

### A. E. Roland Herbarium Fund to be established

A new fund being established and administered by the Alumni Association will honor Dr. A. E. Roland. It will serve to provide support, in perpetuity, for the continuation of the work he has done throughout his lifetime. Doc Roland's collections are a personal legacy. This fund will ensure they are preserved and main-

The A. E. Roland Herbarium is located in the Department of Biology at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College and houses a number of specialized collections for educational and research purposes. The herbarium is named in honor of Dr. Albert E. Roland, Professor Emeritus of Biology at the N.S.A.C., for his lifelong contribution to the understanding of the natural history of Nova Scotia. Herbarium specimens represent a permanent, botanical record of species occurring in the wild providing important distribution and ecological information. The continuing mandate of the A. E. Roland Herbarium is to: collect and maintain a permanet floristic record of Nova Scotia; provide a standard reference collection for plant identification; and provide a teaching collection for students of systematic botany and other related courses at the N. S. A. C. Specimen contributions made by professionals, students, and amateurs benefit both the reference and teaching

The A. E. Roland Herbarium hopes to focus its short and long term collection goals on various regions of the province. Recently, a floristic survey of the marshes northwest of Amherst, Nova Scotia has been initiated with the cooperation and participation of the Nova Scotia Department of Land and Forests biologists. The objectives are to provide the appropriate botanical information necessary for effective conservation and management and to enhance our general understanding of the natural history of the locality. Only with expanded financial and staffing support will the herbarium be able to initiate and coordinate projects in certain areas of the province which have not been

### New Food Lab program announced

The increased attention to food quality control, the development of new foods and the concerns for food safety are increasing the demand for more technical staff trained in food lab analysis. NSAC is launching a new technical course in response to this and will accept up to ten new students in the first year next September.

The three year program leads to a Diploma of Technology and contains five semesters on campus and one semester in a food lab practicum in food processing, or a related service. The student is employed during this practicum. This co-op education approach provides a good linkage to those employers who are interested in hiring graduates.

Students will receive laboratory based courses on Food Lab Methods, Food Microbiology, Food Chemistry, Analytical Chemistry, Food Processing, as well as courses on Egg and See page 2

## Principal's Message L. E. Haley

It has been a great pleasure and privilege for me to return to N.S.A.C. as Principal some 33 years after first coming here as a student. The Institution has changed considerably in that time and, even though I had numerous contacts with the College while I was at Dalhousie, I was pleasantly surprised to find a number of changes had occurred since degree granting status was achieved in 1985. In this report I would like to give you my impression

The contest is open to students at any North American University with a weed science program or a program related to the discipline of weed science.

Darren's essay was entitled "St. John's Wort - A potential problem in pasture land in Nova Scotia" and dealt with the toxicity problems associated with this serious weed as well as its biology and control. His award consists of \$150.00 cash, a plaque and an expense-paid trip to the 1990 WSSA meeting in Montreal, Quebec in February 1990, where he will be formerly presented with his award at a banquet in honour of all award winners of the Society. In addition, the essay will be considered for publication in the Journal "Weed Technology" in 1990.

Second place in this contest also went to an NSAC student. Tammy Hill, also a 4th year Plant Protection student, wrote an essay entitled "Agropyron Repens" which placed second. Her prize consists of \$100.00 cash and a plaque. The other NSAC student to enter the contest, Lisa Cody, placed fifth.

Third place was shared jointly by students from the University of Ohio and the University of Iowa.

of N.S.A.C. both as Principal and as a returning alumnus.

The impressive increase in the size and quality of the physical plant was immediately obvious to me. In the past 13 years over 30 million dollars in new construction has occurred. This includes the extension of Cox Institute, the Athletic Centre, a dining hall, a Library and most recently a new Animal Science building. With the excellent maintenance of the existing buildings the addition makes N.S.A.C. possibly the best campus in Atlantic Canada for the quality of its buildings. Just as important is the fact that these buildings have been equipped with the most up-to-date scientific equipment for teaching and research.

