Introduction.

KING'S COLLEGE was founded A. D. 1789, by an Act of the Provincial Legislature, chiefly through the exertions of the Right Reverend Charles Inglis, D. D., first Bishop of Nova Scotia. For this foundation funds were granted by the Provincial Legislature, and subsequently by the British Government.

By the Royal Charter granted in 1802 all the privileges of a University were conferred on King's College, which thus became the first University of British origin established in Canada.

A Provincial Act incorporating the Governors of King's College, and annulling the Act of 1789, was passed April 4th, 1853. It provides that the Royal Charter of Incorporation shall not be affected by it further than is necessary to give effect to its own enactments.

The Patron of the University is the Archbishop of Canterbury, to whose approval all "Statutes, Rules and Ordinances" of the board of Governors are subject by resolution of the Board of Governors recorded in the statutes of the University.

King's College is open to students of all denominations, and imposes no religious test either on entrance or on graduation in any faculty, excepting that of Divinity.

The University confers degrees in Arts, Divinity, Law, Engineering, Science, and Medicine. The School of Law, situated in St. John, N. B., was established in 1892.

Candidates for Matriculation may now be examined at distant centres under special regulations, which will be found in the Calendar.

Students reside in the main College building, which is heated throughout with hot water. Two or three, according to arrangement, share a study between them, and each has his own bedroom.

The aggregate outlay necessary for the three years' residence and study qualifying for a degree will, of course, depend much upon the tastes and economy of the student but may be estimated at about \$250 per year. The mere money payment demanded need never, however, exclude a candidate really prepared to benefit by the course of instruction offered, inasmuch as many benefactors of the University possess the right of nomination. Each nominee is exempt from the payment of certain yearly fees (See Stat. Cap. III, Sec. 2), besides the fee for a B.A. degree. There being some forty certificates conferring this privilege, it is easy for students to obtain it. If a Divinity scholarship is held besides, nearly the whole cost of education will be covered. The Calendar supplies all necessary information with regard to these nominations.

Non-resident Undergraduates are admitted to the College Course and Graduations, under regulations which will be found in the Calendar.

A general statement of the financial condition of the University is appended.

UNIVERSITY OF KING'S COLLEGE, WINDSOR, NOVA SCOTIA.

An Act of Parliament was passed in 1789 for the establishment of "King's College of Nova Scotia," in accordance with the recommendation of a Committee of the House of Assembly, November, 1787. The College was opened in 1790, and a Royal Charter was granted by His Majesty King George III, in 1802.

Course of Study.

The object aimed at in the Arts Course is to impart a good general education, while every facility is afforded for the prosecution of special studies.

Every Resident matriculated student in Arts, except under peculiar circumstances, to be approved of by the College Board, is required to attend the Lectures of all the Professors until he has passed his Responsions. After this he is at liberty to select three or more of the subjects lectured on to form the subject of his B. A. examination. If the student be desirous of taking Honours at his B. A. Examination, he can do so in any one or more of the subjects lectured on after passing the ordinary Examinations. The precise regulations will be found under the heading of Examinations.

Students who do not intend proceeding to a degree may attend the Lectures of any of the Professors, subject to the usual regulations, and can obtain from the Registrar certificates of examinations passed.

The Course of Engineering is framed with a view of giving the student a sound and thorough training in

Mathematics, pure and applied ; a comprehensive knowledge of Engineering and applied Science, together with such practical experience in work connected with the profession of a Civil Engineer as it is within the scope of the University to afford.

The course of B. Sc. has been established for carrying on advanced study in Mining and Chemistry.

Every facility is afforded for students who wish to prepare for the Provincial “Grade A” Examination.

Numerous Scholarships, Prizes, and Honorary Distinctions are open to be competed for by students in the several faculties, concerning which particular information will be found under the heading “Scholarships and Prizes.”

Students.

Students are admissible to the College who are not less than 16 years of age, and who have matriculated and are desirous of proceeding to Degrees in Arts, Engineering, or Science; and also elective students who desire to attend during an Academical Year or Term, one, two or more courses of lectures.

Women are admitted on the same conditions, and have the same privileges, as men.

Matriculation.

Every candidate for Matriculation must lodge with the President of the College, before the day of Examination, a certificate of good moral conduct extending over a period of not less than eighteen months immediately preceding. In the case of candidates from a boarding-school, a certificate from the Head Master will suffice; but those candidates who have attended a day school must, in addition, produce a certificate from the minister of the church they have attended.

MATRICULATION IN ARTS.

Subjects: (1) Latin, (2) Greek or French or German, (3) Mathematics, (4) English.

N. B.—Candidates for Holy Orders are required to take Greek.

I.—*Latin.

LATIN PROSE COMPOSITION.—Bradley's *Arnold*, Exercises 1—25, with book-work; and a translation back into Latin of a plain English version from the Latin of some easy author.

MATRICULATION IN ENGINEERING.

MATRICULATION IN SCIENCE.

As in Engineering, with the addition of Latin, as prescribed in Arts.

The Faculty of the College are authorized to accept certificates from the Head Masters of such schools as they may approve in lieu of Matriculation.

The Junior leaving Examination (Grade XI) of the High Schools of Nova Scotia, including the subjects prescribed, is accepted as equivalent to the Matriculation Examination.

The Senior Local Examination is accepted as equivalent to Matriculation into the second year, and the Junior Local Examination as equivalent to Matriculation, as far as they cover the subjects required.

Every student on Matriculation must sign a declaration that he will comply with the rules and regulations of the University.

Attendance at Lectures.

Attendance at all Lectures, except those which are announced as optional, is compulsory upon all undergraduates.

Professors will register the presence or absence of students immediately before beginning lectures; any student entering thereafter will be noted as absent, unless a satisfactory explanation be given to the Professor.

No student is allowed to absent himself from any Lecture (except by special permission, obtained from the Professor), nor from the Examinations in any Department in his course.

Of Terms and Residence.

The Academical year begins in October, and contains three terms. Michaelmas Term extends from the first Saturday of October to December 22nd; Lent Term from the second Saturday of January to the Saturday before Palm Sunday; Easter Term from the Monday after Easter Monday to the last Thursday but one in June.

Students are required to pass the Terminal Examinations at the end of Michaelmas and Easter Terms. No student who has failed to pass a terminal examination shall be allowed to present himself for examination in the subjects of any subsequent term until he shall have passed a supplementary examination in the subjects in which he has previously failed. The College Board will, in their discretion, require a student who, from whatever cause, shall fail to keep up with the work of his year, to “degrade,” *i. e.*, to go into a lower year, in which case such student shall lose the seniority of the year from which he degrades. Students shall rank according to the number of terms they have kept.

The following days are observed as holidays in the University; All Saints' Day, Ash Wednesday, Ascension Day, Whitsun Monday, and the Birth-Day of the reigning Sovereign.

Regulations for Non-Resident Students in Arts, Engineering and Science.

Non-resident undergraduates, *i. e.*, students residing at such a distance from Windsor as to render them unable to attend the lectures of the Professor (the decision in each case resting with the College Board) are admitted to the College course and graduation under the following conditions:—

1. Students in Arts must matriculate, and, in their first year, pass one terminal examination.
2. In their second year they must pass the examination for Responsions, as prescribed for resident students.
3. In the third year they are required to pass:—
 - (a) The terminal examination at the end of Michaelmas term.
 - (b) The examination for the Degree of B. A., at the end of the Easter Term.
4. In case of failure candidates must pass a supplementary examination before they can present themselves for a succeeding examination.
5. Supplementary examinations are held at the beginning of the next term after the regular examination.
6. Candidates who fail in the Degree Examination may present themselves for a supplementary examination at the end of the following Michaelmas Term.
7. Candidates for the Degree of B. Eng. are required to matriculate in the School of Engineering, and to pass:—
 - (a) One terminal examination in their first year.
 - (b) The first University examination for the degree of B. Eng. before entering upon their third year.
 - (c) The second University examination for the Degree of B. Eng. before entering upon their fourth year.
 - (d) The final University examination for the Degree of B. Eng. at the end of their fourth year.

8. Candidates for the degree of B. Sc. are required to matriculate in the School of Science, and to pass:—

- (a) One terminal examination in their first year.
- (b) The first University examination for the degree of B. Sc. at the end of the Easter Term in their second year.
- (c) The second University examination for the Degree of B. Sc. at the end of the Easter Term in their third year.
- (d) The final examination for the Degree of B. Sc. at the end of the Easter Term in their fourth year.

9. All examinations are held at the College, at Windsor, but that for Matriculation may be held at various centres.

10. On application to the President of the College, arrangements may be made, under suitable regulations, for holding Matriculation Examinations at other centres than those prescribed in the College Calendar.

11. Candidates must appear at the examination in proper academical costume, and during their attendance at the College are subject to the same regulations as resident students.

12. Non-resident students may compete for the McCawley Hebrew Prize, the Bishop's Prize, and the Binney Responsions Prize, but they are not eligible for scholarships, nor can they hold nominations.

13. Non-resident students are permitted to become students for one or more terms, for the purpose of attending lectures in such subjects as they may desire, but they shall not be exempt from the regulations governing such students, except with the consent of the College Board.

N. B.—On application, information will be afforded by the Professors of the different departments as to the subjects, required for the terminal examinations.

All fees, including College dues, must be paid to the Bursar before a candidate may present himself for examinations. and they are not returnable in case of failure to pass

The fees for admission to degrees, etc., are the same as those already prescribed.

Women are admitted on the same conditions, and have the same privileges as men.

Full particulars of the Matriculation Examinations, and of the different courses of study will be found in the College Calendar, which may be obtained from the President of the College.

The above regulations do not apply to students from Theological Colleges admitted to King's College under conditions stated below.

Students from Other Colleges

Students who have taken a partial course at any other University recognized by the Board of Governors, may, upon presentation of certificates of their standing, be admitted *ad eundem statum* and complete their course at King's College.

Students who have received their diploma from St. Augustine's College, Canterbury; St. Boniface, Warminster; Wycliffe College, Toronto; or Montreal Diocesan Theological College, may obtain the degree of B. A. from this University, by a residence of one year, upon presenting satisfactory certificates of work done, and passing the required examinations in any three subjects other than Divinity.

Graduates of the Royal Military College, Kingston, are allowed to proceed to the degree of B. Eng. or B. Sc. on passing an examination in those subjects which are not included in the Kingston course. Other Colleges of equal standing will doubtless obtain the same privilege.

Discipline.

All students are required to be in residence not later than the first Monday in each Term.

The resident Students are under the immediate charge of the President and Vice-President.

All Students are required to attend the services in the College Chapel. A Register of attendance is kept. Students who are not members of the Church of England are permitted to attend the Sunday Services of their own Church.

Students residing in the College are not to be out of it after 10 p. m. without the permission of the President, or, in his absence, the Vice-President, and such regulations shall be made as may be found necessary to secure the strict observance of this rule. The College authorities may enter the apartments of any undergraduates at all hours of the day or night.

No visitor shall be allowed to remain in College after 10 p. m. unless by permission.

The President is authorized to impose fines or written exercises for infraction of regulations, insubordination or disorderly conduct; matters of a more serious nature shall be referred to the Board of Discipline, which shall meet once a week, or oftener if required.

Each Professor shall keep a record of the attendance at his Lectures, and report thereon at the weekly meeting of the Board.

The Board of Discipline may deprive any Student of his Term for negligence of due preparation for Lectures.

In case of sickness a medical certificate must be produced, if required by the Board.

The introduction or use of spirituous liquors in the College is absolutely prohibited.

Regulations for holding Matriculation Examinations at other centres than King's College.

To meet the convenience of Candidates for Matriculation who reside at a distance from Windsor, Matriculation Examinations may be held at other centres than King's College, subject to the following conditions:—

I.—A Committee of not less than five members must be nominated by the Governors of King's College, for the purpose of conducting the Matriculation Examinations in the city or town where it is desired that such examinations should be held.

II.—The said Committee must appoint a Secretary to conduct the necessary correspondence with the President of King's College.

III.—The following declaration must be signed by all the members of the Committee:—

"We the undersigned, having been nominated by the Governors of King's College as a Committee for the purpose of conducting Matriculation Examinations for King's College, N. S., hereby pledge ourselves to conduct such examinations according to the rules laid down by the Board of Governors for that purpose.

IV.—The examination questions shall be forwarded under seal to the Secretary of the Committee, from King's College, N. S., and shall be opened at the hour appointed for the commencement of the examination, in the room where the examination is to be held.

V.—No candidates shall introduce, for any purpose whatever, any book or papers into the examination room.

VI.—No talking, and no communication whatever, shall be permitted amongst the candidates undergoing the examination.

VII.—Candidates shall write the answers on paper provided by the Committee for that purpose.

VIII.—The days for holding the Matriculation Examinations shall be those appointed in the Calendar of King's College.

IX.—On each occasion when it is proposed to hold a Matriculation Examination at a distant centre, notice should be sent by the Secretary of the Committee to the President of King's College, one month before the date of the examination.

