INTRODUCTION.

By the Royal Charter granted in 1802, all the privileges of a University were conferred on King's College, which thus became the first University of British origin established in the Dominion.

A Provincial Act incorporating the Governors of King's College received the royal sanction in 1853. It provides that the Royal Charter of Incorporation shall not be affected by it further than is necessary to give effect to its own enactments.

The Patron of the University is the Archbishop of Canterbury, to whose approval "all Statutes, Rules and Ordinances" of the Board of Governors are subject, but King's College is open to students of all denominations, and imposes no religious test either on entrance or on graduation in any Faculty, with the exception of Divinity.

In 1871 a Curriculum was issued for a course of Civil Engineering, and the University has subsequently granted degrees and diplomas in that science, as well as in Arts, Law and Divinity.

During the past Academic Year most valuable donations have been made to the Science Department by A. R. C. Selwyn, Esq. L. L. D., F. R. S., Director-General of the Dominion Geological Survey, and by Professor S. F. Baird, L. L. D., Secretary of the Smithsonian Institute at Washington, U. S.; a detailed account of which will be found on page 51 of the Calendar.

A system of Local Examinations has been instituted for those who are not members of the University.

Candidates for matriculation may now be examined at distant centres, under special regulations, which will be found in the Calendar. The aggregate outlay necessary for the three years' residence and study qualifying for a degree will of course depend much upon the tastes and economy of the student, but may be estimated at about \$300 to \$350 per year. The mere money payment demanded, need never, however, exclude a candidate really prepared to benefit by the course of instruction offered, inasmuch as many benefactors of the University possess the right of nomination. Each nominee is exempt from the payment of yearly fees, amounting to \$180 for the three years' course, besides the fee for a B. A. degree. There being some forty criticates conferring this privilege, it is easy for students to obtain it. If a scholarship is held besides, nearly the whole set of the education will be covered. The Calendar supplies all necessary information with regard to these nominations.

COURSE OF STUDY.

The object aimed at is to secure a good general education for all matriculated students, while every facility is afforded for the prosecution of special studies. Accordingly every matriculated student, except under peculiar circumstances to be approved of by the College Board, is required to attend the Lectures of all the Professors until he has passed his Responsions, which is generally done in the sixth term of residence. After this he is at liberty to select three or more of the subjects lectured on to form the subjects of his B. A. Examination. If the student be desirous of taking Honours at his B. A. Examination he can do so in any one of the subjects lectured on after passing the ordinary Examinations. The precise regulations will be found under the head of Examinations.

Students who do not intend to take the degree of B. A. are permitted to attend the lectures of any of the Professors, subject to all the usual Regulations, and can, moreover, under certain conditions, proceed to Degrees in Science and Engineering.

The schemes of Responsions and B. A. Examination will afford a general idea of the usual Curriculum, which, within certain limits, is varied as circumstances require.

There are three classes of students admissible to the Colleges

- 1.—Matriculated Students in Arts.
- 2.—Matriculated Students in Civil Engineering.
- 3.—Elective Students: who desire to attend during an Academical Year or Term, one, two, or more courses of Lecture.

MATRICULATION IN ARTS.

Every student presenting himself for Matriculation in the School of Arts shall be required to pass an examination in the following subjects:

I-CLASSICS.

THE GREEK AND LATIN LANGUAGES.

One Greek and two Latin books, to be selected and published by the College Board one year in advance. Latin Prose Composition.

Note.—By a "book" shall be meant one division of an author's work. For example, one book of Homer's Odyssey shall mean any one book out of the tweatfour into which the poem is divided.

II-MATHEMATICS.

ARITHMETIC.—The ordinary Rules of Arithmetic: Vulgarand Decimal Fractions.

ALGEBRA.—Addition, Subtraction, Multiplication and Division of Algebraical quantities.

GEOMETRY.—The first two books of Euclid.

III-THE ENGLISH LANGUAGE.

Orthography: Writing from Dictation: The Grammatical Structure of the Language: Outlines of History of England and General Geography.

IV.-THE FRENCH OR THE GERMAN LANGUAGE.

(At the option of the Candidate.)

One passage from some author for translation into English. The College Board to select the work and publish the name one year in advance,

Candidates shall not be approved of by the Examiners unless they pass in three of the above subjects, two of which shall be Classics and Mathematics.

Subjects for 1883-4:-

Homer: Iliad. I, or Xenophon, Anab. 11.

Cicero pro Lege Manilia, and Horace Odes, 1.

Latin Composition:—Arnold's Introduction to Latin Prose, to the end of the Passive Voice; and a translation back again into Latin of a plain English version from the Latin of some easy author.

French:—Charles XII., Book II. First part of Otto's French Grammar.

German:—Adler's Reader, Part I. First part of Otto's German Grammar.

MATRICULATION IN ENGINEERING.

The same as in the School of Arts, with the omission of the Classical Subjects.

ATTENDANCE AT LECTURES.

Attendance at all Lectures, except those which shall be announced as optional, shall be compulsory upon all Undergraduates.

Professors will register, upon the Lectures Attendance List, the presence or absence of students immediately before beginning the exercises of the class: any student entering thereafter will be noted as absent, unless a satisfactory explanation be given to the Professor.

No Student shall be allowed to absent himself from any Lecture, (except by special permission, obtained from the Professor,) nor from the Examinations in any Department in his course. All Students must procure from the Professors certificates of attendance, without which they will not be allowed to proceed to the Examinations held at the end of every term.

OF TERMS AND RESIDENCE.

The Academical year shall begin in October, and shall contain three terms, in which all scholastic exercises shall be performed, and all degrees conferred. Michaelmas Term shall extend from the first Saturday of October to December 22nd; Lent Term from the second Saturday of January to the Saturday before Palm Sunday; Easter Term from the Monday after Easter Monday to the last Thursday in June.

The following days shall be observed as Holidays in the University:—All Saints' Day, Ash-Wednesday, Ascension Day, Whit-Monday, and the Birth-Day of the reigning Sovereign.

In order to encourage school-teachers and others, whose engagements prevent them from attending the full course, and who desire to obtain the Degree of B. A., the following special arrangements will be made:

Any such Student, on making proper application, will be permitted to come into residence during the first week of November in each year, and to remain until the end of the succeeding Lent Term, passing the regular examinations. This will be allowed to count as two Terms. After thus keeping eight Terms, he will be permitted to present himself for the B. A. Examination on any subsequent occasion.

DISCIPLINE.

The resident Students are under the immediate charge of the President and Vice-President.

A Register shall be kept of the attendance of all Students at Lecture and Chapel.

No Student shall be out of College after 9.30 P.M., unless by special permission.

No visitor shall be allowed to remain in College after 930 P.M., unless by permission.

The President and Vice-President are authorized to impose fines or written exercises for infraction of regulations, insubordination or disorderly conduct; matters of a more serious nature shall be referred to the Board of Discipline, which shall meet once a week, or oftener, if required.

Each Professor shall keep a record of the attendance at his Lectures, to be handed in at a weekly meeting of the Board, and duly registered.

The Board of Discipline may deprive any Student of his Term for negligence of due preparation for Lectures.

In case of sickness a medical certificate must be produced, if required by the Board.

