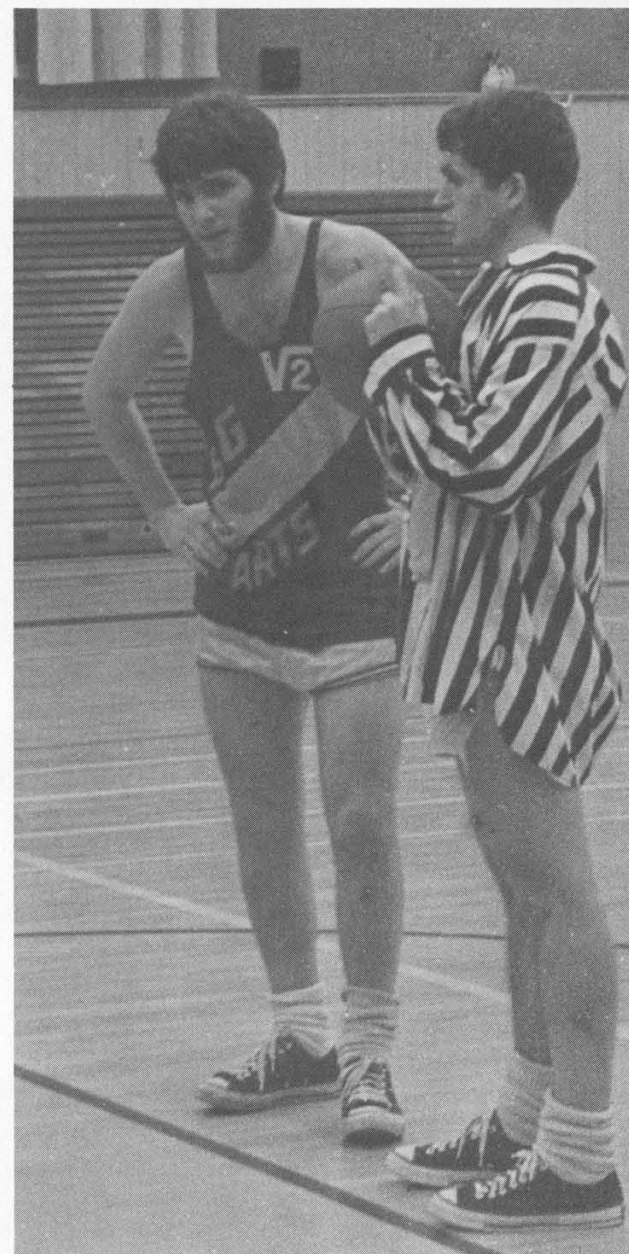
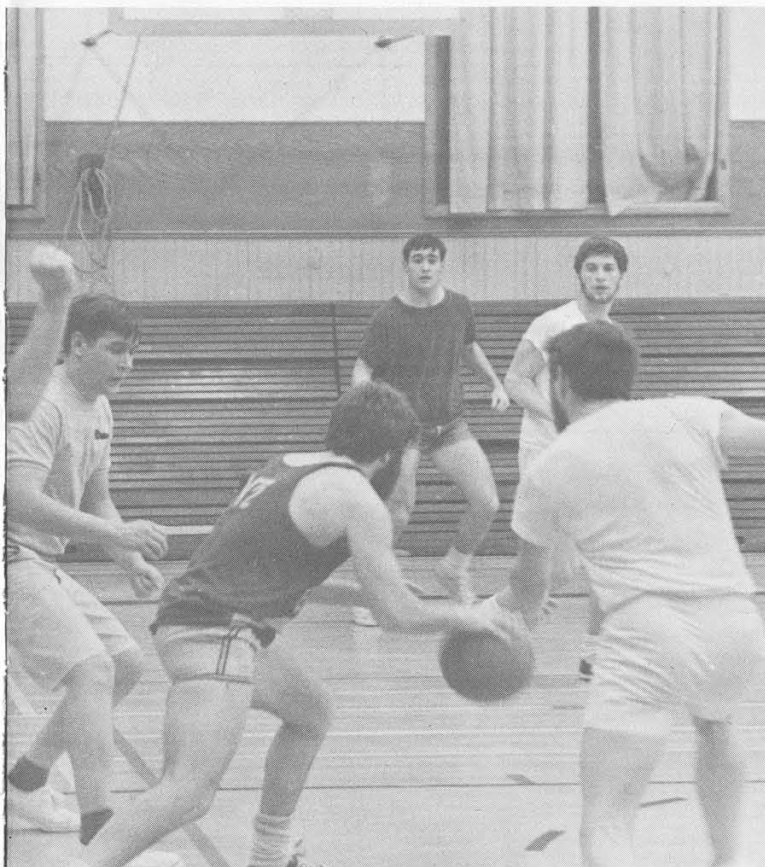
Before me lay a hot asphalt track. In the next two hours my comrades and I would circle this oval two hundred times. Oh, I wish I hadn't gone to the stag last night.