X.—Each candidate for Matriculation, at any distant centre, shall pay in advance a fee of five dollars.

XI.—Two or more members of the Committee shall be present throughout each session of the examination, and shall sign the following declaration, which shall be transmitted, with the answers of the candidates, to the President of King's College—

"We, the undersigned, having been present during the whole time of the examination, when the accompanying papers were worked, hereby declare that the examination has been in all respects fairly conducted, and in accordance with the prescribed rules."

On application to the President of the College, arrangements may be made, under suitable regulations, for holding the examinations in other centres.

Examinations and Graduation.

TERMINAL EXAMINATIONS.

Every student is required to undergo an examination at the end of Michaelmas and Easter Terms in all the subjects in which he has attended lectures. Any Professor may, at his discretion, dispense with examination in optional subjects.

Every undergraduate, previous to presenting himself for any Terminal Examination, must obtain from each Professor whose lectures he has attended during the term, a certificate of attendance and good conduct.

No Professor will grant such certificate if more than two absences without leave, during the course of the term, are recorded against the applicant, or if his conduct has been in any way reprehensible.

Such certificate must then be handed in by the Senior of each class to the President, who shall post in the Commons' Hall a list of eligible candidates, previous to the beginning of the examination, and no undergraduate is allowed to present himself at any Terminal Examination unless he has complied with these regulations.

The list of candidates who have passed the Terminal Examination is published in the hall after the final meeting of the College Board for that term. Any student whose name does not appear in the list is allowed a *supplementary examination at the beginning of the term, in those subjects in which he has failed.

TEXT BOOKS.

Students should provide themselves with the necessary text books before entering upon their work.

Information concerning the books required and editions recommended, if not given in the Calendar, may be obtained upon application to the several Professors.

RESPONSIONS.

Every matriculated student in Arts is required to pass an examination called Responsons, for which he may present himself in Lent Term following his admission; and no term after the sixth can be reckoned until it has been passed. Candidates failing in any subject are required to present themselves for the whole examination again at the beginning of the following Michaelmas Term. The subjects for 1903 are as follows:—

*Any Student requiring a supplementary examination must apply to the Board of Discipline, enclosing a fee of five dollars.

N. B.—Candidates who do not take Greek will be required to pass in both Modern Languages.

B. A. DEGREE EXAMINATION.

An Examination for Degrees is held towards the end of Michaelmas and Easter Terms. Students are not permitted to offer themselves for this before their ninth term except those who intend to offer themselves for Honours, who may be examined in the Ordinary Degree subjects in their seventh term. In such case the student must pass an examination in the Honour subjects chosen by him before being admitted to a degree.

The examination is carried on mainly by written questions and answers, but the Examiners at all times have the power of examining *viva voce*.

Every candidate for a Degree must give notice in writing, to the President of the University, of his intention to present himself for examination, such notice to contain a list of subjects prepared, and to be sent not later than twenty-one days previous to the date published in the Calendar for the holding of Degree Examinations.

Every candidate for a Degree must be examined in at least three of the subjects on which lectures are delivered by the Professors. The following (or their equivalent) are the subjects of any ordinary degree :

I. CLASSICS.

LATIN.—Tacitus, *Histories*, I: Cicero, *De Senectute* and *De Amicitia*; Horace, *Epistles*, Books I and II, and *Ars Poetica*.

GREEK.—Lucian, *Vera Historia*; *Antigone*; Demosthenes, *De Corona*.

Sight Translation (Latin) will be practised each term, and a passage set in the examination. Candidates will also be examined in a selected period of Roman and Grecian History, the Geography of Ancient Greece and Italy, and in a selected portion of Donaldson's *Theatre of the Greeks*.

II. ENGLISH LITERATURE :

Sixth Term.—Palgrave's *Golden Treasury*, Book III: Johnson, *Life of Pope*; Gosse's *History of XVIII Century Literature*; Thackeray's *Esmond* (to be read in private); Essays.

Seventh Term.—Bright's *Anglo-Saxon Reader*; Chaucer's *The Parliament of Fowles*; Jevon's *Lessons in Logic*, first ten chapters; Brooke's *History of English Literature from the beginning of the Norman Conquest*; Essays.

Eighth Term.—Bright's *Anglo-Saxon Reader*; Marlowe's *Dr. Faustus*; Shakespeare's *Macbeth*, and three other plays to be announced; Dowden's *Shakespeare's Primer*; Saintsbury's *History of Elizabethan Literature*; Jevon's *Lessons in Logic*, to end of book; Scott's *Kenilworth* (to be read in private); Harrison, *Description of England* (Scott's Library); Essays.

Ninth Term.—Palgrave's *Golden Treasury*, Book IV; Carlyle, *Sartor Resartus*; Ruskin, *Sesame and Lilies*; Tennyson's *The Princess*; Selected Poems of Robert Browning; Saintsbury's *History of XIX Century Literature*; Emerson, *Essays on Books, Beauty, Culture and Eloquence* (to be read in private); Essays.

NOTE.—Students are required to write short essays once a week; a weekly "Conference" will be held in English Composition. Besides the regular terminal work in Composition, every student is required to write three special essays. Of these the first is to be handed in at the end of the first year, the second before the Responsions Examinations in the second year, and the third before the Degree Examination.

GREEK.—Plato: *Republic*, Books I-IV; Sophocles: *Antigone*; Theocritus: Ten selected *Idyls*; Pindar: *Olympian Odes*.

LATIN.—Lucretius: *De rerum Natura*, Books I-II; Catullus: Ellis's *Carmina Selecta*; Cicero: *De Oratore*, Book I; Terence: *Andria*.

LATIN PROSE.—Mahaffy's *Greek Literature*; Ferrier's *Lectures on Early Greek Philosophy*; Zeller's *Socrates and the Socratic Schools*; Crutwell's *History of Roman Literature*; Whitney's *Life and Growth of Languages*.

II. ENGLISH LITERATURE:

The Honour Work in English will cover the development of the Language up to the time of Shakespeare. One representative work will be selected from each of the great periods for special study. Each candidate must present a Thesis upon some literary subject, involving original research.

Lectures will be given and examination papers set on the following work:—

Trine's *History of English Literature*, Lanier's *Science of English Verse*; Anglo-Saxon, *Beowulf* (Ed. Harrison and Sharp); Chaucer's *Prologue*, and *Knights Tale*; Dowden's *Shakespeare, His Mind and Art*, Shakespeare, selected plays; Tennyson's *In Memoriam*; Swinburne's *Atlanta in Calydon*; Matthew Arnold, selected Essays, Parkman's *France and England in North America*, selected volumes; Raleigh's *A Story of the English Novel*.

NOTE.—Each candidate for Honours will be required to write two Essays upon approved subjects, and to carry on a prescribed course of reading in the standard English novels.

III. DIVINITY:

Hebrew Bible (selected portions); Greek Testament (selected Epistles); Westcott *On the Canon of the N. T.*, or Salmon's *Introduction to the New Testament*, Butler's *Analogy*; Church History to A. D. 451 and the English Reformation; Browne *On the Articles*; Pearson *On the Creed*; Hooker's *Ecclesiastical Polity*, Book V; Liddon's *Bampton Lectures*, or Martensen's *Christian Ethics*; St. Athanasius, *De Incarnatione*.

IV. MATHEMATICS AND MATHEMATICAL PHYSICS:

ALGEBRA.—Spherical Trigonometry; Analytic Solid Geometry; Geometrical Conics, Differential Calculus, including Maxima and Minima; Integral Calculus; Mechanics, Statics and Dynamics; Hydrostatics; Geometrical Optics.

V. NATURAL SCIENCE:

ANALYTICAL CHEMISTRY, *advanced course*,: (Jones' Junior Course of Practical Chemistry and Fresenius' Manuals); Geology, *advanced course*: Palæontology (Nicholson's Manuals); Field Geology (Geikie's Outlines).

The scientific collections of the College are available for study, and these are supplemented, when necessary, by the Professor's Collection. Excursions for field work will be made when practicable.

The course will include Lectures in Political Economy, International Law, Constitutional and General History, and History of the Aryan Race, together with *theses* on various problems in Applied Economics.

Elective Students may also obtain Pass Certificates, Honour Certificates, and Diplomas. in lieu of Degree.

FOR THE DEGREE OF M. A.

Candidates must be of three years standing from the time of taking the B. A. degree, and must present a satisfactory thesis on some subject approved by the College Board.

DIVINITY STUDENTS.

Candidates for Holy Orders, entering College for theological study, are subject to the same regulations as other students.

The course of study comprises the subjects usually required for the Ordination Examination, and the special subjects prescribed for the "Voluntary Preliminary Examination" of the Provincial Synod of Canada. Students are also practised in the composition and delivery of sermons. Hebrew is optional.

This course ordinarily covers a period of two years; but for graduates one year's residence is sufficient.

GRADUATION IN ENGINEERING—DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF ENGINEERING.

Undergraduates presenting themselves for examination for the Degree of Bachelor of Engineering shall be required to have matriculated in the School of Engineering, to be of twelve terms' standing and to have passed the First and Second University Examinations for that Degree.

Candidates for the First University Examination for the Degree of B. Eng. will be required to be of six terms' standing. The Course of Studies for this Examination will include :—

The fee for the Degree of Bachelor of Engineering will be \$12.00. It must be lodged with the Bursar before the examination begins.

FOR THE DEGREE OF M. ENG.

Every candidate must have taken the Degree of B. Eng., and must have been engaged in practical work as a Civil Engineer for at least three years from the time of so doing. He must have held a position of responsibility in such connection.

He will be examined in Practical Engineering, including the Preparation of Designs, Specifications and Estimates for Engineering Work, and also in some special branch of Theoretical Engineering Science, selected by the Candidate, and (upon the recommendation of the Professor of Engineering) approved of by the College Board.

The particular department of Practical Engineering work in which the candidate will be examined, will be chosen with reference to the character of the work in which he has been specially engaged, and in this portion of the examination candidates will be tested as regards their knowledge of the subject by being required to submit a complete set of Drawings, Specifications and Estimates for some proposed work, for the preparation of which a month or five weeks will be allowed. These Drawings, with the detailed calculations upon which they are based, will be sent in to the Examiners, and if they are approved, an Oral Examination of the candidates will be conducted for the purpose of supplying the authenticity of the work submitted and of testing the candidate's professional ability.

The Examiners in Civil Engineering shall be appointed yearly by the Board of Governors, and the Professor of Engineering shall be, *ex officio*, a member of the examining body.

FOR DEGREE OF M. Sc.

A candidate for this Degree must be a B. Sc. of three years' standing. He will be required to send in a satisfactory Thesis on some subject embodying original work, and also to pass an examination in some branch of scientific work, approved by the College Board, on the recommendation of the Professor of Science.

FOR THE DEGREE OF D. Sc.

A Candidate for D. Sc. must be a B. Sc. of eight years' standing, or a M. Sc. of five years' standing.

A Thesis on some approved subject, to be sent to the Board of Examiners, and a proof of continued successful work in Science.

EXAMINERS.

1.—The Examiners to conduct the Degree of Prize Examinations in each year shall be appointed by the Governors.

2.—These Examiners shall sign the Declaration, No. 2, in the Appendix, to the present code of Statutes.

3.—The Examination shall be conducted by means of printed or written papers, together with a *viva voce* Examination at the discretion of the Examiner, and shall take place at such a time as shall permit of the results being made known at the Encænia of that year.

DEGREES IN DIVINITY.

The University of King's College having entered into an agreement with the other Church Universities and Theological Colleges in Canada to adopt a uniform standard for Degrees in Divinity, all such Degrees are now only conferred by the University in accordance with the Canon of the Provincial Synod of Canada on Degrees in Divinity, within the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada. Particular information concerning the regulations for such Degrees, and concerning the "Voluntary Preliminary Examination," may be had upon application to the Secretary of the Board of Examiners, Rev. G. H. Broughall, 99 Bellevue Avenue, Toronto, or to the President of the College.

Local Examinations.

Local Examinations for Candidates who are not members of the University, are held in Windsor the first week in June, and at other places where it may be requested, at such times as may be found expedient.

Every Candidate who passes the examination is entitled to receive a certificate specifying the subjects in which he or she has satisfied the Examiners and the class obtained.

The Junior Examination is accepted for Matriculation, Senior for entrance into the second year as far as they cover the subjects required.

Candidates passing the Senior Examination receive the title of "ASSOCIATE IN ARTS."

Local Committees wishing to have examinations held in their several districts may obtain all necessary information from the President of King's College.

All such applications must be lodged with the President two months before Examination begin.

REGULATIONS FOR SENIOR CANDIDATES.

Every Candidate is required to pay a fee of \$4.00 to the Secretary of the Examining Committee.

