

## **Appointment Announced**

Dr. H.F. MacRae, Principal of the Nova Scotia Agricultural College announced the appointment of Dr. Claude D. Caldwell as Head of the Department of Plant Science. The appointment became effective September 21st.

Dr. Caldwell, a native of Hants County, Nova Scotia, received his undergraduate education at Mount Allison University and graduate degrees from Dalhousie and The University of East Anglia in England from which he received his Ph.D. in 1977. He taught at the University of Brandon in Manitoba and later joined Agriculture Canada as part of the Cereal Crops research team at Lacombec,

## **NSAC Library Past-Present- Future - What Is Your Role?**

Many alumni will remember the library they had to use during the early and mid sixties, housed in less than 600 square feet, with fewer than 3000 items, and an annual budget of \$200. The early parttime librarians, H. J. Fraser (1924-1952), Roy Stevenson (1952-1960), Ian Fraser (1960-1968), Fraser Carr (1965-1966), laboured with insufficient space, acquisitions, money and time.

The importance of a well equipped library has never been greater than today as we are moving rapidly out of the manufacturing age and into an information economy which relies principally upon ideas. Adequate education, coupled with retraining, is going to be crucial. Fifty per cent of what an engineer learns today will be obsolete in five years. In ten years, that figure leaps to about 90 per cent. In order to cope, anyone working in agriculture will have to deal with a faster changing world, with new technology and new

When someone in the Atlantic region is looking for information related to agriculture there should be no alternative considered until the NSAC library holdings have been investigated. This library should be the centre of agricultural information for the region.

NSAC hired its first professionally trained librarian, B. Sodhi, in 1968, and the library has been under his capable direction ever since. The new NSAC library building opened in 1983. It contains 26,000 square feet of space, with excellent audio-visual facilities, meeting and study rooms. It has holdings of 19,000 books and about 800 journal titles. These are added to annually. There is a capable professional service-oriented staff of six full-time employees, two halftime casuals and seven student assistants. The library is open seven days per week (80 hours) during the college term. The "Agricola Collection", set aside for agricultural items of historical interest and value, is also housed in the library

This library is not only a resource for teaching programs, but also for workers in agriculture across the region, be they in industry, extension, research, women's institutes, or members of 4-H or the interested public. The library should provide us with tools and materials to understand agriculture in the past and its ramifications for the region. It must also enable anyone working in agriculture to become familiar with agriculture as it is currently being practiced, and to provide the basic resources needed to make judgements on future directions.

At present, the library needs development in all areas to fulfill

these goals. The historical aspect is best filled by acquiring older volumes of texts, government documents and agricultural publications from the region. These may be hoarded away in people's personal collections. Maybe you could help supply some of these needs.

understanding agriculture in the present is best provided by having substantical collections of topical books, government documents, popular press publications and a strong base of journals and related scientific publications. Books provide a general, time - defined source of information about topics relating to agriculture. However, much of the vital new information does not get into textbook form until approximately two years from the date of discovery. Therefore, periodicals and government documents are vital to the maintenance and development of an adequate base of information. The NSAC library does have a good blend of current journals but there are inadequate backfiles of journals and filling in the gaps is a major need.

Of great importance also is access to computer data banks on agriculture available in Canada. the United States and Europe. It is essential to develop this service to enable library users to consult sources of agricultural information

and research worldwide.

The NSAC library staff and committees are attempting to overcome past deficiences and to build the acquisitions to meet standards recommended for four year degree programs. They know an average scientific book costs \$75 and the cost of journals is increasing annually. They also know the collection has to be dynamic - it must sustain an annual gross growth rate of a least five per cent to stay relevant. They need your help to attain this goal.

The alumni and the agricultural industry can assist tremendously by helping to fill the gaps in current holdings, increase the acquisition of back issues of journals currently subscribed to, purchase more books, develop access to data banks, or enlarge the government document collection. Maybe you have older books and journals that you can contribute, or perhaps you can provide personal or industry financial donations to support acquisitions. Industry contributions will, in the long-term, reap rewards for the industry. Alumni contributions, will, in the long-tern, reap rewards for alumni.

Alberta. In 1983 he joined the faculty of N.S.A.C. and has been an associate professor of Plant Science.

A comprehensive research program on cereal crop management has been developed at N.S.A.C. under his direction. He has designed and implemented several projects with specific applications to Maritime Agriculture, and has published numerous scientific papers in national journals.

In making this announcement, Dr. MacRae paid tribute to the leadership given by Dr. Robert Prange who has been the Department Head for three and one-half years. Dr. Prange has accepted an appointment as a Research Scientist at the Agricultural Canada Research Station in Kentville, where he will concentrate on the post harvest physiology problems of horticultural crops.

#### Class '44 Lectureship

In 1984 the Class of 1944 created and endowed a fund to provide income for an annual lectureship to be given under the auspices of the N.S.A.C.

