90 Years of Service for **NSAC & Cumming Hall**

It was on February 14, in 1905, when the was starting to separate and become unsta-Premier of Nova Scotia officially opened the new College of Agriculture in Bible Hill. The act providing for the establishment of an Agricultural College was passed in the Legislature on March 30, 1899. Several years of debate and discussion on location followed. The new college was the consolidation of three separate programs: The School of Agriculture in Truro operated by the Provincial Normal School, The School of Horticulture in Wolfville operated by the Nova Scotia Fruit Growers Association, and The Provincial Demonstration Farm in Bible Hill.

Dr. Melville Cumming was appointed the first Principal. In September, 1957, the administration building, originally built in 1904, and used for a winter short course in February, 1905, was named in honour of


In 1913, a large extension was added to the south, in which was housed the Assembly Hall/Gymnasium, engineering workshops in the basement. The extension also provided classrooms, a library and a reading room on the top floor. In 1980, major renovations were made to convert the gymnasium into Alumni Theatre. When this was done the back of the building was changed with the construction of the stage with height above to fly scenery and lights for better presentations. The top floor above the theatre was rearranged to provide offices, small classrooms and the Douglas

ble. Temporary emergency repairs to stabilize the worst areas were made by the N.S. Government, and a further assessment of the entire structure was carried out before redeveloping the whole exterior. Now the more extensive repairs to the building shell will commence this winter, as the condition of the masonry is now deteriorating and its correction is essential. The N.S. Department of Supply and Services has provided for repair funds in their expenditure plan for 1994-95 and plan to let a contract for work to begin early in the new year.

The removal of the brick work and the rebuilding of the exterior walls will take several months and the disruption will make it necessary for most services to relocate for a while. The NSAC Administration Services including the offices of the Principal, Vice-Principals and the Business Office will move to the Board Room, Lounge and Continuing Education spaces in Cox Institute. Continuing Education will relocate to the Animal Science Building. The Department of Humanities will set up their offices in the Groundskeeper's House at 56 Tower Road. The Centre for International Development will relocate to the International House at 179 College Road.

Although the disruption will inconvenience many for a several months, the long term improvement to the structure is a welcome birthday present for the 90 year old building. Cumming Hall will be able to serve "with a smile" because of its proud history and its restored condition.

New NSAC Foundation Activated

The Nova Scotia Government has just appointed the members including the Chair for the new Nova Scotia Agricultural College Foundation. Dr. Les Haley, College Principal has announced that James Mac-Connell, President and CEO of the Scotsburn Dairy Group, is the Foundation Chair. The four other members are: Dr. Nancy Crowe, a Faculty member at NSAC; Arlene MacGregor, Farmer and a Past President of the Women's Institute of Nova Scotia; Dr. Herb MacRae, Past Principal and President of the Alumni Association and David Martin, a Vice-President of Scotiabank.

The new University Foundations Act, passed by the provincial government in 1993, has established the legal framework for a foundation for each institution named in the act. The act also designated that gifts to each foundation will be treated for tax purposes like gifts to the crown, and there will not be a limit to tax deduction amounts as there is when giving to charitable organizations.

One of the early tasks of the NSAC Foundation will be to determine by-laws and operating procedures. Only the new Foundation can finalize these, so no details can be announced yet. The Foundation does not replace or limit the Alumni Association's ability to receive and manage funds, but rather provides another vehicle to receive and manage gifts of money or real property and in a legal structure that may be preferred by some benefactors. In this time when there are cuts in public funding for higher education, private support becomes extremely important to NSAC and its several programs.

Appointed VP Academic

Dr. Ted Burnside, a Professor of Animal Science at the University of Guelph, and Director of their Centre for Genetic Improvement of Livestock, was appointed to the role of Vice-Principal Academic at NSAC, effective November 1, 1994.

Recognized and respected as one of Canada's leading scholars in animal genetics and breeding, Dr. Burnside has had more than 100 papers published in refereed journals, has co-authored or made major contributions to seven text books, and has published more than 100 articles in agricultural industry related publications. He has frequently been sought after as a speaker at agricultural extension workers and farmers through numerous contributions to extension fact sheets and media reports. On several occasions he has been invited to be an

advisor to major animal breeding programs in other countries.