REGULATIONS FOR HOLDING MATRICULATION EXAMINATIONS AT OTHER CENTRES THAN KING'S COLLEGE,

Whereas it is desirable to meet the convenience of candidates for matriculation who reside at a distance from Windsor, it is Resolved that Matriculation Examinations may be held at other centres than King's College, subject to the following conditions:

I—A Committee of not less than five members must be nominated by the Governors of King's College for the purpose of conducting the Matriculation Examinations in the city or town where it is desired that such examinations should be held.

II.—The said Committee must appoint a Secretary to conduct the necessary correspondence with the President of King's College.

III.—The following declaration must be signed by all the members of the Committee:—

"We, the undersigned, having been nominated by the Governors of King's College as a Committee for the purpose of conducting Matriculation Examinations to King's College, N. S., hereby pledge ourselves to conduct such examinations according to the rules laid down by the Board of Governors for that purpose."

IV.—The examination questions shall be forwarded under seal to the secretary of the Committee from King's College, N.S. and shall be opened at the hour appointed for the commencement of the examination, in the room where the examination is to be held.

V.—No candidate shall introduce, for any purpose whatever, any books or papers into the examination room.

VI.—No talking, and no communication whatever, shall be permitted amongst the candidates undergoing the examination

VII.—Candidates shall write their answers on paper provided by the Committee for that purpose.

VIII.—The days for holding the Matriculation Examinations shall be those appointed in the Calendar of King's College.

IX.—On each occasion when it is proposed to hold a Matriculation Examination at a distant centre, notice should be sent by the Secretary of the Committee to the President of King's College, one month before the date of the examination.

X.—Each candidate for Matriculation, at any distant centre, shall pay in advance a fee of five dollars.

XI.—The members of the Committee shall be present throughout each session of the examination, and shall sign the following declaration, which shall be transmitted, with the answers of the candidates, to the President of King's College

"We, the undersigned, having been present during the whole time of the examination, when the accompanying papers were worked, hereby declare that the examination has been in all respects, fairly conducted, and in accordance with the prescribed rules."

EXAMINATIONS AND GRADUATION.

TERMINAL EXAMINATIONS.

Every student will be required to undergo an examination at the end of each term in all the subjects in which he has attended lectures.

Every Undergraduate, previous to presenting himself for any Terminal Examination, will have to obtain from each Professor whose lectures he has attended during the term, a certificate of attendance and good conduct.

No Professor will grant such certificate if more than two absences without leave, during the course of the Term, are recorded against the applicant, or if his conduct shall have been in any way reprehensible.

Such certificate will then be handed in by the Undergraduate to the Vice-President previous to the beginning of the examination, and no Undergraduate shall be allowed to present himself at any Terminal Examination, unless he shall have complied with these regulations.

The list of candidates who shall have passed the Terminal Examination shall be published in the hall after the close of the examination. The names shall be arranged in the order of merit. Any student whose name does not appear in this list shall forfeit his examination.

RESPONSIONS.

Every matriculated student is required to pass a public examination called Responsions, for which he cannot offer himself until he has completed his fourth term, and no term after the sixth can be reckoned until it has been passed. This examination is

held at the beginning of the Easter Term. The subjects are ordinarily as follows:—

- 1. Classics: Two Greek and two Latin Books and Latin Prose Composition. Honour Students in Classics must give also—a period of Greek and of Roman History; one Philosophical Book of Plato or Aristotle, and a Greek Play. Books for 1883: Plato, Sophist; Sophods, Œdipus Tyrannus.
- 2. English Literature: Shakspere, Richard III.; Milton,
 Paradise Lost, Books I., II., III.; Macaulay's Essays,
 Warren Hastings; Trench, Study of Words.
- 3. Divinity: One Gospel, or the Acts of the Apostles.
- 4. Mathematics: Algebra to the end of Quadratic Equations; Logarithms; Euclid, Books I., II., III., IV., VI.; and Definitions of Book V.; Plane Trigonometry.
- 5. Chemistry (Inorganic), and Physics, (Heat, Light, Electricity and Magnetism).
- 6. Modern Languages—any one:

French—The two first books of Charles XII., or an equivalent; the Etymology of the language according to Otto's Grammar; one of Racine's Tragedies.

German—The first part of Adler's Reader or an equivalent; the Etymology of the language according to Otto's Grammar; some of Schiller's Poems.

GRADUATION IN ARTS-B. A. DEGREE.

Undergraduates presenting themselves for examination for this degree, shall be required to produce satisfactory certificates of attendance and conduct during the whole of the three years course. The certificates will have to be signed by the various Professors whose courses of lectures they have attended, and no Undergraduate shall be allowed to present himself at any Degree Examination unless he shall have complied with the above regulations. Or, if they shall not have attended the whole time at King's College, they shall be required to produce similar certificates from the University they have attended.

The Examination shall be carried on mainly by written questions and answers, but the Examiners shall at all times have the power of examining viva voce.

A Public Examination for Degrees shall be held towards the end of Michaelmas and Easter Terms. Students shall not be praitted to offer themselves for this before their ninth term, except those who intend to offer themselves for Honours, who may be examined in the Ordinary Degree subjects in their eventh term, between the Responsions and this Examination. In such case, the student must pass an examination in the known-subjects chosen by him before being admitted to a Degree.

Every candidate for a Degree must be examined on two days in a least three of the subjects on which lectures are delivered by the Professors, of which Classics or Mathematics must be one. The following (or their equivalents) are the subjects of an Ordinary Degree:—

Every candidate for a Degree must give notice, in writing, to the President of the University, of his intention to present timed for examination, such notice to contain a list of subjects present and to be sent not later than 21 days previous to the date published in the Calendar for the holding of Degree Examinations.

L CLASSICS:

GREEK—Three Plays and one Book of Herodotus, or equivalents.

Laux—Horace, Epistles; Cicero, De Oratore; Prose Composition.

A period of Roman and Grecian History; Geography of Ancient Greece and Italy.

IL ENGLISH LITERATURE:

Shispere, Henry VIII., Macbeth; Milton, Comus and Shorter Poems; Macaulay's Essays; Addison and Hallam's Constitutional History; Formal Logic; Composition of an English Essay.

III. DIVINITY:

Four Gospels, Bible History and Liturgy.

IV. MATHEMATICS:

Algebra (including Theory of Equations); Exclid, six Books; Plane and Spherical Trigonometry; Conic Sections; Elementary Mechanics of Solids and Fluids.

V. NATURAL SCIENCE:

Analytical and Practical Chemistry, Geology and Mineralogy.

VI. Modern Languages—any one:

FRENCH—The Forms and Syntax of the language according to Otto's Granze.

The whole of Bué's Formes Idiomatiques Comparées to be correctly af
fluently read and translated. Candidates must be able to translate ordinary English prose into French without serious errors, and show are readiness in conversation, and some knowledge of the principal authors.

GERMAN—The Forms and Syntax according to Otto's Grammar. Reader; some of Schiller's Poems, and one of his Tragedies. Easy too be translated into German, and some readiness in speaking to be about

All candidates for Honours in any branch must first pass the Ordinary Degree examination.

Every candidate for a degree in Honours shall be examined in one or more of the following subjects, at his own choice:

I. CLASSICS:

GREEK—Sophocles, three plays; Thucydides, two books; Aristotle's Rise or Politics; or equivalents.

LATIN—Terence's Andria; Tacitus, six books; Cicero de Officis; or epote lents; Prose and Verse Composition (Lat. & Gr.); Formal Logic.

