The Nova Scotia Agricultural College was established in 1905 and offers degree, vocational and technical programs in agriculture and related fields. It caters primarily to residents of the Atlantic Provinces but increasingly to students from across Canada. An active and expanding program of international involvement brings many others to campus each year. The B.Sc. (Agr.) degree is awarded in association with Dalhousie University with whom a formal agreement also exists for graduate training at the M.Sc. and Ph.D. level. Current enrollment is approximately 300 degree and 200 technical students taught by 69 faculty.

The College, which operates as a unit of the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture and Marketing, is situated on a 200-hectare campus in central Nova Scotia. A recent, extensive capital building program has established a modern campus to support both teaching and an expanding research program which serves the Atlantic region. The faculty, facilities and programs reflect a broad, diversified and integrated approach to the life sciences as related to agriculture and food, engineering and landscape horticulture.

The Search Committee will be particularly interested in candidates with substantial administrative experience at a senior level, a record of achievement in teaching and scholarly activity normally associated with a senior academic appointment and a strong background in agriculture. Candidates should have demonstrated ability to communicate effectively with faculty, students, staff and the agricultural community.

The vacancy is a result of the retirement of Dr. H.F. MacRae after 16 years in the position. Initial appointment will be for a five-year term commencing October, 1989.

# **Two Professors Retire**



K. Padmanathan

Kathir Padmanathan, Professor, Department of Plant Science, retired in October from his full-time faculty role at N.S.A.C. Since then he has continued to teach some Genetics Classes and will continue to assist on a part-time basis in the winter semester.

Professor Padmanathan, "Pat" was appointed to faculty twenty years ago. He has taught several courses, but has concentrated his contribution in the field of Genetics and Statistics. In addition to the regular courses in the curriculum, he has provided helpful guidance to many students undertaking projects, especially those seeking advice on experiment design. He has regularly taught statistics and experimental design to the international students in the Potato Production Technology course each summer.

His early education was in Ceylon. His studies included both a B.Sc. (Hon.) from the University of Madras, and a B.Sc. (Agr.) from the University of Ceylon. His early professional work was as a Crops Research Officer with the Department of Agriculture. He also taught at the College of Agriculture in Jaffna. Dr. Padmanathan pursued graduate studies at Penn State University in the U.S.A. from which he received M.S. and Ph.D. Degrees majoring in Genetics. Before coming to N.S.A.C. he was a Research Assistant with the Department of Agronomy at Penn State University.

While at N.S.A.C. he has contributed much to the life and operation of the college through committee roles. For many years he was Chairman of the Faculty Committee of Standards and Admissions. He has also been a keen debator and contributor to curriculum the discipline and social committees. He has represented the College on APICS

William G. Mathewson, Associate Professor, Department of Animal Science, retires in December. He has taught several animal science courses and given considerable leadership to the livestock programs of the College and in the farming community. His expertise in beef and sheep production systems became a distinguishing trademark.

Professor Mathewson was appointed to faculty in 1968. He came to Canada following seventeen years of experience, first in Tanzania with the British Colonial Service and after Independence with the Tanzanian Government and then in Scotland as Assistant Secretary to the National Farmers Union. His academic studies included a B.Sc. (Agr.) from Aberdeen, a D.T.A. from Trinidad, and a M.Sc. from Aberdeen at which time he specialized in Sheep Husbandry. Other educational activities included a study of irrigation in Sudan, Australia, Malaya and Ceylon, sponsored by FAO.

Professor Mathewson, "Bill", has helped many students with projects and through counselling. He has contributed to numerous committees including College Royal, Judicial, Library, Animal Care and Curriculum. He has actively participated in several professional organizations including the N.S.I.A., A.I.C. and C.S.A.S. He has been a Director of The Royal Agricultural Winter Fair, The American N.C. Cheviot Sheep Association, the Maritime Shorthorn Association, and the N.S. Shorthorn Club.

His research has been closely associated with the management of sheep and beef production systems. He has conducted several studies and published results in both scientific journals and the farm press. He is frequently requested to evaluate sheep in North America, Ireland and Scotland, and is currently the N.S. Producer representative on the Canadian National Sheep Improvement Board.

# **New Faculty**

The Department of Economics and Business Management has a new Assistant Professor. He is Professor Steven Russell who brings to the position considerable experience in economic and financial matters.

Professor Russell graduated with a Degree Diploma (honours) from the N.S.A.C. in 1976. He went on to get his B.Sc. (Agr.) degree in Agriculture Economics (honours) from the University of Guelph in 1978. In 1986 he attained his M.B.A. in Marketing and Finance from St. Mary's University in Halifax.