His teaching activities have included an excellent scope of programs including diploma and undergraduate students, graduate student supervision, the development of customized programs for specialists from other countries, and the hosting of visiting scholars. He has also developed several effective partnerships with industry for research and technology transfer work.

In making the announcement, Principal Les Haley expressed confidence that Dr. Burnside's extensive teaching, research and management skills would be important farm conferences and scientific meetings. assets to NSAC as adjustments are made to He has been a valuable resource person for the new realities affecting postsecondary

Langille Honoured by Acadia

Win Langille, Professor Emeritus in the NSAC Department of Chemistry and Soil Science, was honoured by Acadia University by the granting of the degree of Doctor of Civil Laws. This was given at Fall Convocation on October 15, fifty years after he first graduated from the University.

In the citation, special reference was given his thirty-six years of service to NSAC and his professional contributions in the field of Soil Science. He was a faculty member for 36 years and also contributed much to the athletic endeavour of AC students both as coach and advisor for numerous activities. This was really a continuation of the style he first displayed at Acadia during his undergraduate years. There he excelled in sports, including football and hockey. He also served as Student Union President. His valuable assistance to numerous community and recreation organizations throughout his adult years were listed in the citation. It was also noted that he has been made a member of the Truro and Nova Scotia Sports Hall of Fame and in 1968 was chosen as Truro's Citizen of the Year.

Prof. Langille continued to show support and interest in his original alma mater throughout his career, developing a student-alumni liaison program and providing leadership with the Alumni and the Acadia Institute. The tribute made to Win Langille by NSAC, when the Athletic Centre was named in his honour, was also quoted.

Rovers Appointed Deputy Minister

On January 6, Nova Scotia's Premier John Savage announced that Arnold Rovers, class of '65, has been appointed deputy minister for the Department of Agriculture and Marketing. He was the executive director of the departmen's agricultural development division, and will assume the new duties immediately. He has had major responsibilities in the development of policies and programs to advance agriculture during his 27 years with the department. He has been director of marketing and economics and was the CEO for the Nova Scotia Farm Loan Board. Arnold grew up on the family farm in Afton, Antigonish County, and after his graduation from NSAC, completed a B.Sc.

MacRae Inducted into Canadian Agricultural Hall of Fame

Surrounded by his family, Dr. Herbert Farquhar MacRae, PAg, FAIC, was inducted into the Canadian Agricultural Hall of Fame, November 13.

Dr. MacRae, recognized as a Distinguished Agrologist, has provided leadership and valued contributions in agricultural education, research, animal science, biochemistry and the coordination of programs and services. He is a graduate of the Nova Scotia Teachers College, the Nova Scotia Agricultural College and Macdonald College of McGill University, receiving his PhD degree in 1960.

After working briefly for the Food and Drug Directorate of Health & Welfare Canada, Dr. MacRae returned to Macdonald College as Assistant Professor in Animal Science and later became Chairman of the department. He then was selected as Principal of the Nova Scotia Agricultural College. During 17 years as Principal, Herb MacRae guided his Alma Mater, the Nova Scotia Agricultural College, through growth and development of student services, educational programs and research. Dr. MacRae was instrumental in developing an academic agreement with Dalhousie University for granting the BSc(Agr) degree to NSAC graduates enabling them to enter the profession of Agrology directly. Modernization and expansion of the Technical Diploma program at NSAC also occurred under his leadership

Dr. MacRae was chair of the Atlantic Provinces Agricultural Sciences Coordinating Committee and twice President of the Association of Faculties in Agriculture. He also served as Executive Director of the Confederation of Canadian Faculties of Agriculture and Veterinary Medicine, retiring in 1993. Dr. MacRae was a charter member of the Canadian Agricultural Research Council, serving as a member for 20 years and Chair from 1987 to 1994, during which time he gave strong leadership to the development of a strategy for agricultural research and technology transfer in Canada. From 1989 to 1991 he served as a member of the task force to study agriculture in Newfoundland.