Instead of Verse-Aristotle's Poetics or Rhetoric.

II. ENGLISH LITERATURE:

Shakspere, four plays exclusive of those previously presented; Spenser, Feed Queene, Books I., II., III.; Pope, Essay on Man, Moral Essays; Basil Essays; Smith's Student's English Language; History of English Language; Whately's Logic; Whately's Rhetoric; Composition of an English Essay.

III. DIVINITY:

Hebrew and Greek Scriptures; Evidences; Ecclesiastical History; Systems Divinity; Church Polity and Liturgies.

IV. MATHEMATICS AND MATHEMATICAL PHYSICS:

Algebra; Euclid; Trigonometry; Dif. and Int. Calculus; Conic Section Mechanics; Optics; Acoustics; Heat; Electricity; Astronomy & Engineering.

V. NATURAL SCIENCE:

Inorganic Chemistry in detail; Analytical Chemistry and Assaying; General Geology, including both Lithology and Paleontology; and one of the following subjects:—Practical and Determinative Mineralogy; Organic Chemistry or Botany. The scientific confections of the Museum are available for study, and these are supplemented, when necessary, by the Professor's collection. Excursions for field work will be made when practicable.

VI Modern Languages-any two.

Candidates must show a good knowledge of the forms and syntax of both French and German. In French they must be able to read and translate the whole of Bué's Formes Idiomatiques, and one of Molière's Comedies, correctly and fluently, and to read and translate any French prose whatever, without much bestation, Any ordinary English prose is to be correctly translated into French, and facility must be shown in conversation. In German, the whole of Adler, or an equivalent, most of Schiller's Poems and one of his Dramas, must have been read. The rest like French.

An Examination fee of One Dollar shall be paid by each condidate to meet the expenses of stationery,—for the examinations through the year,—which shall be provided by the University.

Elective Students may also obtain Pass Certificates, Honour Certificates, and Diplomas, in lieu of Degrees, which shall talk them to the rank of Associate of Arts.

GRADUATION IN SCIENCE AND ENGINEERING .- B. E. DEGREE

Undergraduates presenting themselves for examination for the Degree of B. E. shall be required to have been duly matriculated; to have subsequently studied in King's College the course herein prescribed; and to have passed the (University) First Engineering Examination.

The course for Degrees in Civil or Mining Engineering shall usually extend over three years, and shall comprise attendance on the following Curriculum:

FIRST YEAR

Mathematics (1st course).

Chemistry.

Experimental Physics.

A Modern (European) Continental Language.

Geometrical Drawing (and Geological Drawing.*

Office Work.

Mineral Surveying.*

SECOND YEAR.

Mathematics (2nd course.)
Mathematical Physics.
Mineralogy and Geology.
Analytical Chemistry and Assaying.*

Civil Engineering.
Office Work.
Field Work.

THIRD YEAR.

Natural Philosophy (aplied). Civil Engineering (or Mining.*) Office Work. Field Work. Geology, Mineralogy, (and Blowpinia) Practical Chemistry, (and Metallury,) Engineering Excursions.

Attendance on these Lectures shall, in all cases, include passing such examinations as may be appointed by the College Board.

Candidates shall, on the recommendation of the College Board, be admitted to the Degree after two years' residence instead of three, if their previous acquaintance with a sufficient group of the subjects set down for study in the 1st and 2nd years be deemed satisfactory by the Board; and candidates shall, for special reasons, to be approved by the Board, be admitted to the Degree after one year's residence, instead of three.

In such cases the Certificate of the Board will be accepted in lieu of attendance upon these classes, but will not exempt candidates from the University E. amination in them.

Students who have completed their second year must present themselves at the (University) First Engineering Examination before rising to the third year; but students prevented by illness, and candidates who, having studied with diligence attisfactory to the Professors, shall fail to pass, will be admitted by the Board to a Supplementary Examination, and if this be creditably passed, the Terms kept in the meantime may be allowed. The (University) First Engineering Examination shall include:—

1.—English Literature, as for Responsions.

2.—Mathematics, -- First and Second Courses.

3.—Experimental Physics.

4.—Mensuration, Levelling and Mapping.

5.-A Modern (European) Continental Language.

The First Course in Mathematics shall include:—Euclid, Books I., II., III., IV., VI., and XI., and Definitions of Book V.; Anthmetic; Algebra, including the usual rules, to the end of Quadratics; Proportion; "Binomial Theorem," for positive integral exponents; Geometrical and Arithmetical Progressions; and nature and use of Logarithms. Plane Trigonometry to the end of solution of Triangles.

The Second Course in Mathematics shall include:—Algebra, with the "Theory of Equations;" Plane and Spherical Trigonometry; Analytical Geometry as far as the "Equation of the Second Degree;" Conic Sections; Differential and Integral Calculus.

Experimental Physics shall be represented by the Professor's Lettures to the Arts Students, and part of Deschanel's or Ganot's Physics.

The Second, or Final, Engineering Examination, entitling the candidate to the B. E. Degree, shall embrace the following adjects:—

Engineering.
Mensuration.
Levelling and Mapping.
Mathematical Physics.

Natural Philosophy (applied). Chemistry. Geology. Mineralogy.

^{*}For Mining Students only.

Each candidate will be required to produce at this Examination the Field Notes and Drawings of a Survey made by him

The course in Mathematical Science will be represented by such books as Newth's Mechanics, Todhunter's Mechanics for Beginners, Galbraith & Haughton's Hydrostatics, Optics and Astronomy.

The course in Natural Philosophy applied will be represented by:—Twisden's Practical Mechanics, Elements of Thermo-Dynamics, and parts of Deschanel's or Ganot's Physics, Galbraith & Haughton's Steam Engine.

The course of Chemistry by:—Experimental Physics (Deschanel's or Ganot's), Inorganic Chemistry (Wilsons), Practical Chemistry, Qualitative Analysis (Fresenius).

Mineralogy (Dana's Manual).

Geology (Dana's Text Book).

In the course for Mining Engineering, instruction will be given in Geological Drawing and Mineral Surveying, in addition to the work required for Students in Civil Engineering in the first year. In the second year there will be Analytical Chemistry and Assaying besides the Civil Engineering course. In the third year there will be courses of Lectures on Mining and Mining Machinery, Practical Mechanics, Geology and Mineralogy (with Blowpiping), Practical Chemistry and Metallurgy.

Among the subjects of Mining in which the Students will be instructed, are Blasting and use of Explosives; Quarrying and Hydraulic Mining; Boring, Sinking, Timbering and Tubbing of Shafts; Driving and Timbering of Levels.; Underground Conveyance and Hoisting; Drainage and Pumping; Lighting and Ventilation of Mines; Methods of Exploitation employed in working Coal Seams and Metalliferous Deposits, &c. The course in Geology and Mineralogy will be the same as for Honours in the B. A. Degree.

Text Books and Books of Reference required, besides those included in the list required in the Honour Arts course in Natural Science:—

Warington Smith's Coal and Coal Mining.

Each candidate must forward to the President on or before the 1st of June notice of his intention to offer himself as a candidate, and before entering on either of the two University Examinations must produce official proofs of having complied with the above-named regulations.

Successful candidates will be arranged in three classes.

The Fee for the Degree in Civil or Mining Engineering will be \$12.00. It must be lodged with the Bursar before the Examination begins.