Originally from Amherst, Nova Scotia he has had work experience as an Economist with the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture and Marketing, an Assistant Agricultural Representative with the same Department, a Loans Officer with the Nova Scotia Farm Loans Board and was Manager of Commerical Accounts for the Bank of Montreal in London, Ontario.

The Nova Scotia Agricultural College's Plant Science Department has a newly-appointed assistant professor who will be primarily involved in teaching potato production and storage crop phys-

Having been born in Ghana, Dr. Samuel Asiedu left the farming community where he grew up and went to the Netherlands to study at the National Agricultural College. He then went on to get his Bachelor, Master, and Doctor degrees from McGill University's Macdonald College.

As well as doing graduate work in potato storage problems, Dr. Asiedu spent two and a half years at the International Institute of Tropical Agriculture in Nigeria as a research fellow in the root and tuber improvement program. Af-ter receiving his doctorate, he worked on postharvest physiology and pathology of norticultural crops at Macdonald College.

Prior to working at the N.S.A.C., he was the potato specialist for the Prince Edward Island government for over two years. Dr. Asiedu now lives in Truro.

This gift came at a time when the Library Committee was independently studying library funding problems for acquisitions. It had written to the N.S.A.C. Alumni Association in May 1988 asking if the Association might support the establishment of an endowment fund to collect and to invest donations on behalf of the Library. In September the N.S.A.C. Alumni Association responded:

"The Alumni Association is very much in support of the concept of a trust fund for library acquisitions, and we are prepared to endorse the


By November the Class of '38 gift and the initiative to start an endowment fund came together when procedures for the administration of the fund and guidelines for the public recognition of donors were finalized. Thus, the groundwork was laid for a library endowment fund for NSAC. Special purpose and Trust Fund Revenues are made available for library acquisitions at many Canadian universities.

The Alumni Association and the Library Committee have formally agreed that donations to the College Library which are not for a specific purpose will be deposited in a special Library Trust Fund Savings Account by the Treasurer of the N.S.A.C. Alumni Association, who will issue a charitable donation receipt for income tax purposes. Each time this account accumulates to \$1,000, the money will be invested in a G.I.C. or other investment vehicle for (at the present time) a three to five year term. Interest from the account and the investment will be credited annually. The N.S.A.C. Library Funding Committee will have the option of using the interest for acquisitions, or adding it to the principal. Thus, gifts made to the N.S.A.C. Alumni Association Library Trust Fund, automatically

become gifts in perpetuity.

Following the gift of the Class of '38 came an equally significant gift of \$1,100. from the members of the Class of '43 to acknowledge the 45th Anniversary of their graduation. # Former Deputy Minister Dead at Age 58

Walter V. Grant, Nova Scotia's deputy agricultural minister from 1975 until his retirement, died in September at age 58.

Born in Yarmouth, he spent his entire working career with the provincial Agriculture Department, joining it in 1952.

He graduated from the Nova Scotia Agricultural College, and received his B.Sc. (Agr.) in agricultural economics from Macdonald College, and his M.Sc. (Agr.) in agricultural economics from the University of Connecticut.

His 35 year career was devoted to his native province and specifically to the development of agriculture,

the rural people and to the education of these people of all ages.

In 1960 he was named supervisor of farm management, became associate director of extension and later director of extension and economics, where he serviced with distinction for 12 years.

In May 1975, he was appointed deputy minister of agriculture and marketing, a position he held for 11 years. During his time as deputy minister, he earned the respect and admiration of those who worked closely with him, a role in which he demonstrated his leadership and administrative capabilities.

His interest in education was

demonstrated from early work in 4-H, through to the support and encouragement he provided toward the significant development which had occurred at the N.S.A.C.

He was made a member of the Honor Societies of Phi Cappa Phil and Gamma Sigma Delta in 1964-65.

In 1967 he was the recipient of the Centennial Medal "in recognition of his valuable service to the nation."

In 1986 he was made an honorary associate of the N.S.A.C.

In 1987 he was awarded the Distinguished Agrologist Award by the Nova Scotia Institute of Agrologists. He was a member of the N.S.I.A., the Agricultural Institute of Canada, the Canadian Society of Extension and the Canadian Agricultural Economics and Farm Management Society.

He was chairman of the board of directors of Maritime Resource Management Services Inc., Amherst. He served as president of the Canadian Agricultural Extension Council and President of the 4-H Council of Canada.

He was a member of the First United Church, Truro, where he was an elder and a member of the pastoral relations committee and the ministry and personnel committee.