The Canadian Society of Animal Science awarded Dr. MacRae the Certificate of Merit and the Queen's Silver Jubilee Medal. McGill University honoured him with the Degree of Doctor of Science, honoris causa. In 1988 Dr. MacRae was made Honourary Associate of Nova Scotia Teachers College and was elected a Fellow of the Agricultural Institute of Canada. The Alumni Association NSAC granted him the Distinguished Alumnus Award in 1991. Dr. MacRae was named to the Order of Canada in 1992.

CHUTE HONOURED BY ALUMNI

The NSAC Alumni selected Dr. Harold L. Chute, class of '44, to be the recipient of the Distinguished Alumnus Award at their annual meeting on July 30. In the citation, considerable detail was noted on his distinguished career as a teacher, scientist and administrator. His equally impressive record of service to the community was also noted.

In 1976, the NSAC recognized Dr. Chute when he was made an Honorary Associate of the College.

He was raised in the community of Margaretsville on the north mountain of the Annapolis Valley.

After receiving his DVM, he was appointed Animal Pathologist with the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture and at later accepted the position of Assistant Professor of Animal Pathology at the Uni-

versity of Maine

He returned to studies in the early fifties, obtained a Masters in Veterinary Pathology from Ohio State University and later a Doctor of Veterinary Science from the University of Toronto. At Maine, he moved rapidly through Assistant, Associate to Full Professor in 1955, a position he held for 22 years. For eleven of these years Dr. Chute was also Director of the Pullorum-Typhoid Testing Service.

In 1969 Harold moved into University Administration and was Director of Development for the University of Maine until 1977 when he took leave of absence to develop the Chute Chemical Company, of which he is the President. Harold and Marion have two daughters, one son and two grandchildren.

Charles Keddy, class of '73, was elected President of the Nova Scotia Federation of Agriculture at the annual meeting on December 3. This was noted in the farm related newspapers in the province. Charles and wife Doris operate Keddy's Nursery in

Lakeville, Kings, County, which encompasses 75 acres of nursery stock; grain and corn in rotation. There is also a herd of 70 beef cattle. Charles has given leadership in a variety of farm and community organizations during the past 20 years.

Farm Focus carried a story about the farm in the July 13 edition. He and his father have found a way to combine three unique interests into one integrated program. The marketing of pork products and grass seed are intregated with passes to play golf. In the first month of operation about 1500 people played the course.

Three AC grads were among those honoured by the Nova Scotia Institute of Agrologists last Spring. Nancy Kent, class of '84, was named the "Outstanding Young Agrologist". After leaving AC, she completed her B.Sc.(Agr.) at Macdonald College and then earned a Masters of Science from Aberdeen University in Scotland. She is employed as a Nutritionist with Clarence's Farm Services in Truro and lives in Nine Mile River with her husband Scott Smith, and their new daughter Megan Melissa. Keith Russell, class of '46, was given the "Distinguished Life Member Award." Keith was well known for his 26 years of service with Co-op Atlantic and when he retired in 1989, he was Manager of their Agricultural Marketing and Development Division. He was also Executive Secretary of the Atlantic Farmers' Council. Fred Walsh, class of '50, was awarded with a "Distinguished Life Membership". Fred's frequent leadership in professional, farm and community organizations were cited among his many accomplishments as an Agrologist. Principal's Message

As I begin my second term as Principal it is perhaps appropriate to reflect on the rapid rate of change at the College during the past five years.

Enrollment in 1994 - 95 is over 850 students, an increase of 75% in five years with all programs including technician, technology, degree and graduate showing gains. During this period the first graduates in the Food Laboratory and Animal Health Technology were well -received by employers. The Animal Health Technology program has earned full accreditation by the Canadian Veterinary Medical Association. New degree options in Environmental Agribiology and a M.Sc. was started jointly with Dalhousie and a degree option in Aquaculture has been approved. In addition a joint degree program in Environmental Engineering was started with TUNS. Research has increased to the point where NSAC is a leading research institution among the universities in the region and the only comprehensive research centre in agriculture in Atlantic Canada. The College has also developed a solid reputation for its activities in international development and a full time Director for the Centre for International Development was hired in 1994. The College is in a unique position, being both a community college and a university with technical and degree programs designed to meet the needs of agriculture, agri-food and related industries. The importance of institutions which can meet the whole range of post secondary education is well recognized around the world and is most noticeable in the rapid growth of the polytechnic type of institution. Technical programs continue to be a very important element in the range of training programs required today and there must be well recognized routes for transfer between diploma and degree studies.

