On July 2, 1986, Victor L. Saxon was appointed Registrar of the Nova Scotia Agricultural College.

In 1958 he graduated with honors in Mechanical Engineering from the Nova Scotia Technical College (now the Technical University of Nova Scotia).

Between 1958 and 1968 Mr. Saxon worked as an engineer and manager with National Research Council, Northern Electric, Dosco Steel Ltd. (now Sysco), Canadian Liquid Air and Scotia Marine Products. In the last two positions he served a plant manager.

Peter Hamilton honoured

In October the college officially honoured Peter Hamilton, retired Registrar, by naming him Professor Emeritus during Autumn Assembly. In the citation, Principal MacRae, drew particular attention to his dedication as an agriculturalist, a teacher, a registrar and friend of students. Professor Hamilton delivered the address to the assembly and gave his perception of important trends in the Agriculture and Food systems. He identified important roles for all agricultural graduates, and predicted an increasing influence from N.S.A.C. in national and international development.

Principal MacRae has just appointed a policy board for a new centre to guide the N.S.A.C. involvements in international development projects. This centre will give more profile to the work and provides a structure in which it will develop as opportunities occur.

The centre is attached to the Department of Economics & Business with Professor Tait as Chairman of the Board, and Professor Ells as the Centre's Director. Other board members are Professors John Brennan, Robert Prange, Bruce Gray, Don Crober and Ernie Maynard.

Present projects at the college include the International Potato Production Technology Course, The Gambia College Project, Rural Development with FUNDAEC in Colombia, and three new projects with the Jamaican Agricultural Society, Hunan Agricultural College in China, and an Agricultural Technical Institute

in Thailand. Specialists from China, Thailand, Jamaica and The Gambia are doing upgrading studies now on the N.S.A.C. campus.

Many readers will be interested to learn that Peter Hamilton has recently agreed to help with the Jamaican Agricultural Society Project and project leader John Brennan reports that Peter will be living in Kingston, Jamaica, from February until December 1987. Many will be interested in noting that John Brookhouse of the Dept. of Plant Science has started an assignment in The Gambia for eight months, Dr. Don Crober will be lecturing in China for five weeks this spring, and that Dr. Bruce Gray has just returned from a month of work in Thailand as an advisor on agricultural education.

A house at 179 College Road has just been acquired to help facilitate some of the international work. More details will be reported in the next issue of Alumni News.

CARC consist of 26 people and is regarded as being CASCC's research arm. With CARC's recommendations, the CASCC (made up of federal and provincial government members and university representatives) recommends to its constituencies those areas

Plans for the new Animal Science building were approved and tenders called and let in September, 1985. There was strong support for the development of this building, the last one in a major expansion at N.S.A.C. The sod was turned at the time of the Autumn Assembly on October 9 and construction began almost immediately. The building has a floor space of 75,000 sq. ft. with completion expected by January, 1987

The next step will be the renovation of the Boulden Bldg. to provide facilities for small animal

Research work continues to grow. This year 11 of 12 proposals submitted to Natural Science and Engineering Research Council were approved and have been supported. The total budget for research now stands at about \$1 million dollars.

A project has recently been signed in which the N.S.A.C. and Gambia College will embark on a project to upgrade the faculty and staff at Gambia College. This is a two year project supported by the Canadian International Development Agency to the amount of about \$500,000.

Recent retirements included Peter Hamilton, Don MacLeod, Ron Buckler, Jack Fitzpatrick and

Marie Hartigan.

The Principal ended his report by thanking the Alumni for their continued support in the form of scholarships. This support is most appreciated.







Greetings to all alumni and friends of N.S.A.C. The beginning of the new year 1987 prompts reflections on the year that has passed. Before Christmas, the Animal Science Department began to move into their new building and over the early months of 1987 will become established in modern facilities which will greatly enhance their teaching and research capabilities. The renovation of the Boulden Building as a small animal care centre remains to be completed. In 1979-80, the development program was launched and at that time, the task was indeed a sobering but challenging one. To those of our staff who took the leadership in planning new buildings, recruiting new staff and the arguous task of developing curricula, we are deeply indebted. All these tasks required dedication and persistence and they were performed willingly and with enthusiasm.

Through the efforts of our staff,

research activity continues to strengthen and grow with funds obtained through research grants and contracts. It was particularly gratifying to realize that our staff were especially successful in the 1986 Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council (NSERC) competitions. Eleven of the twelve research proposals submitted were funded. The total support of all research activities at N.S.A.C. is currently in excess of \$1 Million and it is important that this support increase significantly over and reasonable length of time. Our research activities are aided greatly by the N.S. Department of Agriculture and Marketing Research and Demonstration Committee chaired for many years by Dr. Lorne Cock and the Faculty Research Committee chaired by Dr. Glenn Stratton.