The Examinations will comprise the subjects mentioned in following 12 Sections. Students are required to satisfy the Examiners in Section I, and in at least 4 of the 11 Sections II-XII, of which 2 must be taken from the 4 Sections II-V, and one from the 5 Sections VI-X. No candidate may enter for more than 8 Sections altogether.

Section I.—Arithmetic, including Simple and Compound Interest, Discount and Stocks.

Section II.—Religious knowledge. Any 2 of the following, and 3 for Distinction :—

THE COGSWELL SCHOLARSHIP.

(£24 sterling per annum Open to candidates for Holy Orders, under the direction of the Trustees.)

THE DIVINITY SCHOLARSHIP.

(Open to Students for Holy Orders actually requiring assistance and subject to the control of the Bishop of the Diocese).

Eight in Number.—Thirty pounds sterling per annum.

Two of these Scholarships are awarded each year, and are tenable for four years. They are awarded to those only who matriculate and take an Arts Course. In order to obtain a Scholarship a candidate must make an average of not less than fifty per cent. in the Matriculation Examination, and be not less than nineteen years of age. The Scholarships are awarded according to the rank obtained in the Matriculation Examination, without excluding some consideration of the character and circumstances of the candidates. The Scholarships shall be forfeited for serious misconduct, of which the Board of Discipline

*No Scholarship or prize open to competition shall be awarded unless at least 50 per cent. shall have been made in each paper.

shall be the judges (the Board to report to the Bishop for his action), and any student failing to keep his terms, unless prevented by illness or other urgent reason, shall *ipso facto* forfeit his Scholarship, and the scholarship thus forfeited may, upon the recommendation of the President and Professor of Divinity, be given by the Bishop to a Divinity Student of the same Academical standing as the one who forfeits the Scholarship.

Divinity Scholars are required to reside in the College Building.

THE BINNEY EXHIBITION.

\$50 00 per. annum.

In the year 1858, Miss Binney, sister of the late Visitor, and daughter of the late Rev. Dr. Hilbbert Binney, in the name and on behalf of her father's executors, handed over to the Governors certain stock amounting to \$1000, to found an exhibition at King's College, to be called "The Binney Exhibition," in memory of her said father.

The design of this Scholarship is to assist students who may require assistance, and who shall have commended themselves by their exemplary conduct, although their abilities and acquirements may not qualify them to be successful competitors for an open scholarship.

TERMS.—On or before the first day of May, in each year, the College Board shall nominate two students, in their third term at the least, whom they may deem best qualified, having regard to their straitened means and the excellence of their character; and the President shall forthwith transmit their names, together with a brief statement of their claims, to the Visitor, who shall select one of them to be the Exhibitioner, and to receive the interest accruing for the following year, commencing July 1st. Or, at his discretion, if he considers the claims of the two nominees to be equal, or nearly so, the Visitors may adjudge that the amount be divided between them.

THE McCAULY HEBREW PRIZE.

(£9 sterling. Open to all members of the University who are below the standing of M. A., and who have not already gained the first premium in Hebrew).

This prize is given out of the interest of a Trust Fund in the hands of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts. The Fund and the conditions of the Prize are thus stated in the Report of Society:—

“This fund arises from a gift of £150 sterling in the British North American Bank, made by the Rev. George McCawley, D. D., Falmouth, Nova Scotia, the interest to be paid to the student of King’s College Windsor, N. S., who shall pass the best examination in Hebrew Bible and Greek Testament: the examination being under the direction of the Visitor and President.”

The prize is open to all members of the University of not more than twenty-one or less than twelve terms standing in June, 1903.

“The Outlook for Foreign Missions ; with comment (*a*) upon past principles, whether sound or unsound, and (*b*) upon past methods, whether good or bad, and suggestions as to needed changes or new methods which should be tried.”

The Essays to be sent to the President by June 1st, 1903.

THE ALMON-WELSFORD TESTIMONIAL.

WILLIAM J. ALMON, ESQ., M.D., endowed King’s College with \$400, the interest of which is appropriated as a prize to be competed for every June, by the matriculated students in their

first year of residence. The prize to be presented by the President, in the College Hall, on the anniversary of the attack upon the Redan, in which MAJOR WELSFORD fell, on which day in every year his gallant and loyal deeds are to be commemorated in Latin. N. B.—Day changed to second Thursday in October.

THE STEVENSON SCHOLARSHIPS.

(Three, of \$60.00 each.)

The REV. J. STEVENSON, M. A., (some time Professor of Mathematics in King’s College), left a sum of money for the purpose of founding three Scholarships, tenable for two years, and open to matriculated students in their second year of residence.

REGULATIONS.

(1.) These Scholarships shall be competed for in the month of October, and shall be open to all matriculated students in their second year of residence.

(2.) No student shall hold more than one of these Scholarships ; and in the event of two being vacant at the same time, they shall be awarded to the first and second candidates on the list who shall have attained the proper number of marks.

(3.) Candidates must select from the following list subjects aggregating not less than 600 and not more than 800 marks :—

THE McCAWLEY CLASSICAL SCHOLARSHIP.

This Scholarship is given out of the interest of a fund raised by subscription for a Testimonial to the Rev. G. McCawley, D. D., on his retirement from the Office of President.

(1.) The competition shall be confined to matriculated under-graduates who have completed their first year of residence.

(2.) The Examination shall be conducted by the President, assisted by such other person as the Governors shall appoint for the time being, either within or without the University, as assessor.

(3.) The examination shall be confined principally to such classical works as the President shall have appointed at the beginning of Michaelmas Term preceding, and shall include the translation, grammatical construction and relation to the content of the passages selected, together with such critical papers in prose and verse as may be set at the examination.

(4.) The examination shall be subject, in respect of the number of marks required, to the general regulations of the University with reference to prizes and scholarships.

(5.) In the event of there being no competition, or on failure in the examination, the year's interest shall be expended in the purchase of classical books for the library from a list selected by the President, having in view in the first instance, the completion of a collection of the works of all the classical authors, and and of the best editions of the respective works, whether English and foreign, and also of books illustrative of the same at the discretion of the President.

(6.) This scholarship shall be competed for in the Easter Term.

THE AKINS HISTORICAL PRIZE.

T. B. AKINS, Esq., D. C. L., Barrister-at-Law, and Commissioner of Public Records, vested in the Governors, as Trustees, a sum of money sufficient to found a prize of Thirty

The Report of the Executive Committee (including the Treasurer's account) was submitted, considered clause by clause, slightly amended, and adopted as follows:—

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

COLLEGE FEDERATION.

I. The close of this academical year, which is the 100th anniversary of the granting of the Charter by King George III. establishing King's College as an University, finds us face to face with a question of the utmost importance to the welfare of the College, to wit, the proposal, emanating from our own Governors, that we bring to an end our existence as an independent university, and join with any other colleges whose consent can be obtained to such a union, to form a provincial or maritime university.

Your Committee have had no opportunity as yet to consider the details of the proposed scheme: but it is publicly known that the Governors of Dalhousie favour the proposal, and that the University of New Brunswick deems it worthy of serious consideration.

At present we can only lay down general principles with a view to assisting the members of the Associated Alumni in coming to a right conclusion with regard to a matter of so great importance.

The very name of our Society and the history of its formation imply that the first duty of its members is to work for the best interests of the College and to conserve the principles for which King's College was founded.

These were: (1) to further the cause of higher education in the land: (2) to maintain the doctrine and discipline of the Church of England: (3) to secure to students the educative and humanizing influences of College residence, and (4) to provide training for candidates for Holy Orders.

The conditions of the Province have greatly changed since the College was established, and educational ideas and requirements have greatly changed, but the principles are permanent, and the problem which lies before us is how to adhere to those principles and at the same time satisfy the educational demands of the day.

Your Committee trust that before any decisive action is taken ample opportunity will be afforded for the careful consideration and discussion of the subject by this Society.

NUMBER OF STUDENTS.

2. We have called attention for several years to the facts that the number of students was small and the funds were low. The first of these we attributed, among other causes to two things, viz; (a) the cost, and (b) the greater attraction to students of larger universities. With regard to the second matter we have no progress to report, except that we understand that the agent to the 20th Century Fund has obtained a certain amount of contributions towards the College.

COLLEGIATE SCHOOL.

3. The Collegiate School has made good progress under the Head Mastership of Mr. Handsombody, and is now in a very satisfactory condition, the only disappointment being that it furnishes very few students to the College.

CHURCH SCHOOL FOR GIRLS.

4. The Church School for Girls is also in a very efficient state, and reflects great credit upon the lady Principal, Miss Lefroy.

VACANCIES BY ROTATION.

5. Under Sec. 3, Cap. 66, Acts of 1853, Rev. Dr. Bowman and Rev. Dr. Campbell, retire from the Board of Governors, and their successors are to be elected at this meeting.

The Vice-President of the Alumni, together with Rev. W. H. E. Bullock, Mr. W. L. Payzant and Dr. W. Bruce Almon retire from the Executive Committee of the Alumni, under By-law IV, and it devolves on this meeting to fill the vacancies.

The meeting is also to "nominate" five members of the Board of Governors to serve on the Executive Committee of that Board, under Sub-sec. (c), Section I, of the amended Constitution of that Committee.

Mr. C. S. Wilcox, Rev. V. E. Harris, Mr. R. Paulin, Mr. J. Y. Payzant, and Ven. Archdeacon Kaulbach were "nominated" as members of the Executive Committee of the Board of Governors of the College.

A motion to recommend to the Trustees of the Fund from which the "Alumni Prizes" are given to the Collegiate School, that the senior alumni prize, of \$40, be given conditionally on the recipient becoming a student at King's College, was lost.

Thanks were voted to the transportation authorities for concessions in railway fares to those attending the closing exercises of the Educational Institutions at Windsor during the week.

Referring to clause 1 of the report of the Executive Committee a resolution, moved by Rev. V. E. Harris, was adopted in the following modified form:—

Resolved, that it would be a departure from the principles upon which King's College was founded, and which it has always steadfastly maintained, and involve a change of trust, and might result in the cancelling of her charter, to become a party to a scheme for the establishment of a University from which all recognition of the Christian religion is eliminated.

The following motion of Rev. L. J. Donaldson was lost, 35 to 38, including proxies :—

That, the Associated Alumni of King's College hear with pleasure of the movement inaugurated by the Board of Governors to establish a Maritime University by the federation of the existing colleges.

The following resolution, moved by Hon. Mr. Justice Hanington was adopted, 30 to 14 :—

Whereas, the condition of the college both as to finance, numbers of students and efficiency continues to be and is in a very unsatisfactory condition.

Therefore Resolved, that it is expedient that the officials and faculty be re-organized by the appointment of a new President, and such other changes as are necessary to bring the college up to the position it should occupy both as to efficiency as well as in the confidence of the public ; *and further*, that upon that being done, every effort be made to procure the sympathy as well as the strong financial aid of Church people as well as other friends of the Institution.

The discussion on the College question was very full and exhaustive, it was taken part in by a more than usually large number of the Alumni present, and occupied a large part of the forenoon, and all of the afternoon up to the hour of adjournment, 7.25, p. m.

CAP. IV.

An Act for Founding, Establishing and Maintaining a College in this Province.

WHEREAS, *the permanent establishment and effectual support of a College at Windsor, may, by the blessing of God, become of the greatest public utility to this Province, and to His Majesty's neighbouring Colonies:*

I. *Be it therefore enacted, by the Lieutenant-Governor, Council and Assembly, That a sum not exceeding four hundred and forty four pounds, eight shillings and ten pence half penny, current money of Nova-Scotia, equal to four hundred pounds, sterling money of Great Britain, shall be yearly, and every year, granted, allowed and paid by, from, or out of, such monies as may from time to time be collected and paid into the public Treasury of this Province from the duties imposed, or to be imposed, on brown, and loaf or refined, sugars ; and in case such duties are not sufficient to answer the said sum at the days and time of payment thereof ; then by, from, or out of any other aids, supplies or taxes not otherwise specially appropriated to other uses ; which sum of four hundred and forty four pounds, eight shillings and ten pence half penny, shall be drawn by warrant,*

under the hand and seal of the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or Commander in Chief for the time being, on the Provincial Treasurer in the way usually practised in equal quarterly payments; the first quarter to commence the first of January, one thousand seven hundred and eighty nine, and to be drawn for on the first of April, and so on from quarter to quarter, as the same shall grow due, on the requisition of the Governors of the said College, or the major part of them, as herein after appointed, for or towards the maintenance and support of the said College, and the payment of the salaries of the President and Professors to be by them appointed.

II. *And be it further enacted, by the authority aforesaid,* That the Governor and Cominander in Chief of the Province of Nova-Scotia, for the time being; the Lieutenant-Governor, for the time being; the Bishop of Nova-Scotia, for the time being; the Chief Justice, for the time being; the Secretary of the Province, for the time being; the Speaker of the House of Assembly, for the time being; His Majesty's Attorney General, for the time being; and His Majesty's Solicitor General, for time being, shall be Governors of the said College.