The College is also recognized for its close cooperation with all aspects of the industry, including producers, governments, research institutions and related industries. Your continued interest as an alumni helps strengthen this link. This is different from several other colleges and

universities who are viewed as too distant from the needs and economic opportunities

A strategic planning process was carried out during the past year which included extensive consultation with all College stakeholders including the Alumni Association. The two most positive areas identified included excellent programs and well trained graduates. The main criticism was a perception that the College needed to be more active in continuing and distance education in the whole of Atlantic Canada. A Director of Continuing Education is currently being recruited with a specific direction to address this concern.

A major review of universities is under way in Nova Scotia with many options for rationalization. A green paper outlining the issues has been prepared by the Nova Scotia Council on Higher Education. The Council has arranged a series of special meetings to receive "grass roots" level input on the green paper. The meeting at NSAC will be on February 3, 1995 and I would urge alumni especially to respond with briefs, oral presentations or both.

New Faculty Members

Dr. Leslie MacLaren joined the Department of Animal Science as Assistant Professor on August 15. She will provide teaching and research expertise in the areas of animal physiology including molecular biology and reproductive physiology.

She received her undergraduate education at the University of Guelph. Her graduate programs were at the University of Alberta, where she earned a M.Sc. with specialization in animal genetics and at the University of California, where her research included the use of morphological, hormonal and immunological indicators associated with interspecific pregnancy. She has also completed Postdoctoral studies at the University of Guelph in research involving molecular biology and protein chemistry techniques.

For three years she taught at New Liskard College of Agricultural Technology and supervised the sheep research program as well as directing the feeding and management of the flock. This research was applied and emphasized methods to increase productivity and efficiency of sheep production. Cooperative work with agricultural extension programs was

ty, the College has gained a broad range of applied and specialized expertise which fits well with the scope of programs being addressed by NSAC.

Dr. Marcus Merrin joined the Department of Chemistry and Soil Science as an Assistant Professor on December 12. He is teaching courses in general and biochemistry and will also contribute expertise in quantitative chemistry.

His undergraduate education included programs at the Open University in the UK and a B.Sc.(Hons.) from London University King's College, where he majored in chemistry. Graduate studies were completed at Dalhousie University with the awarding of a Ph.D. in May, 1991. In 1991 he also satisfactorily completed the structured assessment of chartered membership of the Royal Society of Chemistry.

In the graduate programs he pursued extensive investigations in the field of medicinal chemistry with particular attention to potential antitumour pro-drugs. His work involved a wide range of analytical and instrumentation techniques which relate well to the NSAC labs. He is the author of several publications on open chain nitrogen compounds.

Dr. Merrin has taught chemistry at five of the colleges and universities in the Atlantic Region. Since September of 1993, he has been a Research Associate and Lecturer at Saint Mary's University in Halifax.

New Grants for First Graduates

The records for the "First Session" of the "College of Agriculture" in 1905-1906 show twenty-five students, two designated as "seniors" and the other twenty-three as "juniors". The two seniors became the first graduates to continue for further studies at the Ontario Agricultural College in Guelph. Several others in the next graduating class followed their example. Students in the 1910 annual report are said to have registered in the third year at the Ontario Agricultural College, Macdonald College and Cornell Agricultural College.

Edgar S. Archibald from Yarmouth, and who already had a degree from Acadia University in Wolfville, became the first graduate with only one year of NSAC study. He went on to a career in research and eventually Dr. Archibald headed up the Canadian Experimental Farm Service.

Elton Lewis from Westbrook Mills had other university courses before entering AC and also had advanced standing in that first session. He too graduated from the Ontario Agricultural College in 1908.