OF EXAMINERS.

- 1.—The Examiners to conduct the Degree Examinations, and the Prize Examinations in each year shall be appointed by the Governors at their October meeting of the previous Academical year.
- 2.—These Examiners shall sign the Declaration, No. 4, in the Appendix to the present code of Statutes.
- 3.—The Examinations shall be conducted by means of printed or written papers, and shall take place at such a time as shall permit of the results being made known at the Encænia of that year.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING DEGREES IN DIVINITY.

1.—Candidates for the Degree of Bachelor in Divinity, other than those Masters of Arts who are of the standing required by the former Statutes, must be in Priest's Orders of not less than ten years' standing. 2.—They must produce certificates of having matriculated in some University established by Royal Charter, or specially recognized by the Board of Governors, or in lieu thereof diplomas from some recognized Theological College.

3.—Only those successful candidates for the Degree of Bachelor in Divinity, who have graduated in Arts, will be allowed to present themselves under these regulations, for the further examination for the Degree of Doctor in Divinity.

4.—The examinations in Divinity will embrace the following subjects:—The Holy Scriptures (Hebrew and Greek), the Composition of a Latin Essay, the Evidences of Christianity, Church History, Ecclesiastical Polity, and Liturgiology.

5.—The examination will be conducted in King's College in Easter Term, by a Board of Examiners, nominated by the Visitor and the President.

6.—The fee of \$5.00 is to be paid to the Bursar of the College before the commencement of the examination.

7.—Applications for admission to the examination must be lodged with the President on or before May 1st.

REGULATIONS FOR LOCAL EXAMINATIONS.

It is proposed to hold local examinations for candidates, male and female, who are not members of the University, in Windsor and other places where it may be requested and found expedient

Every candidate who passes will receive a certificate specifying the subjects in which he or she has satisfied the examiner.

Local Committees wishing to have examinations held in their several districts may obtain all necessary information from the President of Kings College, Windsor, N. S.

All such applications must be lodged with the President on or before March 1st.

REGULATIONS FOR JUNIOR CANDIDATES.

Every candidate will be required to pay a fee of \$2.00 to the Secretary of the Examining Committee.

I All candidates will be required to satisfy the Examiners

(a) Reading aloud a passage from some English author.

(b) Writing from dictation.

(c) Analysis and parsing of a passage from some specified English poem.

(d) Writing a short Essay.

II. Arithmetic—first four rules. Simple, and Vulgar and Decimal Fractions and Proportion.

III. Geography—General Geography, as in Calkin's School Geography, (large edition.)

IV. Outline of English and Canadian History,

V. Bible History.—One Book of the Old Testament and one of the Four Gospels.

VI Of the following subjects, one only is obligatory upon the candidates:—

(1) Latin.—One Book of Virgil and one Book of Cæsar. Latin exercises, as in Principia Latina, Part I., or Henry's First Book.

(2) Greek.—One Book of Xenophon, with the History and Geography involved in the book. Male candidates to give in also one book of Homer.

(3) French.—A passage will be set from Paul et Virginie for translation into English. Also another passage from some tay French author. Translation of easy English sentences into French.

(4) German.—Adler's Reader, Part I. Translating easy English sentences into German.

(5) Mathematics.—Arithmetic; Euclid, Books I., II., III.; Algebra, to simple Equations, inclusive.

Successful candidates will be arranged in three classes according to merit. The schools in which they were taught will be stated.

REGULATIONS FOR SENIOR CANDIDATES' EXAMINATION FOR THE TITLE OF ASSOCIATE IN ARTS, OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KING'S COLLEGE, N. S.

Every candidate will be required to pay a fee of \$4.00 to the Secretary of the Examining Committee.

All candidates who have not obtained Junior certificates will be required to pass the obligatory subjects of the Junior examination.

Every candidate will also be required to satisfy the examiners in two at least of the following sections, of which one shall be A or B:—

- A. English.
- (1) English History during the Tudor period.
- (2) English Language and Literature—Sketch of history of English Literature during the Tudor period.
 - (3) Shakspere's Julius Cæsar.
 - (4) Milton's Paradise Lost, Books I. and II.
 - (5) Gray's Odes.
- (6) Selected Essays from the Spectator, or Macaulay's Essay on Addison.
- B. Languages.—To pass in this section, the candidates must satisfy the examiners in one of the following languages:

Latin.—One book of Cæsar, one book of Virgil, one book of Odes of Horace; Writing—first half of Smith's Principia Latina, Part V., or Arnold's Latin Prose to the end of the Passive Voice.

The Williams Prize in Mineralogy applied to Mining.—The preparation for scheenpetition shall be, in addition to a brief sketch of Geology, a study of the grand principles of Mining, and of specimens of metals and minerals, particularly the atural products of the British North American Provinces, such as ores of gold, open, iron and other metals; coal, antimony, gypsum, manganese and other useful metals. The candidates shall be required to produce satisfactory certificates of attackance and attention at Lectures on Chemical Physics and Inorganic Chemistry other in the College or elsewhere, in addition to the like satisfactory certificates of tradace at the special Lectures by the Professor.

II. REGULATIONS.

(1) These Scholarships shall be competed for in the month of October, and shall be open to all matriculated students in their second year of residence.

(4) No Scholarship shall be awarded to any candidate who shall not have make at the examination 50 per cent, in two Departments. For the purpose of this examination the subjects indicated by asterisks shall be taken to be Departments.

(5) In arriving at a decision on the merits of the candidates the following shall be assigned as full marks in the various subjects named; but no subject shall count in which less than 25 per cent. shall have been obtained; and subjects limited to the making up 800 marks.

THE McCAWLEY SCHOLARSHIP.

This Scholarship is given out of the interest of a fund raised by subscription for a Testimonial to the Rev. G. McCawley, D. D., on his retirement from the office of President.

(2) The examination shall be conducted by the Reverend the President, assistably such other person as he shall appoint for the time being, either within or without the University, as assessor.

(3) The examination shall be confined principally to such classical works at the President shall have appointed at the beginning of the Michaelmas Term precise, and shall include the translation, grammatical construction and relation to the count of the passages selected, together with such critical and taste papers in process were as may be set at the examination.

(4) The examination shall be subject, in respect of the number of marks required to the general regulations of the University with reference to prizes and scholarships.

THE AKINS HISTORICAL PRIZE.

T. B. Akins, Esq., D. C. L., Barrister-at-Law, and Commissioner of Public Receis, has vested in the Governors, as Trustees, a sum of money sufficient to found Prize of Thirty Dollars, annually, for the best Paper or Essay on the County History of Nova Scotia, embracing matters derived from all local records, and traditions relating to the early and progressive history of each County. The Essays must be given in to the Essays of the Governors on or before the 1st June, 1884. The decision on the perits of the Essays to rest with the Governors, or such persons as they may appoint, and to be announced at the Encaenia.

In case of a joint certificate, the above form must be compiled with, and the same must be signed by all the holders.

Each nominee is exempt from the payment of yearly feat amounting to \$180 for the three years' course, besides the feet a B. A. Degree. If a scholarship is held besides, nearly the whole cost of the education will be recovered.

At the request of the Associated Alumni, nominated Student are required to pay the annual Library Fee of \$5, unless specially exempted on nomination.

CONDITIONS ATTACHED TO THE NOMINATION CERTIFICATES.