III. *And be it further enacted, by the authority aforesaid,* That for the better management and regulation of the said college, and the more full and complete executing the purposes of this Act, the said Governors, hereby appointed, shall be a body politick and corporate in deed, and name, and have succession for ever by the name of "The Governors of King's College of Nova-Scotia," and by that name shall sue, and be sued, implead and be impleaded, in all Courts and places within the Province of Nova-Scotia; and they, or the major part of them, shall have power to have and use a common seal, to be appointed by themselves, and to make bye laws and ordinances for the regulation and general management of the said college, and to assemble together, when and where, and as often, and upon such notice as to them shall seem meet, for the execution of the trust hereby reposed in them; and shall also have full power and capacity to purchase, receive, take, hold and enjoy, for the use and benefit of the said college, and purposes of this Act, as well goods and chattels, as

lands, tenements and hereditaments, any law or statute to the contrary thereof notwithstanding.

IV. *And be it further enacted, by the authority aforesaid,* That the Governors of the said college, so appointed and incorporated by this Act, or such major part of them, at any general meeting assembled, shall from time to time, and as they shall think fit, make and establish such statutes, rules, and ordinances, for the instruction, care and government, of the students, and for the care and preservation of the books, furniture and other property, belonging to the said college, as to them shall seem meet, and shall and may in like manner nominate and appoint the President and Professors (the President always to be a clergyman of the established Church of England, duly qualified for that office,) to whom the tuition of the students in the said college shall be committed; and also to appoint such Officers and Servants from time to time, as the said Governors, or such major part of them, may think necessary, and assign to them respectively out of the said sum of four hundred and forty four pounds, eight shillings and ten pence half penny, annually granted by this Act, such salaries and allowances as they shall think fit, and shall and may in like manner suspend or remove the President, Professors, Officers and Servants, or any or either of them, for misbehaviour or neglect of duty; and no President, Professor, Officer or Servant of the said college, unless in cases of sickness, shall absent themselves from their respective duties, without the express leave of the Governors, or the majority of them, who are hereby authorized to appoint a deputy or deputies to fill the office of such President or Professor in such cases, and to appropriate a part or the whole of the salary of the President or Professor, absent as aforesaid, for the payment of such deputy.

V. *And be it further enacted, by the authority aforesaid,* That besides the four hundred and forty four pounds, eight shillings and ten pence half penny, hereby annually granted for the purposes of the said college, it shall and may be lawful for the Governor, or Lieutenant-Governor and Commander in Chief, at the requisition of such major part of the Governors of the said college, to draw by warrant from the Treasury of this Province,

a sum not exceeding five hundred pounds, to enable them to purchase such house, lot of ground and premises in the township of Windsor as they may chuse and think requisite, and proper, for the purpose of founding and establishing of such college.

VI. *And be it further enacted*, That it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors to provide a person, well and sufficiently qualified, to act as a temporary President, and also a person or persons, well and sufficiently qualified, to act as temporary Professors, who shall be immediately employed in the education of youth; and the said Governors shall and may continue to apply such parts or shares of the said sum, herein before granted, for the payment and support of such temporary establishment, until a sufficient building shall be erected, and a charter obtained from our Most Gracious Sovereign to authorize the opening of such college in due form.

NOTE.—The first section of the above Act was repealed by chapter 31, of the Acts of 1851; and the whole act was repealed by chapter 66, of the Acts of 1853. It is now reprinted as showing the legislative origin of the college; as throwing light on the charter; and as an item of historical interest in connection with the proposed federation of the colleges of the Maritime Provinces.—R. J. W.

CHARTER OF THE UNIVERSITY.

(Granted 12th May, 1802.)

George the Third by the Grace of God
of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and
Ireland King Defender of the Faith To all
to whom these presents shall come Greeting
Whereas we have declared our Royal intention to
establish within our Province of Nova Scotia in North America a
College for the education of Youth in the Principles of true reli-
gion and for their instruction in the different branches of Science
and Literature which are taught at our Universities in this King-
dom **And whereas** the Sum of four thousand Pounds granted by
our Parliament in that part of our United Kingdom called Great

Britain hath been applied in erecting a suitable Building within the Town of Windsor in our said Province on a piece of Land which had been purchased by means of a Grant of the General Assembly of our said Province for that purpose **And whereas** the said Building hath been fitted for the residence of Professors and Students and an endowment of four hundred Pounds Currency of that Province (equal to Three hundred and Sixty Pounds British sterling) Per Annum hath been granted for the support thereof by the said General Assembly **And whereas** humble application hath been made to us by many of our loving Subjects in our said Province that We would be pleased to grant our Royal Charter for the more perfect establishment of the said College and for incorporating the Members thereof for the purposes aforesaid and for such further endowment thereof as to us should seem meet We have taken the premises into our Royal consideration and duly weighing the great utility and importance of such an institution are willing and desirous to condescend to their request **Know ye** therefore that **We** of our especial Grace certain knowledge and mere motion **Have Willed Ordained and Granted And Do*** by those Presents for Us our Heirs and Successors Will Ordain and Grant that upon the said Land and in the building or buildings so erected or to be erected thereon at our Town of Windsor in our said Province of Nova Scotia there shall be established from this time One College the Mother of an University for the education and instruction of Youth and Students in Arts and faculties to continue forever and to be called **King's College** and that our trusty and welbeloved Sir John Wentworth Baronet Lieutenant Governor of our said Province or the Governor or Lieutenant Governor of our said Province for the time being the Right Reverend Father in God Charles Inglis Bishop of the Diocese of Nova Scotia or the Bishop of the said Diocese for the time being our trusty and welbeloved Samuel Salter Blowers Chief Justice of our said Province of Nova Scotia or the Chief Justice of our said Province for the time being Our trusty and welbeloved Alexander Croke Judge of our Court of Vice Admiralty in Nova Scotia or the Judge of our Court of

Vice Admiralty in our said Province for the time being our trusty and welbeloved Richard John Uniacke Speaker of our House of Assembly and Attorney General of our said Province of Nova Scotia or the Speaker of our House of Assembly and the Attorney General for said Province severally for the time being our trusty and welbeloved James Stewart Solicitor General of our said Province of Nova Scotia or the Solicitor General of our said Province for the time being our trusty and welbeloved Benning Wentworth Secretary of our said Province of Nova Scotia or the Secretary of our said Province for the time being together with such other person or persons as shall be elected in manner hereinafter mentioned shall be Governors of the said College and that the said College shall consist of one President three or more fellows and Professors and twelve or more Scholars at such Salaries and subject to such Provisions Regulations Limitations Rules Qualifications and Restrictions as shall herefter be appointed by the Statutes Rules and Ordinances of the said College and until such Statutes Rules and Ordinances shall have been framed subject in all respects to the Orders and directions and eligible and removable at the pleasure of the said Governors or of the major part of them And that the said Governors or the major part of them shall have the Power of electing the President of the said College for the time being to be a Governor of the said College And also of electing any other Person or Persons not exceeding three in number subject to such Regulations as shall be appointed by the Statutes Rules and Ordinances of the said College to be a Governor or Governors of the said College And We do by these Presents for us our Heirs and Successors will ordain and grant that the said Governors President and fellows and their Successors for ever shall be one distinct and separate body Politic and Corporate in Deed and in Name by the Name and Style of "**The Governors President and Fellows of Kings College at Windsor in the Province of Nova Scotia**" And that by the same name they shall have perpetual succession and a Common Seal and that they and their Successors shall from time to time have full power to break alter make new or change such Common Seal at their Will and Pleasure and as shall be

found expedient and that by the same name the said Governors President and fellows and their Successors from time to time and all times hereafter shall be a Body Politic and Corporate in Deed and in Law and be able and capable to have take receive purchase acquire hold possess enjoy and retain **And We** do hereby for Us and Heirs and Successors give and grant full authority and free licence to them and their Successors by the name aforesaid to have take receive purchase acquire hold possess enjoy* and retain to and for the use of the said College notwithstanding any Statutes or Statute of Mortmain any Manors Rectories Advowsons Messuages Lands Tenements Rents and Hereditaments of what kind nature or quality (soever so as that the same do not exceed in yearly value the Sum of Six thousand Pounds above all charges) **And Moreover** to take purchase acquire have hold enjoy receive possess and retain notwithstanding any such Statute or Statutes to the contrary all or any Goods Chattels Charitable and other Contributions Gifts and Benefactions whatsoever And that the said Governors President and fellows and their Successors by the same name shall and may be able and capable in law to sue and be sued implead and be impleaded answer and be answered in all or any Court or Courts of Record or Places of Judicature within our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland And our said Province of Nova Scotia and other our **Dominions** and in all and singular Actions Causes Pleas Suits Matters and Demands whatsoever of what kind and nature or sort soever in as large ample and beneficial manner and form as any other Body Politic and Corporate or any other our Liege Subjects being Persons able and capable in law may or can have take purchase receive hold possess enjoy retain sue implead or answer or be sued impleaded or answered in any manner whatsoever **And we** do by these Presents for Us Our Heirs and Successors will ordain and grant that the Governors of the said College or the major part of them shall have power and authority to frame and make Statutes Rules and Ordinances touching and concerning the good Government of the said College the performance of Divine Service therein the Studies Lectures Exercise Degrees in Arts and faculties and all matters

regarding the same the election qualification and residence of the President fellows and Scholars the management of the Revenues and Property of the said College the Salaries Stipends and Provision for the President fellows Scholars and Officers of the said College And also touching and concerning any other matter or thing which to them shall seem good fit useful and agreeable to this our Charter And also from time to time to revoke augment or alter all every or any of the said Statutes Rules and Ordinances as to them or the major part of them shall seem meet and expedient **Provided** that the said Statutes Rules and Ordinances or any of them shall not be repugnant to the Laws and Statutes of this our Realm And of our said Province of Nova Scotia **Provided also** that the said Statutes Rules and Ordinances or any revocation augmentation or alteration thereof be subject to the approbation of the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury for the time being and shall be forthwith transmitted to the said Lord Archbishop for that purpose and that in case the said Lord Archbishop shall signify in writing his disapprobation thereof within three years of the time of their being so made and framed or of their being so revoked augmented or altered the same or such part thereof as shall be so disapproved by the said Lord Archbishop shall from the time of such disapprobation being made known be utterly void and of no effect but otherwise shall be and remain in full force and virtue **And We** do hereby for Us our Heirs and Successors charge and command that the Statutes Rules and Ordinances aforesaid subject to the said Provisions shall be strictly and inviolably observed kept and performed from time to time so long as they shall respectively remain in full vigour and effect under the Penalties to be thereby or therein inflicted or contained **And We** do by these Presents for Us our Heirs and Successors will order direct and appoint that the said Lord Archbishop of Canterbury for the time being shall be Patron of the said College and the Bishop of Nova Scotia for the time being shall be Visitor of the said College **And We** do further Will ordain and grant that the said College shall be deemed and taken to be an University and shall have and enjoy all such and the like Privileges as are enjoyed by our Universities in our United Kingdom of Great

Britain and Ireland as far as the same are capable of being had and enjoyed by virtue of these our Letters Patent And that the Students of the said College shall have liberty and faculty of taking the Degrees of Batchelor Master and Doctor in the several Arts and faculties at the appointed times and shall have liberty within themselves of performing all scholastic Exercises for the conferring such Degrees in such manner as shall be directed by the Statutes Rules and Ordinances of the said College **And We We Will** and by these Presents for Us our Heirs and Successors Do grant and declare that these our Letters Patent or the Inrolment or Exemplification thereof shall and may be good firm valid sufficient and effectual in the Law according to the true intent and meaning of the same And shall be taken construed and adjudged in the most favorable and beneficial sense for the best advantage of the said Governors President and fellows of the said College at Windsor aforesaid as well in all our Courts of Record as elsewhere and by all and singular Judges Justices Officers Ministers and other Subjects whatsoever of Us our Heirs and Successors any misrecital non-recital omission imperfection defect matter cause or thing whatsoever to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding without fine or fee great or small to be for the same in any manner rendered done or paid to us in our Hanaper or elsewhere to our use **And lastly Wee** do hereby promise and declare for Us Our Heirs and Successors that We and they shall and will at all times hereafter give and grant to the aforesaid Governors President and fellows and their Successors such other reasonable Powers and Authorities as may be necessary for the Government of the said College and the more effectual execution of the Premises **In Witness** whereof We have caused these our Letters to be made Patent **Witness** Ourself at Westminster the twelfth day of May in the forty second year of our Reign.

An Act to Incorporate the Alumni of King's College, Windsor.

(Passed the 30th day of March, 1847.)

WHEREAS a number of persons have associated themselves under the name of the Alumni of King's College, Windsor, for the promotion of Education, and have raised, by private contribution, sums of money which they are desirous to expend in aid of the funds of the said College, on the promotion of Education in the said College, and the Collegiate School at Windsor connected therewith, in or towards the maintenance and support of the teachers therein, or in such other way as may best conduce to the end which they have in view, and they are desirous of obtaining assistance from the Legislature by the passing of an Act of Incorporation for enabling them to hold property, and manage their affairs with greater ease and convenience.