The third Class of '44 Lecture will be presented on March 9th in association with the Nova Scotia Institute of Agrology Technology Day. The theme this year is Food Irradiation and the lecture will be presented by Susan Mills, Science, **Technology and Communications** Division, External Affairs, Canada. Ms Mills prepared a discussion paper "Issues In Food Irradiation" for the Science Council of Canada. This discussion paper was a supporting document for the Science Council of Canada's report "Food Irradiation: Prospects For Canadian Technology Development" published in 1987.

The lecture will be held in the Alumni Theatre, March 9th, at 20:00.

#### Guelph's Dr. J.D. McLaughlin Dies

Dr. John D. McLaughlin, University of Guelph's First President and Vice Chancellor, died on October 13, 1987. Dr. McLaughlin was known to many N.S.A.C. graduates who had studied at the Federated Colleges and later the University of Guleph. He was appointed President of the Federated College in 1962, and was the first President of the University from 1964 to 1967. When he retired he became the Education Consultant with the Government of Jamaica.

He has been honured by the Agricultural Institute of Canada

and by his own University, who appointed him an Honourary Fellow. In 1984 the University renamed the Agricultural Ecomonics and Extension Education Building the J.D. McLaughlin Building as a tribute to the founding President. A bust of Dr. McLaughlin by a Guelph sculptress, Sophia Hungerford, is now on the main floor of McLaughlin Library.

The Dept. of Alumni Affairs and Development of the University of Guelph is administering a new memorial fund established in Dr. McLaughlin's name.

SOCCER

The men's team, suffering from losses due to '87 graduation, started slowly before winning key contests against Canadian Coast Guard College and NSTC to move into 3rd place for NSCC league play.

In exhibition play the Rams dropped 3 games to the experienced Damascus Senior Team from Truro and downed Brookfield High and Kings County Academy to round out their schedule

In the NSCC final tournament, hosted by NSAC, the Rams met Kings College in the first round and challenged the 2nd place squad frequently before losing 2-1 in the final moments to end the season.

All-Conference recipients for the AC squad were William Mac-Murdo and Jannes Wesselius. Mac-Murdo owned the backfield while Wesselius controlled much of the play in midfield.

The women's soccer program got off to a flying start after a year's leave of absence from the Nova Scotia College Conference. With the "old faithfuls" and a talented group of rookies, the girls began league play with a 1-1 tie with Kings College in Halifax. Pat Cabot, goolkeeper, had an exceptional game between the posts but unfortunately suffered an injury which kept her out of action for 3 weeks. Susan Appt handled the keeper duties following that tie for the majority of the season, and following three subsequent losses, the girls worked hard to tip the scales for three consecutive wins to end the league play in 2nd spot.

The NSCC finals saw the "Aggies" defeat Kings 2-1 in the semi before going down 2-0 to MSVU in the final. The girls had a great season which will provide an excellent base for future years.

#### CROSS COUNTRY

Notes from the Registrar
The past ten years has seen a N.S.A.C. will graduate another

declining enrollment of those who wish to pursue an education, and, hence careers in agriculture. This is particularly evident in the reduction of those in degree programs. the University of Guelph has shown a decline (new students admitted to the degree program) from 670 in 1977 to 360 in 1986. For Macdonald College, the total (all years) of degree students has declined from 825 in 1984 to 651 in 1986. It would not be wrong to say that there could be a shortage of degree level agriculturists in the near future with its resultant negative effects

on the agricultural sector.
At N.S.A.C. since the advent of the complete degree program, the numbers in the degree program has been: 315 (1984-85); 321 (1985-86); 345 (1986-87), 305 (1987-88). You can see the considerable statements of the consi siderable reduction in the number of students in the degree program in the past year. The reason for the reduction is difficult to pinpoint. Part of the reason could be attributed to the national decline in degree enrollments and that it has just caught up to us at N.S.A.C. Another surprising development is the 50 percent drop in those entering the Pre-Vet program. In actual numbers this is a change in the past year from the normal 55-60 students. This year (1987-88)

record number of degree (1987); 57 potential (1988). However, since total enrollment, and particularly first year enrollment is down 29 percent, future years will see a decline in the number of degree

College enrollment as a whole has experienced a five percent decline in full-time students from 541 (1986) to 514 (1987). Technical programs, which had been declining over the past few years, have experienced a jump in numbers this year. This increase in technical program enrollment has thus helped keep our total enrollment from a more drastic decline. In particular, the Biology Laboratory Technology and Landscape Horticulture Technology programs have experienced increased applications.

Alumni are encouraged to be knowledgeable about the programs available at N.S.A.C. Further, in your daily contact with young people do sing the benefits of an education at N.S.A.C. and the careers available through the study of agriculture. Please contact the College should you need more information about the programs now available.