- 1. That on death or transfer the certificate is to be delivered up, and a new certificate obtained. Fee \$2.
- 2. That the right of nomination belongs to the executors, administrators, or assigns, of the original holder, and not to the heirs.
- 3. No nomination will be accepted which is not signed by the person or persons in whose name or names the certificate is registered.

^{*}The words "except Library Fee," may be omitted, at the option of the Nominer.

The University Library.

The foundation of the Library is due to the efforts of the first Bishop of Nova Scotia, and may be placed in the year 1780 Several contributions in money had previously been received but it was not till that year that efforts were made to obtain books.

The original fund at the disposal of the Governors was not more than £250 sterling, and was intrusted to Mr. John Inglis (afterwards Bishop), son of the Bishop, and a graduate of the University, who repaired to England in 1800, for the purpose of purchasing books. The names of Dr. Moore, Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr. Porteous, Bishop of Rochester, Wm. Wilbertons, Sir S. Bernard Morland, John Eardley-Wilmot, M. P., and others, thus became connected with the early history of the Library.

Munificent gifts from the University of Oxford continued to increase the value of the collection, which was further enriched by gifts from various English gentlemen, and from others settled in Nova Scotia.

The room in the College building set apart for many year for a Library Hall, was completed in 1810 at the expense of Sr Thomas Strange and the Archbishop of Canterbury.

Subsequently valuable works were presented by Drs. Bayard and McCulloch, and by the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge.

Among later benefactors may be mentioned Dr. Greswell, of Worcester College, Oxford; The Smithsonian Institute; The British and Foreign Bible Society; The Dean and Chapter of Westminster; T. B. Akins, Esq., D. C. L.; The Society of Incorporated Alumni of King's College; E. Binney, Esq.; Cogswell, Esq., M. D.; The Dominion Government; The Secretary of the Interior, United States; The Institution of Civil Engineers; the Society of Engineers; the Royal Society; The

Rev. G. McCawley, D. D.; The Rev. Canon Hensley, D. D.; General Sir W. F. Williams, K. C. B.; the present Bishop of Nova Scotia; and Her Majesty the Queen.

This large collection of books, now numbering about 7000 volumes, contained till the year 1870 in a single room in the College building, was then removed to the new Hall specially built for the purpose and presented to the University by the Incorporated Alumni. It contains a large number of standard works of reference in Theology, which is by far the richest department in the Library, and a fair selection of the great Greek and Latin classics.

In Modern History and Belles-Letters it is very poorly

In Science some recent standard works have from time to time been added, and, next to Theology and Classics, this is the largest department. The languages of Modern Europe are not well represented.

In spite of many blanks, the Library is one of the largest in the Province, and contains all the elements requisite for making its thoroughly well appointed and efficient Reference Library.

There is no special Library fund except the fee from students, and the collection can only be increased by grants of money from the Governors, the occasional lapsing of the General Williams and Welsford prize moneys, and the benefactions of friends of the University.

The Museum.

NATURAL HISTORY.

GEOLOGY AND MINERALOGY.

The Geological Specimens, many of which are very fine, illustrate the most prominent features of general Geology, but the majority have been collected in Nova Scotia and are especially adapted to show the characters of the Fossil Flora and Fauna of the Province. There are several collections, which may be discriminated as follows:—

- 1. The W. B. Almon Collection, presented over forty years ago by Mrs. W. B. Almon, of Halifax, contains, with many minerals and a few shells, a considerable number of rock specimens and a few fossils, chiefly from Scotland, collected by the late W. B. Almon, M. D.
- 2. The Governors' Collection consists of coal fossils obtained in 1860, at the expense of the Governors of the College; these were collected by Professor How with the valuable assistance of a party headed by Richard Brown, Sr., Esq., then agent at the Sydney Mines, who from long study was familiar with the district. Many of the specimens are exceedingly fine, and some are of large size.
- 3. The Alumni Collection consists of Silurian and Devoisa Fossils, chiefly from Arisaig, N. S., collected, named and arranged stratigraphically by Dr. Honeyman; purchased and presented in 1861 by the Alumni of King's College.
- 4. The Australian Collection consists of specimens obtained through Col. Nelson, in 1863, from Sir William Denison, then Governor of New South Wales, in exchange for Nova Scotian specimens from the College Cabinet, sent by Professor How. It contains some beautiful fossils, and is arranged stratigraphically.

its value is increased by an accompanying large detailed colored section made by the Government Examiner of Coal Fields under instructions from Sir W. Denison.

- 5. A collection of British Fossils, chiefly Silurian and Devonian, obtained through Dr. McCawley in exchange for Nova Scotian specimens sent by Professor How from the College Cabinet, in 1860, to Captain, now Sir James Anderson.
- 6. A collection from Europe, illustrating chiefly the nature of crystalline and sedimentary rocks, purchased by the Governors.
- 7. Several collections, some of which are unnamed, and ringle specimens, given and obtained by exchange at various times; of these it will suffice to name: Reptilian Tracks of great geological interest, presented by the widow of their discoverer, the late Dr. Harding; valuable Fossils, chiefly carboniferous, presented by H. Poole, Esq.; Silurian Fossils From Arisaig, presented by H. Hill, Esq., Sheriff of Antigonish; Coal Plants from Cumberland County, presented by Rev. Mr. Townshend, Retor of Amherst; Cretaceous Fossils from England, presented by C. B. Bowman, Esq., and Dr. Honeyman; Silurian and Carboniferous Fossils of Nova Scotia from Professor How; Devonian Corals of Ontario and Canadian Rocks from Professor Spencer.

The mineralogical specimens represent the most important species of minerals,—some of them are of great beauty. They consist of those in the Almon Collection, of Zeolites collected at the expense of the Governors, and of various others obtained by gifts and exchange, as mentioned with regard to the geological department. Sir Rupert George; Rev. Dr. Robertson, Rector of Wilmot; H. Brown, Esq., Director of the Geological Survey of Victoria, formerly a distinguished student in science at this College; Rev. Mr. Ambrose; Rev. J. C. Cochran; C. B. Bowman, Esq.; J. Bowman, Esq.; Rev. D. W. Picket; Hon. W. Odell, and Professor How, have presented interesting specimens.

ZOOLOGY.

The Willis Collection consists of specimens fully illustrating
Nova Scotia Mollusca, named, arranged, and presented by J. R.
Willis, Esq.

The department is further illustrated by a collection of foreign shells, some interesting skulls and skins, and a limited number of preserved animals.

BOTANY.

The Cogswell Herbarium, bound in five Imperial foliovolumes, contains a fine systematically arranged collection of Phænogamous and Crytogamous Plants of Great Britain presented by Dr. Cogswell.

The Gossip Herbarium consists of a small number of Scottish Plants, presented by Dr. Gossip.

The Willis Herbarium consists of Nova Scotia Alga and Terrestrial Plants, presented by J. R. Willis, Esq.

The Strange Herbarium consists of a considerable number of East India Plants, presented, in 1805, by Sir T. Strange.

The Ball Herbarium of Nova Scotia, consisting of about 250 species, presented by Rev. E. H. Ball.

There are also a few woods, barks, leaves, and fruits—from various sources—presented by C. B. Bowman, Esq., Hon. W. J. Almon, M. D., and other benefactors.

THE GENERAL COLLECTION.

