4. AUL Discussion Follow up

The deadline for the AUL postings is Friday, May 19. Discussion of the postings will take place at the June Library Council meeting hopefully, before the interview process begins. It is hoped Donna Bourne-Tyson can be present at the June Library Council meeting to answer any questions Council may have on this topic. There has been some concern that Library Councils feedback is not going into the discussions about the reporting structure and members want clarity on how librarians are put on the AUL Areas of Responsibility & Team Leaders list and the impact this will have moving the libraries forward.

5. SIFT Report

The SIFT Report was sent to Library Council ahead of today's meeting. Marlo MacKay and Linda Bedwell presented the highlights of this report.

- This is a revamp version of the Student Advisory Group.
- Last summer, the members of the library team, met.
- Linda became co-chair because of her role as the Assessment Librarian.
- Students as well as others were invited to join the team or to attend the open meetings that were scheduled on each campus to talk about library related issues over pizza and soft drinks.
- Meetings were broadly organized so conversations were around spaces, collections and services.
- The meetings were recorded and transcribed and results were grouped into common themes about spaces from all locations as well as specific spaces in each location.
- The summary of the 5 sessions is included in the Report, keeping in mind that the findings are not to the level of Assessment or Research, just feedback from drop-ins.
 - oInteresting findings which allowed the group to make several recommendations which fall under both assessment and communications but under other areas as well.
 - oThe Senior Leadership Team talked about the recommendations and identified the areas they can move forward with.
 - oThe general recommendations are: reviewing the website and the policy regarding study room bookings and making it consistent across all learning commons, study room sizes, and to be open 24/7. Linda is suggesting one location be 24/7 to start.
 - OUser friendly updates: printer interface, quick guide to document delivery.
 - o Promote the walk-in and by appointment Research Assistance service.
 - o Consider online textbook purchases and support open textbook initiatives.
 - Some assessment suggestions was to have a space study at Killam and Circulation stats for Kellogg.
 - Received feedback from students to say that students get departmental updates and would like to get similar updates about the libraries eg. night owls.
 - o The SIFT will continue next year but hope to have an online component.

6. Follow up on Senate Discussion

Donna and Robin Parker are the only formal linkage we have with Senate. Can we have an informal linkage to Senate? It was felt it was best to wait for clarification from Donna or Robin. It was suggested that it might be beneficial to evaluate the various committees and identify those committees that would benefit from having a library member on it. It was noted, Joyline has just been assessed for a Senate Committee she was recommended to.

7. Follow up on Amendments to ToR re: Committees (from March Library Council)

Mark put forward a draft of the Terms of Reference for the Library Council Committees for Library Council members to consider. There is nothing saying in the Terms of Reference that annual reports from the Committees of Library Council need to be into the Secretary by a certain date. It was suggested to add May or June to these Terms of Reference.

8. Preservation Committee

Background:

This item was brought to a previous Library Council Meeting. Since then, feedback has been received from a number of people. The template for the Preservation Committee Terms of Reference is similar to Library Council Terms of Reference. There have been questions around the membership and this draft is open for discussion. The reason this committee was established was because of a concern across the system. If we do get to implement a digital preservation system there will be a lot of talk about preservation planning and policies around preservation and it makes sense to incorporate analog material into that conversation. Creighton Barrett is thinking about library collections, special collections, archive collections, multimedia material as the types of materials being considered.

Motion: To create the Preservation Committee as a Committee of Library Council M. Vail/J. Makani

The vote will be tabled for this motion to the next meeting until some of the membership are in attendance. It was suggested to look at the Terms of Reference ahead of the June meeting and if there is any suggestions on edits, please send them to Creighton.

9. Senior Management Reports

Truth and Reconciliation Hub Room

Go to NCTR.ca to find out more about this room. It was noted, this space is a dedicated space for people to come and use this space. Discussions are ongoing with the details. It's Choi's old office. It is for researchers and the global community who have been victims/survivors to come and use the NCTR documentation in that space. It is digital at this point but there is long term plans to collect more stories and local documents but it was noted, we are not close at this point. The timeline is to be open on Treaty Day which is October 1. It was noted, discussions have been had with the Indigenous Committee.

Chuck Humphrey's visit is June 5 & 6. The visit will consist of a number of meetings, presentations and engagements. Anyone interested in Portage and Research Data Management initiatives in the Canadian library system should be in attendance.

DataVerse North Initiatives Committee

Erin MacPherson is on the DataVerse North Initiatives Committee. The first meeting was held on May 17. The committee is looking at the different repositories that are being offered across Canada. Currently Dalhousie is in the testing phase. Some other provinces have their own hubs. DataVerse North is looking at different models that we can be providing eg. Scholars Portal and UBC are doing a service model. One university will host it but other universities can use it. The group is also looking at best practices and training plus getting started on the technical expertise. Another meeting will take place May 31. The DataVerse North Conference will be attended by Jason Flynn and Erin in Cambridge Mass, USA. Another initiative is FDRD. This initiative would link other databases together. These groups want to share resources and expertise because this is an emerging service.