I. *Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Council, and Assembly:* That John T. Twining, Jas. B. Uniacke, Henry Pryor, Hugh Hartshorne, and all and every such other person and persons as now are members of, or in the said Society, and their successors, shall be, and are hereby appointed a Body, Politic and Corporate, in deed and in name, by the name of "The Alumni of King's College, Windsor," and by that name have succession and a common seal, and by that name shall sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded, at law and in equity, and in all courts and places, and be able and capable in law to have, hold, purchase, get, receive, take, possess, and enjoy, Lands, Tenements, Hereditaments, and Rents, in fee simple or otherwise, and also Goods and Chattels, and all other things real, personal, and mixed, and also to give, grant, sell, let, assign, or convey the same or any part thereof, and to do and execute all other things in and about the same as shall or may be thought necessary or proper; and also shall have, from time to time, and at all times, full power, authority, and license, to constitute,

make, and establish such By-Laws, Rules, and Ordinances, as may be thought necessary for the rule and good management of said Society, the establishing of the officers proper for the management of its affairs, and declaring the extent, duration, and authority of the offices and officers of the Society, and their mode of appointment, and generally for promoting the objects of the Society: *Provided* such By-Laws, Rules, and Ordinances be not contrary or repugnant to the Laws and Statutes of this Province, or those in force within the same, or to the Laws and Statutes of King's College, Windsor, respectively, at the time such By-Laws, Rules and Ordinances may be constituted and established, or to the provisions of this Act: *And provided also*, the said Society shall not hold at any time, Lands, Tenements, Hereditaments, Goods, Chattels, Property, or Effects, of greater value than Ten Thousand Pounds.

II. *And be it enacted*, That all persons paying an annual subscription of Twenty Shillings, or upwards, or making at one time a donation of Twenty Pounds, or upwards, shall be entitled to be members of the said Society, having been duly admitted pursuant to the By-Laws thereof: *Provided* that such annual subscription or donation be actually paid into the funds of the Society, and provided that no person now a member of the said Society, or who hereafter may become a member of the same, shall at any time hereafter continue a member of the same, unless he shall have heretofore paid, or shall hereafter pay at one time into the funds of the said Society, a donation of at least Twenty Pounds, or shall hereafter annually, and from year to year, pay into the said funds the sum of Twenty Shillings or upwards, and if such annual subscription, or payment of any such annual member, shall not be paid on the first day of May in each year, such member shall thereupon cease to be a member of the said Society, until such annual subscription or payment shall be actually paid, or until such person shall otherwise become a member of the said Society, under some By-Law or Rule thereof.

[This Section is amended by Chapter 64 of the Acts of 1882, q. v., (page 113 of this Calendar), which provides that the Alumni may, at any annual general meeting, fix the amount of the annual subscription, and the amount

of donation to entitle to life membership, NOT TO EXCEED the amounts mentioned in this section.

At the annual meeting on 28th June, 1882, (page 85 of the minutes), it was *Resolved*—“That the annual subscription be two dollars, and that the payment of the sum of twenty-five dollars by any person at any one time entitle him to life membership.”—R. J. W.]

III. *And be it enacted*, That the said Society shall be governed, and its affairs managed by a Committee of nine, comprising a President, Vice-President, and seven other members, a Secretary and Treasurer; the said Committee to be henceforth called the Executive Committee, and such other officers as the said Society from time to time may think proper.

IV. *And provided, and be it enacted*, That John T. Twining, D. D., now the President of the said Society, shall, after the passing of this Act, be the President of the said Society; that the Honorable Henry Hezekiah Cogswell, now the Vice-President of the said Society, be the Vice-President of the said Society after the passing of this Act; that Samuel L. Shannon, Esquire, now the Secretary and Treasurer of the said Society, be the Secretary and Treasurer thereof after the passing of this Act; and Samuel P. Fairbanks, Henry Pryor, James B. Uniacke, William J. Almon, Robert Fitzgerald Uniacke, Mather B. Almon, and Charles Twining, now the Managing Committee of the said Society, shall, after the passing of this Act, be the Executive Committee of the said incorporated Society, until an Executive Committee be elected under this Act.

V. *And be it enacted*, That all persons, without regard to religious denomination or difference of religious sentiments, may be, and at any time hereafter, become members of the said incorporated Society, being in all other respects entitled to be and become members of the said Society, and now, and at any time hereafter, may hold any of the said appointments, or any other offices and appointments in the said incorporated Society, being duly elected and appointed thereto pursuant to the By-Laws thereof, anything contained herein, or in any Rules, Regulations, or By-Laws of the said Society, to the contrary notwithstanding.

VI. *And be it enacted*, That the said Society, incorporated as aforesaid, shall have power, from time to time hereafter, to

appoint the President, Vice-President, and Executive Committee at some general meeting of the said Society, by a majority of the members of the Society present, the whole number present being not less than twenty members, according to such regulations concerning such appointments as may hereafter be made by any By-Laws of the said Society, to be passed by virtue hereof.

VII. *And be it enacted*, That the Secretary and Treasurer of the said Society, and such other officers as may hereafter be required for the management of its affairs, shall be appointed in such manner as shall be declared by the By-Laws and Rules of the said Society, to be made by virtue hereof.

VIII. *And be it enacted*, That all donations to the said incorporated Society, to constitute Life members, or otherwise, of not less than Twenty Pounds, shall be invested under the direction of the Executive Committee, as a permanent Fund for the benefit of the said Society, and that the funds of the said incorporated Society shall, from time to time, be paid and applied by the Executive Committee in such way and for such purposes only as any general meeting of the Society may direct or appoint; and that the Executive Committee shall be bound, and are hereby required annually to account to the Society for all their acts, receipts, expenditures, and doings whatsoever, in the said office, and to make a report, annually, to the Society at the general meeting, of the progress of the state of the said Society, and of its affairs generally.

IX. *And be it enacted*, That a general meeting of the said Society shall be held once, that is to say, some time within the last ten days of the month of June, in each year; and as much oftener as may be directed by any Rule or By-Law of the said Society.

[By chapter 148, Acts of 1895, q. v., (p. 118 of this Calendar) this section is amended to read as follows: “That the [a] general meeting of the said Society shall be held once, that is to say, some time within the last fifteen days of the month of June, in each year, preferably on the day preceding Encenia, or as often as may be directed by any rule or by-law of the said Society.”—R. J. W.]

X. *And be it enacted*, That the Executive Committee of the said Society shall meet and assemble as often as there may be occasion, and any three members shall form a quorum.

ACTS OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE PROVINCE
OF NOVA SCOTIA, 1851. (14 VIC.). P. 39.
CAP XXXI.

An Act to discontinue the Grant to King's College, Windsor.

(Passed the 7th day of April, A. D. 1851).

Be it enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor, Council and Assembly, as follows:

1. The first Section of an Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, entitled "An act for founding, establishing, and maintaining a College in this Province," is hereby repealed.

STATUTES OF NOVA SCOTIA. 1853, (16 VIC.), p. 193.
CHAPTER 66.

An Act to Incorporate the Governors of King's College, Windsor, and to Repeal the Act for founding, establishing and maintaining a College in this Province.

(Passed the 4th day of April, A. D. 1853.)

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council, and Assembly, as follows:

1. The Act passed in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of his late majesty, King George the Third, entitled, an Act for founding, establishing, and maintaining a College in this Province, is hereby repealed.

2. The Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia, the Honorable Brenton Haliburton, Reverend George McCawley, D. D., the Honorable James B. Uniacke, and Lewis Morris Wilkins, Esquire, together with eight persons, being members of the Church of England, to be elected at a general or special meeting of the "Alumni of King's College, Windsor," shall be Governors of the College hereby incorporated.

[Chapter 63 of the Acts of 1883, secs. 1 and 2, q. v. (pp. 114 of this Calendar), provides that the number of Governors may be increased to eighteen by representatives from sundry Synods. Chapter 147 of the Acts of 1895, q. v., (p. 116 of this Calendar), provides that the number of Governors be increased to thirty-seven by representatives from sundry Deaneries, etc.—R. J. W.]

3. The Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia, for the time being, shall be always, *ex officio*, a Governor, President of the Board and Visitor; the said Brenton Haliburton, George McCawley, James B. Uniacke, and Lewis Morris Wilkins, shall be Governors for the term of their respective lives; and of the eight persons so to be elected by the Alumni of King's College, Windsor, two shall, in each and every year, successively, in the order of their election, go out of office, but such two Governors may be re-elected.

[Chapter 100 of the Acts of 1866, q. v., (page 113 of this Calendar) provides that no person shall be re-elected Governor until after at least eleven months from the time he shall have last served as Governor. This applies only to Governors elected by the Alumni; those elected by the Synods are, by sec. 4, Chapter 63. Acts of 1883, q. v., (page 114 of this Calendar), subject, so far as eligibility for re-election, &c., is concerned, to the regulations of their respective Synods; those elected by the Deaneries, sec. 2, Chapter 147, Acts of 1895, q. v., (page 116 of this Calendar), remain in office one year, or until others are elected in their stead.—R. J. W.]

4. All vacancies hereafter occurring, whether by death, resignation, removal from office, or otherwise, amongst the Governors, from time to time, shall be filled up by the Alumni of King's College, Windsor, in manner hereinbefore appointed, but the Governors shall always be elected from among members of the Church of England, and every person hereafter elected on any such vacancy, shall, as to his tenure of office, be subject to the regulation hereinbefore prescribed touching the eight persons to be elected by the Alumni of King's College, Windsor.

5. For the better management of the College, and for more completely executing the purposes of this Act, the Governors appointed, and to be appointed from time to time by virtue hereof, shall be a body politic and corporate in deed and in name, and have a common seal and succession for ever, by the name of Governors of King's College, Windsor, and by that name shall make By-Laws and Ordinances for the regulation and management of the College, and shall also have, hold, and enjoy, for the use and benefit of the College, and the purpose of this Act, all the goods and chattels, and all the lands which are now had, held, occupied, or enjoyed by "the Governors of King's College, of Nova Scotia," or by "the Governors, President, and Fellows of King's College, at Windsor, in the Province of Nova

Scotia," or by any person in trust for them, or on their behalf, in the same manner as if the same had been duly conveyed and transferred to the Governors hereby incorporated, by virtue of a Statute of this Province, authorizing the conveyance and transfer thereof, and also shall have power to purchase, receive, take, hold, and enjoy, for the use and benefit of the said College, and the purposes of this Act, any other goods, chattels, or lands, so as the said last mentioned lands shall not exceed in value ten thousand pounds, and also at all times hereafter shall have power to sell, lease, mortgage, or otherwise dispose of the lands belonging to the College, or any part thereof, for the benefit of the said College, as to the Governors, hereby incorporated, shall seem proper, any law to the contrary notwithstanding.

6. The Governors hereby incorporated, at any general meeting assembled, shall, from time to time, and as they shall think fit, make and establish such statutes and ordinances for the instruction, care, and government of the students, the management of the property of the College, the appointment of the President, Professors, Fellows, and Scholars, (the President always to be a member of the Church of England); and also touching any matter or thing respecting the College which to them shall seem meet.

7. The College, hereby incorporated, shall be taken to be an University with all usual privileges of such an institution, whether relating to the conferring of degrees and honors, or otherwise.

8. From the time of this Act coming into operation until the appointment of a full Board of Governors, by virtue hereof, the present Governors shall, notwithstanding this Act, continue to exercise all the powers which are now vested in them, by the Act hereby repealed, and the royal charter which they now hold.

9. All academical honors and degrees, and all rights, powers, privileges, and authorities, now had, held, or exercised by any person, by virtue of the Act hereby repealed, or of the charter hereinbefore referred to, except so far as they may be necessarily taken away, altered, abridged, or affected, by, or in consequence of this Act, shall be had, held, and exercised, in relation to the

College hereby incorporated, as fully as as they are now had, held, or exercised.

10. The royal charter, incorporating "the Governors, President, and Fellows of King's College, at Windsor, in the Province of Nova Scotia," shall not be in any manner affected by this Act, except so far as may be necessary to give effect to this Act.

11. This Act shall not come into operation until Her Majesty's assent be signified thereto.

STATUTES OF NOVA SCOTIA, 1866, (29 VIC.) P. 141,
CHAPTER 100.

An Act to Amend the Act to Incorporate the Governors of King's College, Windsor, and to Repeal the Act for Founding, Establishing, and Maintaining a College in this Province.

(Passed the 7th day of May, A. D., 1866.)

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council, and Assembly, as follows:

1. Sections 2 and 3 of the above named Act are hereby amended by adding to the third section the following words:

"But no person shall be re-elected to the office of Governor of said College until after the period of at least eleven months from the time he shall have last served as such Governor."

