SIR ROBERT HOLLAND, of Victoria, B. C., has contributed to *The Dalhousie Review* on several occasions. He spent thirty years in India as a member of the Indian Civil Service and three years in Siam as Judicial Adviser to the Siamese Government. He has travelled extensively and, as an observer of the international scene, has been heard frequently in C.B.C. broadcasts.

JACK WILCOX, of Toronto, studied Arts at Dalhousie and Journalism at the University of King's College. Formerly a reporter in Halifax, he is now a public relations executive and finds time, as well, to contribute to national magazines and to the Talks Department of the C.B.C.

DOROTHY VINTER, wife of a Bristol doctor, was educated at the University of Oxford (1914-17) and taught English in London and in St. Lucia, B. W. I. She writes occasional newspaper articles lectures for the Workers' Educational Association, and has given some short broadcasts on British history for the B.B.C.

PAUL WEST, who plans to live in Canada rather than England, has had verse published in *quarto*, *World Review*, *Mermaid*, and *Poetry from Oxford*, and broadcast by the B.B.C. He is a member of a group known as The Fantasy Poets.

M. W. BURKE-GAFFNEY, S.J., of Halifax, is Professor of Applied Mathematics at Saint Mary's University. Father Burke-Gaffney is a membre correspondant de l'Academie Internationale d'Histoire des Sciences and holds the following degrees: B.E. (civil) National University of Ireland, Ph.D. (astronomy) Georgetown, D.Eng. (honoris causa) Nova Scotia Technical College.

J. MURRAY BECK, of Kingston, Ont., since 1951 has been Assistant Professor of Politics at the Royal Military College. He has done extensive research in the constitutional history and government of Nova Scotia.

A. J. WM. MYERS, is from Prince Edward Island. He attended Prince of Wales College and Dalhousie University, Pine Hill, and Columbia, where he received his Ph.D. He was minister in Black River, N. B., Educational Secretary of Religious Education and then Professor of Religious Education in the Hartford Seminary Foundation until 1943. He then served as minister in Belleville, Ont., for a few years before settling in Toronto. He has published about two dozen books in Canada, Britain, and the United States.

C. FRIEDLANDER, of Lusaka, is an internationally famous petrologist and mineralogist. A native of Switzerland, he was educated in Zurich under the late Professor Niggli. His father operated a private research institute in Naples for the study of volcanoes. In recent years he has been Chief Geologist for Chartered Explorations Limited in Northern Rhodesia.

PETER MILLER, of Toronto, is a banker who has long had a taste for reading but who began writing only eight months ago. He has written original poetry and has done translations from Lorea,

Apollinaire, and Leopardi. His work has appeared in *Canadian Poetry* and *Quicksilver* and some of his poems have been accepted for publication by several other journals in Canada and the United States.

N. L. BURNETTE, D.Sc., has written extensively concerning the psycho-physical factors in accident causation. "As a rest from this totally unrewarding task," he reports, "Dr. Burnette has found solace in writing about the pioneers of Upper Canada. The Burnettes live in Brighton, Ont. When it gets cold they fly south to Florida with the other geese and winter in DeLand."

F. FRASER BOND, of New York, is a Haligonian by birth and a Canadian citizen. Although he started his writing career on *The Toronto Star* he has spent most of his professional life in the United States on the editorial staff of *The New York Times* and as Professor of Journalism at Columbia University and, at the present time, at New York University. He is the author of several books and numerous articles and stories in general and scholarly periodicals. His latest book, "An Introduction to Journalism," now forms a basic text in more than sixty schools and departments of journalism. He was awarded an honorary doctorate by Mount Allison University in 1934. He is a brother of Dr. R. Bond Nichols of the Dalhousie Faculty.

MARTIN S. DWORKIN, New York City, is a writer and photographer who has published critical articles, poetry, and fiction in many countries. He has served in the U. S. State Department as editor of *Amerika Illustrated* and in the Motion Picture Service of the U. S. Information Agency. This spring he resumes an association with Teachers College, Columbia University, teaching a course in the history of education.

TREVOR N. S. LENNAM, of Saint John, teaches English and Physics in the Saint John High School. He is an Arts graduate from the University of Leeds and has written articles and verse for reviews in England and Canada. He is Director of the Phoenix Players in Saint John and a former infantryman of World War II.

MYRTLE REYNOLDS ADAMS, of London, Ont., has published poetry, articles, and "a little fiction." Her poetry has appeared in *Canadian Forum*, *Saturday Night*, *Georgia Review*, *Atlantic Monthly*, *New York Herald Tribune*, *Washington Post*, *Christian Science Monitor*, *Good Housekeeping*, *Saturday Evening Post*, *Fiddlehead*, and other publications. Last year, Ryerson Press published her chapbook, "Remember Together."