AUL Resources & Discovery

- 1. The Novanet Discovery Operations Group (DOG) will meet May 16 to discuss specific plans for implementing the new Primo interface. The Novanet Board has unanimously approved the proposed interface, which will be soft launched at an upcoming Novanet Day more details to come about this Novanet Day. The DOG still needs to set an exact date for implementation of the new Primo interface, sometime this summer.
- 2. Ex Libris is launching a new SFX A-Z journal list layout in June. Because of this change, our internal SFX Menu Group will hold off on any more meetings until this new layout is available and we can determine any implications for the SFX Menu.
- 3. Killam cataloguing staff Paul D, Mollie T, and Andrew W have completed the cataloguing of Video Difference DVDs. Eight boxes of DVDs have been shipped to the Halifax Public Library. Thank you Paul, Mollie, Andrew and Alice and Heather!
- 4. Heather M attended a meeting in Calgary, with attendees from other mid-sized schools (Calgary, Dalhousie, Montreal, Ottawa, Queens, Western) to discuss approaches to unbundling Big Deals during the upcoming CRKN renewal cycle.
- 5. Heather is Novanet's GreenGlass expert. She has been visiting with librarians from Novanet libraries talking with them about how to use GreenGlass for collections management.

Sexton Library

- 1. Sexton staff have received training from Jake M. in Security on how to effectively use the three distress buttons installed at the Service Desk.
- 2. We said farewell to Carolene Robertson with a small retirement party in the Sexton Library, April 26, celebrating Carolene's 30 years with the Library.

- Last week's global malware attack passed us by. The exploit attacked vulnerable Windows XP machines. When Microsoft announced the end of life for XP support a few years ago, we began work on decommissioning any remaining machines within the libraries either through upgrades or replacements. Those preventative efforts have paid off but threats are escalating globally. It is important for all to be vigilant and be wary phishing attempts.
- Video Conference Coordinator position has gone in to HR for .
- We've made an offer for the ATS/GIS developer position, more details to follow as things unfold.
- We are decommissioning Techsmith Relay, a message has gone out to users. This was the previous video recording solution in place before Panopto.
- I have been getting plugged into update meetings with Facilities to support classroom technologies.
- We have set up an instance of Crestron Fusion which is the tool that will help us remotely monitor equipment in classrooms. There's a lot of work left to come setting rooms up within the system but the core piece of infrastructure to support the effort is now operational.
- Martin Chandler a student in the University of Toronto's Master of Information program has been doing his practicum with us since the start of May on developing the concept for a database to keep track of software used across campus. This is supporting broad Academic IT initiatives. His 105 hours will wrap up this Friday.
- Jessica Irving has joined the team for the summer as a coop student. She will be doing some development work to support the records management initiative.
- There is work taking place to renew staff machines. This work normally takes place earlier in the spring but ordering problems caused a delay.

- 2) Young Canada Works Grant Application: Has been submitted still no word back. Is we do now hear soon we will post the position and indicate it is *contingent upon* YCW grant funding.
- 3) Art in the Kellogg Spaces: A selection of art works from the Dalhousie Art Gallery were hung in both Kellogg spaces in Tupper and CHEB. Thanks to Michele Gallant from the Dal Art Gallery for all her assistance with this.
- 4) **Kellogg 50th Anniversary:** First planning meeting takes place on 17th May. The expected date of the event will be scheduled around Homecoming week in October at the suggestion of Lori Ward in Advancement.
- 5) Assessment of both Kellogg Spaces: The analysis and report writing is well under way. Some additional assessments around the user perceptions of the compact shelving and of the Kellogg Library After Hours Service are currently underway.
- 6) After Hours Card Access for Students in Health Disciplines Pilot of a new service:

 This pilot has launched and over 50 student registered in the early weeks. So far the assessment responses mentioned above indicate that student like the service very much but would like to have access earlier in the morning on Saturday and Sunday when the space if not open until Noon.
- 7) Realigning Reference Service Procedures: Following a term in our new spaces it we are making adjustments in our delivery model based on our experience so far. We will be returning to the on-call model using iPads and the iPhone and will evaluate how that works in our new environments.
- 8) **Adjusting staffing at CHEB:** After 5 months in our new spaces we are reviewing the staffing balance between the two service points and are making some adjustments that allow for better utilization of staff time.
- 9) **New Committee:** A library representative has been added to the Undergraduate Medical Education Curriculum Committee (UMECC)
- 10) **Conferences:** Lucy Kiester and Melissa Helwig will be at CHLA this month. Ann Barrett, Jan Pelley, Courtney Boudreau and Gail Fraser will be at APLA. Robin Parker will be at MLA.
- 11) Attended: Education Advisory Board Presentation on Strategic Planning (2 parts)

AUL Team

This month we welcomed Michelle Paon to the team. In her role as Subject Liaison champion she fits into many of the activities of our team particularly instruction and information literacy. Our next meeting is scheduled for June 9th.

ADAC: At the most recent ADAC meeting we heard a presentation from Arig al Shaibah, Chair of the SEM Steering Committee on the Planning Framework for Strategic Enrollment Management. The framework has been developed in response to Priority 1.2 – Student Recruitment. The framework covers all aspects of student success from recruitment to retention. Key elements are: goals for the number and type of students, promoting academic success, financial and resources planning, data analysis, and student-centred services among others. The ultimate goal is to achieve the optimum level of enrollment, the desired student profile and the desired academic profile.

Dunn Law Library

We have now launched our search for a permanent reference/instruction librarian. Our hope is to have someone in place for September. David Michels is the Chair of the Search Committee.

We have started our summer weeding and shelf-reading project. This year we are targeting certain areas and are also shifting materials as we go.

David Michels, Hannah Steeves, and I attended the Canadian Association of Law Libraries conference earlier this month. Both David and Hannah presented at the conference. We were pleased to have Professor Naoimi Metallic, Assistant Professor at the Law School and Chancellor's Chair in Aboriginal Law and Policy, speak about librarians' role in advancing Truth and Reconciliation Report recommendations. Also at the conference I became Chair of the Canadian Council of Academic Law Library Directors.