The General Collection consists of various curiosities from different parts of the world, and a small but choice cabinet of coins. Other interesting curiosities are the beautiful Indian Pipe from Queen Charlotte's Island, the models of the leaning Tower and the Baptistry at Pisa, and the memorials of Gens Williams and Inglis, which include the sword worn by the former throughout the seige of Kars, and that used by the latter during the defence of Lucknow. There is also a model of the Cawnpore Memorial Cross, formed of wool from the house in the court-yard of which the women and children were massacred.

The College possesses also a number of autographs of royal and distinguished personages; one of Thomas Moore, the poet inscribed in a copy of Lucian, presented by him on the occasion of his visit.

The Coins illustrate the Numismatics of Rome, and most of the countries of the modern world.

The different departments of the museum are arranged in twenty-four flat cases, supported by the balustrade surrounding the gallery, and five large table cases, all glazed and provided with lock and key. The large specimens which could not be coveniently placed in cases are arranged on shelves, or distributed in different parts of the Hall.

The friends of Science in Nova Scotia and elsewhere are respectfully requested to contribute specimens to the Museum of King's College. The steps which have been lately taken by the Covernors to provide suitable cases for the arrangement and display of the contents of the Museum in the fine Hall erected at the expense of the Alumni, offer a guarantee that the liberality of donors will be carefully recognized and fully recorded.

It is particularly requested that donors will send their contributions of Books, Coins and Curiosities, addressed to the Librarian, and of Natural History specimens to the Natural History Curator, King's College Museum, Windsor, N. S., in order that the receipt may be duly acknowledged, and the donations acknowledged in the yearly Calendars as heretofore.

A superb collection of Loyalist China, over three hundred places, arranged in three cases, was presented by Judge and Mrs. Weldon, on the 97th anniversary of the landing of the Loyalists in New Brunswick.

REPORT.

The Executive Committee of the Associated Alumni of King's College, Windsor, on their Thirty-sixth Anniversary, beg leave to possent their customary report.

All hope of the renewal of the Government grant having been standard, it has become necessary for members of the Church of England in this and the adjoining Diocese, and others more immediately interested in the welfare of the University, to bestir themselves in endeavouring to place the College on a more permanent basis, by means of an ample Endowment Fund, in order to ensure present and future excluses.

With this end in view, your Committee have endeavoured from time to time to do their part by soliciting persons to become members, more excelly since the passage of the Act reducing the rates of Annual Sateription and Life Membership. In consequence of the first step which they took in the matter a large number of persons came in, and the hopes of the more sanguine members were more than realized by the increased interest in the affairs of the College; but we regret to state that the subsequent appeal to the several Parishes throughout this Pieces, consequent on the Rev. Mr. Harris' resolution,

"That the Secretary of the Alumni obtain from every Clergyman in the Dioceses of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick a list of the names of precis in his Parish or Mission who ought to be Members of the Associated Alumni, and that the Secretary send a written invitation to each person whose name is received, inviting him to become a member of the Association,"

and the subsequent action of the Diocesan Synod has had little or no result, but very few persons having responded to several hundred postal and issued under authority of the Clergy who furnished the lists.*

We feel, however, that a personal appeal to the several Parishes is equin to have a better result, and hope that at the termination of the cares just instituted in behalf of the Endowment Fund, a larger

^{*} The Committee decided not to appeal to New Brunswick until after a fuller

number may feel it to be their duty to enrol themselves as Members of the Association, by annual subscription or otherwise; while the Committee beg to suggest that those among the present members or who may hereafter become members, who can afford a larger subscription may be induced to pay something in addition to their annual allowance or commutation than is fixed by law.

We hope also that the Synod having evinced an interest in the affairs of the University by the election of two members to the Board of Governors, confirmed by a recent Act of the Legislature, will be the means of increasing the interest in the respective Parishes.

This year your Committee have to record with much regret the decease of several of their oldest and most respected members, who is past years took a very warm interest in the affairs of the University:

Lewis Bliss, Esq., of London.

Joseph B. Bond, Esq., of Barton, Digby Co.

Richard H. Brown, Esq., of London, for many years Manager of the Sydney Mines, C. B.

Samuel Prescott Fairbanks, Esq., many years Commissioner of Crown Lands for this Province, and who matriculated in 1810.

The Treasurer's Account for the past year is herewith submitted shewing a satisfactory balance at the Bank, which your Committee would like to see still further augmented, with a view, next year, to a permanent investment, though they feel at liberty to suggest that the sum of \$200 might with propriety be voted for the present emergency.

In addition to the other business of the day you are required to elect two Governors in place of Thomas B. Akins, Esquire, D. C. L. and Jedediah A. Shaw, Esquire, whose terms have expired; the election of a President in place of Thomas Trenaman, Esq., M. D., and three members of the Executive Committee in place of Edward P. Archbold, Esq., Hon. S. L. Shannon, and the Secretary.

In Let to Incorporate the Alumni of King's College, Windsor.

(Passed the 30th Day of March, A. D. 1848.)

Whereas, a number of persons having associated themselves under the name of the Alumni of King's College, Windsor, for the promotion of education, and have raised by private contribution sums of money which they are desirous to expend in aid of the funds of the said college, and the Collegiate School, at Windsor, connected therewith, in a towards the maintenance and support of the teachers therein, or in such other way as may best conduce to the end which they have in the teachers are desirous of obtaining assistance from the Legislature, by the passing of an Act of Incorporation for enabling them to hold paperty, and to manage their affairs with greater ease and convenience.

Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor, Council and lambly: That John T. Twining, James B. Uniacke, Henry Pryor, the Hartshorne, and all and every such other person and persons as was members of, or in the said Society, and their successors, shall be ed are hereby appointed a body, politic and corporate, in deed and in sase, by the name of "The Alumni of King's College, Windsor," and s that name have succession and a common seal, and by that name sul sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded, at law and in equity, and sall courts and places, and be able and capable in law to have, hold, satisse, get, receive, take, possess and enjoy, lands, tenements, estiments and rents, in fee simple or otherwise, and also goods and and all other things, real, personal and mixed, and also to give, cat, sell, let, assign or convey the same or any part thereof, and to do all other things in and about the same, as shall or may be south necessary or proper; and also shall have from time to time and at all times full power, authority and license to constitute, make and

establish such bye-laws, rules and ordinances, as may be thought necessary for the rule and good management of said Society, the establishing of officers proper for the management of its affairs, and declaring the extent, duration and authority of the offices and officers of the Society, and their mode of appointment, and generally for promoting the objects of the Society, provided such bye-laws, rules and ordinances be not contrary and repugnant to the laws and statutes of this Province or those in force within the same, or to the laws and statutes of Kingle College, Windsor, respectively, at the time such bye-laws, rules and ordinances may be constituted and established, or to the province of this Act; and provided, also, that the said Society shall not hold any time lands, tenements, hereditaments, goods, chattels, property a effects, of greater value than ten thousand pounds.

II. And be it enacted, that all persons paying an annual subsets tion of twenty shillings or upwards, or making at one time a donation of twenty pounds or upwards, shall be entitled to be members of the sel Society, having been duly admitted, pursuant to the bye-laws thered provided that such annual subscription or donation be actually paid into the funds of the Society, and provided that no person now a memberal the said Society, or who, hereafter, may become a member of the same shall at any time hereafter continue a member of the same, unless to shall have heretofore paid, or shall hereafter pay at one time into the funds of the said Society a donation of at least twenty pounds or sail hereafter annually, and from year to year, pay into the said funds the sum of twenty shillings or upwards; and if such annual subscription a payment of any such annual member, shall not be paid on the first dr of May in each year, such member shall thereupon cease to be a member of the said Society, until such annual subscription or payment shall be actually paid, or until such person shall otherwise become a memberal the said Society, or under some bye-law or rule thereof.