He served the Christian Education Program for 30 years. Until recently he was chairman of the Nova Scotia Farm Debt Review Board, chairman of the Nova Scotia Trade Council and chairman of the Nova Scotia Dairy Commission.

He is survived by his wife, the former Shirley Conley; three sons, Bruce, Ottawa, Allan, Scott, Truro, a brother, Murray, Texas, a sister Rita, Yarmouth, and four grandchildren.

The agenda for the meeting was approved (on a motion by John Eaton and Don MacNeil).

The President's Report was presented by David Sangster. He introduced Brian Crouse and Robert McEwan as new executive positions with the association. This year's Alumni Association scholarship winners were: Joann Whalen, Rothesay, New Brunswick and Troy Webster, Kinkora, Prince Edward Island. Appreciation was expressed to those who helped with the preparation and distribution of the two issues of Alumni News during the year. An Alumni Gardens update was provided. The N.S.A.C. was thanked for matching Alumni Association funds for this project.

In highlighting the Executive meeting held prior to the annual meeting, the President reported on the request from the N.S.A.C. Library. (It was agreed a trust fund be set up library acquisitions and be administered by the Association. Classes and individuals are encouraged to support this project); a donation be made to the N.S.A.C. Day Care Centre; and, a proposal from the Athletic Centre for financial support for lighting for the playing field. It was agreed to support this project this year conditional on support from other user groups on campus, i.e. the College, the Students' Union and the sports teams.

The minutes of the 1986-87 Annual Meeting of the N.S.A.C. Alumni Association were highlighted by the Secretary. The Secretary's report was adopted by Brian Crouse and Frank Scammell.

The Treasurer's Report was presented by Robert McEwan. Current bank balance is \$649.72 (follow-

ing a deficit for the year of \$1,566.83). Balance in Campus Enrichment Fund is \$1,435.69. Life membership account has 32 new members (503 in total), balance in account of \$3,073.32. New fund received this year: Edith Main Memorial.

Report was adopted by Robert McEwan and Ralph Morehouse. Maintaining the Alumni Theatre account was explained. The interest supports various campus enrichment projects currently underway.

In the Principal's Report Dr. H. F. MacRae extended a welcome to those present. He noted an excellent turnout of Alumni at this year's reunion weekend and he welcomed them "back" to campus

them "back" to campus.

Dr. MacRae expressed pride in the high standards that graduates have established for N.S.A.C.

A lot of changes have taken place at A. C. over the past ten years. He commented on the great increase in staff at the college - "young, ambitious, talented people". The development program is really coming very much to its finality. The renovation of Boulden Building to a small animal lab care centre is ready to go to tender. The construction of the fur unit to support teaching and research programs is coming to completion. This will tidy up the major commitment by government initiated in 1979-80.

The new Animal Health Technology program begins in September. One new staff member will be hired to supervise this program.

Other technical programs are currently under review (to ensure a proper response to the needs of industry). Dr. MacRae confirmed the importance of maintaining the quality of programming even through this period of change and expansion. The two Curriculum Review committees are two of the most active committees at the college. A degree evaluation is now underway to examine the core content standards of N.S.A.C.'s B.Sc.

The Research Program continues to grow. In the upcoming year total research spending is probably going to be close to \$2 million and even through this is not large in Canadian standards (for universities and colleges), it is significant and constantly increasing. Dr. MacRae explained the very competitive system of winning research awards. Research support is initiated and developed by individual staff members. He complimented N.S.A.C's faculty for making significant strides in the research development on campus.

A lot of joint ventures are now underway on campus (between governments, industry and other agencies). A good example is the Atlantic Poultry Research Institute established this year with the

poultry industry, Agriculture Canada and N.S.A.C. jointly participating in research projects and co-ordinating support for that research in the region.

Dr. MacRae commented on the continued busy year it has been in the area of International Development. He singled out Dale Ells for the responsibility of a lot of this work. The college has had significant involvement in the Gambia, Columbia, Thailand, Hunan College in China and others. There are continuing demands on the college to take on international assignments. Dr. MacRae noted "we are making worthwhile contributions on a

world-wide scale".

Dr. MacRae admitted that the college has been treated well by the public purse. Often times, though, when there are projects public money can't be asked for, the Alumni Association has helped. He asked for support of the Library Trust Fund. He explained how the needs of the library are very real and assured the appreciation of the college and the students for whatever support the Association can offer.

In closing the principal offered thanks to David Sangster, on behalf of the college for his three-year commitment to the association through