The First **Short Course - 90 Years Ago**

Sixty people attended the first short course sponsored by the new College from February 7 to 25, 1905. These students were on hand for the official opening ceremony for the College on February 14, when Premier Murray attended.

The students are listed just as they are recorded in the first College Record Book, which has been kept in the vault of Cumming Hall. Although most of the students were from Nova Scotia, it is interesting to note that several also attended from New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. Scottish names were spelled with "Mc" and not the "Mac" which is so common today. Twenty-six of the sixty participants were awarded diplomas.



In Memoriam

The College community was deeply saddened to learn of the death of Mrs. Kim Rilda LeBlanc on August 28, 1994, at the age of 34. Mrs. LeBlanc taught English H101 in the fall of 1993.

Mrs. LeBlanc received her M.A. in English from Dalhousie University in 1993. She had planned to continue studies in the doctoral program at the University of Alberta

Mrs. LeBlanc was born with a defective heart condition. 

Two AC Grads added to Atlantic Agricultural Hall of Fame

On October 26, there was an induction ceremony by the Atlantic Agricultural Hall of Fame to honour four individuals who have made an outstanding contribution to Atlantic agriculture. The four people were: Stuart Allaby from Nova Scotia, Franklin Johnson from New Brunswick, Juanita Lester from Newfoundland and Elmer MacDonald from Prince Edward Island

Alumni News has reprinted the citations for the two AC grads, (Stu Allaby, Class of '49, and Franklin Johnson, Class of '50) so their classmates will become more aware of the achievements of these two alumni members.

Stuart Francis Allaby (1924 -) Nova Scotia

Stuart Allaby was born in Bloomfield Station, New Brunswick and spent his early years in Norton and Sussex.

Following service in the Royal Canadian Air Force during World War II he enrolled at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College and went on to graduate from Macdonald College of McGill University in 1951.

His first appointment as Poultry Fieldman with the Nova Scotia Department of Agricultural and Marketing marked the beginning of a lifelong career in the agriculture industry. He went on to be Director of Technical Services for Maritime Co-operative Services and in 1964 rejoined the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture & Marketing as Provincial Poultry Superintendent. Stuart was appointed Director of the Livestock Services Branch in 1975, a position he held until his retirement in 1986. He was a founding partner of ABS Chick Hatchery, New Minas, and is co-owner of Lifeline Software Consultants.

Throughout his career Mr Allaby has promoted efficient poultry production and marketing which has placed the Nova Scotia industry in a sound financial basis. He encouraged the development of supply management programs in Canada and presently acts as Chairman of the Nova Scotia Natural Products Marketing Council. Mr Allaby, an Honorary Member of the Chicken Producer's Association and the Atlantic Provinces Hatchery Federation was instrumental in the establishment of the Atlantic Poultry Research Institute. He is also a member of the Farm Debt Review Board.

Stuart and his wife Ruth have lived in Truro for many years. They have five daughters: Pam, Donna, Karen, Sonja and Carolyn.

A strong supporter of his community, Stuart has for many years been a member of First Baptist Church and served as a Deacon and Chairman of the Management Board. He also was a Board member of the Children's Aid Society.

Nominated by the Nova Scotia Egg and Pullet Producers Marketing Board, Stuart Allaby's many contributions to agriculture and his community merit recognition in the Atlantic Agricultural Hall of Fame.

Franklin R. Johnson (1929 -) New Brunswick

Franklin R. Johnson was born in New Jerusalem, Queens County, New Brun-swick on August 3, 1929. He was raised on a small, mixed farming operation. After high school graduation, he attended the Nova Scotia Agricultural College for two years and went on to study at Macdonald College in Montreal where he graduated in 1952 with a Bachelor of Science in Agriculture, majoring in animal husbandry

After a short period of employment in Toronto, Franklin returned to New Brunswick to work for Agriculture Canada as a research officer. In 1956, he joined the New Brunswick Department of Agriculture where he spent the rest of his career working in the livestock sector. He retired in 1991 as director of the Animal Industry Branch. Mr Johnson currently resides in Fredericton.

Franklin Johnson will be remembered for his contact with farmers and farm organizations during his time as livestock fieldman. His ability to communicate government policy and programs in ordinary language was unique.