The second strong impression is that of a young and vibrant faculty which has undergone a 75% increase in size in the last 10 years. There are now over 70 Faculty members with only 15% over the age of 50. Other higher education institutions will be facing severe recruiting problems in the next 10 years because something like 30-40% of their University Faculty are over 50.

The relatively young N.S.A.C. Faculty are typically recent Ph.D graduates and have very active research programs. In 1989 they obtained some 1 1/2 million dollars in research funds. This research attitude has been vital in developing the 3rd and 4th years of the degree program but also in developing graduate studies at N.S.A.C. The faculty are supervising about 15 graduate students who are registered in graduate programs at Dalhousie and Macdonald College.

Program offerings in Technology and Technician areas have also increased with the recent addition of the very popular programs in Animal Health, Landscape Horticulture Technology and the new program in Food Laboratory Technology commencing this year.

The other significant change has been the great increase in International Development programs which includes major CIDA exchange programs with Gambia, Colombia, and Jamaica. There are now over 25 students at N.S.A.C. from these countries plus Kenya and Uganda.

Of singular importance to me, as an N.S.A.C. alumnus, is the fact that in spite of this rapid expansion the college has maintained the close personal touch with students. This I view as the greatest strength of N.S.A.C. and judging from a recent survey of current students in which over 95% indicated they would recommend the institution to others, I think the college has maintained this strength very well.

One area of concern being faced by all Science, Engineering and Agriculture programs is the apparent decline in

student interest in pursuing Science programs. Other faculties of agriculture have experienced a sharp decline in student enrollment. While N.S.A.C. has had a slight decline, clearly the demand for graduates is so great that we must increase our efforts to attract highly qualified students. It is in this area that I will be calling on our N.S.A.C. alumni for assistance. I believe our network of graduates across Canada, but especially in Atlantic Canada, can be used to educate potential students to the career opportunites in the whole Agri-food industry. It is clear from surveys of High School students that they do not understand or appreciate the career options following N.S.A.C. programs. We obviously have an important education job to do and one that is best done by N.S.A.C. and its alumni.



contracts now exceed one million dollars, and a total of twenty-five full time and twenty part time research assistants are employed during the academic year. In the summer approximately fifty students and thirty research assistants are hired.

The research activity is leading to the publication of more scientific papers from NSAC authors. The hosting of graduate students has increased. Several professors have been approved as research associates with the Dept. of Biology at Dalhousie, and some of the research funds are now supporting eleven graduate students at

The expanding role of research has increased the need for more coordination and profile to outside agencies. Dr. Haley recently appointed Prof. Graham Pearson, from the Dept. of Math and Physics to Associate Dean, Research, effective January 1, 1990.

In making the announcement Dr. Haley, Principal, noted the expanding role of research at the College. This has necessitated a greater need to co-ordinate information and procedures relating to research projects into a new research office. In this role Professor Pearson will be providing information services relating to sources of research grants, the co-ordinating of project proposals, the implementing of procedures for conducting research programs as well as overseeing the reporting to research sponsors and interested organizations.

The Research Office will be developed as part of the Math and Physics Office, Room 28 Cox Institute.

The Laboratory Animal Care Course taught in the winter semester will use the new space for their weekly lab exercies. Two of the rooms will be used for short term housing for the dogs and cats that are used as teaching resources in the Animal Health Technology Program.

Other space is allocated for records, feed preparation, cage washing, student labs, radiography and clinical services, as office and some restricted space for isotape use.

## Gambia College **Program Extended**

CIDA has approved a contribution grant to extend the NSAC - Gambia College development program for three more years. This will mean six years of continuous assistance which will provide numerous benefits for both insti-

At Gambia College the work is with their School of Agriculture and their College Farm. The work to date has been mainly on staff-upgrading studies, the provision of some technical and teaching assistance and development of farm land and related resources. In the new project there will be more staff updating studies, teaching help from NSAC and assistance with curriculum development and farm infrastructure.