III. And be it enacted that the said Society shall be governed, and its affairs managed by a Committee of nine, comprising a President Vice-President, and seven other members, a Secretary and Treasure; the said Committee to be henceforth called the Executive Committee and such other officers as the said Society may from time to time thint proper.

IV. And provided, and be it enacted, that John T. Twining D. I. now the President of the said Society, shall, after the passing of the

Herekish Cogswell, now the Vice-President of the said Society, be the Vice-President of the said Society after the passing of this Act; that Samuel I. Shannon, Esquire, now the Secretary and Treasurer of the said Society, be the Secretary and Treasurer thereof after the passing of this Act; and Samuel P. Fairbanks, Henry Pryor and James B. Uniacke, William J. Almon, Robert Fitzgerald Uniacke, Mather B. Almon and Charles Twining, now the Managing Committee of the said Society, thall, after the passing of this Act, be the Executive Committee of the said incorporated Society, until an Executive Committee be elected under this Act.

V. And be it enacted, that all persons, without regard to religious denomination or difference of religious sentiment, may be, and at any time hereafter become members of the said incorporated Society, being in all other respects entitled to be and become members of the said Society, and now, and at any time hereafter, may hold any of the said repointments, or any other offices and appointments in the said response of the said society, being duly elected and appointed thereto, pursuant to the bye-laws thereof, anything contained herein, or in any rules, regulations, or bye-laws of the said Society to the contrary notwith-tanding.

VI. And be it enacted, that the said Society, incorporated as a dorsaid, shall have power from time to time hereafter, to appoint the President, Vice-President, and Executive Committee, at some general acting of the said Society by a majority of the members of the Society present, the whole number present being not less than twenty members, according to such regulations concerning such appointments as may be less than twenty members, as may be less than twen

VII. And be it enacted, that the Secretary and Treasurer of the mil Society, and such other officers as may hereafter be required for the imagement of its affairs, shall be appointed in such manner as shall be declared by the bye-laws and rules of said Society, to be passed by title hereof.

VIII. And be it enacted that all donations to the said incorporated Soity, to constitute life members or otherwise, if not less than twenty points, shall be invested under the direction of the Executive Committee was permanent fund for the benefit of the said Society, and that the

funds of the said incorporated Society shall from time to time be laid out and applied by the Executive Committee in such way and for such purpose only as any general meeting of the said Society may direct or appoint, and that the Executive Committee shall be bound and are hereby required annually to account to the Society for all their acts, receipts, expenditure, and doings whatsoever, in the said office, and to make a report annually to the said Society, at its general meeting, of the progress and state of the Society, and of its affairs generally.

IX. And be it enacted, that a general meeting of the said Society shall be held once, that is to say, some time within the last ten days of the month of June, in each year, and as much oftener as may be directed by any rule or bye-law of the said Society.

X. And be it enacted, that the Executive Committee of the sail Society shall meet and assemble as often as there may be occasion, and any three members shall form a quorum.

An Act to Incorporate the Governors of King's College, Windsor, and to repeal the Act for Founding, Establishing and Maintaining a College in this Province.

(Passed the 4th day of April, A. D. 1852.)

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council and Assembly as follows:

- 1. The Act passed in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of his late Majesty King George the Third, entitled "An Act for founding establishing and maintaining a College in this Province," is hereby repealed.
- 2. The Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia, the Honorable Brentz Halliburton, Reverend George McCawley, D. D., the Honorable James B. Uniacke, and Lewis Morris Wilkins, Esquire, together with eight persons, being members of the Church of England, to be elected at a general or special meeting of the "Alumni of King's College, Windson, shall be Governors of the College hereby incorporated.

- 3. The Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia, for the time being, shall be always ex officio a Governor, President of the Board and Visitor, the said Braton Halliburton, George McCawley, James B. Uniacke, and Lewis Moris Wilkins, shall be Governors for the term of their respective live; and of the eight persons to be elected by the Alumni of King's College, Windsor, two shall, in each and every year, successively, in the colar of their election, go out of office, but such two Governors may be reelected.
- 4. All vacancies hereafter occurring, whether by death, resignation, renoval from office, or otherwise, amongst the Governors, from time to time, shall be filled up by the Alumni of King's College, Windsor, in manner hereinbefore appointed, but the Governors shall always be thatel from among members of the Church of England, and every pason hereafter elected on any such vacancy, shall, as to his tenure of after, be subject to the regulation hereinbefore prescribed touching the tight persons to be elected by the Alumni of King's College, Windsor.
- 5. For the better management of the College, and for more completely executing the purposes of this Act, the Governors appointed, and to be assisted from time to time by virtue hereof, shall be a body politic ast corporate in deed and in name, and have a common seal and succeson for ever, by the name of Governors of King's College, Windsor, and by that name shall make bye-laws and ordinances for the regulation and management of the College, and shall also have, hold and enjoy, for the use and benefit of the College and the purpose of this Act, all the gods and chattels, and all the lands which are now had, held, occupied, senioved by "the Governors of King's College, of Nova Scotia," or the Governors, President and Fellows of King's College, at Windsor, in the Province of Nova Scotia," or by any person in trust for the or in their behalf, in the same manner as if the same had been the conveyed and transferred to the Governors hereby incorporated, by titue of a statute of this Province, authorizing the conveyance and trusfer thereof, also shall have the power to purchase, receive, take, and enjoy for the use and benefit of the said College, and the purpose of this Act, and other goods, chattels, or lands, so as the said at mentioned lands shall not exceed in value ten thousand pounds, and about all times hereafter shall have power to sell, lease, mortgage, or aderwise dispose of the lands belonging to the College, or any part broof, for the benefit of the said College, as to the Governors, thereby marganted, may seem proper, any law to the contrary notwithstanding,

- 6. The Governors hereby incorporated, at any general meeting assembled, shall, from time to time, and as they shall think fit, make and establish such statutes and ordinances for the instruction, care and government of the students, the management of the property of the College, the appointment of the President, Professors, Fellows, and Scholars (the President always to be a member of the Church of England), and also touching any matter or thing respecting the College, which to them shall seem meet.
- 7. The College hereby incorporated shall be taken to be an University, with all the usual privileges of such an institution, whether relating to the conferring of degrees and honors, or otherwise.
- 8. From the time of this Act coming into operation until the appointment of a full Board of Governors, by virtue thereof, the present Governors shall, notwithstanding this Act, continue to exercise all the powers which are now vested in them, by the Act hereby repealed, and the royal charter which they now hold.
- 9. All academical honors and degrees, all rights, powers, privileges and authorities now had, held, or exercised by any person, by virtue of the Act hereby repealed, or of the charter hereinbefore referred to except so far as they may be necessarily taken away, altered, abridged or affected by, or in consequence of this Act, shall be had, held, and exercised, in relation to the College hereby incorporated, as fully as now had, held, or exercised.
- 10. The Royal Charter, incorporating "the Governors, President and Fellows of King's College, at Windsor, in the Province of Nova Scotia," shall not in any manner be effected by this Act, except so far as may be necessary to give effect to this Act.