It is believed the fire, which claimed all clothes, books, and belongings of the student's started in the main floor of the three storey wooden building.

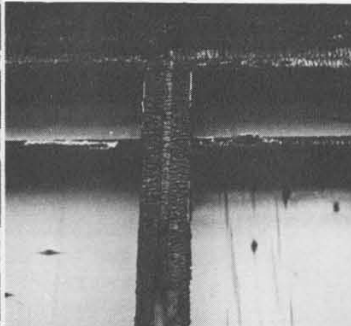

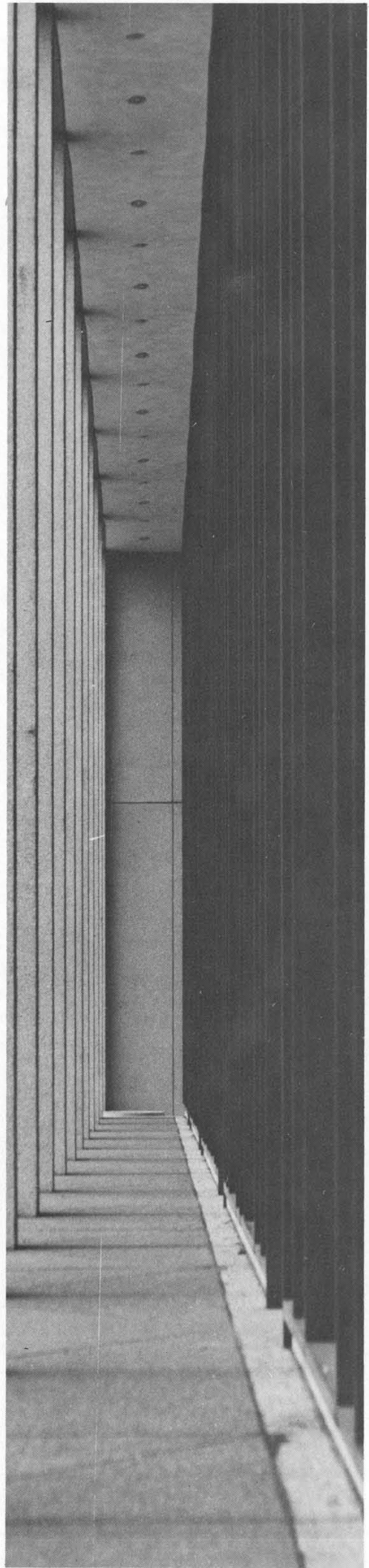
A spokesman for the Halifax Fire Department said they arrived on the scene at approximately 2 a.m. and battled the blaze for four hours.

There is no immediate estimate of damage and no decision as to whether the fraternity alumni will repair or rebuild the house.