John Henry, Marlene Horgan, and Gerard Horgan are currently working at Gambia College on behalf of NSAC. Momodou Jeng, a Farming Technology Student from The Gambia is supported from the project and is preparing to be the Farm Work Supervisor at the College. Three more staff are expected to arrive at NSAC in

Two interesting features of the program last year were the construction of a post harvest storage for crops. This was designed and built by the NSAC and Gambia personnel and is now being used as a secure storage offering protection from birds, rodents, and other plant product pests. The other was a joint workshop for extension staff on the Role of Farm Management in Agricultural Extension. Prof. John Tait from NSAC was one of the guest lecturers participating with the Gambian Instructors.



John Eaton highlighted the past year's activities of the association. He acknowledged Dr. MacRae's upcoming retirement after 17 years as Principal at N.S.A.C. and thanked him for both his very significant contribution to the college and his support of the Alumni Association. The minutes of the 1987-88 annual meeting were highlighted by the Secretary and approved on a motion by Stuart Allaby and David Sangster. Motion carried.

The Treasurer's Report was presented by Robert McEwan. The balance in the general account is \$1,957.21. The Campus Enrichment Fund's balance is \$1,600.29.

The Life Membership Account balance is \$3,223.32 (\$3,000 was reinvested this year). Forty-two new life members were received this year bringing the total life membership to 545.

Two new funds were established this year: \$5,000.00 from H.A.L. MacLaughlin and \$10,000 from Angus and Tena MacLellan for scholarships.

It was moved by Robert McEwan and seconded by Eric Meek that the Treasurer's report be adopted. Motion carried.

#### **BOARD OF DIRECTORS' REPORT**

John Eaton reported on the two Board of Directors' meetings held this year. In October the board agreed to make a donation to the N.S.A.C. Daycare Centre, to establish the Library Trust Fund and to commit towards the Athletic Field Development. In July the board heard a report of the official opening of the gazebo in June and of the encouraging first year of the Library Trust Fund, reviewed the plans for Alumni Weekend, agreed to have an alumni directory published and provided for an hororanium for the Treasurer.

A major review of core requirements for the B.Sc. (Agr.) program is well underway. This effort is being spearheaded by Vice-Principal Ian Fraser. The curriculum is never static -- it is constantly being reviewed and requires a lot of time to keep current.

The College's research program is very active. The Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture and Marketing provides a major portion of the funding but staff are also very competitive for NSERC grants. Many other funding sources are involved, both from government and industry. The annual report of research at N.S.A.C. has been prepared by Dr. Lorne Cock and is available to any who are interested.

The International Development activity has continued this year. Prof. John Tait chairs the centre for International Development and Dale Ells directs this

The year 1989 was the tenth year for the International Potato Technology Course. Eleven students from ten countries participated. A five year program has been approved by CIDA for ten students to be involved annually.

There is great demand on our people and on the college for help in international development work. This year we have been involved in Three Gambia, Jamaica, Columbia, China and Brazil.

The annual Class of '44 Lecture continues to be a successful event. This is held in partnership with N.S.I.A.'s Technology Day and has become a highlight on Campus through the mid-winter. The entire Class of '44 was present and Dr. MacRae acknowledged them.

Dr. MacRae expressed delight that Dr. Leslie Haley has accepted the

appointment to the principal's position.

To retire in 1990:

In closing the Principal extended appreciation on behalf of the College to all those who work with the Alumni Association. He particularly thanked John Eaton for the great contribution and the guidance he has offered this year. Dr. MacRae acknowledged the public relations benefit Alumni News provides the college.



On December 31, 1989 Dr. McFadden retired from the Faculty of the Nova Scotia Agriculture College where he was Department Head of the Department of Biology from 1972 until 1989.