This Act shall not come into operation until Her Majesty's assent to signified thereto.

In Act to Amend the Act to Incorporate the Governors of King's College, Windsor, and to repeal the Act for Founding, Establishing and Maintaining a College in this Province.

(Passed the 7th day of May, A, D. 1866,)

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council and Assembly as follows:—
Sections 2 and 3 of the above named Act are hereby amended by adding to the 3rd section the following words:

"But no person shall be re-elected to the office of Governor of said College until after the period of at least eleven months from the time to shall have last served as such Governor."

BYE-LAWS

OF

THE ALUMNI OF KING'S COLLEGE, WINDSOR

Passed at a General Meeting held at the Halifax Hotel. June 27, 1848.

I. Besides the Annual General Meeting of the Incorporated Society, it shall be competent for the Committee at any time, either of their own accord, or upon a requisition signed by at least ten of the members of the Association, upon giving seven days' notice in the public papers, to call a Special Goneral Meeting of the Association, specifying the purpose for which it is called, and in which meeting it shall be competent for the Association to transact any such business as may be required. Ten members shall be deemed a quorum for the transaction of business.

II. That the books, accounts and papers of the Association shall be open at all times for the inspection of members, and the Secretary shall furnish an account of the affairs of the Association whenever required by the Committee.

III. That the Treasurer and Secretary, and such officers as shall be requisite for the Incorporated Society, shall be annually appointed by the Executive Committee.

IV. That at the Annual Meeting of the Association, the President and Vice-President shall alternately go out of office, accompanied by the first three of the Committee, and that all or any of them having a majority of votes shall be eligible to be re-elected.

V. That at any meeting, members not present may vote by proxy in writing, to be held by any other member; provided that no member shall be entitled to vote either personally or by proxy, whose dues are not all paid up for the preceding year.

VI. That the funds of the Association will be appropriated for the payment of one or more professors or lectures, and one or more scholarships at the University of King's College, or one or more teachers or exhibitions in the Collegiate School at Windsor, to be denominated the Alumni Professorships and scholarships, respectively.

VII. That the Association will scrupulously apply such donations as may be made to them to such specific objects in aid of King's College as may be directed by the donors respectively.

VIII. That all meetings of the Incorporated Society shall be spened with prayer.

IX. (Passed at general meeting of June 21st, 1849.) That the election of members of the Incorporation shall be by ballot.

RULES PASSED AT DIFFERENT TIMES.

- 1. That no resolution or proceeding inconsistent with or molifying any resolution or proceeding adopted by a general meeting be entertained by the Executive Committee in Halifax, except upon a month's notice to the Committee being given by the person proposing the same, and that no such resolution or proceeding be carried into effect until the same shall have been confirmed by a general meeting to be summoned for the consideration thereof, if necessary to be arranged before the annual general meeting.
- 2. A month's notice shall be given of all resolutions affecting the rights of members, or creating new offices or salaries.
- 3. No individual shall be entitled to vote under a parochial certificate unless he be authorized by a parish meeting.
- 4. All annual general meetings of this Association shall be holden at Windsor.
- 5. That the Treasurer make up his annual account to the 30th of April in each and every year.
- 6. In the election of Governors all the names proposed shall be put on the same ballot, out of whom those having the highest number shall be declared elected; provided that no person shall be declared elected as Governor unless he have a majority of votes cast.
- 7. That in the election of Governors the order of names be such as to place the name of the candidate obtaining the smallest number of votes at the head of the list, and so on in succession.
- 8. That the ballot be not sent round for any officer of this Association, or of the Board of Governors, whose name has not been previously proposed and seconded by some member of the Association; and that the ballot be not taken until all the names of all persons intended to be proposed for any office be given.

- 9. That the Executive Committee of the Associate Alumni be empowered at their monthly meetings, during the interval between one annual general meeting and the next, to elect members of the Incorporation, provided that no black beans be cast against them.
- 10. That honorary certificates be granted in the several departments instead of the prizes as heretofore.
- 11. That any member of this Society whose annual subscription shall remain and be unpaid for three years shall cease to be a member of this Society, and can only be admitted as a new member by being papered and seconded and duly elected pursuant to the bye-laws.

That the Alumni adopt for Life Members donors of \$200 and spwards to the Endowment Fund.

That a statement be made to the Alumni at their annual meetings of the funds and appropriations of the College.

That efforts be made to increase the number of Alumni, and that Grahutes and Students be solicited to become members.

That Graduates of the College be ipso facto members of the Association, on payment of subscription, without election.

That the annual subscription be Two Dollars, and that the payment of the sum of Twenty-five Dollars by any person at any one time entitle him to life membership.

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RESOLUTIONS PASSED AT ANNUAL MEETING, JUNE 27, 1883.

"That while the payment of Two Dollars annually confers every privilege of membership, all are earnestly requested to remember the urgent need of the College, the important work the Alumni are associated to advance, and that they need not necessarily limit their amount to the sum above named."

"That no member be permitted to hold more than one proxy."

"That in the opinion of this meeting, the best interests of this University would be furthered by the development of the Faculty of Music, and the meeting therefore respectfully request the Board of Governors to take the matter into their consideration."

NOTICE OF MOTION.

"That with the consent of the Governors, a circular to the following effect be sent to the holders of Nomination Certificates now in force-

"In consequence of the withdrawal of the Government grant, and the evident inability of the additional endowment now being raised meeting the present necessities of the College and maintaining the staff of Professors absolutely necessary to its efficiency, the Associated Alumni earnestly request all future nominations be made conditional upon payment by the nominee of Ten Dollars in the first week of December of each year into the general funds of the College, in addition to Five Dollars given to the Library."

NOTICE OF MOTION.

"Whereas, It is most important at the present time that nothing should be allowed to interfere with the 'prosperity of the Alumni Association, and, whereas, some have maintained that 'proxy' voting has been among the causes which have operated to prevent a larger attendance at the meetings and a more general interest being taken in the Association by Clergy and Laity; be it therefore resolved: That the Executive Committee be requested to take the whole subject of proxy voting into consideration, with a view to the most practical way of abolishing it."

HEAD MASTER: The REV. C. E. WILLETS, D. C. L.,

Graduate and formerly Scholar of Corpus Christi College, Cambridge, late Sub-Rector of Bishop's College School, Lennoxville, Quebec.

This School is in direct connection with King's College, and is abject to the supervision of the President and Vice-President of the College, under instructions from the Board of Governors.

The object of the School is to provide a sound religious, classical, nathematical and general education, in conformity with the principles of the Church of England; but it is open to all denominations without natriction.

Pupils belonging to the Church of England will attend the Services at the College Chapel, but those of other Denominations may, if squired by their parents, attend the Sunday services of the Denomination to which they belong. In the latter case certificates of proper tendance will be required from the Ministér.

While ample provision is made to prepare boys for the University and high Civil Examinations, the utmost attention is devoted to imparting such a training as may fit them for all pursuits and professions, and analythem to take that position in society which is conceded only to men of liberal education and refined habits.

COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

The course of instruction includes all the usual branches of a sound election in Classics, Mathematics, German, French, English, etc.

TERMS.

The School Year is divided into three Terms: Michaelmas, Lent and Trinity Terms.