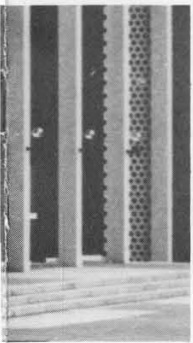
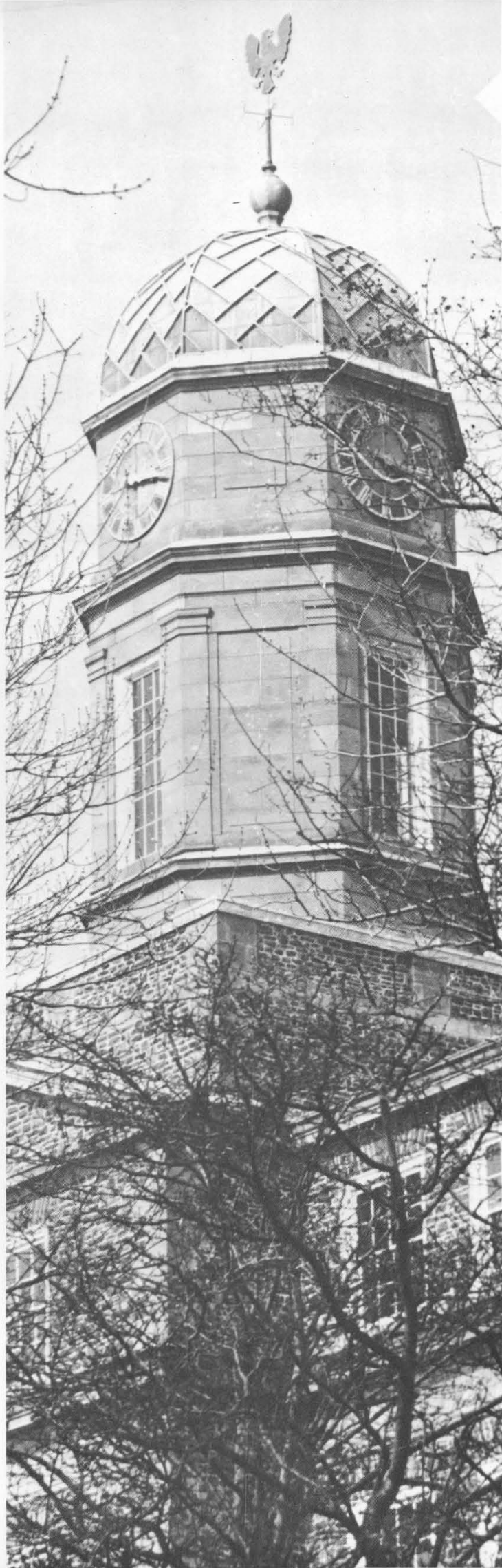

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT FOR 1968 EDITION OF PHAROS

Once again your Editor has been kind enough to ask me to contribute a message to this year's graduating class, and to all the members of the University community who will find Pharos to be such an interesting and attractive memento of the 1967-1968 year at Dalhousie.

We have all had to put up with a good deal of noise and inconvenience this year from the opening of the new wings in the Residences to the blasting out of the Library excavation, and it may be that talk of Dalhousie's expansion would turn out to be rather a sensitive subject at this time. Nevertheless, as you know, the University is growing excitingly, and I believe that student participation in this growth has been most important and most responsible. Indeed, I would like to acknowledge how grateful I am to all Dalhousie students who have participated in the affairs of the University over the past few years. The student point of view has always been ably and forcefully presented to me in the various problems that have come up for discussion. We have not always been able to meet all the reasonable requests for improved student benefits and student services, and it has often taken all of my wit and experience to balance the resources available to the University against student needs which have been so forcefully brought to my attention.

I value what I believe to be the good "communication" between the student offices and my office, and I feel that, without exception, we have always spoken in a direct and forthright manner with one another. Where we have not been able to agree, I think we have nevertheless been able to appreciate one another's problems and points of view.

I welcome, therefore, the change in the composition of the Senate, which has seated the President of the Dalhousie Student Union and two of his colleagues in the supreme academic body of the University. A growing university can and must provide increasing benefits and advantages to its students and faculty. Unfortunately, however, as the University grows, contact between my office and individual students tends to decrease. I regret this and accordingly want to acknowledge to you all how much I value the loyalty and hard work of those of you who have supported the good student government which has generally prevailed at Dalhousie in my time.

I thank you all for your efforts and confidently hope that you will retain this spirit of determination, coupled with co-operation and goodwill, as you undertake your duties as citizens of the larger community you are now entering.

'NO C absolutely

Last week's article on education has proven one thing: the Dalhousie Department of Education is certainly no laughing matter. In fact, it is something to be feared.