Our involvement in international projects continues to increase through the untiring efforts of our Dean of Vocational and

Technical Education Dale Ells and with the help of Peter Hamilton while he was Registrar. This increased activity resulted in the creation of an International Development Centre, ministered by a Board under the

A note from the treasurer, N.S.A.C. Alumni Association

As presented at the annual meeting of the Alumni Association on July 27, 1986, the financial statement showed the association to be active and in a relatively stable financial condition. This situation remains the same at the time of publication for Alumni News. However, it requires substantial assistance from the province of Nova Scotia, through the College via the Principal's Office, to make possible, the publication and distribution of Alumni News to Alumni members.



Men's **Basketball**



Class of 44 Lecture

Freeman L. McEwen, Dean, Ontario Agricultural College will deliver the 1987 lecture on Wednesday, January 28, at 8:00 p.m. in Alumni Theatre. His talk will be focused on "Directions for Sustainable Agriculture". Dr. McEwen is convinced that a healthy agricultural industry is essential for a viable Canadian economy.

Dr. McEwen was born in 1926 in Prince Edward Island. He was Head of the Department of Entomology at Cornell University (1965-1968). In 1968 he joined the University of Guelph as Professor in the Department of Zoology and became Chairperson of the Department of Environmental Biology in 1971 until the end of 1982. Since 1983 he has been the Dean of the Ontario Agricultural College.

During his academic career, Dr. McEwen has directed several graduate students in the area of insect biology and control. He is a past President of the Entomological Society of Canada (1979-1980) and the Canadian Pest Management Society (1980-1981). Author and co-author of a large number of scientific publications, Dr. McEwen serves on several committees dealing with pesticides, control, pest agriculture and biology.



N.S.A.C. Library Needs Help

Library collections remain below the standards established for a four-year degree-granting program. Although small improvements are made each year, there still exists a sizeable shortfall. Funds are needed to overcome past deficiencies and to meet the information needs of the new academic programs.

*** Background ***

Between 1968 and 1983 the N.S.A.C. Library was housed in a space roughly equivalent to two classrooms located in the lower level of the Cox Institute. The small collection was supplemented by specialized collections held in various departments and individual faculty collections which together supported the two-year

programs.

In 1980 N.S.A.C. received approval to offer all four years of the B.Sc. (Agr.) degree course. Students in the B.Sc. (Agr.) program select one of seven options after completion of the first year course: Plant Science, Animal Science, Agricultural Economics, Plant Protection, Agricultural Chemistry, Agricultural Soils, and Agricultural Mechanization. A wide range of courses is offered in addition to those leading to the B.Sc. (Agr.) In 1986 - 87 the first three years of an Agricultural Engineering degree and a threeyear Pre-Veterinary course are being offered in addition to five technician courses, five technology courses and numerous vocational short courses.

In May 1983 the N.S.A.C. Library Building was officially opened. Many of the smaller resource collections were incorporated into the larger collection. The new facility now contains over 17,000 monographs and over 740 journal titles as well as approximately 8,200 bound journal

volumes.

90 *** Shortfall ***

The budget for book purchases was increased to allow collection building to support the four-year program rather than the previous two-year program - as well as to support the teaching and research interests of the 63 percent full-time faculty, rather than the previous 45 in 1979. Collections, however, remain below standards. A comparison of the present N.S.A.C. collection size required for a four-year degree-granting College library is presented below in tabular form:

Even after collections have attained sizes required by Library standards, they can only retain their requisite utility by sustaining an annual gross growth rate, before withdrawals, of at least 5%. Continuity of collection development is essential.

*** Guidelines ***

Because the College is not an independent institution but a branch within a provincial government department, there has been some confusion as to whether the College Library could accept donations. For anyone interested in assisting the N.S.A.C. Library, the following guidelines have been established:

1. Library Gift Fund

A new fund has been established for those wishing to assist the N.S.A.C. Library. Individuals or organizations may now make cash gifts and receive an official receipt from the Province for tax purposes. New acquisitions needs met from this fund will be determined by the Library Funding Committee with consent of the Principal. However, any individual donor preference will be respected. It is not intended that the fund be used for operating costs.

2. Gifts in Kind

Individuals or organizations interested in donating books or other materials should contact the Reference Librarian and learn what materials are needed most. A Want List is prepared and revised annually. The needs listed on the want list are materials such as:

. specific titles of books or audio-visual material on the priority list of requests submitted by faculty for new acquisitions

. missing issues or backfiles of specific journal titles

. reference books

. issues or backfiles of specific abstracts or indexes

historical materials for the Agricola Collections If a receipt is needed for income tax purposes, we will have the gift appraised, and a receipt will be issued.

3. Special or Long-Term Gifts

Donors interested in making a memorial gift, a perpetual gift or any special gift arrangement may discuss their ideas with the Reference Librarian, Ms. Bonnie Waddell or the Principal, Dr. MacRae. Specific ideas and advice will be available. Confidentiality, if desired, will be fully respected.

4. Volunteer Staff

Persons with library work experience, or with specific library skills may assist with special projects from time to time. Individuals wishing work experience to test their interest in future library science careers may also discuss their ideas with the library administration.