He is well known for his contribution to the Maritime Stock Breeders Association. He worked closely with the New Brunswick Livestock Council and the New Brunswick Livestock Breeders Cooperative in assisting and supporting the New Brunswick Provincial Livestock Show. Johnson's expertise as a livestock judge is well known.

He worked in the early stages on committees to privatize milk recording in the Atlantic Region, which eventually led to the formation of the Atlantic Dairy Livestock Improvement Corporation (ADLIC). He was also instrumental in amalgamating the New Brunswick Central Breeding Unit and Eastern Breeders Inc., providing livestock breeders with an excellent choice of genetic material at a fair price.

Nominated by the New Brunswick Shorthorn Association, it is an honor to welcome Franklin R. Johnson as an inductee in the Atlantic Agricultural Hall of Fame.

We gather to-day in memory of a distinguished agrologist, educator and researcher.

Kenneth Cox was born in Upper Stewiacke 95 years ago. Following high school he studied at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College, the Ontario Agricultural College and Macdonald College of McGill University where he obtained his Masters of Science in Agriculture. He is recognized for a career that included a broad range of activities through which he served agricul-

His early work at the Experimental Farm in Nappan was as an agronomist and as assistant to the superintendent. In this position he conducted agronomic research with cereals, forages and root crops. The basic research work on club root resistance was done at this time. He was also involved in the early work on Brown Hart Disease in turnips and established the role boron played in this nutritional disorder.

In 1937 he moved to Truro as provincial agronomist and Professor at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College. In 1946, he was appointed Principal and continued in that role for eighteen years until his retirement in 1964.

In the first summer when he was Principal, a fire destroyed the Science Building at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College. He was faced with the challenge of guiding the College through the years fondly recalled by Dr. Cox as "the Debert Interlude". He negotiated the temporary move of the teaching programs to the military hospital facilities in Debert. In these difficult circumstances he coped with increased numbers of students, many of whom were returning war veterans, with the maturity and freedom of expression enhanced by the wartime experience. The College operated in the Debert setting for seven years.

Ken Cox became highly respected by the staff and students, particularly because of his understanding of each student's situation. He was considerate, fair and firm in all of his dealings. The students and staff knew where Ken Cox stood on all issues. They trusted him. He always honoured every commitment. He knew all of the students on a first name basis, and continued

[The following remarks were presented to know their names, and he showed an interest in their achievement throughout the rest of his life. At the same time he maintained and extended rigorous demands for scholarship and academic performance. We still continue the process of faculty reviews of all students at the end of each term.

He lead the planning arrangements for the rebuilding of the Science Building, engineering and the first residence facility on the Bible Hill campus. Through his efforts the basic foundation for the modern Nova Scotia Agricultural College was established and permitted the Principals who followed to build on that foundation the excellent facilities and high quality education for which NSAC is known.

As a tribute to their Principal at the time of his retirement the class of '64 established the Dr. Kenneth Cox Scholarship. In that same year McGill University honoured Ken Cox with an Honourary Doctor of Laws in recognition for his contributions to agricultural education in and beyond the Atlantic Region. In 1968 NSAC named the new voc-tech building - "The Cox Institute of Agricultural Technology" in his honour. The Nova Scotia Agricultural College Alumni has honoured him as an Outstanding Alumnus. He was made an honourary member and fellow of the Agricultural Institute of Canada and an honourary life member of the Canadian Seed Growers

He provided leadership and wise counsel in his church, St. Andrews United, through various boards and committees and as an elder. He was made an honourary elder in his senior years.

I had the good fortune to have been a student at NSAC when Dr. Cox was Principal and to have had the benefit of the new science building and lived in residence the year it was opened. As one of my electives I chose his course in Genetics. This was my very first course in the subject in which I became so interested that I eventually completed a Ph.D. in Genetics.

Like me there are a large number of people who have been helped by Dr. Cox. He will be remembered by his family and friends as a researcher, an agronomist, a teacher, an administrator, a leader, a respected Principal, a conversationalist with whit and interesting insights, and most of all, as a trusted friend.

New Memberships