The newspaper was released Thursday night. At 9:15 Friday morning, it was delivered to the Education Department. By 10:30 the great witch-hunt had begun.

One would think that in a modern Canadian university a student would be free to criticize the course structure which is determining his studies. You may rest assured that he is not.

Certain professors of the Education Department reacted to last week's article in the most emotional and degrading ways imaginable. If there were factual errors in the article, the Department communicated none of these to the GAZETTE. Instead, certain professors in the Department began an actual campaign to determine the identity of the authors of the article.

One professor went to the trouble of pointing out to his class that if letters critical of the article did not appear in the GAZETTE, he could arrange for the failure rate to rise at the end of the year. Such a statement on the part of a professor is the most horrible type of blackmail which it is possible to imagine in a university context.

By Monday morning the situation had reached unbelievable propor-

tions as a professor announced that Prof. Mowat would soon be wiping the smirks off certain student faces that the three culprits had been discovered, and that they would be "punished".

The author of the statements, and the accomplices who obviously supported him, have lost their integrity as men, much less as professors.

How can you fail to feel a certain surprise in belonging to a university which, despite its many merits, supports a department where not even the fronts of democratic processes are allowed, and where not even the first sort of academic freedom is enjoyed by students?

This is no exaggeration. The department's latest move consists of establishing a system whereby students can bring "honest criticisms" to the faculty by sending them anonymously to the executive of the Education society . . . It is important to understand that this was done in lieu of stating openly and with professional honour that students could bear their grievances and complaints directly to all faculty members without fear of reprisal. But of course, such a promise could not be taken seriously in light of the recent record of the department unless public apology were made to the victims, whoever they may be of the department's manhunt.

On the other hand, a lesson should



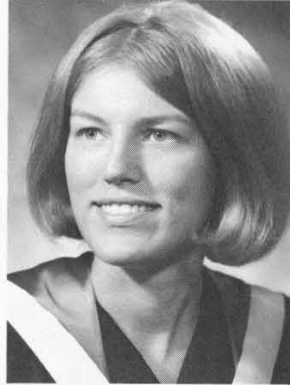

be taken from this week's, and no doubt the whole year's, events in the Education Department. It should be clear that it is of incredible importance to have students sit on all faculty committees. Students have a right to help determine their curriculum, for they are the ones who are directly concerned with it. Student representatives have a right to be present when students are being discussed, and decisions concerning them are being made. Students have a duty to inform their professors of their complaints, in an honest and legitimate way, and with a guarantee that they will not be penalized for making statements which it is their right to make. It would be extremely unfair to leave the reader with the impression that the Education department is "all bad". Some of the professors are as good and as open-minded as one could ever hope they would be. But some are certainly not. After last week's article was printed, an attempt was made to contact many of the professors for interviews. While Dr. Engels refused to be interviewed, he was polite enough to explain his reasons.

The same can not be said of Prof. Mowat, who repeatedly and rudely refused even the most explanatory comments, and thereby helped the Gazette to develop an insight into why the Education Department is so open and so free.

So it was signed POOH, WOL, EOR, RABBITT, KANGA, BLOT, and SMUDGE.

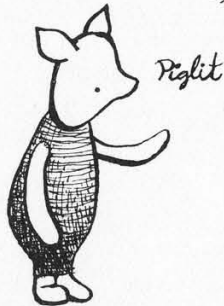
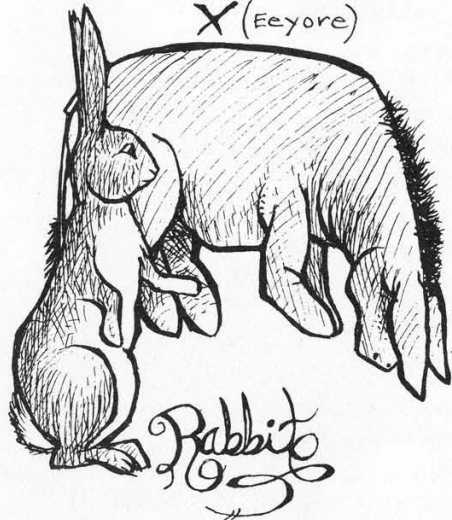