[This provision does not apply to Governors elected by the Synods of Nova Scotia and Fredericton. (see Sec. 4 Chapter 63, of the Acts of 1883, page 114 of this Calendar) nor to Governors elected by the Deaneries, &c. See Sec. 2, Chap. 147, Acts of 1895, p. 116 of this Calendar.—R. J. W.]

STATUTES OF NOVA SCOTIA, 1882, (45 VIC.) p. 160,
CHAPTER 64.

An Act to Amend the Act to Incorporate the Alumni of King's College Windsor.

(Passed the 10th day of March, A. D. 1882.)

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council and Assembly, as follows:

1. From and after the passing of this Act the annual subscription to be paid and the amount of donation to be at one time made to entitle parties to be annual or life members of the incorporated Alumni of King's College, Windsor, under the second section of the Act hereby amended, shall be such as may be fixed by the said Alumni at any annual general meeting held under the ninth section of the said amended Act.

2. Said subscriptions and donations to be fixed as aforesaid, not to exceed the amounts mentioned in section two of the Act hereby amended, to entitle persons to be admitted members of said Society.

[See note at end of Section 2, Chap. 53, Acts of 1847, on page 106 of this Calendar.—R. J. W.]

STATUTES OF NOVA SCOTIA, 1883, (46 VIC.) p. 157.
CHAPTER 63.

An Act to Amend the Act to Incorporate the Governors of King's College, Windsor.

(Passed the 19th day of April, A.D. 1883.)

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council and Assembly, as follows:

1. The number of the Governors of King's College, Windsor, shall be increased to fifteen, by the addition of two Governors, who shall hereafter be elected from time to time by the Diocesan Synod of Nova Scotia, and shall be members of that Synod at the time of their election. Such additional Governors so to be elected, shall hold office for four years and shall go out of office alternately, and one of such Governors shall be elected at each regular biennial session of the Diocesan Synod of Nova Scotia. Until such election can take place, J. Norman Ritchie and Charles James Stewart, of Halifax, Esquires, who have been nominated by the said Synod for the purpose at its last session, shall be and they are hereby appointed, Governors of King's College, Windsor; the said Charles James Stewart to continue in office until the session of said Synod of 1884, and the said J. Norman Ritchie until the session of said Synod in 1886. In case of the

death or resignation of any of said additional Governors, the vacancy shall be filled at the next ensuing session of the Diocesan Synod of Nova Scotia, and the Governor then elected shall hold office for the residue of the term of four years.

[“In all cases the out-going Governor may be re-elected, if then a member of the Synod.” Journal of the 16th session, 1882, of the Diocesan of N. S., p. 82. See Sec. 4 of this Act.—R. J. W.]

2. Whenever and so soon as the Diocesan Synod of Fredericton shall by resolution declare King's College at Windsor to be the college approved by said Synod for the education and training of the divinity students of the diocese of Fredericton, the Governors of King's College, Windsor, may by resolution, duly passed at a meeting called for that purpose, still further increase their number by the addition of three more Governors, one to be the Lord Bishop of Fredericton for the time being, who shall then be *ex officio* a Governor of King's College, and the remaining two to be elected from time to time by the Diocesan Synod of Fredericton in such way and for such term as the said Diocesan Synod may from time to time limit and appoint, and to be members of that Synod at the time of their election. But if at any time thereafter the approval and support of the Diocesan Synod of Fredericton should be withdrawn from King's College, or the divinity students of that diocese should cease to attend said college, the person so elected by the Synod of that Diocese, and also the Bishop of Fredericton, shall thereupon cease to be Governors of King's College, Windsor, and the number of said Governors shall be reduced to that extent, which reduction shall be effected by a resolution of the Governors of King's College, Windsor, passed at a meeting called for that purpose.

[Governors elected by the Diocesan Synod of Fredericton hold office for one year, and are eligible for re-election, if then members of the Synod.

The Canon of the Synod of Fredericton governing the election is as follows:

CANON XIV, KING'S COLLEGE, WINDSOR.

1. King's College, Windsor, Nova Scotia, shall be recognized as the Theological Institution of the Diocese of Fredericton.

2. Two members of the members of the Board of Governors of King's College shall be elected annually by ballot, one from the Clergy and one from the Lay Members of the Synod and shall hold office until others shall be elected in their places.—R. J. W.]

3. Whenever and so soon as the Diocesan Synod of Newfoundland shall by resolution declare King's College at Windsor to be the college approved by the said Synod for the education and training of the divinity students of the Diocese of Newfoundland, the Governors of King's College, Windsor, may by resolution duly passed at a meeting called for that purpose, still further increase their number by the addition of two more Governors, to be elected from time to time by the Diocesan Synod of Newfoundland, in such way and for such time as the said Diocesan Synod may from time to time limit and appoint. But if at any time thereafter the approval and support of the Diocesan Synod of Newfoundland should be withdrawn from King's College, or the divinity students of the diocese should cease to attend said college, the persons so elected by the Synod of that diocese shall thereupon cease to be Governors of King's College, Windsor, and the number of said Governors shall be reduced to that extent, which reduction shall be effected by a resolution of the Governors of King's College, Windsor, passed at a meeting called for that purpose.

[The Diocesan Synod of Newfoundland has not yet availed itself of the privileges conferred by this Section.—R. J. W.]

4. All the Governors elected by virtue of this Act, shall as regards their eligibility for re-election be subject to the regulations of the Synod by which they have been elected respectively, notwithstanding the provisions of Chapter 100 of the Acts of the Legislature of Nova Scotia for 1866.

STATUTES OF NOVA SCOTIA, 1895, (58 VIC.), p. 623,
CHAPTER 147.

An Act respecting the Governors of King's College, Windsor.

(Passed the 11th day of March, A. D. 1895.)

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council, and Assembly, as follows :

1. The number of governors of King's College, Windsor, shall be increased to thirty-seven by the addition of one governor for each of the several deaneries now established in the provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and three for the archdeaconry of the province of Prince Edward Island, to be elected from time to time for each said deanery and said archdeaconry by the rectors and clergymen in charge of parishes resident in the deanery or archdeaconry, as the case may be, for which said governor or governors are to be elected, and the lay delegates to the diocesan, provincial and general synod of the Church of England in Canada respectively, resident within any of the parishes of said deanery or archdeaconry, as the case may be, at a meeting to be called for that purpose, and held in said deanery and archdeaconry respectively, for which said governor or governors are to be elected, at which meeting there shall be present not less than four of said clergy and four of said lay delegates.

[This section is amended by Chapter 129, Acts of 1897, q. v., p. 119 of this Calendar, to read as follows :

"The number of Governors of King's College, Windsor, shall be increased to thirty-seven, by the addition of one governor for each of the several deaneries now established in the provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and three for the archdeaconry of the province of Prince Edward Island, to be elected from time to time for each said deanery and said archdeaconry by the rectors and clergymen in charge of parishes, together with the deans and canons of the Cathedral, resident in the deanery or archdeaconry, as the case may be, for which said governor or governors are to be elected, and the lay delegates to the Diocesan Synod of the Church of England in Canada resident within any of the parishes of said deanery or archdeaconry, as the case may be, at a meeting to be called for that purpose, and held in said deanery or archdeaconry respectively for which said governor or governors are to be elected, at which meeting there shall be present not less than three of said clergy and three of said lay delegates.

The members of the board of governors elected as provided for in this section, shall be resident churchmen of the sphere from which they are elected, provided that, in the provinces of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, if such lay delegates are not resident in the rural deanery or archdeaconry, then the lay electors shall be the church wardens of the parishes, instead of the lay delegates to the Synod."

See also Chapter 66, Acts of 1853, p. 110 of this Calendar.—R. J. W.]

2. That the said meeting for such election shall be called by the rural dean of such deanery, or in the case of the archdeaconry of Prince Edward Island by the archdeacon thereof, or in the absence, inability, or refusal to act of said dean or archdeacon, then by two others of said clergy in said deanery or archdeaconry,

as the case may be, and shall be held on or before the first day of June in each year, and the chairman of any such meeting shall upon any election certify the same, and the name of the governor elected thereat, to the secretary of the board of governors of said college, who shall duly enter the name of the person so elected in the registry of the College as one of the governors thereof, and such governor shall remain in office for one year, or until another be elected in his stead.

3. That in case of the death, resignation, or inability to serve of any governor elected under the provisions of this Act, then another may forthwith be elected in his stead by the same persons and in the same manner as is herein provided for the election of any governor for any deanery or said archdeaconry.

4. That in the event of the establishment of any additional deanery in either of the said provinces, then a governor shall be elected for every such additional deanery in the same manner as is herein provided for the present deaneries, in which case the number of governors of said King's College shall be increased accordingly.

STATUTES OF NOVA SCOTIA, 1895, (58 VIC.), p. 625,
CHAPTER 148.

**An Act to Amend the Act to Incorporate the Alumni of King's College,
Windsor, 10 Victoria, Chapter 53.**

(Passed the 11th day of March, A. D. 1895.)

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council, and Assembly, as follows:

1. Section IX of Chapter LIII, of the Acts of 1847 (10 Victoria), is amended to read as follows:—

“That the [a] general meeting of the said society shall be held once, that is to say, some time within the last fifteen days of the month of June, in each year, preferably on the day preceding encænia; or as often as may be directed by any rule or by-law of the said society.”

STATUTES OF NOVA SCOTIA, 1897, (60 VIC.), p. 392,
CHAPTER 129.

**An Act to Amend Chapter 147 of the Acts of 1895, respecting the
Governors of King's College, Windsor.**

(Passed the 1st day of March, A. D. 1897.)

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council, and Assembly, as follows:

1. Section 1, of Chapter 147, of the Acts of 1895, is hereby amended by adding thereto after the word “parishes” and before the word “resident” on the eighth line of said section, the words “together with the deans and canons of the cathedral.” Also by striking out of the eleventh line thereof the words “provincial and general,” before the word “Synod,” and by striking out of the twelfth line the word “respectively.” Also by striking out of the seventeenth and eighteenth lines of said section the word “four,” and inserting in the place thereof the word “three.”

2. Said section is also amended by adding at the end thereof the following words:—

“The members of the board of governors elected as provided for in this section, shall be resident churchmen of the sphere from which they are elected, provided that in the provinces of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, if such lay delegates are not resident in the rural deanery or archdeaconry, then the lay electors shall be the churchwardens of the parishes, instead of the lay delegates to the Synod.”

Bu-Laws of the Alumni of King's College, Windsor.

Passed at a General Meeting Held at the Halifax Hotel, June 27, 1848.

I. Besides the Annual General Meeting of the Incorporated Society, it shall be competent for the Committee at any time, either of their own accord, or upon a requisition signed by at least ten of the members of the Association, upon giving seven days' notice in the public papers, to call a Special General Meeting of the Association, specifying the purpose for which it is called, and in which meeting it shall be competent for the Association to transact any such business as may be required. Ten members shall be deemed a quorum for the transaction of business.

II. That the books, accounts, and papers of the Association shall be open at all times for the inspection of members, and the Secretary shall furnish an account of the affairs of the Association whenever required by the Committee.

III. That the Treasurer and Secretary, and such officers as shall be requisite for the incorporated Society, shall be annually appointed by the Executive Committee.

IV. That at the Annual Meeting of the Association, the President and Vice-President shall alternately go out of office accompanied by the first three of the Committee, and that all or any of them having a majority of votes shall be eligible to be re-elected.

V. That at any meeting, members not present may vote by proxy in writing, to be held by any other member; provided that no member shall be entitled to vote, either personally or by proxy, whose dues are not all paid up for the preceding year.

[A rule, No. 17 (see p. 122) was subsequently adopted "that no member be permitted to hold more than one proxy."—R. J. W.]

VI. That the funds of the Association will be appropriated for the payment of one or more professors or lecturers, and one or more scholarships at the University of King's College, or one or more teachers or exhibitions in the Collegiate School at Wind-

sor, to be denominated the Alumni Professorships and Scholarships, respectively.

VII. That the Association will scrupulously apply such donations as may be made to them to such specific objects in aid of King's College as may be directed by the donors respectively.

IX. (*Passed at General Meeting of June 21st, 1849.*) That the election of Members of the Incorporation shall be by ballot.

Rules Passed at Different Times,

1. That no resolution or proceeding inconsistent with or modifying any resolution or proceeding adopted by a general meeting be entertained by the Executive Committee in Halifax, except upon a month's notice to the Committee being given by the person proposing the same, and that no such resolution or proceeding be carried into effect until the same shall have been confirmed by a general meeting to be summoned for the consideration thereof, if necessary to be arranged before the annual general meeting.

2. A month's notice shall be given of all resolutions affecting the rights of members or creating new offices or salaries.

3. No individual shall be entitled to vote under a parochial certificate unless he be authorized by a parish meeting.

4. All annual general meetings of this Association shall be holden at Windsor.

5. That the Treasurer make up his annual account to the 30th of April in each and every year.

6. In the election of Governors, all the names proposed shall be put on the same ballot, out of whom those having the highest number shall be declared elected; provided that no person shall be declared elected as Governor unless he have a majority of votes cast.

7. That in the election of Governors the order of names be such as to place the name of the candidate obtaining the smallest number of votes at the head of the list, and so on in succession.

8. That the ballot be not sent round for any officers of this Association, or of the Board of Governors, whose name has not been previously proposed and seconded by some member of the Association; and that the ballot be not taken until all the names of all persons intended to be proposed for any office be given.

9. That the Executive Committee of the Associated Alumni be empowered at their monthly meetings, during the interval between one annual general meeting and the next, to elect members of the incorporation, provided that no black beans be cast against them.

10. That honorary certificates be granted in the several departments instead of the prizes, as heretofore.

11. That any member of the Society whose annual subscription shall remain and be unpaid for three years, shall cease to be a member of this Society, and can only be admitted as a new member by being proposed and seconded and duly elected pursuant to the by-laws.

12. That the Alumni adopt for Life Members donors of \$200 and upwards to the Endowment Fund.

13. That a statement be made to the Alumni at their annual meetings of the funds and appropriations of the College.

14. That efforts be made to increase the number of Alumni, and that graduates and students be solicited to become members.

15. That graduates of the College be *ipso facto* members of the Association, on payment of subscription, without election.

16. That the annual subscription be Two Dollars, and that the payment of the sum of Twenty-five Dollars by any person at any one time may entitle him to life-membership; but "That while the payment of Two Dollars annually confers every privilege of membership, all are earnestly requested to remember the urgent need of the College, the important work the Alumni are associated to advance, and that they need not necessarily limit the amount to the sum above named."

17. That no member be permitted to hold more than one proxy.

The School is pleasantly situated about three-quarters of a mile from the Town of Windsor. It has good and ample recreation grounds, with a well equipped Gymnasium, in charge of a skilled professional instructor, play-room, cottage infirmary, etc. The building is heated throughout by hot water and lighted by electric light, as are also the gymnasium and play-room.

The School provides a good general education, and pupils are prepared for matriculation at King's College and other Universities, for the entrance examination, Royal Military College, Kingston, Ontario, for the Army and Navy, and for commercial pursuits. The School is carried on under the general management of the Rector, who was formerly, for twelve years, Head Master.

Pupils who are members of the Church of England attend the Sunday services in the College Chapel; those belonging to other denominations may, at the request of their parents, attend the services and the Sunday School of the denomination to which they belong, and the Minister of the Church will be requested to furnish a certificate of regular attendance at the end of each term.

Careful attention is given to moral training and religious instruction.

Brief reports of boys' progress and conduct are sent home at mid-term, and detailed reports at the end of each term.

Pupils are required to pay strict observance to the rules and regulations of the School.

Instruction will be given in Book-keeping, Shorthand and Type-writing, provided a class is formed large enough to warrant the attendance of a special teacher, the fee for which subjects will be given on application.

Reductions in the general fee for Board and Tuition are made for brothers, sons of clergymen, and boys under twelve years of age.

Arrangements may be made for inclusive terms.

All fees are payable strictly in advance.

Pocket money will be given weekly in such amounts as parents may desire.

Boys either provide their own bedding, (except mattress and bedstead), towels, table napkins, etc., or pay a fee of \$15.00 on entering the School, in which case these articles are supplied by the School during the whole period of residence.

It is particularly requested that all clothing, linen, etc., be plainly marked with the owner's name.

There are six exhibitions for the sons of clergymen, and the Board of Governors have placed at the disposal of the School two nominations at King's College, which exempt those who hold them from certain annual College fees and from that for the degree of B. A.

Money prizes of \$40.00, \$20.00, \$15.00 and \$5.00 are presented annually by the Alumni of King's College.

One-half term's notice must be given in writing, or one-half term's fee paid previous to the removal of a pupil.

LEGISLATION OF THE PROVINCE OF NEW BRUNSWICK
AFFECTING KING'S COLLEGE LAW SCHOOL.

I EDW. VII., CAP. XVII.

An Act relating to the Admission of Attorneys.

WHEREAS the University of King's College, Windsor, in the Province of Nova Scotia, has established a School of Law in the City of Saint John, in this Province, and has appointed a Dean and Law Faculty and Board of Examiners in connection there-with ;

And whereas a Student at Law in this Province who is a Student in such School, must undergo and pass the Examination prescribed by said Faculty and Board of Examiners before being qualified for the Degree of Bachelor of Civil Law of said University ;

Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor and Legislative Assembly, as follows :—

1. The Honorable the Attorney General and President of the Barristers' Society of this Province for the time being, and such other member of the Council of the Barristers' Society as may be designated by said Council, shall be *ex officio* members of the Board of Examiners of said School of Law.

2. From and after the passing of this Act any Student at Law, making application for admission as an Attorney of the Supreme Court of this Province, shall on presentation of a Diploma from the said University of King's College, conferring on him the Degree of Bachelor of Civil Law, and a certificate signed by the Dean of the said School of Law and countersigned

by the Attorney General or the President of the said Barristers' Society, of his having there satisfactorily passed the examination prescribed by said Faculty and Board of Examiners, and recommending him for admission as an Attorney of said Supreme Court, and on said Student conforming with the requisites of the bye-laws of the Barristers' Society in all other respects, shall be entitled to be admitted as such Attorney without undergoing or passing any other examination.

3. Section 3 of Chapter 33, of Consolidated Statutes, is hereby amended by inserting after the word "Laws" in line three, the words "or Bachelor of Civil Law,"

DEGREES IN LAW.

BACHELOR OF CIVIL LAW.

I. MATRICULATION.

The candidate for this degree must be a matriculated student of King's College, except in cases hereinafter provided for. If he be an Attorney-at-Law or a Student-at-Law who has been matriculated by any Law Society, or duly entered according to the law and practice of the Courts of any one of the Provinces of Canada, he shall be admitted to matriculation in the University without further examination. These shall be termed undergraduates.

The Candidates will be required to pass three examinations, separated by intervals of not less than a year, to be called the first, second and final examinations in law.

A Barrister of three years' standing, who is a graduate in law of any recognized University may be admitted to the degree of B. C. L. on passing the examination in Roman Law provided for the second year. (Particulars of the University Matriculation Examination will be found in the General Calendar; this examination is held at the College at Windsor, and the following centres: St. John, N. B., Charlottetown, P. E. I., St. John's, Newfoundland, and Bermuda.

A Barrister of not less than seven years' standing, who shall have been a lecturer in the Faculty of Law for three years, may be admitted to the standing of an undergraduate of the third year.

A graduate in law of any recognized University may be admitted as an undergraduate of the third year, and shall be entitled to the degree of B. C. L. on passing the examination for the third year, including an examination in Roman law.

General students (being those who are not undergraduates) may be admitted to attend the Lectures on producing certificates of good moral character. Partial courses may also be taken.

II. REGISTERING.

All undergraduates must sign the matriculation Register, and general and partial students the register provided for the purpose.

III. TRANSFER OF STUDENTS.

Undergraduates of other Law Schools may be admitted to an *ad eundem* standing in this School if, on examination, they shall be found qualified. Any person duly matriculated may, at the end of the first year, (though he has not attended the Lectures of the School) matriculate as a student of the second year on passing the same examination as is provided for students at the close of the first year, and the same provisions shall apply to the third year.

VII. EXAMINATION AND GRADUATION.

All undergraduates shall be required to undergo examinations at the end of Hilary Term in all the subjects of their respective years.

Every undergraduate, previous to presenting himself for an examination, must obtain from each Professor or Lecturer whose lectures he has attended during the term, a certificate of attendance, which shall not be granted without the consent of the Faculty if there be more than three absences during the course of a term.

An undergraduate who has attended the lectures and passed the examinations of the first two years may be admitted to the degree of B. C. L. on passing the final examination and paying the fees for the third year, without attending the lectures of the third year.

In order that a candidate may pass in any of the three examinations, he must obtain sixty per cent of the marks assigned to each paper.

If an undergraduate fail to pass in more than two subjects at an examination he shall lose his year, but if he fail to pass in two or less, he shall be allowed a supplementary examination in such subject, or subjects, at the beginning of any subsequent year, and not sooner.

VIII. ACADEMICAL HABIT.

Bachelors of Civil Law are entitled to wear gowns and hoods. The gowns are of black silk and the hoods of blue silk, trimmed with white fur.

DOCTOR OF CIVIL LAW.

Regulations Respecting the Degree of D. C. L.

A. The Candidate for this degree must be a Bachelor of Civil Law of five years' standing, complete.

B. He must compose and submit to the President of the University, one month before the date of the *Encaenia* at which degrees are to be conferred, a Thesis on some legal subject to be appointed by the Faculty.

C. He must forward to the President of the University with the Thesis a declaration that he has carefully read the following course of study and reading, namely:—

DEGREE OF DOCTOR OF MEDICINE AND
MASTER OF SURGERY.

DEGREES.

Two Medical Degrees are conferred by this University, viz.,
Doctor of Medicine (M. D.), and Master of Surgery (C.M.)

MATRICULATION EXAMINATION.

1. Candidates for medical degrees must give evidence of having obtained a satisfactory general education, by presenting certificates of having passed, before entering on the course of study qualifying for the degrees, either the Matriculation Examination of the Provincial Medical Board of Nova Scotia, or some other examination recognized by the Board as sufficient.*

*All information in reference to the requirements for Matriculation Examination of the Provincial Medical Board. Exemptions, etc., may be obtained on application to the Registrar of the Board. Dr. A. W. H. Lindsay, 241 Pleasant Street, Halifax.

2. The Examinations recognized *pro tanto* by the Provincial Medical Board will be similarly recognized by this Faculty.

DEGREE EXAMINATIONS.

Candidates for the Degrees of M. D. and C. M. shall be required to pass two main examinations—the Primary and Final M. D., C. M. examinations—and to have satisfied at the dates of the examinations certain conditions as to the attendance on classes, etc.

PRIMARY M. D., C. M., EXAMINATION.

1. This examination shall consist of two parts; Section A to be passed at the end of the First Year, and Section B at the end of the Second Year.

(A). PRIMARY EXAMINATION, SECTION A.

(1.) This examination shall include Anatomy, Histology, Chemistry, and Elementary Biology to the extent indicated in the following synopsis:

ANATOMY.

A written examination on Osteology, including general physical characters, chemical composition course and structure of bone. Ossification, Arthrology, classification of Joints, structure and mechanism of the more important (hip, knee, shoulder, elbow, ankle, etc.)

HISTOLOGY.

A written examination on the structure of the tissues and of the organs of the body. Candidates may also be called upon to describe the general histological methods of fixing and hardening tissues and organs, and cutting, staining and mounting sections.

CHEMISTRY.

Elementary general chemistry, as in the course of the Junior Chemistry Class, outlined on pp. 97, 98. Two papers will be set corresponding to the work outlined under "class-work" and "laboratory-work" respectively in the above course.

ELEMENTARY BIOLOGY.

Candidates will be expected to show a practical acquaintance with the topics indicated as forming the subject matter of the courses of lectures and instruction in Botany and Zoology outlined at pp. 99, 100.

(2). Candidates for this examination shall be required to produce certificates to the following effect :

(a) Of having passed the Matriculation Examination of the Provincial Medical Board of Nova Scotia or other examination recognized as sufficient, at least one academic year previously, and of having completed their sixteenth year before the passing of said examination.

(b) Of having, after passing the Matriculation Examination, attended either in this University, in the Halifax Medical College, or in some other University or College approved by the Faculty, during at least one medical session of eight months duration, the following courses of lectures and instruction, viz: *Anatomy*, (*Osteology and Arthrology*) a course of at least 75 lectures and demonstrations with 10 hours laboratory work per week for six months; *Chemistry*, a course of at least 75 lectures with a laboratory course of not less than three hours per week for six months; *Elementary Biology*, a course of at least 100 hours of lectures and laboratory work.

(B). PRIMARY EXAMINATION, SECTION B.

(1). This examination shall include Anatomy, Physiology, and Histology, Chemistry, and Materia Medica to the extent indicated in the following synopsis :

Anatomy.—This examination will be partly written and partly *viva voce*. The paper may include questions in Descriptive and Regional Anatomy, Surgical and Medical Anatomy. At the oral examination candidates will be examined on the skeleton, recent dissections, models, preparations, etc.

Physiology and Histology: A written and oral examination on: (a) The physiology of digestion, absorption, circulation, respiration, secretion, nutrition, animal heat, animal motion, the functions of the nervous system, and sense organs: reproductions and development.

(b) The composition of food, and of the tissues, secretions, excretions, and other fluids of the body.

At the oral examinations microscopical preparations of the tissue, and organs of the body, will also be submitted for identification and description.

Chemistry.—Inorganic, organic and medical chemistry as in the course of the Senior Chemistry Class, outlined on page 96. The examination will include: (a) Two papers corresponding respectively to the work outlined under "class-work" and "laboratory-work" in the above course. (b) A practical examination in the laboratory. (c) An oral examination in which in addition to the preceding, questions may be put to the candidates upon the work prescribed in chemistry under Section A of the Primary Examination, (p. 100).

(2.) Candidates for this examination shall be required to produce certificates to the following effects :

(a) Of having passed the Matriculation Examination, or other examination recognized as sufficient, at least two academic years previously, and of having completed their sixteenth year before the passing of said examination.

(b) Of having, after passing the Matriculation or other equivalent examination, attended either in this University, in the Halifax Medical College, or in some other School of Medicine approved by the Senate, during at least two medical sessions each of eight months' duration, the course of lectures, etc., prescribed above for Sec. A of the primary examination, and having also attended the following, viz.: *Junior Chemistry*, a course of at least 75 lectures and demonstrations with 10 hours laboratory

work per week for six months; *Senior Chemistry*, a course in Organic and Medical Chemistry of 75 lectures with a laboratory course of not less than 3 hours per week for six months; *Physiology*, a course of at least 75 lectures; *Histology*, a course of at least 75 hours of lectures and laboratory work.

(c) Of having passed in the subjects of the first part of the Primary Examination either at this University, at the Halifax Medical College, or at some other Medical College specially recognized by the Faculty.

2. The Primary M. D., C. M. Examination will be held in the second and third weeks in April. Candidates are required to hand in their applications and to transmit as far as possible the certificates specified above for Section A or Section B, as the case may be, to the Secretary of the Faculty at least fourteen days before the date of the examination, and the remainder of the required certificates not less than two days before the date of the examination, and to pay before the date of the examination, one-sixth of the amount of the graduation fee in the case of candidates for Section A, and one-third of the graduation fee in the case of candidates for Section B.

FINAL M. D., C. M. EXAMINATION.

1. This Examination shall also consist of two parts, one to be passed at the end of the fourth Academic Year.

(A.) Final Examination, Section A.

(1.) This Examination will include the following subjects: Materia Medica, Pharmacy and Therapeutics; Pathology and Bacteriology; Medical Jurisprudence, Hygiene and Insanity.

Materia Medica, etc.—This examination will be partly written and partly oral. The candidates will require to possess a knowledge of:

(a) The general nature and composition, and the most important physical and chemical characters of the Pharmacopœial drugs, named in the annexed schedule.

(b) The composition of the Pharmacopœial preparations of these drugs, and the process employed in making them.

(c) The doses, therapeutical uses and modes of administration of these drugs and their preparations. writing of prescriptions.

(d) The remedial uses of Electricity and Galvanism, Heat and Cold, Climate, etc.

(e) Diet.

At the *oral* examination candidates will be required to recognize the drugs indicated by *italics* in the annexed Schedule:

Medical Jurisprudence, Hygiene and Insanity:—The Examination will be partly written, partly oral. Candidates will be examined on the following topics:

Forensic Medicine.

I. Examination of Persons found Dead, with reference to:—(1) Identification; (2) Time of Death (3) Cause of Death.

II. Violent Causes of Death:—(1) Drowning; (2) Strangulation (3) Suffocation; (4) Mechanical Injuries and Wounds.

III. Poisons and Poisoning:—(1) Symptoms and post-mortem appearances in cases of poisoning by the following agents:—Inorganic—Miner: 1 Acids: Solutions of Alkalis; Copper; Lead; Mercury; Antimony; Arsenic; Phosphorus. Organic—Oxalic Acid; Carbohic Acid; Hydrate; Cyanides. (2) Duties of medical men in cases of Poisoning as regards observation: Treatment and Preservation of parts for Analysis. (3) Preliminary Tests for Poisonous Substances for Clinical Use before reference to an Analyst.

IV. Medico-legal points in connection with:—Pregnancy, Delivery, Rape, Criminal Abortion, Infanticide, Assaults and Homicide, Wounds and other external injuries: Mental Capacity in relation to Criminal Responsibility, Contracts and Wills; Malpractice, and Neglect of Duty.

V. Forms of Isanity. Examination of persons supposed to be insane. The Lunacy Laws in so far as they effect the Medical Practitioner, when signing Certificates of Lunacy.

Hygiene.

I. WATER, in its relation to the Health and Disease:—(1) The Character and Classification of Drinking Water. (2) The Causes and Sources of Impurities found in Water and Methods of Purification. (3) The Diseases conveyed by Water, and the Methods of dealing with Epidemics and Diseases.

II. AIR, in relation to Health and Disease:—(1) The Causes and Sources of the Impurities found in Air. (2) The Diseases conveyed through the Air. (3) The Quantity of Air necessary for Health; the Principles of Ventilation.

- III. SOIL, in relation to Health and Disease :—(1) The Causes and Sources of the Impurities in the Soil, and the Methods of dealing with them
(2) Diseases connected with the Soil. (3) The Methods of dealing with Excreta and Sewage.
- IV. FOOD, in relation to Health and Disease :—(1) Dietetics. (2) The common Adulterations of the chief Articles of Diet. (3) Diseases connected with Deficiency or Impurity of Foodsupply.
- V. The Dwelling, in relation to Health and Disease :—The Principles of House Drainage.
- VI. The Principles of Disinfection, and the mode of action of the chief Disinfecting Agents.
- VII. The provisions of the Act for the Notification of Disease.

Pathology and Cacteriology :—The Examination will be partly written partly *viva voce*. Candidates will be expected to possess a knowledge of :—

(a) General Pathology, including Degenrative Processes, Inflammation, Morbid Growths, etc.

(b) General Etiology, with reference to Parasitic and Infective Diseases.

(c) Systematic Pathology, the more important diseases of the principal systems and organs of the body.

(d) Bacteriology, to include the General Morphology and Life History of Micro-Organisms; Characters of Organisms Pathogenic to the Human Subject, and their modes of producing diseases, etc.

At the oral examination candidates will be examined on gross and microscopical preparations, and will be expected to possess a knowledge of the Preparation of Culture Media, Methods of Isolation and Cultivation, Staining, Separation of Bacterial Products, Inoculation.

(2). Candidates for this examination shall be required to furnish certificates to the following effect, viz :

(a) Of having passed the Matriculation Examination, or other examination recognized as sufficient, at least three academic years previously, and of having completed their sixteenth year before the passing of said examination.

(b) Of having, after passing the Matriculation or other equivalent examination, attended either in this University, in the Halifax Medical College, or in some other School of Medicine approved by the Faculty, the course of lectures, etc., prescribed above for candidates for the Primary M. D., C. M. Examination.

(c) Of having passed the Primary M. D., C. M. Examination at this University.

(d) Of having, after passing the Matriculation Examination, attended at the Halifax Medical College, or at some other College or School of Medicine approved by the Faculty, during at least one medical session of eight months' duration, the following courses of lectures and instruction, viz : *Materia Medica*, a course of at least 75 lectures; *Therapeutics*, a course of at least 50 lectures; *Medical Juaisprudence (including Insanity)*, a course of at least 50 lectures and demonstrations; *Hygiene*, a course of at least 25 lectures and demonstrations; *Pathology and Bacteriology*, a course of at least 150 hours' lectures, demonstration and laboratory work.

(e) Either of having, after passing the Matriculation Examination, attended at the Halifax Medical College, or at some other College approved by the Faculty, one course of instruction of at least thirty lessons in Practical Dispensing, or of having, after passing the Matriculation Examination, had three months' practice in the dispensing of drugs with a registered apothecary or dispensing medical practioner. Persons submitting a college certificate must also show that they have passed a satisfactory examination at the end of their course of instruction.

(f) Of havlng, after passing the preliminary examination attended the Post Mortem Examinations in a recognized Hospital for a period of at least eight months, during which they have received practical instruction in the methods of making Post Mortem Examinations and in framing Reports. Such certificate to be accompanied by reports of at least six autopsies which the candidate has attended.

(B). FINAL EXAMINATION. SECTION B.

(1.) This Examination will include the following subjects :—Surgery, Clinical Surgery, Medicine, Clinical Medicine, Obstetrics and Diseases of Women and Childred.

Surgery :—The Examination in this subject will be partly written and partly *viva voce*. The candidates will be expected to possess a knowledge of the Principles and Practices of Surgery, of Surgical Pathology, Surgical Anatomy, and Operative Surgery. They will also be examined on the more common Diseases of the Skin, of the Eye, Ear, Throat and Nose.

Clinical Surgery :—This Examination will be partly practical and partly oral. Cases will be submitted for diagnosis and treatment. Candidates will also be examined on the application of Splints and Bandages, and on the uses of Surgical Instruments and Appliances.

Medicine :—In this subject there will be a written and an oral examination on the Clinical History, Causes, Diagnosis, Prognosis and Treatment of the different Systems and Organs of the Body. The examination will also include infectious Diseases, Constitutional Diseases Mental Diseases and Diseases of the Nervous System. Candidates may also be questioned on Medical Anatomy and Therapeutics.

Clinical Medicine :—The Examination in Clinical Medicine will be partly practical and partly oral. Patients will be submitted for examination, diagnosis and treatment. Examination of Urine, Sputa, etc., will be required.

Obstetrics and Diseases of Women and Children :—in these subjects there will be a written and an oral examination, which will embrace the following :—

- (a) The Anatomy and the Physiology of the Female Organs of Reproduction.
- (b) The Physiology, Pathology and Therapeutics of Pregnancy.
- (c) Parturition, natural and morbid.
- (d) Hygiene, Pathology and Therapeutics of the Puerperal State.
- (e) Hygiene, Pathology and Therapeutics of Infancy and Childhood.
- (f) Special Pathology and Therapeutics of the Female Organs of Reproduction.

At the oral examination candidates may also be questioned on Gynaecological Operations and the use of Instruments and Appliances.

(2) Candidates for this Examination will be required to furnish certificates to the following effect, viz :

(a) That they have completed their twenty-first year, or that they will have done so on and before the day of graduation. This certificate shall be signed by themselves, and shall be after the following form :

(b) Of having passed the Primary M.D., C.M. Examination at this University.

(c) Of having passed the First part (Sect. A) of the Final Examination, in Pathology, Materia Medica and Therapeutics, Medical Jurisprudence, Hygiene and Insanity.

(d) Of having, after passing the Matriculation Examination, attended during four academic years, (as in § LIX) at least two courses of lectures per year in subjects of the Primary and Final M. D., C. M. Examinations, either in this University or at the Halifax Medical College, or at some other Medical School or College recognized by the Senate.

(e) Of having, after passing the Matriculation Examination, attended at the Halifax Medical College, or at some other College or School of Medicine approved by the Faculty, during at least two medical sessions each of eight months' duration (a) the courses of lectures, etc., prescribed for Sect. A. of the Final Examination, and (b) having also attended two courses of at least 75 lectures in each of the following, viz. : *Surgery, Medicine, Obstetrics and Diseases of Women and Children. Clinical Surgery, Clinical Medicine* ; and one course of at least 25 lectures and demonstrations in *Ophthalmology, Otology and Laryngology*.

(f) Of having, after passing the Matriculation Examination, attended a course in Operative Surgery, and of having performed operations on the dead body to the satisfaction of the Teacher.

(g) Of having, after passing the Matriculation Examination, attended during at least sixteen months the practice of the Victoria General Hospital, or that of some other Hospital approved by the Senate.

(h) Of having, after passing the Matriculation Examination, attending during at least eight months, the practice of a Dispensary, or of the out-patient department of a General Hospital.

(c) Of having, after passing the Matriculation Examination, attended during at least eight months, courses of practical instruction of at least 25 lessons or demonstrations each in Medicine and in Surgery, including :—the methods of examining

various organs and others parts of the body, in order to detect the evidence of disease or the effect of accidents—the employment of instruments and apparatus used in diagnosis or treatment, the examination of the Urine and other secretions, and of morbid products.

(j) Of having, after passing the Matriculation Examination, served at least eight months as a dresser in the Surgical wards, and eight months as a Clinical Clerk in the Medical wards of a recognized Hospital or otherwise given satisfactory evidence of practical work in Surgery Medicine.

(k) Of having, after passing the Matriculation Examination, attended for at least eight months the practice of a lying in hospital, approved by the Faculty, and of having attended at least six cases of midwifery, under a recognized practitioner.

(l) Of having, after passing the Matriculation Examination, received instruction and attained proficiency in the practice of Vaccination, under a recognized medical practitioner.

2. The final M. D., C. M. Examination will be held in the second and third weeks in April. Candidates are required to hand in their applications and to transmit as far as possible the certificates specified above for Section A. or Section B, as the case may be, to the Secretary of the Faculty, at least fourteen days before the date of the Examination, and the remainder of the required certificates not less than two days before the date of Examination, to enter their names in the register of undergraduates before the dates of examination, and to pay before the date of the examination, one sixth of the amount of the graduation fee in the case of candidates for Sect. A, and one-third of the graduation fee in the case of candidates for Sect. B.

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
